The long-awaited announcement of The Resort at Ludlow Bay Membership Program is out of the bag. Residents of the greater Port Ludlow area are being given a preferred offering period in which to meet with a sales associate and sign up for membership in The Club at Ludlow Bay. During this period a reduced deposit fee will be offered for early signup. Four membership programs are available: Social, Golf, Sports/Marina, or Marina/Golf.

The success of the Membership Program will ensure that all facilities and programs will go forward including:

- construction of a new Golf Clubhouse facility that will include a Pro Shop, men’s and women’s locker facilities, steam room, ballroom, tournament room, bar and grill, and reception area with casual seating
- rebuild of existing sand traps and trap drainage on the Golf Course
- construction of a covered facility for the Driving Range
- construction of a new Marina building at the site of the existing Marina store including a private members area

In a meeting with Michael Padden, the *Voice* asked about the minimum number of memberships required to go forward with the program. Padden responded, “We will improve the facilities regardless of the number of memberships sold.” As we discussed rumors and misinformation that abounds in Port Ludlow, Padden again repeated the commitment saying, “This is a win-win situation for our members and the Resort. This program offers the residents of Port Ludlow an opportunity to become involved in what is destined to be one of the finest social clubs in the Northwest.”

Padden further explained that fee schedules are not available at the *Voice* deadline. He said program fees for “The Club” would be termed deposits and 100 percent refundable. This is a change from the past when Golf Club Initiation Fees were non-refundable. He also explained that in the event a member sells his/her home and relocates outside the area, the program provides the member with the ability to transfer his/her membership to the new purchaser thus assuring the new owner of a membership. This feature of the program becomes very important once full membership is achieved. Padden said the plan was for “The Club” to become a private club available only for members, tournaments and Resort guests.

When asked about rights for current Golf Club members, Padden said all current members would receive a credit based on the amount the member already paid. When asked about long-time members who received memberships as an incentive to purchase homes and land, he said,

Soft Furnishings—Working with Fabric

Dana Pointe Interiors is offering a free workshop in soft furnishings that will focus on upholstery, pillow making and fabric on **Wednesday, August 28**, at 3:00 p.m. Ann Little from “A Little Upholstery” and Laurel Shelton, Dana Pointe’s premier pillow maker, are guest speakers.

Soft furnishings can be the touch that makes your decorating scheme complete. They can make an important addition and liven up, tone down, or complement a room in a meaningful way. A change in upholstery color or new pillows can transform the space and give existing décor a new lease on life.

A soft-furnishing scheme can take as much planning and thought as any other part of your home decoration. Making your own soft furnishings can be quite easy, and give you the opportunity to create loose covers, curtains, cushions and pillows to give your home a personal touch.

When choosing a fabric, keep in mind:

- **Type of fabric:** Match to your project; upholstery should be sturdy and tightly woven. Draperies and curtains are most flexible but watch for fade resistance and sun damage. Blended fibers are generally stronger, or add a lining.
- **Color for fabric:** Decide on main and/or primary colors and a secondary color, then add one or two accent colors, fringe, beads, and creatively make up the rest.
- **Pattern and style:** When choosing and mixing patterns keep in mind the scale of your room as well as the main design and balance of colors. You can pick up on the main color in the room in the background color of your fabric, or in any other colors in the upholstery design. One formula of 2/3 main, 1/3 secondary, 1/6 accent can help with layout.

Humane Help for Feral Cats

Despite the abundance of hungry wildlife, Jefferson County has an overpopulation of feral (wild) cats. The Feral Cat division of the Jefferson County Animal Services Auxiliary (JCASA) has a program for humanely dealing with the problem. They will lend humane traps to people interested in getting the feral cats they may be feeding "fixed," so they won't be feeding increasing numbers of cats.

The Feral Cat Division pays for the sterilization surgery. Unfortunately they don't have a cat sanctuary, so the sterilized cats must be returned to their origin. Since June of 2001 they have fixed more than 150 feral cats throughout the County.

JCASA, a membership-based non-profit organization, has a program to help financially with the spay/neuter of pet cats and dogs. They are financed by fund-raisers and donations. For further information, call Phyllis Becker, Coordinator of the Feral Cat Division, at 437-9085.

Know More about the Fred Hill Materials Project

On **Wednesday, August 7**, the Jefferson County Planning Commission will continue public hearings that began Wednesday, July 24, to take testimony on issues surrounding the request by Fred Hill Materials for a Mineral Lands Overlay Designation expanding the current site of operations into timberlands owned by Pope Resources. The hearing will be held at the Shold Business Park in Port Hadlock at 7:00 p.m. The Commission will make a recommendation to the Jefferson County Commissioners to approve or disapprove the application should the company apply for a permit. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and Jefferson County are co-leads on the project expansion proposal. DNR will formulate a reclamation plan for the project. The County will go through the due process of public hearings and permitting.

If you'd like to see the Fred Hill Materials aggregate operation for yourself, the Village Council Government and Regional Affairs Committee is arranging weekly tours for all citizens interested in judging the impacts of the proposed pit-to-pier project for themselves. Medicare and Supplemental Insurance Workshop

A clinic/workshop to assist anyone with problems or questions about his/her Medicare or supplemental insurance will be **Friday, August 16**, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m., at the Bay Club. Dick Moser, a volunteer with Statewide Health Insurance Benefits Advisors (SHIBA), has made the arrangements and will be available to answer questions along with other SHIBA staff members and volunteers.

SHIBA is a special service of the State Insurance Commissioner's Office that provides free health insurance education, assistance, and advocacy for all Washington residents, including seniors and the disabled. Volunteers and staff assist consumers with choices and problems involving private health insurance as well as many government programs (Medicare, Medicaid, Basic Health Plan, Children's Health Insurance Program, and the Washington State Health Insurance Pool). They also can help with and provide information on Medigap coverage, employment-related health benefits, managed care, long-term care insurance, medical billings and fraud/abuse questions. SHIBA has been assisting Medicare beneficiaries since 1979.

July Meeting Recap

A full house at the July Port Ludlow Village Council meeting listened to three presentations of current political and environmental interest to the community.

The Council introduced three candidates for the position of Jefferson County Sheriff and invited them to make brief presentations concerning their qualifications and backgrounds. Kristen Anderson reviewed her ten years' experience in law enforcement and her current position as Police Chief in Port Townsend. Mike Brasfield directed attention to his thirty-three years of law enforcement experience that included five years as Assistant Police Chief in Seattle and six years as Chief of Police of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Bob Hinton cited twenty-nine years' experience in criminal justice positions including twelve years as Chief of Police in Port Townsend.

At the conclusion of the presentations, an audience member questioned the need for both a Port Townsend Police Force and a Jefferson County Sheriff's Office in such a small jurisdiction. Each of the candidates responded to the question. Anderson, citing geographic distances and the prevalence of drug issues in the County, said that she was not a proponent of consolidation at this time; however, she strongly supports collaboration between the two agencies. Hinton said that tax shortfalls and budgetary restrictions might compel consideration of consolidating the two agencies. Brasfield stressed the importance of each agency having a willingness to share resources and eliminate duplications of effort. He also suggested that contracting some services might be considered. In the long run, Brasfield said, Port Ludlow will need increased services.

The North Olympic Salmon Coalition, represented by its Executive Director, Paula Mackrow, made the next presentation to the Council. The Coalition's objective is the restoration and improvement of salmon stocks in the northern Peninsula. Using overhead projections, Mackrow showed the Ludlow watershed and explained the process of food web development, particularly in the Puget Sound area. She expressed particular interest in any historical or anecdotal evidence that anyone in Port Ludlow might have of the presence of salmon in Ludlow Creek at any time in the past. Such information, Mackrow said, would

enhance the possibility of restoring it as a viable habitat for the fish.

John Fabian representing the Hood Canal Coalition made the final presentation. The Coalition is an organization dedicated to opposing the apparent expansion plans of Fred Hill Materials (FHM) that operates a gravel strip mining operation in the Thorndyke area near Shine. According to Fabian, FHM has a pending request before the Jefferson County Planning Commission to change the zoning designation of 6,240 acres of forest land to mineral lands. This, Fabian says, will eventually result in a tenfold production increase in its mining operation, expanding their current 144 acres from 400 to 800 acres.

Fabian cited plans by FHM to build a four-mile long conveyor from the Shine Pit to the Hood Canal. Here, the material would be transported along a "T"-shaped industrial pier extending 1,100 feet into the Hood Canal for loading onto ships or barges ranging from 400 to 740 feet. He expressed the Coalition's concerns about the impact of such a plan on both the Hood Canal Bridge and on the

environment. Bridge opening and closures would significantly increase, he said. Wetlands, lakes, and streams, as well as shoreline conservancy and land wildlife, would all be negatively impacted according to Fabian.

A representative of Fred Hill Materials will make a presentation to the Council at the August meeting. Residents wishing to tour the facility are welcome. (See related story on page 4)

In other business, the Council received several PLVC Committee reports: The Trails Committee gave an extensive report to the Council. Six members participated in the presentation, addressing projects and conditions of the various trails. (See the related story on this page). The Membership and Elections Committee reported that there would be five openings on the Council, three from the North Bay and two from the South Bay. (See the related story on page 4). The Tax Committee recommended the Council seek an overturn of the Jefferson County Board of Equalization's downward revision of Port Ludlow Associates' tax liability. (See related article below). When the Council reconvened to deal with this issue they voted not to pursue the appeal.

PLA's Tax Relief Questioned by Tax Committee

Ron Null, new Chairman of the Village Council's Tax Committee, replacing Bert Loomis, recommended to the Council at their July 11 meeting that they seek an overturn of the Jefferson County Board of Equalization's downward revision of Port Ludlow Associates' (PLA's) tax liability. PLA had appealed their assessment based on the purchase price paid in August of 2001. According to Null, PLA's tax reduction of approximately \$43,000 would result in a redistribution of the County's lost tax revenue to all other property owners in Jefferson County, of which Port Ludlow represents about twelve percent.

The Golf Course and Clubhouse accounted for the bulk of the readjusted assessments. The County Tax Review Board lowered Tax Assessor Jack Westerman's assessment by \$2,068,265. They also reduced the value of the Inn by \$960,000, from \$3.87 million to \$2.9 million, still \$300,000 more than the value claimed by PLA. The Board confirmed Westerman's \$1.092 million assessment for the Village Center, rejecting PLA's claim that the facility was worth only \$175,000, based on an independent appraisal done on their behalf.

The Tax Committee's proposal generated considerable discussion between Null, some Council members, and members of the audience. Questions were raised concerning the appropriateness or inappropriateness of certain assessment stratagems and what the cost would be for the Village Council to file an appeal with the State Board of Tax Appeals by the July 19 deadline.

When Chair Sally Smith reconvened the Council immediately following the adjournment of the regular meeting, they voted not to pursue the appeal recommended by the Tax Committee.

Trails In the Right Direction

In the July issue of the *Voice*, we reported that the PLVC Trail Committee's proposal for management of our trails has been approved. What this means is that the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC), South Bay Community Association (SBCA), Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC), and Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) have all pledged to contribute to the cost of community trail upkeep and repair, plus improvements such as signs, maps, and other printed information for the use of Port Ludlow residents and guests.

Thanks to our community's leaders, the Trails Committee has a lot of work ahead! Details of how to accomplish it are being worked out, opinions are being expressed, and new ideas are coming in every day. This topic has a lot of vitality—and the "rumor mill" is in full operation! Unfortunately, there are some rumors making the rounds which are completely false, such as the one that has the Trails Committee poised to force unwanted trails through various sections of the North Bay greenbelts.

Please be assured, North Bay residents, that this is absolutely untrue. Only the residents of North Bay, through their LMC Board of Trustees and Greenbelt Committee, can decide what is done in North Bay greenbelts. Before any trails are built, many factors would need to be considered: the privacy and security of nearby residents, storm water drainage issues, wildlife, parking, expected trail usage patterns, and more. The Trails Committee is interested in working to develop new trails only where the affected residents desire them, and would strongly urge investigation of all these factors before embarking on any trail-building project.

Highlights of Recent Trails Activity—and Things to Come

- Our newest trail, variously known as the Cunningham Memorial Trail, the Waterfall Trail, and the Ludlow Creek Interpretive Trail, was selected by the employees of Windermere Real Estate's Port Ludlow office for their project during Community Service Day on June 17. A dozen or so of them worked nearly five hours mowing, clipping, sweeping, and otherwise sprucing up that beautiful trail. And now they have offered to “adopt” it and keep up the good work!
- American Marine Bank is assisting with development of new trail maps, hiring well-known mapmaker Dan Youra to work with the Trails Committee in their preparation. Soon we will see some professionally designed maps to help us find our way around our trails!
- Local resident Alex Padden has taken on a trail-building task in the area of the Wedgewood Short Plat as his Eagle Scout project. His work there will eliminate a dangerous and unpleasant short walk along Paradise Bay Road and make a pretty section of trail through the woods more accessible.
- Identification signs on all the trails—additional interpretive signs near Ludlow Creek—work parties along Oak Bay Road—guided trail tours during Port Ludlow Festival 2002. All these things have recently occurred or are in the final planning stage.
- Watch for a new “column” in future issues of the *Voice* for more information about our trails as the year progresses. We hope to keep residents informed about activities concerning Port Ludlow's trails and provide information or answer questions about them through this new feature.

The September *Voice* will carry 75-word biographies from all candidates.

An “election work party” is planned for **Monday, August 19**, at 9:00 a.m., at the Bay Club, to prepare ballots for mailing by **Monday, August 26**. All mail-in ballots must be postmarked by **Friday, September 27**. Election results will be announced at the Village Council Annual Meeting on **Thursday, October 3**.

The nearly half dozen commercial property owners in the Master Planned Resort (MPR) met recently to designate a new representative to serve as a non-voting Board member of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) replacing Bert Loomis who resigned. Port Ludlow Festival 2002

Plans for Festival 2002, sponsored by the Port Ludlow Village Council, the weekend of **September 13 through 15**, are well underway. On **Friday, September 13**, athletic events will start the Festival with a golf tournament, Timberton Loop hike, and synchronized swimming event. The official opening ceremony will be the morning of **Saturday, September 14**, at 10:00 a.m. It will include a salute to the flag, opening prayer and patriotic music by Port Ludlow's own Choral Belles.

Nearly a dozen food vendors have already agreed to participate in the Food Fair. Food vendors have been selectively invited so no two will offer the same food. There'll be something for everyone—German bratwurst, French entrée and dessert crêpes, Korean, or Northwest regional cuisine, barbecued ribs, clam chowder in a bread bowl, fish and chips, hamburgers, kettle corn, espresso, ice cream in waffle cones, chocolate-dipped cheesecake and ice cream sundaes and a beer garden full of cold beer and Bavarian music.

This year the Arts and Crafts portion of the Festival will be around the Marina pond creating a boardwalk. The entertainment stage will be located below the Harbor-master Restaurant. An improved sound system will be utilized so that announcements and entertainers can be heard throughout the Marina. Entertainment will include the Navy Band, invited to perform on Saturday, and the Army Band expected to perform on Sunday. Volunteer Disaster Services

Formerly known as Emergency Preparedness, Volunteer Disaster Services (VDS) under Co-Chairs Howard Morse and Mark Garcia has expanded to cover the following areas.

The first is Rapid Response Teams of Captains and Co-Captains. Areas have been assigned within the Village, each with leaders that have Family Radio Service (FRS) radios for communication with central command and local needs. They serve as a radio response team in the event of a disaster. The Bay Club and Beach Club, Village Council, Port Ludlow Associates, the Captains and Co-Captains all support FRS. VDS wishes to thank various clubs and individuals for their contributions. The radio expansion will also include two-meter band amateur radios with the help of the Amateur Radio Club and the individual members.

The second area is the Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT). A new group of volunteers began a seven-session training at the end of July. Members now exceed 40 persons in Port Ludlow alone and 60 persons in the Jefferson County area. These valuable classes prepare them to lend assistance in the event of a major disaster or small, single incident. Shelter, food and water for community support is organized with the Red Cross and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency).

VDS now has accepted responsibility for a third area, Neighborhood Watch. This program will be organized under the Captains and Co-Captains and will begin in September.

Hydrangeas Flourish in Port Ludlow

Hydrangea is a Greek word meaning water vessel. It began as a marsh plant, and flourishes in Port Ludlow gardens. With a little maintenance, your hydrangea's size, bloom size and color and can be controlled.

To help you select the right plant here are some that *Sunset* feels are appropriate for the Pacific Northwest:

- *H. arborescens* 'Annabelle.' Huge white globes cover the plant all summer. Withstands some drought; grows in shade or sun. Hardy to -30 degrees.
- *H. aspera*, *H. robusta*, *H. sargentiana*. These have lavender blue or white lace cap flowers and hairy, pointed leaves. *H. a. villosa* has a spreading habit, *H. robusta* and *H. sargentiana* grow 9 to 12 feet tall. Prune hard if plants get leggy. Hardy to 0 degrees.
- *H. macrophylla*. This large category of familiar plants includes mop heads (large, round heads) and lace cap hydrangeas (flat heads with small, star-petaled flowers surrounded by large showy flowers). *H. m.* 'Ayesha' has small pink flowers several times thicker than those on other *H. macrophylla* varieties. Hardy to 0 degrees.
- *H. quercifolia* (oakleaf hydrangea). Long-lasting flowers in conical clusters turn from white to pale pink. 'Snow Flake' has double flowers. 'Snow Queen' has 12-inch long flowers. Bronze or crimson fall foliage. Hardy to -30 degrees.

If you have a taste for something more exotic in hydrangeas, you may want to try *H. macrophylla* 'Matilda Gucci' that has a fuchsia colored bloom, *H. serrata* 'Preziosa' changes from white to violet to a deep wine red as it ages throughout the summer. *H. macrophylla* 'Glowing Embers' starts out a raspberry pink and evolves to a bright

red by fall. *H. m.* 'Blue Danube' is a deep purple with violet shaped blossoms, and *H. m.* 'Nikko Blue' has bright yellow-green foliage and pale to dark blue flower petals, depending on the soil's acidity, and when dried turns bright green with purple tipped petals. In time for Christmas a California grower is going to introduce two white hydrangeas: 'Sister Theresa,' which has ball-shaped flowers and 'Libelle,' which is a laced cap. Supposedly these will be winter bloomers, but don't plant them in your garden until after the threat of frost has passed.

To plant your new hydrangea, choose a shade to part-shade location. However, here on the coast most varieties will tolerate full sun as long as they get plenty of water. Next, dig a hole three to five times as large as the rootball; add peat moss and backfill until the crown is an inch above the soil level. Water. The first couple of years you will need to water regularly, but after that most hydrangeas become drought tolerant for short periods of time.

Flower color can be controlled by applying aluminum sulfate at a rate of 1/4 ounce to a gallon of water once a week in the spring and fall. This will give you beautiful blue flowers. If you want pink blossoms, or to make red hydrangeas redder, add lime to the soil at a rate of 1/2 pound to every 5 feet of surface area under branches. Do this once in the spring and again in the fall. Sometimes it will take a whole season of aluminum sulfate or lime to change the color.

Since the leaves are toxic, hydrangeas are disease and bug resistant, and deer don't like them. In our moist fall weather the flowers often turn brown and mildew, but the plant is not mildew prone. Buds for the following year are formed late in the summer, so if you prune too late you could be jeopardizing next year's blooms. When pruning, it is important to know that flowers will be only on the tips of new growth, so start your pruning by removing the old growth stems. If you want large flowers, thin the plant to half its original size. When a plant becomes too large it can be cut off at the ground and will regrow to its original size if left unpruned.

The leaves may be toxic but dried hydrangea root can be purchased in some health food stores; it was used by the Cherokee Indians and settlers for "calculus disease." As Dr. S. W. Butler of Burlington, N.J. demonstrated, the root extract doesn't cure bladder stones, but does help to remove the gravelly deposits. Don't start nibbling on your hydrangea roots because an overdose can be quite toxic, even fatal.

LMC Board Meeting: Of Trees and Trails

The regular July meeting of the LMC Board confirmed what most of us already know: Continuing communication is the best way to keep information current and to stifle the rumor mill. The subjects in question relate to trail development and tree cutting in the North Bay greenbelts.

Three homeowners had contacted the LMC Board regarding notification of tree cutting to take place in the greenbelt areas alongside their properties. These homeowners were appealing to the full Board the Greenbelt Committee's decision to cut trees. Although the LMC Bylaws allow for a swift appeal hearing, both the Board and the appellants have agreed to hear this appeal in 60 days, or no later than **Saturday, September 14**.

Meanwhile, the Greenbelt Committee has been instructed to hold a member forum, both to provide the Board with input from LMC members and to finalize their Committee guidelines, which will then become a part of the LMC governing documents. The forum will be held on **Tuesday, August 6**, 7:00 p.m., at the Beach Club. These new guidelines will be presented to the Board at the regular August meeting. Greenbelt Committee Chair Ross Robson stated that he wants "a responsible debate on ideas, not mistruth and innuendo. The Committee's decisions must be just and responsive to the needs of all in our community." All tree removal in the greenbelts, except for emergencies, has been put on hold for 60 days or until after the hearings.

Further, as to the question of contributing money to the PLVC Trails Committee, Dick Smith spoke with an attorney, who provided the opinion that "per the governing documents, there is no provision which prohibits a donation for community services to members if that donation is neither political nor charitable in nature." This contribution of \$3,000 is to maintain trails that are already in place in Port Ludlow. Board member D. A. Routt reiterated his belief that this community is responsible to help maintain

the trails that we all use. Direction was given to the LMC representatives on the PLVC Trails Committee to continue their work. Chair Bill Anderson reminded them that any recommendations concerning new trails in the North Bay greenbelts must first be reviewed by the Drainage District. All final decisions concerning North Bay trails would be voted on by the LMC Board after all members have had an opportunity to review and comment on the plan.

Other Items

- The LMC Board is looking for a new Board member. Joe Darcy resigned his position effective immediately. As Darcy was an LOA Board representative, the LOA has been asked to submit names to the Board Chair who will make the ultimate appointment. Howard Morse will fill the Treasurer's position vacated by Darcy.
- The Board approved a request from PLA to permit their guests staying at the Heron Beach Inn and at the Marina to use the Beach Club facilities at a cost of \$5 per person per day. Discussion included the impact that this will have on the facilities, which would be minimal, versus the benefit of increased revenue. This agreement will remain in place until **April 18, 2003**, at which time all of the agreements between the Beach Club and PLA terminate.
- There is still no firm estimate of the costs to refurbish the Beach Club. This is expected by the August LMC meeting date.
- The Operations Committee is working on its maintenance "to do" list. The windscreens at Kehele Park are on hold; it has to be determined whether the fence can support the windscreens during a strong wind.

- The homes and condos to be built at Ludlow Cove have been designated by PLA as belonging in the South Bay.
- The Jefferson County budgeting method has changed for the 2003 General Budget (approx. \$11.5 million). The County will tell each of its Departments how much it will receive and the Department Heads must then decide how it will be used.
- Fred Hill Materials wants approval from the County to quarry 60 million tons of gravel at its Shine pit. This gravel will then be transported from the quarry, approximately four miles west of the Hood Canal Bridge. Because of the quantity of material requested, Jefferson County requires a new, more restrictive permit. (Note: Fred Hill Materials will present their proposal at the August Village Council meeting.)
- The LOA Potluck Committee, headed by Mari Lambe, has set the following dates: **Saturday, September 21**, Chili Cookoff; **Saturday, October 19**, Traditional Oktoberfest; **Saturday, December 14**, Christmas Dinner Dance (catered); **Saturday, March 15, 2003**, St. Patrick's Day Dinner; **Saturday, May 17, 2003**, Traditional Scandinavian Brunch. Further dates for special events are **Saturday, November 2**, Dinner Dance (catered) sponsored by Stan Kadesh; **Saturday, February 8**, Valentine's Day Dinner Dance.

Be a Detective—Provide Evidence



Paula Mackrow, Executive Director of the North Olympic Salmon Coalition (NOSC), speaking to the community at the July meeting of the Village Council, said they're looking for evidence that Coho once inhabited Port Ludlow

Creek in the upper watershed extending south of Highway 104. Anyone possessing letters or pictures from the late 1800s and early 1900s that support the existence of salmon are urged to call her at 379-8051 or send e-mail to nosc@olympus.net. The *Voice* has learned that Shana Smith, curator of the Port Gamble Historic Museum, is searching through hundreds of old pictures in hopes of finding this evidence.

Mackrow described the scene when salmon spawn each fall at the base of Ludlow Falls. She urged anyone who hasn't experienced this annual event to take a walk to the Falls. She further asked that anyone with shoreline property call NOSC to grant permission for them to sample the shore to look for evidence of forage fish eggs.

The mission of NOSC is to protect, restore and increase salmon stocks in the North Olympic Peninsula watersheds. It is a non-profit community-based salmon recovery organization that provides funding, guidance, technical assistance and ongoing support for salmon habitat restoration and enhancement. NOSC's region includes the watersheds along the coast of the Strait of Juan de Fuca, from the Hood Canal Bridge west to Neah Bay. It works cooperatively with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, Conservation Districts, Tribal Fisheries, schools, community organizations, volunteers and private land-owners. If you would like more information on NOSC, give them a call.

State of the Association Recap

We're In Good Financial Shape

- There are no more "free rides," as all money-making organizations are now required to contribute to Club wear and tear.
- Financial statements have been revised for easier reading. Note that we did not get any advice from WorldCom.
- Our reserves are now over \$130,000 which is considerably more than last year's balance of \$96,000.
- Our operating surplus was about \$35,000 and \$15,000 of this surplus was utilized to pay for new carpeting rather than reduce the reserve.
- Including special set-asides for an annual audit and trail maintenance, next year's budget still shows a sizable operating surplus.
- The bottom line is that there will be no dues increase for the second year in a row!

Keeping the Club Interior "Shipshape"

- New carpeting gives the Club an elegant appearance.
- Interior rooms and hallways have been repainted.
- The peeling paint and rotted framing outside the pool area have been replaced and vents added to preclude the problem formerly called "the humidity problem." This fix resulted in a low cost approach versus the original extremely costly proposal.

New equipment purchased included:

- a treadmill
- a defibrillator
- a pool sanitizing system

Landscaping Beautification

- To our great surprise we found that we owned part of the Spinnaker Way entry to the Club.
- An army of volunteers, individual donations and Bay Club employees combined to accomplish a major facelift of the Spinnaker Way/Paradise Bay Road landscaping.

- The PLVC Trails Committee put together an excellent plan for trail maintenance and improvement, mostly in the South Bay area. The budget contains \$3,000 to support its activities.
- There is an ongoing effort to enhance the landscaping at the Bay Club entryway and parking lot.

Homeowners, When All Else Fails, Follow Directions!

- The CC&Rs and Design Standards are your encyclopedia and dictionary for approval of landscaping and exterior home improvement projects. Read Them!
- To make following the rules easier, the ARC has:
 - Updated and improved the design standards
 - Encouraged Villages to appoint their own ARCs with the ability to make decisions and grant permits on routine matters.
 - For tree removal, an approved list of arborists has been published who may determine if trees are diseased or dangerous, which would result in their removal.

Let's Live It Up!

- The monthly socials have been rejuvenated with art exhibits and more emphasis on attracting new members.
- The new Activities Committee has generated an ambitious program of events that promises to keep us all busier.

Looking Ahead

- We have a long-term maintenance plan that shows the capability of the reserve to provide resources when replacement or repair is required. This plan is a living document and needs to be updated at least yearly.
- With today's emphasis on security issues, the Club needs to look at ensuring that no unauthorized person gains access to our Club. All members have a responsibility for making sure our Club is safe.
- In today's economic climate, we can no longer count on PLA to build a major new facility to house larger events. We need to look internally to see how we will handle events to accommodate our ever-growing membership. A committee has been established by the Board, consisting of Board members and homeowners, to start planning facility expansion. We will look to the community to provide input and additional committee members.

Music for everyone is the theme of the Arts Council's 2002-2003 Eleventh Annual Concert Season. Season ticket holders are guaranteed seats for all seven performances featuring jazz, down-home music, classics and mime. "This past year every concert was a sellout and we expect the upcoming season will be the same," said Program Chair Jim Watson.

Arts Council President Diane Watson attributes the Arts Council's success to the financial support received from individuals and businesses. "These added dollars help underwrite our talent and operating budget allowing us to attract higher-quality talent," said Watson. "Since we are a 501(C) (3) non-profit organization, contributors now can take a tax deduction and are willing to contribute to our support."

Performing Arts in Port Ludlow includes four evening performances at 8:00 p.m. and three afternoon performances at 2:00 p.m. during the winter months. All concerts are held at the Bay Club.

A gala evening performance opens the season on **Saturday, September 28**, featuring a return engagement by jazz vocalist Greta Matassa who is joined by a quartet with Susan Pascal on vibes. This talented and popular Seattle native has four times been voted Northwest "best jazz vocalist."

From BC's beautiful coast comes The Bill Hilly Band on the evening of **Saturday, October 26**. Audiences thrill to these six exceptional musicians' blend of choreographed on-stage antics and infectiously danceable music. Get ready for a joyous musical ride—an acoustic explosion is coming to town.

The Northwoods Wind Quintet from Kirkland will launch the holiday season with an afternoon concert on **Sunday, December 8**. Taking time off from their busy holiday schedules with the Pacific Northwest Ballet and Seattle Symphony Orchestras, they will perform holiday favorites including selections from Tchaikovsky's *Nutcracker Suite*.

“They will receive a credit as well.” American Marine Bank will provide financing if someone wishes to extend payment of his/her deposit over time.

Port Ludlow Associates to Sell Village Center

PLA is listing the Village Center for sale in anticipation of a sale to a third party. PLA will focus its development efforts on three primary objectives: 1) replacement and expansion of the Golf Clubhouse together with a membership program, 2) expansion of the Marina/Resort complex, and 3) the residential build-out of the community. In order to grow the retail/office center, PLA is seeking an experienced commercial developer who can focus the appropriate time and energy to own and manage the existing facilities and also seek out and develop space for new businesses in Port Ludlow.

The land available for sale is five acres total and bounded by Breaker Lane, Oak Bay Road and Paradise Bay Road. Currently there are 13,800 square feet of buildings occupied by retailers including the Village Market, Post Office, Beauty Salon, Deano's Pizza, Dana Pointe Interiors and a new business opening soon to specialize in antiques. Office space tenants include the Froula & Glessing CPA firm that opened in July, Jefferson Title Company, Lander Custom Homes, Hear For Life Audiology and PLA's Accounting Department. The existing buildings are 95 percent full. The expansion potential for the Village Center includes land for 20,000 additional square feet. If built to capacity the Village Center would have 34,000 square feet of office and retail space.

We feel that a significant outreach program to recruit new businesses to Port Ludlow is needed in order to grow the Village Center and serve the needs of the community. Our goal in selling the property is to locate an experienced retail developer who will complete the expansion in a timely manner.

Public Hearing on Ludlow Cove

The Jefferson County Planning Department has recommended approval of the Ludlow Cove project and conducted a public hearing before the Hearing Examiner on July 16 at the Jefferson County Courthouse. The 35-acre waterfront project is located on the waterside of the Village Center between Ludlow Creek and the North Bay Condos. If approved, the components of the project will

include 24 single-family lots with waterfront and water views, the establishment of two waterfront condominium tracts on 15.65 acres and three open space tracts of 7.8 acres. Also included will be a beach picnic area and trail connections between North and South Bay. The beach and trail connections are intended to be available for use by all Port Ludlow residents. The beach tract overlooks the Twin Islands and Ludlow Bay and is located southwest of the North Bay Condos.

A comprehensive environmental review was completed in support of the project and was discussed at the public hearing. The Hearing Examiner took testimony from the County Planner, the Developer and the public in consideration of his final decision that is expected to be announced by **Thursday, August 15**.

Wedgewood Approved for Development

The three-lot Wedgewood project, located at the intersection of Paradise Bay Road and Ludlow Bay Road, is finally approved with the expiration of the appeal period. PLA is completing engineering plans that must be approved by the Jefferson County Public Works Department prior to commencement of development activity. Work is expected to begin with clearing of the property sometime in December. The lots will feature views of Ludlow Bay to the North.

Marina Draft Environmental Report Available

Jefferson County has completed its draft of the Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement for PLA's proposed expansion of the Marina. A copy of the report can be read at the Beach Club, the Bay Club and the Jefferson County Public Library.

The Sailing Yacht S.Y. *Georgia*, the world's largest aluminum sloop (159 feet), graced Port Ludlow with her presence on Wednesday and Thursday, July 3 and 4. What a spectacular sight she was!

Alloy Yachts in Auckland, New Zealand, built the S.Y. *Georgia* in 1999. After she was launched, she was moved east of the Auckland Harbor Bridge to Wynyard Wharf, where the mast was stepped. She was then berthed at the America's Cup Village at Viaduct Basin, raced in the Millennium Cup, and attended the America's Cup racing between New Zealand's *Black Magic* and Italy's *Prada*.

Georgia's mast stands 200-feet tall and her sails total more than 22,000 square feet. That is half an acre. Under sail, *Georgia's* hull is designed to exceed more than 16 knots. Her home port is Florida and she is registered out of the Cayman Islands. Her owner, John Williams, resides in Atlanta, Georgia. What a great surprise on the Fourth of July! Talking with the captain, the family, friends, and crew—all had a wonderful time, taking advantage of the walking trails and kayaks. We certainly hope to have the largest sloop in the world back to The Resort at Ludlow Bay in the future.

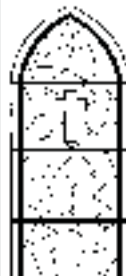

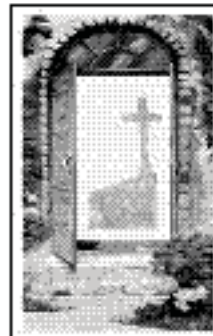

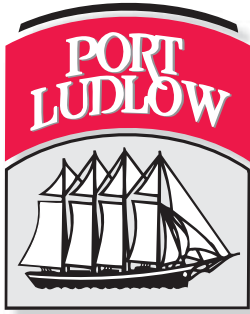
