## Village Council Moves Forward

The concept of the Village Council is moving toward reality with correction of the Bylaws and Articles as recommended by the Ludlow Maintenance Commission. As of this writing the corrected documents are being forwarded to the LMC for endorsement. All of the recommendations were valid and the Governance Committee agreed with the changes. The changes were for the most part procedural and did not affect the character of the Articles and Bylaws.

Meanwhile the Lot Owners Association has formally endorsed the concept and the changes proposed by the LMC and has notified the LMC of its support. The LOA has also accepted nominations for the election that will select the first Village Council Members. The Voice is informed that the condo associations are also selecting their candidates.

Survey results from the South side of the Village indicate that 93% of those surveyed favor the concept of a Village Council. The South side is now working on putting a list of candidates together and this list will be released when it is available. On the North side of the Village 79% of those surveyed were also in favor of the Council.

Both sides of the Village are actively seeking candidates for this first very important election. On the North, candidates to date are:

Condo candidates have not been identified at this time. We understand that they are in the process of being selected.

We have been informed that the South Bay Community Association has formally endorsed the Village Council and has notified the LMC of the results of its vote.

## Survey Results Are Being Tabulated

The results of the survey of the LOA members are being tabulated. Tentative results are now available with the final tabulation expected before the end of March. This survey was a result of the LOA membership expressing a desire to be heard on significant matters that affect our community. While limited in scope it is felt that overall the survey has captured the opinions of the membership. A number of members added comments to the survey and these comments are being made available for your consideration.

The final results will be posted on the bulletin board at the Beach Club and all the survey data and documentation will be given to the LMC for their consideration. The LOA feels that it is important to hear from the membership and expects to have other questionnaires in the future. As we gain more experience we expect to see an improvement in our surveys and hopefully a format that is more precise.

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Results received to date of some questions are as follows:

### Beach Club

35% of the responders said they used it significantly, while another 34% said moderately and 31% said little or not at all.

As to the status of the Beach Club, 42% favored a single-village club, 29% wanted to maintain the status quo, 20% felt it should be rebuilt and refurbished, while 9% thought it should be closed and sold.

### Resort

75% of the responders were in favor of expansion.

### Stormwater

A total of 63% said stormwater was not an issue for them, 27% said it was somewhat of a problem for them, while 10% reported significant impact.

As to whether stormwater control was a community problem, 62% agreed as opposed to 38% who disagreed.

### Self-Governance

The majority of those polled, 79%, favor self-government as opposed to 21% who do not favor the concept.

The results are based on the number who responded to the particular question. 32% of those surveyed responded to all or some of the questions. This is below the number that responded to the Gilmore survey (August 1997, 41% response) and below the number that responded to a survey recently put out by the South Bay Community Association.

Facility usage and participation question details will be made available when they are finalized.

is a significant saving over normal box office prices.

They'll be on sale at the Bay and Beach Clubs starting Wednesday, **March 10th** and are expected to go fast, so reserve your tickets early. A Majestic luxury touring bus will be used for the round trip to Seattle, so you can expect a comfortable ride. The ticket price (about \$57) will include bus transportation and ferry fees to and from Port Ludlow.

We will have a no-host dinner at Anthony's Pier 66 where you can order from the menu. No one is obligated to eat a full meal if they'd rather be "on their own" until the bus returns to Port Ludlow at approximately 7:00 p.m.

There have been more than a dozen recordings of the entire score of "*Evita*," including full cast recordings in Dutch, Japanese, Korean and Spanish, in addition to the several American and British recordings. There have been hundreds of recordings of "Don't Cry for Me Argentina" (120 in Germany alone) by everyone from Ray Coniff to the Munich Symphony Orchestra to Donna Summer.

The role of Evita is one of the most demanding in the annals of musical theatre. In addition to singing 13 songs and rarely leaving the stage throughout the entire performance, she goes through 14 costume changes and 4 wigs.

Plant summer bulbs, corms and tubers about mid-March. If after planting a hard frost is predicted, cover beds with a heavy top-dressing of mulch. Control snails and slugs, moist weather brings them out to feed on tender new shoots. Fertilize evergreens and roses.


Anderson is very sharp with a computer and a talented speaker. We are very lucky to have him put on a program for us. You won't want to miss this presentation.





# ORM Update

## Who Should Control the Stormwater?

An informational meeting on the stormwater control issued was sponsored by the Lot Owners Association (LOA) on Thursday, February 11th at the Beach Club. The speakers included Greg McCarry from ORM, Jim Pearson from Jefferson County Public Works and George Dyer from LMC. Each of the speakers made a brief presentation followed by a question and answer session.

Pearson discussed alternatives for management of stormwater issues. One is to have a county stormwater management ordinance like Kitsap County. Under such an arrangement the County assesses a fee with your property tax bill and provides services for the maintenance and management. Another is to form a Village-wide district where boundaries are the same as the Master Planned Resort (MPR) boundary established for Port Ludlow.

Under the Village-wide concept a vote of the Port Ludlow residents would be needed to establish a district. The district would have its own elected commissioners from the community, similar to a fire or library district. Funding for the district would be similar as the existing districts which appear now on your property tax bill.

There were questions from the audience on the issue of costs. Greg McCarry explained that presently, many of the new associations in South Bay are responsible for their own stormwater management and maintenance. In North Bay no organization is clearly responsible. Neither the county, LMC nor ORM collects fees for the maintenance and management. The issue is that there is a cost for the service and how can it be paid. ORM cannot levy a fee for the service, the county does not tax for the service and LMC does not provide for the service in their dues structure. All three speakers agreed that something must be done.

It seemed that the Village-wide district is the practical alternative. The three speakers agreed to continue to work productively toward a resolution of the best alternative and make recommendations to the community for action.

You can expect to be hearing more on this issue.



- Remember pull carts can do as much damage as motorized carts – when possible, try to keep them on the paved paths and 30 feet from tees and greens.
- Be aware that playing on frosty fairways and especially greens can do serious damage to the turf and leave scars that won't recover until Spring.
- Bunkers with standing water should be played as ground under repair.
- You are allowed relief on the green from standing water between your ball and the hole – no nearer the hole.
- Through the green – lift, clean and place – within one club length – no nearer the hole.

Proper fueling procedures will be stressed because every boater has to refuel their boat from time to time.

The laws and various fines if they are broken will be covered also. Most people want to be legal and not hurt their environment of choice. Many are not aware of the many problems associated with keeping the environment in good condition.

The washing of boats in the slips is a problem also, depending on what the boater uses as a cleaner.

A clean bilge is nice but there is a way to get it without pumping a lot of pollution overboard.

These are some of the items that will be addressed so the Marina staff will be knowledgeable and can pass on the information to the customers of the Marina both visiting and permanent. We want a Hallmark Marina, and a well trained staff that cares can get us there.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary will use the Port Ludlow Marina as a test ground to develop the Marine Safety class and then make it available to take to any other marina on the peninsula.

Wouldn't it be nice if every marina in our area was a hallmark marina and totally understood the pollution problem. Perhaps that's too much to ask for but the Coast Guard Auxiliary says it's not too much to try for.

## Courtesy Marine Examinations

The best way to start the season with a safe boat is to get it in shape for a Courtesy Marine Exam (CME) by the local Coast Guard Auxiliary.

A trained Vessel Examiner will go through your boat to make sure it is in conformance with the federal and Washington State laws. They also will check all the safety gear to make sure it is useable.

This is a free service and when they finish they give you a list of what needs to be done to bring your boat into compliance with the law and with proper safety procedures.



If everything is as it should be you get a CME decal for this year. Many of you have them for last year but they need to be updated every year.

Normally, there are at least one or two items that need to be fixed or replaced or updated. The examiner will come back when you have corrected whatever needs to be corrected and you get your decal then. A boat with a decal is not guaranteed to be safe, but at least you know you did everything you could to have a safe boat.

It's easy to get a CME on your boat. Call the Coast Guard Auxiliary staff officer for Vessel Examinations and she will arrange a time at your convenience to have an examiner do your boat. Her name is Mary Kay Panucci and she can be reached at 437-4115.

## The Need to Know

The term "On a Need to Know Basis" is commonly used by industry or a government agency to limit the amount and/or type of information released to someone.

It is intended to be used for security and to control the information released by the giver to the receiver. This process works well and keeps unneeded information from confusing the problem solver or biasing their results.

This process does not work, however, when it comes to learning about safe boating.

Too many boaters (receivers) reverse the process by telling the giver of information (the CGAUX) that they "don't need to know that." Comments like "I don't need to know the fog signals. I don't go out in the fog." Or, "I don't need to have spare bulbs for my running lights. I don't use my boat at night."

We have all at one time or another rebelled about something we were asked to learn. Something we didn't believe we needed to "waste" time on. Well, when it comes to boating, there is nothing we don't need to know.

Any boater that has spent a few years cruising, fishing or just playing with their boat on the water knows that the only thing you can count on is the unexpected.

It doesn't make good sense to travel at night if it can possibly be avoided, especially in the Northwest water because of all the floating wood.

Having said that, most of the boaters I have known over the years have run at night including me. We didn't do it because we didn't have good sense; we did it because something didn't work out the way we planned (or forgot to plan).

We were delayed by engine trouble, bad weather, catching too many fish, a foul current or perhaps having to render aid to someone else that had problems. Whatever the cause

we found ourselves out in a flack sea where nothing looks familiar and everything we can see looks too close.

When any of these unpleasanties occur we need all the knowledge we can muster to be safe and solve the problem. Knowledge is the best tool for keeping your composure and keeping your composure is essential to safety.

It is the job of the CGAUX to convince not only the public but also its members that you can't learn too much.

Every course given by the CGAUX conveys information that in some scenario will be critical to the skipper's safety and the well being of his/her passengers and vessel.

A good skipper will never pass up an opportunity to learn or review any boating subject. He will never say, "I don't need to know that."

## Coast Guard Helping Kids Read

Did you know that some Coast Guard crew members from the Cutter Point Bennett stationed in Port Townsend donate their time during off-hours helping kids read? They participate in a Quilcene School District reading program. The crew members both read to, and are read to, by the kindergarten and first grade kids. This is a real service above and beyond the normal service Coast Guardsmen perform guarding our shores and protecting boaters in our waters.

These crew members are leaving for a couple of months in order to bring a new 87-foot cutter back to Port Townsend so they can do an even better job of guarding and protecting our shores.

But, who will read with the kids while they are gone?

Some Coast Guard Auxiliary members from Port Ludlow are going to act as substitutes during the guardsmen's absence. ## Dining Out

### Upstage Restaurant and Theatre

923 Washington St., Port Townsend

On a recent Friday evening, four of us motored through driving rain, wind and downed power lines to Port Townsend and the Upstage Restaurant, nestled in the back alley between Water and Washington Streets. You enter from Water Street via Tyler, go one block, turn right, park your car, and it's just a short walk to the main lower entrance.

The simple oak-paneled restaurant with comfortable chairs, two levels of dining, accompanied by excellent acoustics, was already filled with dinner patrons despite the inclement weather. Host Mark Cole, formerly wine steward for the Wines of Americas Competitions, told us the aim of the Upstage is to bring ideas, musicians and performance arts together with great dining in a very special performance venue using the stage as a community resource. The Upstage Chef Bret Barrish is a graduate of the Western Culinary Institute and interned in Oregon. He matches the ambiance and entertainment with his own eclectic and daily changing menu. Not only does a change in menu allow freshness of ingredients, it also results in great dining value.

That evening, beside designer pizzas, the appetizer list included Caesar salad, island fruit grill salad with huckleberry vinaigrette, andouille sausage and shrimp, spicy cheesecake, brochette with duxelles (mushroom, garlic and caper puree, and a pot of goat cheese layered with pesto garlic and capers.) We shared a sample of each with a California chardonnay while awaiting our selections from the entrées: Smoked duck and hazelnut ravioli with apples and cider, a delicious blend of ingredients. Salmon tortilla encrusted with fruit salad, Mahi Mahi glazed with soy and horseradish, and grilled New Zealand tenderloin with shallots, hazelnuts and cabernet sauvignon. Each entrée retained its special flavor – all equally brilliant and delicious and done to perfection.

We shared desserts of Huckleberry Ganache Torte, Peanut Butter Chocolate Mousse, Irish Cream Cake and Huckle-



berry Rhubarb Pie. Truly gourmet food at reasonable prices. Appetizers were approximately \$7, entrees \$11-16 and desserts \$3.50. The wine, beer and micro brew selection is well stocked and moderately priced.

Just as we finished our coffee the lights dimmed to a full house. The Very Valentine Show unfolded in two acts of 13 skits relying on very talented artists from the Port Townsend area. The skits were greeted enthusiastically with rounds of laughter and applause, adding a special theatre ambience to the evening.


