PLA Unveils Latest Plan for Resort Area

Port Ludlow Associates, Inc (PLA) has submitted their 2006 proposed plan for Ludlow Bay Village (LBV) and Admiralty III (ADIII) to Jefferson County. This follows meetings held in late August with several community groups where they outlined the proposed land plan revisions, which included some lot line adjustments. Once County approval is received for the land plan, architectural plans will be developed.

PLA stressed the plan was developed based on information gathered in meetings over the past several months with various special interest groups. In response to community input, the over-water construction, Marina elevator, emergency helipad, central receiving and maintenance building, and Marina/LBV recreation facility proposed in the 2003 plan have all been eliminated. Residents of the new homes to be constructed will be members of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) and be entitled to use the Beach Club.

The proposed Port Ludlow Yacht Club (PLYC) space above the Marina store is reduced in size and will be available for rental when not being used by the Club. The Marina store will be 500 feet larger than the current one. Two separate gathering places for PLYC use will be established in order to allow hosting two guest clubs simultaneously. Designated Marina-use only parking will be restricted from 5:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. only. The 70 spaces will be available for restaurant and open parking for the remainder of the time.

In response to requests for safe walkways, the plan includes an expansive network of walking paths connecting LBV, the waterfront and the Admiralties. The setback of buildings along Gull Drive will be increased from the proposed 3 feet to 20 feet to increase safety in the area and allow for walkways.

A children's play area as well as a Village Park has been added in the ADIII area. The playground will be outfitted with equipment. PLA plans, after resolution of all land use approvals and appeals relating to the project, to offer the park/play area to the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) as a community amenity. If PLVC does not accept it and agree to maintain it, then PLA intends to offer it to the LMC under the same conditions. If LMC also declines, then it will be part of the common area of ADIII and maintained by the condo owner's association.

Additional parking for the existing town homes will be added. The proposed bollards to restrict Inn parking are eliminated. Total parking spaces in the plan increase to 421.

New Kitsap Bank Opens in Port Ludlow

Kitsap Bank announces the completion of its new Port Ludlow facility at 72 Breaker Lane.

In the new 3,600 square foot craftsman-style facility, customers will find safe deposit boxes, drive-in lanes, a drive-thru ATM,

and a night depository. The new branch and ATM opened for business on Monday, September 25. The community is invited to the Ribbon Cutting and Grand Opening Reception, **Thursday, October 5**, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Jim Carmichael, President/CEO of Kitsap Bank, said, “The Port Ludlow branch has proven to be one of Kitsap Bank's fastest growing branches. We are very pleased that this new facility will allow us to expand services to all of our Port Ludlow and Olympic Peninsula customers.” The bank opened its current Village Way location in November 2004, offering a full line of deposit, loan and investment services.

“Kitsap Bank has seen tremendous growth bank-wide during the past year,” said Carmichael, “and recently announced its intent to merge with MarinerBank, with branches in Port Townsend and Port Hadlock.” The proposed transaction, now subject to regulatory and shareholder approval, would bring Kitsap Bank's number of locations on the Olympic Peninsula to six, and increase its market share in Jefferson County to 15 percent.

The artist rendition of new residential units is on this page. PLA will construct no more than 42 new units in the plat of LBV. (See summary table on page 4) The future town homes near the lagoon will not have garages. Randall “Randy” Verrue, president and CEO of HCV Pacific Partners, managing partner of PLA, indicated they saw their market for these homes as being second homes for the owners.

The Harbormaster Restaurant will be relocated and will have two townhomes built over it. These may be two-story units. Six residential units will be built on the current restaurant site. This is a reduction of 8 units from the 2003 proposed plan. Adjacent to the new Harbormaster will be eight waterfront units currently envisioned to be 1,200–1,300 square feet each.

The number of condos in ADIII is projected at 38. This is a reduction of one unit from the previous plan. In response to a question Verrue said that PLA would have units in the rental program in ADIII but would not give preference to those units in renting them.


In order to improve the setback and scenic views for residents of Scott Court, the number of new Marina slips has been reduced from 100 to 64.

Verrue, in response to a question, stated PLA “would be amenable to a bond to build the restaurant if the County required it.” However, he didn’t see why this would be necessary as it would be the first thing built along with the water units. The new restaurant would be completed before the old Harbormaster is torn down.

Residents’ reactions were generally positive at all the presentations. Elizabeth Van Zonneveld, speaking for herself, indicated that she was quite pleased with PLA’s effort to respond to peoples’ desires. Tom Stone, speaking as a resident, commented, “They [PLA] have done a really good job of listening to what the residents told them.” PLYC Rear Commodore Kevin Ryan said he was pleased to learn of the revisions and added, “Many of the previous objections have been addressed. Of greatest significance are the decrease in overall density of living units and the provision for more parking spaces.” The Voice requested comments on the new plan from Lewis Hale, Peter Joseph, Bert Loomis and Les Powers. All declined to comment.

Verrue stated they intended to construct the project in two stages—the waterfront and then the Admiralty area. They want to “get in and out” quickly so it isn’t a disturbance over a long time. He indicated they are still in continuing dialogue with current LBV townhome owners on maintenance and other issues relevant to their Association.

The public comment on the land plan is open until **Monday, October 16**, according to John Fischbach, County Administrator (see related article on page 19.) PLA has said that if they receive approval by **November** they expect to start construction in the spring.

Marine Shoreline Land Owners Invited to Special Workshops

If you live on or own marine shoreline property, you have a number of special considerations in caring for home, garden and land. The natural life in your shoreline area is different than in upland areas and you may have erosion concerns as well. In addition, the Shoreline Master Plan

will be updated soon for Jefferson County and this is a process that relates directly to the area in which you live.

A pair of workshops has been designed to answer many of the questions that you, as a shoreline landowner, may have. Workshop speakers will address coastal geology, habitat formation on shorelines and in estuaries, shoreline and estuarine ecology, water quality and finally, how our actions can impact these areas both positively and negatively. In addition, there will be a number of staffed display booths present from local organizations to answer questions not addressed by the workshop speakers. The workshops will include an optional field trip to local beaches where experts will demonstrate some of the concepts discussed during the workshop presentations.

The first workshop was held Saturday, September 30, 9:00 a.m.–4:00 p.m., at Quilcene High School. Each workshop will feature similar content so there is a second opportunity to participate on **Saturday, October 14**, 9:00 a.m.–4:00 p.m., at the Inn at Port Hadlock. A fee of \$12 reserves your space in the workshop and provides lunch.

Not everyone is familiar with Mikes Mail and More, located in the Village Center, next to the Village Market and Chevron Station. Mike Johnston, proprietor, has discovered that due to the growth of the Port Ludlow area, many people aren't familiar with the kind of operation he provides in our community.

Mikes Mail and More, Inc. is a postal contract station,

which means it is a substation of the Port Hadlock Post Office. Contractors with the Post Office are required to have a retail business. Therefore, Johnston offers a number of services to the people of Port Ludlow. As a Post Office, postal rates and services are the same as any other post office with two exceptions. They don't do bulk or COD mailings. Beyond the post office service, Mikes Mail and More offers United Parcel Service (UPS) shipping, fax, copy, greeting cards, private mailbox rentals, mail forwarding services, MoneyGram electronic funds transfers and some shipping supplies.

Now a new service is available whereby you can pay many of your bills directly into your account through a company called, CheckFreePay. You can pay Puget Sound Energy, Nordstrom, JC Penny, Direct TV, AT&T, Sears, State Farm Insurance, Discover, Capital One and others on the long list of companies. Each transaction is a cash transaction except for Puget Sound Energy, which allows checks as well.

Johnston says, "We have a growing community with a lot of wonderful people. If you haven't been in before, come in so we can meet you."

Chief Ed Wilkerson's Safety Tip:

Chimney Fire Safety—Don't Blow Your Stack!

The heating season is soon upon us. Furnaces, fireplaces, woodstoves and space heaters will be forged up anew. Energy conscious homeowners will restore old fireplaces and install new wood burners, calling into service chimneys that haven't been used for years. All in all, the question is: how safe is your chimney?

It's easy to forget about your chimney's condition and its importance to the safety of your home. A chimney blockage that fills your home with deadly fumes or a chimney fire can spell disaster. Here's how to diagnose and treat common chimney problems before they lead to real trouble.

If you haven't had your chimney inspected for several years, now's the time. Call in a professional chimney sweep to have your chimney cleaned and inspected. (Yes, they still exist—the trade didn't go out with Mary Poppins.)

Why is chimney cleaning important? For starters, it's been unused all summer. How do you know that a family of birds hasn't built a nest on top of it, reducing or ruining its ventilating power? Do you know whether it's developed cracks or leaks that could reduce its draft while also posing a collapse? Of course you don't—and without an inspection, you won't know until it's too late.

While the whole idea of a chimney is for it to be fireproof, many combustion by-products that go up your chimney are flammable substances called creosotes. Being relatively heavy and oily, they cool quickly and deposit on your chimney walls instead of going all the way up and out. As creosote layers build up, heat or sparks can ignite them leaving you with a fire raging in your chimney. Some people think that a chimney fire will just clean out the creosote. If you share the same thought, you are risking much more than a loud roaring fire. It is more likely to rain burning debris into your furnace or fireplace—or shower hot sparks all over the neighborhood—or set fire to roofs and walls adjacent to the super-heated chimney.

You will want to take a couple of precautions before you use any heating source this season.

- Never use gasoline or other flammable liquids to kindle or revive a fire. Flammable vapors can easily travel the length of a room.

- To keep sparks from flying and igniting clothes or furniture, use glass doors or a screen that wraps fully around the fireplace/woodstove opening. A fireproof hearthrug is also a good idea. Wear tight fitting clothing when working with the fire; avoid balloon or draping sleeves.
- Keep children safely away from fireplaces, woodstoves, furnaces and space heaters.
- Be sure ashes have cooled thoroughly before you dispose of them. Place ashes in a sealed metal container away from the house.
- Annual service and maintenance is a must for woodstoves and fireplaces. Have ash and creosote build-up professionally removed or you do it. Check the fireplace annually to be sure vents, flues and chimneys are in good working order, and to identify any structural damage.
- It is also a good idea to have your furnace inspected and maintained annually.

Local Firefighters Dispatched to Eastern Washington

said though summer is nearly over, everyone still needs to be extremely conscious of the very dry conditions that are perfect for wildfire potential.

He reported the local Fire District sent a brush truck and three personnel to the Columbia Complex Fire near Dayton, WA. The team was there for two weeks and gained a tremendous amount of wild land fire experience that will benefit Port Ludlow in the event of a large wild land fire here.

Further, crews from Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue have recently completed confined space training using the Hood Canal Bridge and Olympic Sewer and Water facilities for training props. This training is the final part of a Federal grant for training and equipment of nearly \$30,000 that was awarded in late 2005.

Another Federal grant worth nearly \$25,000 has been received for the purchase of ten flammable/toxic gas monitors. In mid August, Lt. Wes Lueders trained for these devices in Orlando, FL. He will be training Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue members in their use.

District personnel participated in the annual Community Enrichment Alliance (CEA) Ice Cream Social in late August. Chief Wilkerson reported lots of residents and guests enjoyed looking at the fire engine and ambulance and talking with the firefighters.

Local residents Sandy and Tom Boughner have opened a service in Sequim to provide non-medical care at home for senior citizens in Port Ludlow and elsewhere on the northern Olympic Peninsula. The service, Home Instead Senior Care, is a new franchise that began in Omaha in 1994. The service provides help with housekeeping tasks, bathing and personal hygiene, dressing, gardening, transportation to appointments and medical services, shopping and errands, meal preparation, medication reminders, and other tasks of daily living. Employees will provide companionship and help clients with crafts. The goal is to allow seniors to remain in their own homes longer than they could without help.

Sandy Boughner has a certificate in Gerontology from George Mason University and is working on a degree in Health Administration through Phoenix University. She has 16 years' experience working with seniors in the Marriott Senior Living Program and the Area Agency on Aging in Leesburg, Virginia. Husband Tom, a civilian nuclear engineer, previously worked with the Navy in the nuclear submarine area. The Boughners currently have five employees and are hiring more. All employees go through a training program before being matched with a client. Employees are screened, bonded and insured.

Home Instead Senior Care opened its doors on July 17 of this year and has received a very positive response from the community. It will provide care for a minimum of three hours and up to 24 hours a day for 3 days a week. Fees depend upon the service rendered. Companionship services are \$19/hour. Fees for home-helper services are \$19.95/hour.

On the Road Again ...

Sometimes we seem to think that driving a car just comes "naturally" because we have done it so many times before. However, the passage of time changes many aspects of driving; among which are traffic laws, common driving practices (such as the increase in cell phone usage while

driving), and our bodies. The most dramatic physical changes that affect driving skills deal with vision, but our reaction time, mental agility and physical abilities also change.

An eight-hour certified course in traffic safety will help you continue to be a responsible driver and will qualify you for a car insurance discount if you are 55 years of age or older. The course reviews safe driving practices and allows class discussions on driving frustrations, current traffic laws and practices. The cost of \$10 covers class materials.

The course is divided into two four-hour sessions, usually held on consecutive days. Arrangements can be made, however, to take day one in one location and day two in another. High-Quality Health Screenings

Life Line Screening will provide four different health screenings using Doppler color flow ultrasound, **Monday, October 30, 9:00 a.m.–4:00 p.m.** at the Beach Club.

Screenings offered will include:

- Stroke/Carotid Artery Screening that looks for plaque buildup in the carotid arteries, which leads to stroke. Up to 75 percent of all strokes are linked to carotid artery blockage.
- Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) Test that checks for an aneurysm, i.e. enlargement, in the abdominal aorta that could lead to a ruptured aortic artery. The majority of people who have an abdominal aneurysm have no symptoms and the mortality rate for a ruptured AAA is about 80 to 94 percent.
- Ankle Brachial Index (ABI), that screens for Peripheral Arterial Disease or PVD in the lower extremities. Peripheral Arterial Disease is a strong predictor of heart disease.
- Bone Density Screening, which tests both men and women for the early detection of osteoporosis.

You must pre-register by calling 1-800-643-6075. The cost is \$35–\$45 each. These screenings are completely painless, non-invasive, and require ten minutes or less to complete. A small ultrasound instrument is moved over your neck, arms, stomach or legs. A board-certified physician licensed in this state will evaluate the results and send you a report within three weeks, which you are encouraged to review with your own doctor

Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Report

The September General Meeting was held at the Beach Club. There were 24 residents in attendance.

Guest Speaker, Betty Dunaway, RN, Kitsap County Health District, gave a slide show about preparations for an Influenza Pandemic. (See related story, page 16)

In reports from other agencies, Fire Chief Ed Wilkerson said residents should still be conscious of the very dry conditions. (See related story, page 8)

Diana Smeland of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) announced they had presented a new land plan for Ludlow Bay Villages to various community groups and received positive feedback. (See related story, page 34) She encouraged everyone to attend the public hearings on Trendwest and express their viewpoints. She reported that Olympic Terrace II is still moving forward with utility infrastructure. Model home foundations are expected to start in **November**. The Village's new name is still being discussed.

Jefferson County Planner for Port Ludlow, Barbara Nightingale, discussed the upcoming hearing before the Hearing Examiner and answered questions from the floor.

Treasurer Bruce Pyles reported PLVC checking account balance of \$19,472 as well as \$4,909 in the Funfest and Trails Committee accounts.

Funfest: Council member Dwayne Wilcox provided an update on the planning and advance concert and poster sales. The No-Rain dance portion of each Committee meeting was emphasized.

Community Development (CDC) Chair Jim Brannaman reported the Committee had reviewed the Trendwest permit application but were reserving final recommendations to the Board until they can review the County staff report. CDC recommendations will be discussed at a special Board meeting on a date to be determined later.

Two Trendwest issues were discussed:

- County documents state that the easement for a trail across the Trendwest property will be maintained by PLVC. This will require an in-depth study of the entire Trails issue as it relates to liability, insurance, ownership and indemnification by Trendwest.

- Covenant restrictions will not apply to the Trendwest property should they desire to sell at a later date. He said the CDC had not debated their likes or dislikes about Trendwest, but only researched the technical issues.

Diana Smeland reported that PLA has asked Trendwest to include in any future property sale wording that CC&Rs compatible with the area would be attached to the land. She hoped to have that response by the hearing on September 22.

President Elizabeth Van Zonneveld presented Marge and Tom Carter with a plaque of commendation for their dedicated service to the Trails Committee and the community.

Director of Elections Frank Siler provided an update on the mailing and candidates for the upcoming PLVC election.

A motion was made and unanimously approved to appoint Dave Armitage as Chairman of the Resident & Business Directory Committee. Chairman Armitage said ad sales would begin the next week. They have member data from the two Clubs and he expects the final directory to be ready in early 2007.

Don Clark stated a Political Candidate's Forum will be held at the Bay Club on **Thursday, October 5**, at 7:00 p.m. Howard Slack will moderate. .

Vice President Tony Durham distributed copies of a position paper on priority planning for PLVC to Board members. Discussion was postponed to the Workshop Meeting.

Allen Panasuk led a discussion concerning PLVC and the Port Ludlow Chamber of Commerce memberships. A motion was made and passed that the PLVC should join the Chamber of Commerce and requested that a Chamber representative attend PLVC meetings.

Regular monthly meetings of the PLVC are held on the first **Thursday** of each month, and will be held **Thursday, October 5**, at the Bay Club and **Thursday, November 2**, at the Beach Club. Monthly workshop meetings are scheduled on the third **Tuesday** of each month and will be held **Tuesday, October 17**, at the Beach Club, and **Tuesday, November 21**, at the Bay Club. These meetings are open to all community residents and begin at 9:00 a.m.

Every regular monthly Council meeting includes agenda time for public input or comment, with each speaker limited to a nominal two minutes. An Overview on Avian and Pandemic Flu

Betty Dunaway RN, Special Projects coordinator for Kitsap County Health District, opened the September Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting with a detailed discussion of the various categories of flu and how to help you stay healthy.

The four types of flu identified were:

- Influenza—an infection of the lungs caused by a virus that can be passed from person to person.
- Seasonal Influenza—a common form of influenza that spreads each winter. Flu shots protect many people from becoming infected.
- Avian Influenza—also called “bird flu.” A type of flu that affects poultry and wild birds. Humans can get this type of flu through close contact with infected birds. Avian influenza cannot be spread from person to person. The virus could change or mutate and spread easily among individuals.
- Pandemic—a disease outbreak that spreads rapidly around the world. Large pandemics occurred in 1918, 1957 and 1968. This is sometimes referred to as “Pan Flu.”

A pandemic caused by a new type of flu virus would be more serious than the seasonal flu as people would have no immunity to it and no vaccine would exist to prevent it. Development and production of a vaccine would take months. This would allow the virus to spread rapidly. Dunaway stated that with worldwide travel a flu virus could go around the world in 48–72 hours.

If an outbreak occurs and people are unable to get to work, life as we know it could change radically. Supplies and services would then be limited. Hospitals and clinics could be overwhelmed with large numbers of sick people and possibly short-staffed. Medicines for flu symptoms might be in short supply. Travel could be difficult with restricted routes and schedules for buses, trains or planes. Gasoline might also be in short supply.

Dunaway stressed remembering, “everything you touch has been touched by someone else.” Viruses are inert by themselves but become active once they are inside your body. They spread when an infected person coughs, sneezes or touches things that others use.

To protect your health and prevent the spread of germs:

- Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze. Use a tissue or cough into your elbow area.

- Wash your hands. Soap and water are best but alcohol-based hand gel or disposable wipes are also extremely effective.
- Don’t touch your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Stay home when you’re sick or have flu symptoms.

In addition to taking preventive measures to stay healthy, it is also recommended that you keep the following items in your home:

- Enough food and water per person for a week or more.
- At least a week’s supply of medications.
- Items to relieve flu symptoms, such as over-the-counter-medicines for fever.
- Items for personal comfort.
- Pet supplies.

Also included are personal care options, sources of help with home modification for aging persons, help with home up-keep, sources of financial/tax information and aid, transportation options, and other listings. Volunteer opportunities for Port Ludlow residents are provided. Listings are geographically restricted to facilities in Jefferson and Kitsap Counties.

Making Waves in Port Townsend

Recently, we learned the Snohomish County Public Utility District (PUD) wants to install 450 underwater turbines—looking something like windmills attached to the ocean floor—to harness tidal power off Point Wilson (Steve Barry, *Port Townsend Leader*). The Snohomish PUD didn't notify local officials about submitting an application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), which City Manager, David Timmons, considers bad form. A private company, TRC Environmental, also has applied to study tidal power in Washington.

The oceans contain thermal energy from the sun's heat and mechanical energy from waves and tides. Wave energy comes from surface waves resulting from interaction of wind with the ocean surface. Tidal energy works from the power of changing tides but needs large tidal differences, 16–20 feet. Unlike solar energy and wind, tidal motion is very regular and predictable. The tidal station works like a hydroelectric dam, using the flow of water to spin turbines and generate electricity from generators. Power can also be generated from the temperature differences in sea levels and from the action of waves.

Martin Berger, the CEO of Blue Energy Canada, claims that coastal communities could extract 50 to 200 percent of their power from the ocean. Added benefits are that the power would be renewable, non-polluting, and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions and reliance on oil. Berger's company is working on a project to build a tidal bridge under the Tacoma Narrows Bridge, incidentally adding more lanes to the existing highway. There are dozens of other companies worldwide, including TRC Environmental that are hoping to mine the vast potential of marine energy.

Although tidal energy has many positive aspects, it also has negative ones. Conditions have to be very special for tidal power plants to work and there are only 15 successful tidal plants that exist in the world. The ones that do can be very successful. France has a tidal energy system that creates 240 megawatts of power for over 240,000 homes. It has had this technology since 1967. However, potential issues related to the continued development of this technology include a possible detrimental effect on fish, which can become entangled in the equipment; the expense of the equipment; and its susceptibility to corrosion. Back in Port Townsend the questions about the energy project remain. Will it swan dive or a belly flop?

Who will steer the course? Will Jefferson County reap any benefit from its aquatic resource? It is too early to know the answers to these questions.

Identify Theft Revisited

A recent circulation of e-mails chronicles three scenarios where scammers might obtain your credit card information.

Scenario 1 has a man finding his locker open following a workout at a gym. A quick check of his wallet showed all credit cards were in place. A few weeks later his credit card bill arrived with \$14,000 worth of small purchases. Customer service at his credit card company verified there was no mistake in the system. When questioned if his card had been stolen, he realized that the card in his wallet was an expired similar credit card from the same bank. His card had been stolen. Since he had not reported the card missing he ultimately had to pay \$9,000.

In scenario 2 a man paid for his meal at a local restaurant with his credit card. The bill came, he signed it, and the waitress folded the receipt over the credit card and passed it back. When he looked at the card, it was the expired card of another person. When he notified the waitress she took it back to the counter waving it as she went. The cashier immediately replaced it with the real card. All this was done without any exchange of words.

Scenario 3 has a customer picking up a called-in pizza order and paying with a VISA Check Card linked to his checking account. The cashier took the card, swiped it, and then laid it on the counter while waiting for the approval. While waiting, the cashier picked up his cell phone and started dialing. The customer noticed the phone, as it was the same model he had. The customer heard a click that sounded like his phone does when he takes a picture and five seconds later he heard the chime that signifies the picture has been saved. He realized the cashier had taken a picture of his credit card.

Internet research reveals that these stories have been in circulation since early 2004. The scenarios are possible but not common. Someone somewhere might have been victimized in this way.

The first two scenes are not likely to be successful for a number of reasons:

- Not all credit cards look alike. Common credit cards vary widely in appearance; feature different logos, different colors and even different customer selected background designs.

- There wouldn't be much time to run up a large balance via small purchases as the deception would be obvious the first time the victim used or looked at his card.
- Most credit card issuers will flag as suspect thousands of dollars worth of charges made on a credit card within a short period of time.
- Contrary to the claim that the customer had to pay \$9,000 as the card had not been reported stolen, he would not have been held liable. Under federal law a credit card holder's maximum liability for any unauthorized credit card use is \$50. (If the card loss is reported before the card is used, there is no liability).

The third scenario has been the topic of notices from many police departments in several states and also from the Canadian Mounted Police. It is sensible to assume that if cell phone cameras can be used to take covert pictures of other people's credit cards, they will be. At the present time it is possible but somewhat implausible as:

- Given the current quality of cell phone cameras, it is difficult to quickly obtain a clear photo of a credit card because of the reflectiveness of the plastic card finish and the lack of contrast between the imprinted numbers and the background.
- A picture of the front of a credit card won't capture the security code usually required for "card not present" purchases. American Express, however, does print their security codes on the front of the card.

A retail fraud investigator for a large chain store reported in conducting a test that "while unable to capture a useable image of a credit card from even the newer camera phones, he was able to record readable images of all account and routing info from the personal checks customers have produced at the checkout." Check writers, he says, "have a tendency to 'lay out' their check books on the writing counter at the registers and keep them stationary enough to obtain a clear image of all the personal information printed on the check. While your credit cards might be secure at this point from cell phone capture, your personal check might not be.

Using caution and being aware of your surroundings when using your credit cards and your checkbook is sound advice.

From the Jefferson County Administrator's Desk

Greetings to each of you in the Port Ludlow area. I hope this finds you happy and healthy as we move into the autumn season and cooler weather. As always, there are many things going on in Jefferson County, but a few of special note are addressed here.

Holland Amendment: The proposed Holland Amendment and its proposed footprint to the Master Planned Resort (MPR) have been greatly reduced. It was presented to the Planning Commission in early September. The amendment once proposed to allow subdivision of all single-family residences in the MPR not owned by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). The amendment now proposes to allow subdivision of only those lots approved and filed before January 1, 1960. A public hearing is tentatively scheduled with the Planning Commission for **Wednesday, October 18**. More details will be available on the County's website on the Port Ludlow page (see web address below).

Sign Policy: Several of you have requested information about a sign policy in Port Ludlow. According to the Jefferson County Code (JCC), there are no special sign codes in Port Ludlow, only the existing JCC requirements that apply to everyone else in the County. Basically, a building permit is required for any sign that is roof mounted, wall mounted or freestanding on posts in excess of 6 feet above grade and that exceed 16 square feet in size. Engineering signs must be submitted with the building permit for any sign not made of plywood in excess of 32 square feet, over 6 feet above grade, or roof mounted. Billboards, flashing, revolving or moving signs are prohibited. Offsite signs are prohibited and signs that create a safety hazard for pedestrians or traffic are prohibited.

Resort Revision Application: Public comments are open until **Monday, October 16**. PLA has been presenting their reduced revision plan in response to earlier public comments to various Port Ludlow community groups. It's anticipated they'll be submitting that plan to the County in the near future. The revised plan has been receiving positive comments throughout the community.

Drainage District Amendment: The proposed amendment to the Jefferson County Code by the Port Ludlow Drainage District (PLDD) has been pushed out further into the year. This will allow time to develop an agreement between Public Works and the Drainage District before the proposed amendment goes before the Planning Commission.

Paradise Bay Road Lighting: Several of you have asked about lighting in the median on Paradise Road near the Village Center. The wiring is going in. However, other project elements, such as poles for the lights, are not part of this project. Therefore, you will not see lighting in the median until later, as funds become available and a new phase of the road project is able to begin.

Mum's the Word for Fall

There are about 160 species of Chrysanthemums, most of them native to China, Japan, and Europe. They can be found in any grocery store or even hardware stores and add beautiful color to you fall

garden. Mums come in every color except blue, plus a multitude of sizes and shapes. There are tiny pompoms, daisy-like singles, spoons are daisy-like with a tube terminating in an open flat tip, and anemones look like a pompom with daisy leaves at the outside edge. The quill has fewer petals and is flatter than the spider; incurves are large with upturned petal tips, and often the underside is a different color from the top. Reflex is just like incurve except its petal tips turn down, and lacinated has ragged petal tips.

Chrysanthemums can be planted and ignored and they will survive. But, with a little attention they can be spectacular. Spring is the best time to plant outdoors. In Port Ludlow they prefer full sun, away from invasive tree or hedge roots, in well-drained, rich, organically mulched soil. The right amount of water is critical. Too little water will give you woody stems and a loss of lower leaves; too much water will give you yellow leaves that will eventually blacken and die. Generally potted plants need more water. In the late spring, when plants first emerge, give them fertilizer, and continue fertilizing once a month until the 4th of July, when they get a dose of bloom-booster, a low nitrogen fertilizer, and no more fertilizer.

Now for the critical question: To remove buds or not remove buds? For tiny pompoms I just let them grow, but large incurves will reward you with huge blooms if you remove all but one or two buds per bloom cluster. Do not remove any blooms after the 4th of July, because they will not have time to redevelop. In addition to removing buds, I like to nip the growing tips when the plants are very small. This makes the plant fuller and sturdier. When winter is coming and your plants have finished blooming, just cut them back to 6 or 8 inches tall, and wait for spring.

You may buy chrysanthemums that have been forced into blooming off-season. When they have finished blooming, they can be pruned and planted in your garden, but next year they will bloom at their normal time—fall.

Eating Around

C'est Si Bon

Driving to Port Angeles to dine at C'est Si Bon is definitely worth the trip. Once you enter the parking area you don't realize that busy Highway 101 is just a few feet away. There are flowers, trees, grass, and quiet along the path to the entrance. Inside, the décor is somewhere between over-the-top-romantic and bordello Nouveau. The carpet and chairs are a calm teal, while the walls glow with deep fuchsia. Everywhere there are silk flowers, ribbons, a crystal chandelier, carousel horse, cherubs, and soft music. The table settings are lovely.

There is also a large glass greenhouse area decorated with outdoor greenery, and the bar is a narrow room with a wall of mirror at one end, autographed pictures of famous Hollywood people (be sure to ask about these), and a worldwide selection of beer—a cozy fun place.

After exploring the extensive wine list, we started our meals with oysters and French onion soup. The onions were caramelized just enough to be sweet but with no loss of flavor, topped with a round of crouton and rich cheese. Their signature oyster appetizer is oysters in a sauce of shallots, cream and balsamic vinegar, with baguette slices for sopping or eating with butter.

The salad was a buttery bibb lettuce and ripe tomato with an oh-so-light vinaigrette. The beef tenderloin came with sauce made of a reduction of beef, currants, herbs, and cream—wonderful. The lamb tenderloin's sauce had a hint of sweet fruitiness. Later we learned that this sauce is usually made with balsamic vinegar, but since we had already tasted the vinegar with our oysters, a plum sauce was substituted instead. Both meals were beautifully presented with crisp asparagus, shiitake mushrooms, and cheese scalloped potatoes.

Even though the portions are ample, we couldn't resist chocolate mousse, and cream caramel both served with raspberries. Like the décor, our meals were over-the-top. Nothing was ordinary, and everything was exceptional, including chatting with the owner/chef.

However, plan to spend \$20 or more just for the entrée. Appetizer, wine and dessert are extra, but well worth the price. Only dinner is served.

Port Ludlow Real Estate Update

Seattle television and newspapers shout the news that the real estate market has cooled down and home prices are dropping off. Port Ludlow is apparently following the trend as realtors report fewer sales this year, but homes have sold for higher prices. Our community remains an attraction for home seekers looking for a change in life style. With the many “For Sale” signs on both North and South sides, it would appear that unlike the Seattle area, Port Ludlow is booming.

It is true that there has been a drop off of home and condo sales this spring and summer. However as fall approaches, real estate activity seems to be again picking up. 2005 and 2006 data provided by the Northwest Multiple Listing Service showed that during the eight-month period of January to mid August 2005, 65 homes and 11 condos for a total of 76 were sold. In comparison, over the same time period this year, 56 homes and 8 condos for a total of 64 were sold—13 fewer sales. However, prices were higher for the 2006 time period. The average sale price of a home in 2005 was \$425,000 compared to an average of \$469,869 this year. The average was skewed upward with one high end home going for over \$2 million dollars. Housing in Port Ludlow is becoming more expensive each year.

The average “days on the market,” an indicator of sales activities, showed a slight increase from 127 days on the market in 2005 to 133 days in 2006. Some listings show that a number of would-be sellers reduced their asking price during the summer. This suggests that perhaps pricing may have affected sales.

Realtors suggest that several factors influence Port Ludlow sales. Of course, fluctuating interest rates are a factor. However, as construction by Port Ludlow Associates has slowed due to appeals to the County permitting process, there have been fewer new homes on the market. Thus, new home sales are affected. Also the decreasing availability of undeveloped property has resulted in fewer new homes available for sale. An interesting trend is emerging with more focus on resales of older homes that are being purchased with an eye to remodel.

Realtors note that those interested in buying here come with a range of desires and interests. Clients show high interest in views, and the wooded environment of our

“Village in the Woods.” Those who come from an urban area often see these as key attributes in relocating. Unique amenities such as the Bay and Beach Clubs plus the wide range of community activities are seen as very positive resources. The reputations of the Golf Course and the Marina are also factors. Realtors note that today’s buyers want a house to have higher ceilings, good lighting, larger garages, and bedroom suites that include bathrooms, and in many cases more square footage. While fireplaces remain of interest, wood burning fireplaces are not. Potential buyers show concern over the lack of core services such as medical, shopping, proximity of churches and more recently schools. Increasing numbers show interest in one-story rambler-style homes.

Skateboard rumbling on the street and tricycle bells heard through the trees are an indication of a change that is taking place. Families finding housing costs rising on the Kitsap Peninsula are looking towards Port Ludlow as a cost effective move even with commuting time and costs factored in. Our concept of “amenities” may require fresh thinking by both the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) and South Bay Community Association (SBCA) as gray turns to youthful hues.

Patient Navigator Aids Cancer Patients in Sequim

The rapidly expanding Olympic Medical Cancer Center in Sequim has state-of-the-art treatment services for cancer patients including the services of a patient navigator. The navigator, Linda Klinefelter MS, says her job is to help cancer patients make the system work for them. In a treatment program that emphasizes compassion and emotional well being, she tries to identify the crisis flags presented by the patients. The program is partially funded by the Pfizer Drug Company.

Klinefelter's services are broad. She probes patient circumstances, asking questions about whether the patient can get to appointments and what the home situation is. As part of her work she helps coordinate programs for women, advises patients and families, offers hospice referrals, helps with social security applications and performs other tasks. Klinefelter says that the wholistic approach to treatment offered by the Center is supported by research. Patients do not want to be treated like a number at critical times. Caring treatment fosters better outcomes.

Given the huge cost of medical treatment, an important area for Klinefelter is looking for funding options for low-income patients. Funds can come from a variety of levels. The Susan Komen Foundation administers a "Cancer Lifeline" program in Jefferson, Kitsap, Clallam, Pierce, and King Counties. The Peninsula Patient Assistance Fund has funds for housing and other patient needs. Cancer patients on the Olympic Peninsula often have special needs because patients are often older persons on fixed incomes and many must travel long distances to the Center. As part of the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance, patients can be referred to the University of Washington and to clinical trials. Patient files and treatment plans can be transferred electronically and doctors can videoconference to insure smooth treatment transitions.

Olympic Medical Center's new \$5 million dollar cancer care facility offers the latest in radiation technology, including sophisticated equipment that targets the specific shape of individual tumors and leaves healthy tissue untouched. Two new buildings will add capacity. The center is affiliated with the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance and three of the most prominent cancer care organizations: Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, UW Medicine, and Children's Hospital and Regional Medical Center.

September Report

The regular meeting of the SBCA was held at the Bay Club on Friday, September 1. Following opening comments by President Tom Stone, residents in attendance were given the opportunity to speak. Dan Darrow expressed concern that the PLVC had asked for the resignation of Trails Committee chairman without discussion with the Committee membership. He stated the Committee members had always accomplished their work without becoming involved in Port Ludlow politics. Port Ludlow Funfest chair, Marilyn Durand, reported on the extensive array of activities and vendor booths scheduled for the annual event. Signed Commemorative Funfest 2006 posters can be ordered for \$15 at the Friday Market Funfest Booth. Poster sale proceeds will support Port Ludlow Village Council programs.

Committee Reports:

Architectural Review Committee (ARC): Linda Colasurdo summarized ARC activity for the month:

- Three new permits were issued.
- Villages issued fourteen permits.
- A homeowner complaint was resolved.
- An on-site visit will be required to understand the scope of a village common area project.

Homeowners were reminded that CC&Rs do not allow political signs to be displayed in yards.

Tennis: Clint Webb addressed the completion of the refurbishment of the tennis courts, development of a maintenance plan, and updating of signage.

Financial: Chris Whitehurst presented the financial highlights for July 2006. Total Current Assets: \$357,303.13;

Total Assets: \$486,730.04. The Income Statement for July shows total revenues of \$81,216.59, total operating expenses of \$35,339.11 with a net operating surplus for the month of \$45,877.48.

Whitehurst also reported that starting this fiscal year, SBCA is returning to a cash accounting reporting method rather than the partial accrual method used the past few years.

Operations: Mike Morgan reported six new members were added this month for a total of 529.

Old Business: President Stone reported that negotiations with Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) concerning the Capital Contribution Agreement were in their final stages. In order for the Board to have an opportunity to review the final document before signing, a special meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, September 20, 2:00 p.m., at The Bay Club.

New Business:

A meeting with the Village Presidents was scheduled for Friday, September 29, 2:00 p.m. at The Bay Club.

A new Finance and Long Range Planning Committee was approved. John Cragoe will serve as chairperson of this committee. The purpose of this Committee is to assist the Board in ensuring that the SBCA programs/facilities meet the needs of the members at the best value for the cost. Volunteers to serve on this Committee are needed.

The last item of business was a detailed Board discussion on Trendwest support. The SBCA website's Trendwest Forum had about 20 interesting inputs but not enough for the Board to take a definite position. A motion was passed that all SBCA members be urged to make their personal Trendwest positions known through all public hearings.

Rules We Agreed to Live By

From time to time, as space in the *Voice* permits, the SBCA Architectural Review Committee (ARC) will remind you of the rules and guidelines designed to protect your housing investment and assure us all of a high-quality living environment. Three documents provide the details: (1) the *South Bay Master Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, Restrictions, Assessments, Charges, Servitudes, Liens, Reservations, and Easements* (CC&Rs), (2) the supplemental declarations for each village (supplemental CC&Rs), and (3) the *South Bay Design Standards, Revision 4*. You should have these documents. If you've lost one or all, you can obtain copies from the SBCA office or from the Port Ludlow Village Council website: www.plvc.org under SBCA. From this website, you can also obtain landscape permit applications.

With the political campaign season well underway, you may want to support your candidate(s) and cause(s) by placing political signs in your yard, but the rules we've agreed to live by say you may not post political signs and posters on your property or common area. This prohibition is clearly stated in the CC&Rs (§ 4.2.12) and the Design Standards (§ 5.1.21). To quote the CC&Rs:

No signs whatsoever which are Visible From Neighboring Property shall be erected or maintained on any Lot or Common Areas except:

- (i) Signs required by legal proceedings...;
- (ii) One "For Sale" or "For Rent" sign not exceeding 18" x 24" in area...;
- (iii) One identification sign...;
- (iv) Signs of Declarant or signs authorized by Declarant within South Bay
- (v) Signs receiving prior written approval from the Architectural Review Committee....

All such signs shall be removed by the Owner promptly upon completion of their intended use.

Another concern, especially during the warm and dry Port Ludlow summer, is outdoor burning. Although you might see signs throughout the County that state "Outdoor Burning YES," that only holds in South Bay if the fire is "in a contained outdoor fireplace or barbecue unit while attended" (CC&Rs, § 4.2.6). (For a greater discussion, see Bill Hansen's article in the May 2006 *Voice*, p 16.)

If you want to dispose of yard waste, haul it to the Jefferson County Recycling Center; not only is there no charge to dispose of it there, but the waste is converted into useful compost.

We continue to look forward to meeting with groups and residents in order to share ideas or deal with any expressed concerns about Port Ludlow's future. Randy Verrue is in Port Ludlow around the third or fourth week of each month. We are both committed to an outreach program with the members of our community.

I do not have a question to answer this month, so I will give an update on our three projects that we are currently working on.

Olympic Terrace II: We are pretty close to picking a new name for the plat as well as naming the roads and models. We are hopeful, with cooperation from Mother Nature, that we will begin setting foundations for the three model homes in **November**.

Updating Nautical Charts

by Kevin Ryan, Flotilla Commander, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary

The nautical chart is remarkable for the large quantity of information provided on a single sheet of paper. It includes many land and water features, which of course, are in a constant state of evolution. When charted information becomes obsolete, further use of the chart for navigation may be dangerous. It is important, therefore, that the boat operator keeps and uses the latest edition of all charts.

The National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) or its subsidiary, the National Ocean Service (NOS), have produced most of the charts that we use. Assistance in updating is provided by the United States Coast Guard (USCG). District 13 USCG, which includes Port Ludlow's Flotilla 41, provides free upon request a weekly publication reporting discrepancies in the charts, *The Local Notice to Mariners*.

Your local Coast Guard Auxiliary participates in the NOS Adopt-A-Chart Program. We have been assigned Chart 18477, "Puget Sound, Entrance to Hood Canal," and continuously monitor the geographic features included on this chart, reporting discrepancies as they occur. If charted landmarks such as a tower or prominent church steeple disappear or if a new prominent feature is built, these are reported with the suggestion that the next chart edition either omit them or include them. The condition of "Aids to Navigation" such as buoys, day marks and bridge lights are observed, documented and reported. Depths are checked during our patrols in order to detect areas of shoaling.



Another part of this program is to verify or revise the information published in the *Coast Pilot* for our area. This very useful book provides narrative descriptions of the entire coast, frequently accompanied by photographs taken from the water level toward the shore. The information describing the characteristics of Port Ludlow Bay and surrounds was updated in the latest publication of that book based upon descriptions and photographs that the Port Ludlow Flotilla submitted.

If boaters in our area notice errors on current charts or features that they believe should be included in the next edition of the chart, please speak to our Officer in Charge of Aids Verification, Bob Wheeldon, at 437- 8214.




