Town Meeting, Comment Period and Public Hearing Scheduled on PLA Resort Plan

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Jefferson County has given public notice that Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) has submitted applications for a Boundary Line Adjustment (BLA), Shoreline Substantial Development Permit (SSDP), Administrative Code Interpretation, and Major Resort Plan Revision relating to land located within the Ludlow Bay Village (LBV) plat and adjoining undeveloped lands commonly known as Admiralty III adjoining the existing Admiralty Condominiums.

Community members are invited to attend an open record public hearing before the Jefferson County Hearing Examiner at the County Courthouse on **Tuesday, December 6**, beginning at 1:00 p.m. Seven days prior to the hearing, the Jefferson County Department of Community Development (DCD) must complete a staff report.

The Ludlow Bay Resort Committee (LBRC) of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) has had numerous meetings to review PLA's applications and alternative proposals provided by the County. Committee members are reviewing an earlier Resort Plan approved by the County, which set the density for residential development in the LBV plat at 58 townhomes and single-family residences. PLA's current proposal would add 62 new attached residential units, which combined with the existing 25 townhomes makes a total of 87.

To make Port Ludlow residents aware of the comment period deadline of **Friday, November 4**, and the upcoming public hearing, the LBRC plans a community-wide mailing and will conduct a Town Meeting on **Tuesday, November 1**, 7:00 p.m., at the Bay Club to review the project.

The meeting format will include a question and answer segment with PLA invited as a participant. According to the LBRC the purpose of the meeting is to "familiarize Port Ludlow residents with the history of the project and provide ... means to hear the wishes of the community concerning this project."

The County invites all interested persons to (a) comment on the proposal; (b) request notice of other public hearings and meetings; (c) attend the public hearing and present argument, testimony, and other evidence relating to the proposal; and (d) request a copy of the decision of the Hearing Examiner.

Written comments and requests should be sent to the Jefferson County DCD, Development Review Division, 621 Sheridan Street, Port Townsend, WA 98368. Comments should be submitted by 4:30 p.m. on **Friday, November 4**. Comments submitted after that date may not be considered in the staff report. CarFit® is Coming to Port Ludlow!

Drivers of all ages will have an opportunity to participate in CarFit®, a new national program designed to help mature drivers extend their ability to drive safer longer, on **Friday, November 4**, between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m., at the Beach Club. As we age, changes in vision, flexibility, strength, range of motion, and even height may make drivers uncomfortable and reduce their ability to control the vehicle. A simple adjustment or accessory may improve driving ability.

Volunteers are trained to perform CarFit® program checks that are expected to run approximately 20 minutes per driver. The volunteers will look at the driver's position to the airbag, seatbelt use, headrest position, pedal and mirror

usages, steering wheel position, line of sight, neck mobility, and uses of parking brake, signals, emergency flashers, wipers and headlights. No in-car driving test or assessment is involved. The program just examines the stationary driver-car "fit."

If an area of difficulty is identified, the driver will be given the opportunity to visit an on-site occupational therapist with a specialty in driver safety. The therapist will have a list of items that can be purchased to increase the comfort and safety of the driver and also a list of vendors that carry these car accessories.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office and the Beach Club are hosting the event. Call the Sheriff's Office at 385-3831 to make an appointment.

Shore Stewards Information Session

A day at the beach is a day well spent. But did you know that, while you're on the beach enjoying the sun, looking for marine life or playing in the water, the beach may be moving before your very eyes? Our beaches are very dynamic areas; and, while we may not be able to see the change on a day-to-day basis, they are changing nonetheless. Some changes in the shoreline are rapid and obvious, such as landslides, while other changes may take years to develop.

Come learn more about how our beaches have changed through the years due to both natural processes and human forces. On **Tuesday November 8**, 6:00–8:00 p.m., at the Bay Club, Richard Brocksmith of the Hood Canal Coordinating Council and Harriet Beale of the Puget Sound Action team will speak to our community.

Brocksmith will present historic photos of the shoreline in Jefferson County and compare them with our current shoreline and discuss the changes that have occurred. Beale will then discuss the process of erosion, why and how it occurs, and how we may be able to prevent or minimize it.

The Shore Stewards program is hosting this information session. This program is open to anyone in Jefferson, Kitsap or Mason Counties who has shoreline, streamside or lakefront property or beach access through his or her community association. Shore Stewards learn about how they can tend their property, care for their home, and enjoy their waterfront while caring for the water where they live.

Shore Stewards receive a booklet explaining how they can avoid contributing excess nutrients to the Hood Canal and the surrounding waters and improve fish habitat on their property. Subjects in the booklet include: water conservation, septic maintenance, shoreline and bluff maintenance, shoreline development considerations, gardening and native vegetation, erosion prevention and enjoying the beach and its unique habitat. Those who complete an application to the Shore Stewards program also receive a sign to display, invitations to more workshops where they will get more in-depth information, and newsletters updating current activities and conditions on Hood Canal and our County.

Attire Befitting the Occasion

Now known as Veterans' Day, this observance was formerly called Armistice Day, since **November 11** is the anniversary of the Armistice signed by the Allies and the Germans in 1918, ending World War I. In November 1919, President Woodrow Wilson issued his Armistice Day proclamation. The last paragraph set the tone for future observances:

"To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

It was not until 1938 that Congress passed a bill that each **November 11** "shall be dedicated to the cause of world peace and ... hereafter celebrated and known as Armistice Day." For sixteen years the United States formally observed Armistice Day, with impressive ceremonies at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where the Chief Executive or his representative placed a wreath. In many other communities, the American Legion was in charge of the observance, which included parades and religious services. At 11:00 a.m. all traffic stopped, in tribute to the dead, then volleys were fired and taps sounded.



After World War II, there were many new veterans who had little or no association with World War I. Leaders of Veterans' groups decided to make **November 11** the time to honor all who had fought in various American wars. An Act of Congress on May 24, 1954, changed the name to Veterans' Day. In October of that year, President Dwight D. Eisenhower called on all citizens to observe the day by remembering the sacrifices of all those who fought so gallantly, and through rededication to the task of promoting an enduring peace. The President referred to the change of name to Veterans' Day in honor of the servicemen of all America's wars.

The hungry crowd carried food to the entertainment tent where Bev Rothenborg, Diane Watson, and Bernie Robinson arranged a full line-up of music.

The sun came out midday on Saturday, but festival attendance was hampered by rain and cold. Forty-nine vendors braved the weather to sell their wares. Volunteer

Linda Karp, vendor recruitment, arranged for volunteers including Ila Gluhm to give vendors a break. Sally Grything's clean-up crew of Rainbow Girls and Peggy Nan Springer, sporting special hats painted by Barbara Adams, kept the grounds meticulous. Robbie Robinson was a one-person site committee organizing layout of the grounds, working hard to assure that things went well and on time.

We accomplished our goal of involving many community members to provide a broad group of knowledgeable volunteers for future festivals. FunFest also provided an opportunity for non-profits to earn funds and share information to support their work: Boy Scouts, Community Enrichment Alliance, OlyCap, Jefferson Healthcare Auxiliary, Olympic Peninsula Pet Pals, Master Gardeners, Martha and Mary Health Care, and the Port Ludlow Fire Department.

Friday Market Ends Successful Season

“Meet Me at the Market” was selected as the 2005 Friday Market theme to increase use of the market as a community gathering place. Patronage of the market and shoppers increased; the average number of vendors increased. In 2005 between thirty and seven vendors participated each week; nineteen was the average. Though statistics are unavailable from previous years, most observers noted this as a significant increase.

To encourage patronage, live music filled the air on ten of the nineteen market days and recorded music played on the other weeks. Non-profits were encouraged to set up booths without charge. They came: Port Ludlow Trails Committee, Poulsbo’s Jewel Box Theater, Second Chance Ranch (pet adoptions), Centrum, Community Enrichment Alliance (CEA), Port Ludlow Arts Council, and the Master Gardener’s Plant Clinic. Each week a special program was set up. Among the most popular were “Making Gazpacho with Chef Joseph Mollerus,” “Lavender: Its History and Uses” with Karen Porter, and a book signing with Port Ludlow author Bill Schoenemann.

Towards the end of the season, two new vendors became regulars, promising to return next year: Pescador Farms from Yakima and Liz’s Plants from Suquamish. As high quality vendors are added to our regulars, like Ike’s Fish and Chou’s Flowers, we expect increasing success each season.

Port Ludlow’s Friday Market ended its most successful season on September 30 to the sounds of the Northwest Country Boys. The vendors had a potluck at lunchtime with fish furnished by Ike’s to celebrate the successful season. The market will reopen on **Friday, May 5, 2006**. This earlier opening was requested by produce vendors to sell early crops, such as asparagus. Meet you at the Market!

Information and Assistance for Seniors



The National Center for Injury Prevention and Control has provided some interesting statistics concerning falls and the senior population:

- More than one-third of adults ages 65 and older fall each year.
- Among older adults, falls are the leading cause of injury deaths and the most common cause of nonfatal injuries and hospital admissions for trauma.
- In 2003 more than 1.8 million seniors age 65 and older were treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries and more than 421,000 were hospitalized.
- Of those who fall, 20 to 30 percent suffer moderate to severe injuries such as hip fractures or head traumas that reduce mobility and independence, and increase the risk of premature death.
- Among people ages 75 years and older, those who fall are four to five times more likely to be admitted to a long-term care facility for a year or longer.

Over the next few months, this column will list further statistics concerning falls and detail what seniors can do in order to minimize the risks associated with falls. If we can be of assistance with this or other issues, please feel free to call me at our office, 385-2552, and ask for Dave.

Local Residents Volunteer for Katrina Relief Effort

By now the tragic pictures of the devastation of the gulf coast wrought by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita have become all too familiar. Many, here and abroad, have contributed to fund the relief efforts, but some have gone the second mile. John Austin and Judy Blair joined other Red Cross volunteers working with hurricane survivors in Louisiana and Mississippi. Both volunteer with the Red Cross locally and have experience with other national disasters, but they agree that Katrina relief was the most difficult and intense of any they had experienced.

Austin, a clinical psychologist from Minnesota, is a Red Cross disaster action team (DAT) volunteer, drives for the Veterans' Administration, and is on the Board of the Regional Mental Health Support Network.

Much of his local

Red Cross work involves fires (such as the condo fire last year) but he has been called to other national disasters including Ivan in the Florida panhandle last year and Dennis in Pensacola in July.

During Katrina, Austin was second in command as Deputy Manager of a shelter housing 4,500 in Baton Rouge. The complex shelter included supply distribution facilities, medical help, a school (grades K-12), a missing-persons bureau and a missing-childrens website. The shelter operated with donated computers, entertainment, choir groups, and other aspects of New Orleans culture. The sixty volunteers slept on the floor of a room the size of the Beach Club's Bayview room.

Blair moved to Port Ludlow from Spokane with her husband, the Chimacum Superintendent of Schools, and family two years ago. Formerly a second grade teacher, she is a Red Cross DAT member operating out of the Port Hadlock office. Like Austin, she was called to assist during Ivan.

For Katrina, Austin was sent to Jacksonville, Mississippi, and was still there during Rita. Her work involved food

distribution, family services and assistance, and sheltering. The shelter served 1,000 people a day for over a month. During Rita, she helped deliver meals to centers in a van. The work was dangerous because the hurricane generated multiple tornados necessitating constant vigilance by the crew.

Blair and Austin were touched by people's stories and by their resiliency. The people reaching the shelter were just grateful to be alive and to have family members. Unrelated people, rescued together, stuck together as a family to care for each other. They believe this characteristic has been given too little attention by the press.

Other local persons assisting in the relief efforts were Norma Wynman, Marrowstone; Don Dybeck, Kala Point; George Williams of Port Townsend and others. If you wish to get involved in volunteer work for the local chapter of the Red Cross, call Ellen Crockett of Disaster Services Human Resources, at 385-2737. The chapter is located in the Shold Business Center on Rhody Drive near the Washington State University Extension Service. People are needed for hardship situations such as Katrina, answering phones, teaching classes in CPR and first aid, and performing other functions.

Port Ludlow Book Club

A horrific event took place in 1984: an innocent woman and her baby were murdered, the victims of religious extremism. Jon Krakauer's book, *Under the Banner of Heaven: A Story of Violent Faith*, is a true-crime investigation of these murders and the destructive turn fanatical religiosity can take. This meticulously researched account of this appalling double murder was selected as a New York Times Notable Book for 2003.

The Book Club will discuss this chilling book on **Tuesday, November 8**, at 6:30 p.m. at the Bay Club. Plan to attend what promises to be an exciting discussion of a book that probes the foundation of all religious faiths and the extremes to which beliefs can be taken.

Workshop Highlights

The October Workshop Meeting of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) was held at the Bay Club on Thursday, October 6.

Council Treasurer Elizabeth Van Zonneveld reported balances of \$14,251 in Village Council funds and \$3,944 in Trails funds as of October 1. Larry Nobles, Council member, reported that the Community Development Committee (CDC) had not met but he provided the following updates:

- **Trendwest:** A motion for reconsideration of the approval was denied September 27. The deadline for filing any additional appeals is October 12.
- **Olympic Terrace II:** The Appellant Examiner affirmed the project's approval decision on September 27. Any possible appeals to Superior Court would need to be filed by October 26.
- **Michael Bergstrom,** a consultant in land use matters, has been hired by Jefferson County to replace Faith Lumsden, who resigned effective October 1.

Phil Norwine, Council member, reporting for Emergency Preparedness, stated all Villages are fully staffed and the Captains and Co-Captains all have radios. He emphasized that all individuals should be prepared to help themselves by assembling emergency survival kits and having them readily available.

Ralph Stroy, Council member, and Barbara Bradford reported on Friday Market. A number of vendors want to start the market earlier next year so they can bring early crops, such as asparagus. The market had an average of 19 vendors, with a high of 30 participants. There was good participation from multiple non-profit groups. The market showed a profit, which would have been higher if free music groups could have been obtained. (See related article on page 7.)

Marge Carter reported for the Trails Committee. She and Tom Carter distributed prototype copies of a Trails Map showing all Port Ludlow Trails, which have been completed and turned over to the Trails Committee. She requested PLVC members review the map for possible corrections and will bring a proposal for distribution to the next meeting.

There were no reports from the Future of Port Ludlow, Recycle or Utilities Committees.

Elizabeth Van Zonneveld reported that the Ludlow Bay Resort Committee (LBRC) has met twice since the last PLVC meeting to review Port Ludlow Associates' (PLA's) application status and the alternative proposals provided by the County in the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS). Jefferson County Department of Community Development (DCD) staff has notified the LBRC that a hearing date of **Tuesday, December 6**, has been set for the PLA application to be heard before a Hearing Examiner. DCD staff must complete a report 7 days prior to the hearing. LBRC requested PLVC approve sending a letter about the project to residents and holding a community meeting for input. Tom McCay, Council and Committee member, stressed, "They want to submit comments to DCD about what the people want them to say, not what the LBRC wants to say." (See related story, page 17).

Ed Wilkerson, acting Fire Chief, reported that Fire District #3 had received two grant awards totaling \$145,500 to cover specialized equipment/training and a thermal imaging camera purchase. An Advanced Life Support (ALS) service cooperative agreement with Fire District #1 will terminate **Saturday, December 31**, but Port Ludlow coverage will continue as it is now. He advised

that the burn ban has been lifted and permits are available at the fire station. The permits do not supersede whatever individual Village CC&Rs specify.

Greg McCarry, PLA’s President and CEO, thanked the County Commissioners for their timely action in hiring a land-use-matters consultant. He also pointed out that the public comment period on PLA’s Resort Plan ends **Friday, November 4**. A hearing before the Jefferson County Hearing Examiner will be held in the Board of County Commissioners Room, Jefferson County Courthouse, **Tuesday, December 6**, at 1:00 p.m.

Dwayne Wilcox, PLVC President, requested that the “Council move on and work towards furthering the interests of the community” now that decisions have been legally reached regarding the Trendwest and Olympic Terrace II projects.

Frank Siler, reporting on the PLVC elections, thanked his committee for counting the 547 ballots (35 percent) that were returned. He stated, “All of the proposed changes to the PLVC Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws passed by a substantial majority.” Elected for two-year terms from North Bay were Don Clark, Larry Nobles and Bruce Pyles; from South Bay, Tony Durham and Allen Panasuk. Since two of the elected members were absent, an organizational meeting to seat new members and elect officers will be scheduled at a later date.

Barbara Bradford, FunFest Chair, reported that an evaluation meeting was scheduled for October 12. Final financial reports were still being compiled. She thanked PLA, PLVC, and the Port Ludlow Chamber of Commerce for their support. (See related story, page 7).

Port Ludlow Emergency Preparedness Program

Advisories from the Department of Homeland Security and other agencies of government at all levels asking families to prepare themselves ahead of time for disasters are easy for most of us to ignore. Establishing a stockpile of emergency supplies takes up valuable storage space, and requires maintenance. However, the experts say that disaster preparation goes a long way toward ensuring your survival.

There are some common threads in disasters:

1. Some of us might need assistance.
2. We might need to evacuate or we might be stuck in place for five or more days by closed exit routes.
3. We might be the central focus of the event or we might be on the periphery competing with more hard-hit areas for the attention of emergency services.

Several years ago Port Ludlow established a system of neighborhood captains and co-captains, equipped them with radios for the purpose of gathering information and transmitting it to higher levels of emergency management. This organization has been maintained with quarterly radio drills. We are indebted to the originators of our program for the time and energy they put in for organizing, equipment acquisition and training. In addition, approximately fifty residents prepared themselves further by undergoing Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training.

You should know who your local captains and co-captains are. If your household has special needs in case of a power or transportation outage, let your captain know about it. We have posted a complete list of captains and co-captains for the 14 North Bay neighborhoods at the Beach Club. The 18 South Bay area captains are identified at the Bay Club.

Probably the most useful thing that a village can do in advance of any emergency is to get to know your neighbors. Find out which of your neighbors will require assistance in case of a power outage. Find out who has a four-wheel-drive vehicle which might be required to negotiate damaged access roads, who has heavy tools, and who has some medical expertise.

The Community Enrichment Alliance (CEA) sponsored an excellent program entitled “Getting Ready” on September 15 at the Beach Club. (See related article on page 10). We will try to get this valuable information to all of the Captains so that they, in turn, can discuss individual preparedness with their neighbors. Please make their job easier by being prepared for “the big one” ... whatever and whenever it is.

Like the geraniums, I'm going into a cool dark place called winter, but I will see you in the spring.

LMC Board Meeting Highlights

The monthly Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees meeting was held on Saturday, October 8.

LMC President Bruce Schmitz acknowledged former Trustee Carl Jespersen for his design and installation of the stairway and fence projects at the Beach Club. With the help of several LMC members, the much-needed stairway is now complete and will benefit LMC members in the future. Bruce announced the LMC pool table has been sold on *e-Bay* for \$3,000. Shelly O'Brien, Monica Brown and Kim Monroe were thanked for their combined talents in decorating the display case in the Bayview Room.

Beach Club Manager Brian Belmont reported the tile work is about to begin in the ladies locker room. Completion date remains on track for the middle of **November**. The Beach Club staff has been working hard to collect past-due assessments; \$8,000 was collected in September. Work on the spa has been completed, with new jets, tile work, motor repair and removal of the annoying noise when the activator button is pressed.

Michael Cahn reported for the Operations Committee. The second draft of the 2006 LMC budget has been reviewed and sent to the Finance Committee for further consideration before it goes to the Board of Trustees. Michael reported many necessary repairs at the Beach Club have greatly impacted the budget. Dry rot was recently discovered under the lobby and will have to be addressed. Several ways to reduce costs were entertained, one being reduced club hours. (See related article on page 21).

Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Chair Veronica Cross reported 23 requests were approved since the last meeting, including one new house, five repaints, twelve tree removals, two fences, and one satellite dish. There are 15 pending files. Members of the Committee are

monitoring houses under construction, and reported violations are being addressed. Seven new house plans will be reviewed at the October 10 ACC meeting. Veronica requested the Board approve Stephen J. Siegiel as a new member of the ACC Committee.

Greenbelt Committee (GBC) Chair Ron Garton reported the Committee has more than 20 outstanding cases, many of which deal with approved but not yet completed work. A new contractor violation into the greenbelt is being addressed. The GBC has compiled a list of contractors who do tree trimming and removal work in this area. Contact the Beach Club for a copy of the list.

Trustee Ian Feltham reported for the Finance Committee (FC). After review of LMC finances, the FC has determined the LMC will be able to meet its obligations for the remainder of the year. Interest penalty on late assessments is being investigated and will be presented to the Board in **November**. The semi-annual payment plan is being reviewed.

Covenants & Regulations Committee (CRC) Chair Catherine Garrison detailed the Committee's review of the governing documents for all references to the role of the Operations Committee (OC). The CRC, along with OC member Sharon Sorensen and Manager Brian Belmont, are working on minor revisions that will more accurately reflect the roles of the General Manager and Operations Committee. A draft should be presented to the Board in **November**.

Communications Chair Sally Orsborn thanked all members involved with communication in North Bay. The October issue of the *LOG* will be mailed by mid-October. The use of an insert in the *LOG* was discussed as a way to better communicate recent changes to LMC members.

- The Board will hold a special meeting to address the proposed development plan for the Resort.
- Stephen J. Siegiel will join the ACC Committee.
- Gilmore fence appeal was denied. The Board requested the Gilmore family and ACC work together toward a more acceptable design for the project.
- Wilkerson appeal will be heard immediately following the **November 12** LMC meeting.
- Brian Belmont will hire a contractor to address the dry rot under the lobby. The contract will be based on time and materials.

Other items of interest:

- After delay due to location of utilities, Joe Thompson will drill holes at Kehele Park on October 11 to address water drainage problems around the tennis courts.
- Brian Belmont, Eve McDougall and Carol Shamhart continue to work on a fee schedule for use of the Beach Club facilities.
- Sasha Coffey is working part-time with Brian to get the Beach Club website up to speed.
- The Beach Club will be closed on Thanksgiving Day.

Nineteen members representing different South Bay villages and the Racquet Club attended the Friday, October 14, meeting. Below are the highlights.

Financial:

Treasurer Chris Whitehurst presented current financials. Fiscal year 2006 shows a net operating surplus of \$5,072. The Balance Sheet and Income Statement can be found on the SBCA website at www.plvc.org and also posted on the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) office bulletin board. Three CPA firms were interviewed, and one has been selected to conduct a formal audit. The Audit determines whether policies and procedures of the SBCA are being properly applied and reviews fiscal year 2005, which ended June 30, 2005. The Audit will include random samplings of receipts, disbursements, bank statements, and financial statements. Recommendations for improvements on internal controls and accounting weaknesses will be reported.

Board of Director Reports:

Jerry Conover reported on Mike Derrig's presentation to the Board last month. Derrig, a former consultant for the Developer, outlined the history of the development of Port Ludlow. He covered the formation of Council of Ludlow Owners Association (CLOA), described the Planning Forum in 1995 (which included 23 special interest groups), and explained the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) was formed to help unify the community. He said the Developer is capped at 2,250 units and SBCA's CC&Rs are solid. Derrig feels the relationship between Developer and residents is less strained than in the past.

Larry Elton described recent activities concerning the on-going CC&R lawsuit. SBCA has filed many, many pages of discovery documents. Legal proceedings continue.

Jack McKay moved to establish a 2005 Bay Club Expansion Committee with the primary responsibility to develop and recommend a financing strategy for the expansion. Discussion emphasized affordability, timing, smaller actions to make the building more useable, and other alternatives before a major expansion. The Committee will draw on the work by the prior Board. Committee membership was approved and they will make a presentation on the results of their planning to the Board of Directors at their December meeting.

Roy Kraft reported a letter was sent to all realtors asking them to respect our CC&Rs where signage is concerned. Many signs are located on County rights of way and common areas. On open-house days the Board could make exceptions to the one sign per "for sale" location, provided these signs were removed each evening. In response to one realtor's letter to the Board, Tom Stone indicated the Board would send a letter asking cooperation. Another letter will be written to Al Scalf at the County Department of Community Development. This item will be put on the agenda for a Village Board presidents' meeting in early spring.

Membership Report:

Mike Morgan reported there are currently 509 members. A lien was filed last month against one member for prolonged non-payment of dues. He described facility usage by 17 major events. He cited the East Jefferson County Rotary Club's "Puttin' on the Ritz" as the most recent, after which the Rotary Club cleaned the carpets. Winter hours are now in effect. They remain the same with the exception that the Club is closed on **Sundays** except for scheduled events. Mike met with the new Beach Club Manager and they are working together on

policies and procedures for rentals, etc., with the goal of developing similar policies for the two Clubs. He reported the billiard table was sold. The newly freed-up room will be called the Conference Room, with new furniture, window treatments, flooring and the addition of better sound barriers. Regular maintenance items completed include painting the poolroom doors and ladies' lockers, and the temporary patching of the potholes. The parking lot will be resealed and re-stripped next spring when weather permits.

Committee Reports:

ARC Report: Rich Grimm described the permits that have been granted, new applications, and pending applications. Aven Andersen has agreed to prepare ARC articles for the Voice on an occasional basis. An ARC Appeal meeting will soon be scheduled.

Tennis: Tom Stone provided an update of his and Connie Wilkinson's meeting with the President of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) regarding the option of a long-term lease on the courts near the Beach Club as opposed to resurfacing the courts in South Bay. The LMC might be open to joint usage of North Bay courts. The Racquet Club President has stated five courts are sufficient to accommodate all players and that eight may not be needed. Tennis will be discussed at the next Board meeting.

Old Business:

PLVC updates: Larry Elton reported Tony Durham and Allen Panasuk from South Bay were elected to the PLVC Board for two-year terms. They join Tom McCay and Ralph Stroy from South Bay and five North Bay Board members. He reported the status of the County hearings on Olympic Terrace II and Trendwest as well as the upcoming community meeting and public hearing on Port Ludlow Associates' (PLA's) expansion plans for Ludlow Bay Village and the Marina area.

New Business:

Olympic Terrace by-laws change letter: The Olympic Terrace Homeowners' Association has requested to change their by-laws to reflect a decision by PLA to change the name of Olympic Terrace II to another name.

SBCA and LMC Joint Board Meeting: Tom Stone formed an Ad Hoc committee to draft an agenda for a possible joint meeting with the LMC Board.

The next meeting of the SBCA Board will be **Friday, November 4**, at 9:00 a.m.

Rules We Agreed to Live By

From time to time, as space in the *Voice* permits, the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) Architectural Review Committee (ARC) will provide short articles to remind you of the rules and guidelines designed to protect your housing investment and assure us all of a high-quality living environment.

Three documents provide the details: (1) the South Bay Master Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, Restrictions, Assessments, Charges, Servitudes, Liens, Reservations, and Easements (CC&Rs); (2) the supplemental declarations for each village (supplemental CC&Rs); and (3) the South Bay Design Standards, Revision 4. You should have these documents. If you've lost one or all, you can obtain copies from the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) website, www.plvc.org, under Port Ludlow Community, South Bay Community Association or from the SBCA office at the Bay Club.

One recent issue the ARC considered involves signs, particularly those placed by realtors. With the **November** elections coming, residents should comply with the restrictions on signs. Essentially, you may not post political signs and posters on your property or common area. Paragraph 4.2.12 of the CC&Rs states:

No signs whatsoever which are Visible From Neighboring Property shall be erected or maintained on any Lot or Common Areas except:

- (i) Signs required by legal proceedings . . . ;
- (ii) One "For Sale" or "For Rent" sign not exceeding 18" x 24" in area;
- (iii) One identification sign . . . ;
- (iv) Signs of Declarant or signs authorized by Declarant within South Bay; and
- (v) Signs receiving prior written approval from the Architectural Review Committee

All such signs shall be removed by the Owner promptly upon completion of their intended use.

If you have questions about signs or any other ARC matter, contact your village ARC representative or the SBCA office.

Northwind in November

For this exhibit, Giuliani has used cast-off materials as well as her own homegrown Kombucha Culture to create her intriguing work. This fungus culture grows in membrane form and is a symbiosis of yeast cells and different bacteria. It feeds off a solution of black tea and sugar. As the culture ages, it organically evolves a thicker layer of living skin floating on top of the liquid. Once shaped, the skins are treated with frankincense and myrrh resin to protect and preserve them. After drying and varnishing, Giuliani stitches them together to fabricate her art pieces.

Over the years, reviewers have called her work compelling, noteworthy, questioning of society's values and disturbing. On **Friday, November 11**, at 7:00 p.m., the artist will give a lecture about her work as part of the Coffee Talk Series offered at Northwind. Rules of Golf

There have been many interesting questions from players recently, especially concerning hazards.

One of our key questions lately has been regarding contact with the ground in a bunker—more specifically, may a player touch or brush the sand with his club when making his backswing?

When you read Rule 13-2, you see there would be no penalty for this when not in a hazard, if the action occurs "in making a stroke or the backward movement of the club for a stroke and the stroke is made."

However, 13-4 addresses the situation when the ball is in a hazard—and only allows touching the ground during a stroke, and not the backward movement of the club for a stroke (remember that the definition of a "stroke" does not include the backswing, but only the forward movement of the club with the intention of striking and moving the ball).

Going along with that, a player in a bunker must not touch or move any loose impediments except during the stroke. This is why we must be careful when there are leaves, fir cones, and pine needles—all examples of loose impediments—in our bunkers during the autumn season (again, any contact with impediments or caused movement of impediments during the backswing or practice swings would be penalized). See Rule 13 for more information, and keep the great questions coming!

From the Jefferson County Administrator's Desk

With Thanksgiving just around the corner, I'd like to extend a personal wish to you and your families for a very Happy Thanksgiving. Before we know it, the holidays will be upon us. In the meantime, I'd like to bring you up to date on items from the County's perspective that you might find of interest.

On September 27, 2005, the Hearing Examiner denied motions for reconsideration of the September 2, 2005, decision approving the Trendwest project for a 120-unit multi-family timeshare in Ludlow Cove. Les Powers and Lewis Hale had each submitted a Motion for Reconsideration; however, the Hearing Examiner ruled that some of the arguments pertained to matters that were previously decided. The proposal before the Examiner was a request for a binding site plan approval to develop the project on 14.66 acres situated within the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort.

Moving forward, Trendwest continues to plan on closing escrow with Port Ludlow Associates (PLA), owner of the Ludlow Cove Division II. They anticipate that the project will be under construction next year and completed by 2007.

On October 5, 2005, the Appellate Hearing Examiner affirmed the Hearing Examiner's June 27, 2005 and June 2, 2005, decisions denying the appeal of Les Powers for the Olympic Terrace II project. Olympic Terrace II is a subdivision located within the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort. The recent decision defined Olympic Terrace II as a low-intensity, not high-intensity, land use, with all buffer widths required for low-intensity land use.

Port Ludlow Associates LLC has applied for a pre-application to construct a new 8,000-square foot Golf Clubhouse with dining room, kitchen, pro shop and locker rooms to replace the existing building. In addition, it includes the construction of a new 5,000-square foot golf cart storage building, new parking lot, drainage and utilities, landscaping and retaining walls on approximately two acres. The State Environmental Protection Act (SEPA) application was done in 2002.

A public hearing is set for **Tuesday, December 6, 2005**, 1:00 p.m., in the Jefferson County Courthouse. It will cover the revision of the Port Ludlow Resort Build-out and Marina Expansion project proposed by Port Ludlow Associates LLC. The public comment period ends **Friday, November 4, 2005**, 4:30 p.m. Applications are for a Boundary Line Adjustment, Shoreline Substantial Development Permit, Administrative Code Interpretation and the Major Resort Plan Revision. 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
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


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
