## Port Ludlow's Common Land Can Be Uncommonly Complex

As the sign says, Port Ludlow residents live in “a Village in the Woods by the Bay.” Additional houses are coming, but a lot of the Village’s land will remain unbuilt. Who owns these natural expanses? How much of it is held “in common” by the Port Ludlow community, and how did it get that way? Who administers the land, and what are some benefits and challenges of how that is done?

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Jefferson County, in addition to owning and administering public land on behalf of its taxpayers, indirectly creates privately-owned common land. A minimum set-aside of ten percent open space is required by County ordinance when subdivisions such as Port Ludlow are established. Limited budgets for development or maintenance usually preclude the County from accepting ownership of such set-aside land as parks or natural buffers, so the land must be placed under separate ownership. Port Ludlow’s developer, Olympic Property Group (OPG) has made, and continues to make, many such set-aside and ownership decisions.

OPG and its organizational predecessors created the Beach Club, Kehele Park and the green-belt areas that transferred to north-side resident ownership as common land. OPG created the Bay Club and its trails and gazebo that transferred to south-side resident ownership. OPG filed the plats for the numerous south-side developments, including in them structures, landscaping and tracts that transfer to the individual Homeowner Associations. Finally, OPG owns land that by zoning or by promise will remain open space, such as the Twin Islands and much of a possible trail system. Some of this OPG has offered to transfer to the community if the latter so desires and an appropriate management system is put in place. Why does OPG, or any developer, set aside and then “give” land away?

### Why Have Open Space?

There are many reasons to leave land as open space. A minimum, as noted, is required by law when building subdivisions. Utility lines and drainage areas sometimes require access easements that are better managed apart from residential ownership. Certain terrain is too steep or wet for construction. But the most persuasive reason for open space is that it helps sell land. OPG maximizes green space because research shows that its aesthetic and environmental benefits create value. The privacy of parcels that don’t back up to others, as in Timberton; bands of woodland that obscure homes, as on Swansonville Road; a place to picnic and watch boat traffic, as at Inner Harbor; a gazebo overlook, as above the Bay Club; a park to enjoy with grandchildren, as in North Bay; the Village’s numerous cul-de-sac streets surrounded by woods—all these help sell homes and lots. According to OPG vice-president Jon Rose, when people buy in Port Ludlow it is because they decide that the *community* is worth paying for. The open spaces are one of the things that lend Port Ludlow its character that set it apart. While certainly at some point the investment balance between land set aside and land for sale shifts to the unprofitable, to a great extent common amenities create common value.

Master Associations such as the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) and the South Bay Community Association (SBCA), as well as the south side Homeowner Associations, is a way to move the common land from developer to local control. The residents become the land's stewards and have the rights and obligations of its management—a complicated task, as the pages of CC&Rs (covenants, conditions and restrictions) spell out. John F. Kennedy said, "In a democracy, every citizen, regardless of their interest in politics, holds office; every one of us is in a position of responsibility. The kind of government we get depends on how we fulfill those responsibilities." One of Port Ludlow's challenges is its numerous democracies. Homeowner Associations, Master Associations and the Village Council all can shape the community's land, yet it is time-consuming for a resident to stay informed and active in these structures.

### **Administrative Pros and Cons**

There are benefits to local control over common land. Separate Homeowner Associations make it possible to customize one's own destiny, to decide with one's neighbors whether to upgrade entrance lighting or to spread bark mulch together instead of hiring labor. Their periodic meetings or work parties help connect neighbors socially. Master Associations like the LMC and the SBCA allow unified CC&Rs specifying land use criteria County ordinances do not address. The Associations can collect dues and, within limits, levy special assessments. If the community has a collective vision, it can support certain projects at minimum costs per household—perhaps, for example, the needed maintenance of the totem pole. Port Ludlow has an abundance of gifted residents, and the varied governance structures allow many to use their expertise to make the Village a better place to live.

Local control of common land causes considerable challenges. The small scale of many south-side Homeowner Associations make it easy to run out of willing leaders, and hard to afford capital improvements. Having two Master Associations may dilute community resources and brainpower, and create missed opportunities for lowering maintenance and management costs. Ownership of common land has tax consequences, and usually requires liability insurance for property and for Association officers. There is a price to pay in time and money for quality, and large majorities are needed for large expenditures. Community volunteers come and go and their talents are not always the equal of paid professionals.

### **What Does the Future Hold?**

The community's major management organizations all have open space issues on their plates. The LMC is wrestling with mature questions such as drainage and possible building expansion. A new SBCA board is just beginning full resident responsibility for land, and has been asked to consider managing entrance landscaping for all the south-side Villages. The Village Council is not currently a landowner—but its soon-to-be-elected members must decide if it should seek to become one. OPG owns the Open Space Reserve-zoned land inside the Master Planned Resort (MPR) boundaries, comprised of the Twin Islands, an area within and surrounding the Golf Course's "Trail" nine and some woods south and east of Teal Lake Village on both sides of Paradise Bay Road. OPG might transfer some of this to a community-wide organization like the Village Council, if a well-planned management system had broad endorsement. Would this be desirable? What of alternative ways, such as a land trust or deed restrictions, to maintain the land in a manner the Village supports? Wise and practical decisions are needed in the continued stewardship of Port Ludlow's common land.

### **Vote September 19th**

April 25th brought a huge disappointment to the students, staff and community that support Chimacum Schools. Even though the majority of the voters supported the \$3,487 million dollar levy, the 59.27 percent "yes" vote on the ballot was not enough to earn the 60 percent "supermajority" required for the schools' levy passage. But, did you know the levy failed by just 14 votes!

The School Board has had to chop about \$1 million from its budget. The devastating loss at the polls resulted in the layoff of 8 teachers, increased class sizes, the elimination of Spanish and calculus classes, and the high school choir was axed. Many classified staff were laid off, had their hours cut or were reassigned.

The Chimacum Schools' levy request is not "a new tax" or "extra" money. It essentially replaces the levy approved by voters in 1998. Now the levy will be back on the **Tuesday, September 19th** ballot for its second—and—final chance.

Support our schools. Remember to vote on **September 19th**.

## Village Council August Meeting

### Law and Order Resources are Threadbare

Jefferson County Prosecuting Attorney Julie Dalzell urged a sober Village Council and audience to “please lock your doors” despite low crime rates in the Port Ludlow area, noting the County’s growing methamphetamine scourge. Methamphetamine is an extremely destructive drug that can be brewed cheaply from readily available, legal materials. It sparks violent and delusional behavior, and is becoming more prevalent among the poor here and in other rural areas. The County’s limited resources for law and order took a hit after last year’s passage of initiative 695, and meth use and related crimes are taxing them more severely. Dalzell welcomes citizen volunteers on the County’s Law and Justice Council to advise staff and write grant applications, and recommends that voters assess candidates for Superior Court judge closely and participate in the upcoming election.

Sheriff Pete Piccini continued the theme of strained resources, noting that Jefferson County pays to train many jailers, dispatchers, officers and other enforcement staff, only to lose them to better pay, less stress and more advancement opportunities elsewhere. This County is one of the poorest in the state, and Piccini said some road officers seek an alternative to responding alone to a dangerous situation in a far-flung area with no backup. While proudly saying he would match the talents of his detective team against any in the State, the Sheriff said the 37-bed jail was so overcrowded at 68 occupants that greater success in capturing criminals was almost self-defeating. He agreed with the Prosecuting Attorney that security in the outdated courthouse is “nil.” It lacks metal detectors, holding areas for prisoners, bulletproof barriers or protection for prosecutors’ offices and more space overall. However, he reiterated that crime in the Port Ludlow community is low—and cautioned residents to lock their doors, obey the speed limit and not drive golf carts on public roadways.

### 100 Percent Utility Compliance Praised

On a far more upbeat note, years of hard work paid off for Port Ludlow’s utility staff as they received a coveted “Outstanding Wastewater Treatment Plant” award from state Department of Ecology (DOE) representatives at the Council meeting. The award recognizes the Port Ludlow Wastewater Treatment Plant’s perfect record in 1999, as well as the staff’s years of effort to attain it. It is one of only 38 secondary sewage treatment facilities (out of 305) to receive the DOE’s highest honor this year, based

on water quality, spill prevention, prompt staff response time, monitoring and accuracy of testing and reporting. Larry Smith, Vice President of Olympic Water and Sewer, shared the tribute with Operations Supervisor Bob Thurston and plant workers Greg Rae and Eric Naylor. Port Ludlow’s plant was built in 1968, upgraded in 1987 and operates 365 days a year serving about 1200 customers.

### Important Votes Scheduled for September

Committee reports highlighted several key matters coming up for votes in September. The **Tuesday, September 19th** County election includes: primary balloting for County Commissioner candidates, the proposal for creation of a northside Port Ludlow drainage district, the reauthorization of the Chimacum school levy (which was previously defeated by only 14 votes) and Proposition #1, which would fund a dedicated increase in the Jefferson County sales tax from 7.9% to 8.2% in order to avoid large service cuts in public transportation due to lost Motor Vehicle Excise Tax subsidies. In addition to these important decisions, ballots for the Port Ludlow Village Council elections were to be mailed on Friday, August 25th, and must be returned by **Friday, September 29th**.

### Eat! Buy! Be Careful!

Maureen Poole said that a lot more recipes have been received for the Port Ludlow Kitchens publication, and that a press run of about 500 is anticipated. She reminded the Council of upcoming opportunities to sample cookbook selections. The first tasting is of appetizers, on **Friday, September 29th** at the Bay Club. Tickets are available at both Clubs for \$5 per person. Cookbooks can also be ordered at either Club, or by contacting Maureen at 437-2165. Another community resource now on sale is the updated telephone directory. Directories can be purchased at either the Beach or Bay Clubs, and an errata sheet is included so that errors or changes may be submitted for correction in the next edition.

### Peak Fire Danger

District 3 Fire Chief Wayne Kier warned residents that this is peak fire season, and that our side of the State has no reserve force because of major fires burning in eastern Washington and the western states. He reminded the audience that a burn ban is in place, and asked everyone to watch out for brush fires, especially in clear-cut areas. In other announcements, Howard Morse said disaster response equipment demonstrations and valuable information-sharing would highlight emergency preparation activities at the Village Center on **Saturday, September 16th**.

## New Location for Voting

For more than a decade, Jefferson County Precincts 501 and 502 have voted at the Port Ludlow Fire Station. Now voters in these two precincts will go to the Port Ludlow Community Church located on Oak Bay Road (behind the Village store and west of American Marine Bank) beginning **Tuesday, September 19th** for the Primary Election. Karen Cartmel, of the Jefferson County Election Department, advises the move came about as a result of plans to build a new fire station, so Jefferson County has signed a long-term contract with the church.

We will vote an open ballot with all candidates on one ballot just as we have for 65 years. There will be a separate ballot at the same election that will address the establishment of a Port Ludlow Drainage District for the North Bay.

Voting by absentee ballot has become the choice of many voters, so in effect, the County administers two separate elections—one by mail and one at the polls. There were 555 registered voters in these two precincts that chose to vote absentee in the 1996 Presidential election compared to 602 voters who voted at the polling place. Election officials have always been proud of the high voter turnout and 1996 was no exception. Precinct 501 had an 85% turnout and 502 had 80%, with an average of 83%—considerably higher than the national average. These two precincts combined have a total of 1401 registered voters including 676 permanent absentee voters.

Even the long hours (6:15 a.m. until the polls close at 8:00 p.m.) pass quickly as polling place workers are kept busy keeping records, answering questions and helping individual voters with the process. There is a lot of detail associated with an election and several of the workers have been “on duty” more than ten years.

Some of the unique characters that come to vote provide interest and even entertainment! For years, one elderly gentleman has baked a cake (different mix each time) and proudly presents it to the election workers. He always leaves with good advice, “Now you kids be good!” There is the voter who always wears patriotic clothes (at least all we can see) from her shoes up to the hat on her head! There are several young parents who bring their children and explain the voting process so they will “grow up wanting to vote.” The young children are eager to get their “I Voted” sticker, which is offered to all voters.

Many of those who go to the polls agree that absentee voting may be more convenient, but they also agree that it is “my duty as an American to go to the polls and vote.”

## Port Gamble Tour

The Port Gamble Museum will welcome the community of Port Ludlow to a historical excursion of our sister Village across the Hood Canal Bridge on **Friday, September 22nd**.

The day will begin at 11:00 a.m. with a special guided tour of the Museum and the equally interesting building that houses the exhibits. A no-host lunch will be held at the street level café in the Port Gamble General Store. In the afternoon we shall explore other historic and former public buildings that comprised the Port Gamble community including the Masonic Lodge, Walker Ames House, Post Office and Theatre, and Saint Paul’s Episcopal Church. Many of these buildings are not open for viewing to the general public. A stroll through the cemetery will include forefathers whose familiar names continue to be honored on streets and buildings today.

At the conclusion of the walking tour we shall return to the Port Gamble General Store for ice cream and shopping. Museum Curator Shana Smith will be our guide throughout the day. Shana has in-depth knowledge of the interrelated history of Port Ludlow and Port Gamble and shares an enthusiasm for learning more about the place where we live. 

A fleet of boats has been racing over a special course located in the Port Ludlow Pond, between the Harbormaster and the Inn. Races start about 1:30 p.m. each Wednesday. Typically, the five- to six-boat fleet, soon to be seven or eight, starts after a one-minute countdown. Race rules are the same, with minor modifications, as those used by the Americas' Cup boats and all other sail races.

As the skills of the skippers have improved, the racing has become very competitive. Owners spend considerable time tuning and upgrading their boats to eke out a slight advantage. On the racecourse, the boats are very responsive with surprising speeds. Catching a lift just right or sailing too long in a header can make or break the finish position. Considerable yells of "starboard," "overlap" and "room at the mark" can be heard echoing off the Inn. It's a good thing the boats are strongly built, because there are occasional collisions!

One competitor, who has many trophies in big boat races, was heard to say: "They act just like the big boats—only faster—they are amazing. It all happens so quickly." Races are exciting since the boats are so well matched in speed. A lead may change many times in one race, and it is commonplace to have several boats overlapped at the finish line. Yes, we need volunteers to be race committee.

Check us out on Wednesday afternoons at the Port Ludlow Pond. We are already the largest one design fleet of sailboats in Port Ludlow and growing. When the racing is over, we dock them on the workbench and grab a cool one. What is the down side? A few have tried putting

The Jefferson County Red Cross Emergency Assistance Program will provide food. There are plans to film the event—directed by Patrick Young, Public Information Specialist, Port Townsend Fire Department—for presentation on Port Townsend Public Television. Interviews with the participating organizations will take place before the event.

### Schedule of Events

#### 10:00 a.m. Paramedic Unit—Port Ludlow Fire Dept.

A paramedic mobile unit is presented for patient care equipment and support. Rapid and effective transportation of the victim with immediate application of support for the cardio-respiratory system is required.

#### 10:30 a.m. Lifepak 16—Port Ludlow Fire Dept.

Diagnostic and treatment uses of the ECG and defibrillator unit will be demonstrated. Relationship to the Emergency Room and capability of immediate patient treatment is critical and the reduction of the time between the diagnosis and treatment time is required for a good recovery for the victim.

#### 11:00 a.m. Wrecked Car Extraction—Port Ludlow Fire Dept.

Extraction of victims from wreckage of a vehicle must be safe and quick. Procedures will be demonstrated for the safe extraction of a victim.

#### 11:30 a.m. Personnel Equipment Demonstration—Chimacum, Port Ludlow, and Port Townsend Fire Depts.

The effective use of protection gear is essential to the firefighter. Correct and rapid deployment is a must. Competitions between firefighter personnel will emphasize this.



#### 12:00 noon Fire Extinguisher Exercise—Port Ludlow Fire Dept.

Recognition of the hazards and the approach to the fire is a part of safety for operation of a fire extinguisher. Proper procedures for fire control will be demonstrated. The public is invited to participate in this training exercise.

#### 12:30 p.m. Mass Casualty Care and CERT Demonstration—Chimacum Fire Dept.

Mass casualty care could be a reality in Jefferson County. Equipment and setup of an area for this use is demonstrated. CERT members will demonstrate victim lift, carry drags, bandaging, and extractions.

#### 1:00 p.m. Muster by the Firefighters—Port Townsend Fire Dept.

Competition between the firefighters is always great to watch. Port Ludlow, Chimacum and Port Townsend Fire Departments will participate in a bucket brigade. Root for your heroes.

#### 1:30 p.m. Fire Engine Equipment—Port Townsend Fire Dept.

Demonstration of a fire engine and what it can do. Personnel and equipment performing a job well done is a joy to watch.

#### 2:00 p.m. Fire Extinguisher Exercise (Repeat)

This is the last demonstration of the day for those who were not able to participate in the first exercise. Recognition of the hazards and the approach to the fire is a part of operational safety of a fire extinguisher. Proper procedures for fire control will be demonstrated. The public is invited to participate in this training exercise.

## The Village Council's First Year

I wish to thank all of our members who have worked so hard to make the first year of your Port Ludlow Village Council so successful.

### The Accomplishments

The accomplishments of the Village Council's first year of operation can be placed into the following categories: (1) Increased visibility for Port Ludlow in the Jefferson County political arena, (2) Improved human relations within the community, (3) Improved ability of owners to communicate their needs to the developer, (4) Provided a forum for informational exchange, and, (5) developed changes to the founding documents to move the Council forward into the future.

### Some Specifics

The Council's Board did the following:

- Reviewed and commented on the Development Agreement eventually signed as a contract between Olympic Property Group (OPG) and the County.
- Requested that the County have the Chief Counsel from the Zoning Ordinance mediation process also review the Development Agreement, which the County acted upon.
- Reviewed and commented on the Developer's proposed submittal plans for expansion of the Marina.
- Requested that OPG withdraw their application to the County for the building of the Admiralty III condo units on the open area south of the Conference Center, which OPG has done.
- Requested that OPG file with the County a "Master Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions," sometimes referred to as "Development Standards and Design Guidelines," on all of their property remaining to be developed, which OPG has done.
- Requested that OPG start the development of a trail system from the commercial area to the falls including an interpretive portion, with which OPG is proceeding.
- Requested that OPG produce a time line schedule for their future developments, which OPG did and mailed to the property owners (Progress Report on

the Developer/Community partnership for Port Ludlow).

- Contacted Peter Pope, Chairman of the Board of Pope Resources, upon Gary Tucker's retirement to gain assurance that drastic changes would not occur in the community's partnership with the Developer and received that assurance from him.
- Established a working relationship with Pope Resources Director, Doug Norberg, Acting CEO of Olympic Resource Management.
- Requested a committee investigation of the need for changes to the community 20-Year Plan.
- Represented Port Ludlow by attending all County Commissioner meetings.
- Sponsored Port Ludlow's very successful Disaster Response and Emergency Preparedness program.
- Conducted the Farmers Market.
- Established a Village Council website.
- Is presently sponsoring the development of a Port Ludlow cookbook through the "Let's Stir up Some Fun!" program.
- Prepared the updated Port Ludlow Resident's Directory.
- Prepared revisions to the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and filed the approved versions with the State of Washington.

In addition, there have been numerous speakers on subjects of interest to the community. Our residents have had many questions of concern which have been answered by these speakers. ment, Representatives from Washington Department of Transportation on Hood Canal Bridge, Representatives from Washington Department of Ecology with Waste Water Treatment Award, Superintendent of Chimacum Schools, Member of Economic Development Council of Jefferson County, Representatives from Skookum and Murrey's Waste Disposal, Port Gamble Historical Museum Curator, Puget Sound Energy District Operations Officer.

## Election of Directors for the Village Council Board

Ballots for the election of Village Council Directors were mailed on August 25th to the owners of all property within the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort.

If you believe the Council is performing important activities advantageous to the future of Port Ludlow, it is extremely important that you provide your support to the Council by casting your vote. Please see the accompanying article in this issue of the *Voice*, titled *The Village Council's First Year*, for a summary of accomplishments and services performed for the community in 1999-2000.

Each owner of property who votes for the first time becomes a new permanent Voting Member of the Port Ludlow Village Council. There are presently 622 permanent Voting Members, but regardless of whether you are already a Voting Member or not, we urge you to take a few moments to cast your vote.

There are no fees or dues involved. And, there can be none imposed without the concurrence of two-thirds of the Voting Membership. The Council is operating on a very firm financial basis and there is no foreseeable reason to require such a vote.

Note that when property owners become permanent Voting Members they remain so until such time as they divest themselves of all real property within the Master Planned Resort, although they may also resign by providing written notice of their desire to do so to the Council's Board of Directors.

Each property owner (regardless of the number of properties owned) is allowed one vote for each of the ten Director positions being voted upon this year. There are two 2-year positions and two 1-year positions from the South Bay area and three 2-year positions and three 1-year positions from the North Bay area to be filled. Cumulative voting, i.e. casting more than one vote for any candidate is not allowed.

Elections in subsequent years will be for five positions (2 South and 3 North) for 2-year terms, so that there will always be assurance of having five previous Directors on the Board for the purpose of providing continuity.

Ballots must be returned by **Friday, September 29th** for counting before the formal election at the Annual Meeting to be held at the Bay Club at 9:00 a.m. on **Thursday, October 5th**.

Ballots can also be cast in person at the Annual Meeting, although the preferred method of voting, for the sake of expediency, is to mail in your ballot/proxy. When you do so, the Board's Secretary will cast your vote as you specify on your ballot, with or without your presence at the Annual Meeting.

## LOA Meeting Summary

### **Supports Drainage District**

The August meeting of the Lot Owners Association (LOA) was held on the evening of August 11th. The Board approved support of the formation of the North Bay Drainage District. It was suggested that a table be set up at the Village Post Office prior to the election to remind voters to vote. A telephone and e-mail campaign to support the election was also proposed.

Larry Nobles, LMC Operations Committee Chairman, reported that of the 984 questionnaires sent out by the LMC to North Bay lot owners, as of August 10th, 472 had been returned, with over 50 per cent being homeowners. Of that percentage, over half had submitted written commentary. The survey is the first step in establishing a plan for the Beach Club. The next steps will be to evaluate what the community wants, develop a program of requirements, estimate costs, develop financing and seek the approval of the membership.

Michael Cahn, LOA President, advised that a committee be being formed to develop activities for children in North Bay.

Stan Kadesh gave a presentation on the benefits to Jefferson County Transit if Proposition 1 were passed. The Transit District currently receives three-tenths of 1 per cent of the County sales taxes collected. Proposition 1 would increase this amount to six-tenths of 1 per cent of the sales tax to make up for the loss of funds created by passage of I-695.

The Board voted to go back to morning meetings except when we have a speaker or important event to present. The next meeting will be on the second Thursday of the month, **Thursday, September 14th** at 9:00 a.m.

# Preliminary Summary of LMC Membership Survey

by Larry Nobles, Chair, Operations Committee

The LMC Operations Committee mailed out 984 survey forms to Port Ludlow property owners in July. As of August 18th, 493 (50.1%) had been returned. Of these, 255 respondents took time to make written comments in addition to answering the specific questions posed. The comments ranged from one-liners to two or three pages in length.

## Distribution of Replies

Port Ludlow has 1,069 property owners, some of whom own more than one property. The absentee homeowners, who reside in Port Ludlow less than 6 months out of each year, were the most demanding in their comments and desires to upgrade the Beach Club.

## Analysis of Responses

The Operations Committee continues with the complex analysis and scoring of the preferential matrix from the last page of the survey. As you can see from the above numbers, there are many “no opinion” responses and very few definitive responses. The LMC Board will continue to be updated as the Committee completes its work.

## Regan to Head Architectural Control Committee

Dick Regan was approved by the LMC Board, at its August 19th meeting to chair the Architectural Control Committee (ACC) upon the resignation of former chair, Carl Jespersen. Regan has lived in Port Ludlow for almost 3 years and has served one-and-a-half years on the ACC.

In anticipation of his confirmation by the Board, Regan already has instituted some changes in Committee operations. It will hold two meetings a month on the second and fourth Wednesdays. The review process for submissions will be multi-step: 1) A notice of intent will be posted on the property, 2) There will be a comment period of 14 days for neighbors’ comments and 3) a letter will be sent to property owners in the immediate vicinity asking for comment. This whole process should take 30 days.

Currently, mandatory inspections by the ACC occur before the concrete is poured and before the roof goes on. Regan indicated the Committee will be studying a possible square footage minimum; a better definition of “compatibility,” as currently stated in the covenants and restrictions; and the possibility that all homes should have a paved driveway—his personal opinion.

Other ACC members confirmed by the Board are Terry O’Brien, Grant Smith, Warren Petersen, and Mike Fessler. Regan said he would like one more volunteer.

The SBCA Board met on Friday, August 25th at the Bay Club to hear an update from the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) including its charter, revision status of design standards and any major anticipated problems.

## Happenings within OPG

There's a lot of activity occurring within OPG. We thought it would be helpful to share the status of our various projects from time to time:

### Port Ludlow Development Guidelines

During the Planning Forum, OPG committed to record covenants against our undeveloped properties. Last week the recording of the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs) took place. This document includes the Development Guidelines that spell out parameters to guide future projects. They were developed with the input of the PLVC Development Standards Committee and go beyond the zoning regulations administered by Jefferson County. They run with the land and are enforceable no matter who owns or develops the property. If you have questions or would like to review the CC&Rs and Development Guidelines, feel free to stop by our office at 781 Walker Way.

### Timberton Village Division 3

Ground broke last month on the next 19 lots in Timberton Village. Preliminary clearing is complete and the earth moving equipment is in full swing. Included in the construction was expansion of the existing detention pond. Progress has been good although an early burn ban may require that we postpone burning cleared vegetation until the wet season. A reminder to all Port Ludlow residents—we are currently accepting name suggestions for the new roads in the Timberton development. For questions regarding this contest, please call 437-2101.

### Marina Expansion

Applications for the 100-slip expansion were submitted to Jefferson County, Washington State, and the federal agencies last month. Processing is expected to take a minimum of one year as the agencies grapple with the huge backlog of projects. The backlog is due to the change in rules resulting from the listing of several salmon species under the Endangered Species Act.

### Olympic Terrace

Olympic Terrace is the new name for the future residential subdivision that will be developed east of Teal Lake Road and south of Fairway and Fairwood Villages. We are currently conducting wetland, geo-technical, and other studies in preparation for making applications for permits. Submission for permits is targeted for the fall or winter of this year.

### Timberton Loop Hiking Trail

The loop hiking trail recently underwent brush cutting and a general "spruce up." It's a great trail and nice way to get some exercise. Check it out!

### Village Center Expansion

We are working preliminary expansion concepts with our land planners on the potential expansion of the Village Center. Included in the planning will be space set aside for the Ludlow Creek Interpretive Trail, and expanded retail and commercial space. As agreed during the Planning Forum, we will designate space for a potential assisted living facility. Whether or not such a facility can thrive in Port Ludlow will be determined later through discussions with possible operators. We hope to share preliminary concepts with the community in the fall.



## Microchip Clinic



Encoded in the chip is a unique identifying number that can be read by almost all shelters and clinics nationwide, allowing lost pets and their human families to be reunited.

## Keyboard Wizard Michael Kaeshammer is Back!

To Port Ludlow audiences the return of Michael Kaeshammer and his Trio to the Bay Club on **Saturday, September 30th** will be like the return of a prodigal son. According to Bev Rothenborg, Arts Council Vice President and long-time Program Chair, it all began in late 1995 or early 1996 when a German friend of Michael's, Hans Boeckmann of Port Townsend, dropped by the Bay Club with a poster announcing a performance by Michael at the Old Alcohol Plant. A group, including Bob and Janet Force, Jim and Diane Watson, and Mason and Bev Rothenborg, went to hear him. "They had an old, not-very-good-piano there, but the kids were fabulous," said Bev. "Michael was about 18 at the time. We all agreed

he should perform at the Bay Club and subsequently he performed here in September of 1996," she continued.

When he was booked into a Port Townsend venue one week before the Port Ludlow concert, the Arts Council worried that it would cut into our audience size. "I think the opposite happened," continued Bev. "George and Dobie Dyer came because their kids told them they had to hear Michael K. The audience just loved the trio; the following month, Bob and Ann Radwick went to Victoria to hear him at the George & Dragon Pub.

Michael came back to Port Ludlow over Labor Day weekend of 1998 for a sold-out performance. "We thought it would be a difficult time to get an audience, but he drew them in," said Bev. "I remember Lynn Thomas sat up by the piano in rapt attention."

Michael Kaeshammer is one of Canada's most exciting young stars. The pianist-bandleader is building an international following with a series of crowd-pleasing performances in Canada, Europe and the U.S. He has also released a pair of critically-acclaimed CDs, co-written and starred in a play celebrating the history of boogie-woogie, and been featured on Canadian radio and television.

As a boy, Michael studied classical piano in Offenburg, Germany. After seven years of classical training, the 14-year-old piano prodigy discovered the boogie-woogie styling of the form's masters. Three years later, he was playing boogie-woogie in clubs, concerts and festivals all over Germany.

When Michael's family moved to Canada, the still-teenaged pianist formed a trio. The rest is history. He receives national airplay on CBC Radio as well as their chosen tracks for Air Canada in-flight listening programs. He is also a favorite on Tacoma's public radio station, KPLU, and on Vancouver radio station CKST. Now age 23, Michael's musicianship continues to grow. Utilizing a dizzying variety of formats on a repertoire ranging from Duke Ellington and Benny Goodman to Horace Silver, he thoughtfully reshapes traditional jazz, blues, bebop, boo-

gie woogie, and even Nashville legend Hank Williams' *Move It On Over*. He is a busy young man with a bright future.

### Myrdelle Teaford's Garden Tips for September

Feed migrating birds by selecting trees for fruit: dogwood, amelanchier, mountain ash. Even a small garden can have some natural areas for bird refuge and shelter. Remove grass and weeds growing under young fruit trees. They steal water and soil nutrients. Harvest apples and pears as they ripen. Install new lawns from seed or sod. Renovate old lawns, thatching and overseeding. Trim summer heathers after flowering. Plant or divide peonies and other spring and early summer perennials. Cover tomatoes and peppers with cloches to conserve heat. Plant mums, flowering kales, pansies and dusty miller. Groom roses. Remember that when you cut roses from the fall flush of bloom, you're pruning. Cut stems just above a five-leaflet side branch (instead of a three-leaflet branch), and cut with an eye to the plant's shape. Also let a few roses go to hips late in the month; hips are beautiful and some kinds make good bird food later in the fall.

## Is Your Living Will Up-to-Date?

Since the Health Forum, I have received several requests for information or referral, and recently some queries about Living Wills. After consulting several different sources to obtain the latest information, it is probable that your Living Will is out-of-date if it is five or more years old, written outside the State of Washington or prepared several years ago on an office supply form.

With all the recent health care changes, one should consider redoing Living Wills at least every five years. (Cloning is even considered now.) If your Living Will is fairly recent but was prepared outside Washington, read through it to see if it applies only within that state, has expiration dates, etc. Also, check the validity of your Power of Attorney.

An attorney may advise you on the validity of your Living Will. If you wish to obtain forms in the interim, they may be obtained free of charge at the Jefferson General Hospital (ER or Registrar's Desks) or at the Olympic Area Agency on Aging in Port Hadlock, 379-5064, if you are at least 60 years of age. Some office supply store forms may not contain current verbiage as the stores often eliminate stock before reordering. Sometimes these Living Wills are called an Advanced Directive for Health Care, Living Will or Physician's Directive and Supplement.

## Dining Out

Last month we revisited an old favorite the San Carlos Restaurant 279 Madison Avenue on Bainbridge Island, phone 206 842-1999. The San Carlos is open on Friday for lunch from 11:30 a.m. and open every night from 5:00 p.m. for dinner. The menu is Southwestern and they do feature a full bar service.

This restaurant has been in business since 1984. The owner, Lee Jorgenson was the former manager of the Rainier Club in Seattle. When he moved to Bainbridge he determined that there was a need for a Southwestern restaurant and he created the San Carlos. Lee was raised in Texas so he has an intimate relationship with southwestern cuisine. One of the reasons we enjoy this fine restaurant is that Lee has made the food preparation healthy by eliminating the use of lard in the beans and by including many vegetarian dishes. The Chef uses Canola Oil and Olive oil in preparing the many specialty items. Black beans are specified but you can order refried beans where chicken stock is used rather than lard.

For our dining experience we had a house specialty, Drunken Prawns. This dish is prepared as an appetizer or an entrée. It consists of six large prawns lightly sautéed with a green-chili poupon mustard base and then flambéed with lime and gold tequila. Onions and peppers are also sautéed with the prawns. The dish is accompanied with black beans and rice and seasonal vegetables. (You can substitute a small salad for the beans and rice.)

Another signature dish that you may enjoy is the San Carlos. This combination consists of a steak burrito with a smoked chicken enchilada and a pork-loin and green chili enchilada. The San Carlos is served with black beans and rice or a small salad. They also have Mesquite smoked salmon enchiladas with a green chili sauce for you salmon lovers. A number of the entrees have won awards these include: Prawns Santa Fe a 1993 award winner that consists of sautéed prawns in a red chili sauce; an herbed crab chimichanga served with a creamy salsa sauce. A 1992 award winner; and in 1998 and 1999 they won the Peoples Choice best chili award.

As a specialty drink you might try their Papaya-Mango margarita. I am sorry to report that I did not have room for dessert. For you old-timers the San Carlos is better than ever, for you newcomers try it you'll like it. We suggest an early dinner on weekends as they do get very crowded.

## The D & D Club is Born

The Explorer's Club has changed its name to the Dine and Discover Club (D & D Club for short), because the previous name was misleading. # Marina News

## Remembering Augustus . . .

Augustus C. Ludlow would be 208 years old this year and the Marina staff decided he deserved a party. Young Lt. Ludlow never set foot in his namesake community, though as a young man he joined the fledgling navy of the new republic. Born in 1792, just 16 years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, he was part of the new country's first generation of natural born citizens. The difficulties with the British had not yet been resolved and Ludlow came of age in time for the War of 1812.

A new lieutenant, Ludlow was the second in charge of the *USS Chesapeake*, a 36-gun frigate. His senior officer, Captain James Lawrence, commanded a crew of mostly green young recruits when on June 1st, 1813 they engaged in battle with one of His Majesty's ablest frigates, the *HMS Shannon*. Out-gunned and out-maneuvered by the *Shannon's* better trained crew, the *Chesapeake* soon lost its masts and rigging, rendering it unable to avoid destruction. By the end of the skirmish Captain Lawrence, Lieutenant Ludlow and most of the crew were dead or mortally wounded. Augustus C. Ludlow was 21 years old when he gave his life for his country.

Skip ahead to the years 1839 to 1841 and another Navy Lieutenant, Charles Wilkes was on assignment for the United States Government. He circumnavigated the globe visiting 300 islands in the Pacific, as well as parts of Antarctica and the Pacific Northwest. He was on a scientific venture for which Congress had appropriated the sum of \$300,000 in the interest of furthering scientific knowledge. As he surveyed the Puget Sound he named many of the features of the region after friends and fallen war heroes. Wilkes gave names to Elliot Bay, Sinclair Inlet, Agate Pass, Bainbridge Island, Port Gamble, and of course, Port Ludlow.

Two hundred and eight years later the Marina staff organized the "Augustus C. Ludlow Birthday Bash," a perfect event for an August evening. One hundred and thirty boaters and community members visited the Marina on August 12th to enjoy a barbecue served up by the Marina staff, share in a birthday cake honoring old Augustus and listen to the classic rock sounds of the Seattle-based

band, "The Tropics." The August weather was about as good as it gets in Port Ludlow, although it did get cooler as the evening progressed, prompting the staff to build a bonfire in the fire pit. Well fed and warm the birthday guests danced or just swayed to "The Tropics" mixture of favorite rock and country tunes, spiced with a liberal dose of the Jimmy Buffet sound.

Listening to live music at the Marina is a great way to pass a Ludlow summer evening but it was made even better because we could recognize the life and sacrifice of our community's namesake, Augustus C. Ludlow.

On **Saturday, September 2nd**, to mark the Labor Day Weekend, the Poulsbo band "Never Been to Utah" will return for its fourth Labor Day gig at the Marina. A popular group, the band will play for the traditional close of the season event from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. on Saturday evening. The music is free and the community and the Marina's guest boaters are more than welcome to attend.

Thanks to Museum Assistant Ronnie Kelley, no relation to Marina Manager Dean Kelley (so far as we know) for the historical information. Ronnie works at the Port Gamble Historic Museum.

## FSBO Boat Show & Flea Market

Another Marina event coming upon us in September is the fall "For Sale by Owner" Boat Show and Flea Market on **Saturday and Sunday, September 16th and 17th** from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. both days. Typically between 25 and 35 boats of all sizes are in the Marina for this event. It is a time for the individual boat seller to meet face to face with possible buyers for his/her sailboat, powerboat, dinghy, canoe or kayak.

Hopefully the Auxiliary won't have another emergency for at least ten years, but if they do they know they can respond. Spokesman Reseck says, "It's a good feeling to realize you could be instrumental in saving someone's life." 
Approximately every six months the Port Ludlow Paddlers have a meeting. We wouldn't meet so often except we start to run out of trips to take and have to plan more. Not having any officers (or dues), the meeting is generally chaired by the group's founder. At the last meeting, there were over thirty of the 100-plus members present to make suggestions for journeys.

Our excursions offer something for every type of skill level among our paddlers. Just to give an idea of our wide variety, here are some of the ones that came out of our meeting: One-week trips to Salt Spring Island in the Canadian Gulf Islands, Costa Rica, New Zealand, Florida Everglades, Baja California, the East Coast of Maine, Lake Powell in Utah, the Columbia Delta and Alaska. Shorter, one- to three-day trips include: Skagit Delta, Chumuck Estuary, Dungeness Spit, Fowl Weather Bluff area, Mystery Bay, the Port Angeles area, Lake Crescent and Lake Ozette.

In order to keep in shape for all those great excursions the Port Ludlow Paddlers also have weekly paddles out of the Port Ludlow Marina. On Sundays at 2:00 p.m. and Tuesdays at 10:00 a.m. the group paddles from the kayak dock in Port Ludlow to wherever the weather permits. The Port Ludlow Bay paddles are generally less than five miles and are a good place for new kayakers to gain experience without getting beyond their comfort zone.

There are four levels of kayakers based on experience levels: Tenderfoot, Pilgrim, Cowboy and Bronco Buster. The group also has four levels of paddles based on distance, area and weather/sea conditions.

If you are on the outside looking in and would like to join those with wet paddles, ask any of the kayakers how to get involved. It's easy. The only hard part is buying the kayak and gear. The Club doesn't make loans, but we do give lots of advice. Some of it is even good.

Port Ludlow is still closed to shellfish harvest as of the latest report August 16th from the Washington State Health Laboratory with 82 micrograms per 100 grams of tissue. Washington State standard for PSP is under 80 micrograms per 100 grams.




