

A Festival Welcome to the Freddy Pink Band

Undaunted by the nation-wide success of its original headliner and *Voice* featured attraction in July, the Festival Association Board signed a spectacular group, The Freddy Pink Band, to step in and entertain Festival-goers on Saturday night, July 30.

The eight-piece Freddy Pink Band has been described as having “a fire breathing horn section,” an “intense rhythm section,” “superlative vocal” and “dynamic visual experience.” With its bright, staccato brass section, this nine-piece band is reminiscent of “Chicago” and “Earth, Wind and Fire.” Influenced by great legends of rock and roll and rhythm and blues, the guys who make up the Freddy Pink Band freely admit they have not reinvented the wheel.

One newspaper writer wrote, “Freddy Pink’s music is edgy, passionate and full of fire, yet it slides on comfortably like your favorite pair of blue jeans.” These guys have worked with music giants like Ray Charles, Natalie Cole, Sly and the Family Stone and Tina Turner.

Though the Freddy Pink members are from the Seattle area, its leader Gordy Yancey is from Cape George near Port Townsend, the band made its leap from “Seattle band” to semi-national status in 2005 playing Sun Valley Lodge in Idaho, Big Sky Lodge in Montana and “Blues on the Prairie” in Calgary, Alberta.

Okinawan Kenjin-Kai Taiko

A one-of-a-kind performance by taiko drummers from the Okinawa Kenjin Club of Washington State will perform at Festival By The Bay on Saturday, July 30. They’re slated for Center Stage at 5:00 and again at 7:00 p.m. just before the main event!

During the energetic performance, dancers play the small one-sided paranku, medium two-sided shime-daiko or the large barrel-shaped o-daiko. The banjo-like sanshin provides the other major instrumental sound in traditional songs. It is often used in contemporary pieces as well.

Okinawan-style taiko features drums carried by the dancers and is accompanied by other music and singing. Other common elements of these dances are the movements and cheers reminiscent of karate. The cheer “Eisa” has become synonymous with Okinawan Taiko as drumming sends the

Eisa spirit and spreads a message of peace, harmony and friendship.

The Taiko Club was established in March 2007. Its purpose is to preserve Okinawan music and dance and to promote friendships by building cultural bridges with the community at large. Since its formation, the group has grown to over 50 members of all ages and everyone is welcome to join. Performers participate in various events throughout the region, such as club functions, school assemblies, fairs as well as pre-game shows for the Seattle Mariners.

Okinawa, the southernmost prefecture of Japan, has a distinct culture of its own. Okinawan Taiko, one of its strongest and most famous traditions, evolved from the annual Obon festival honoring ancestors.

Kayaks on the Bay: Port Ludlow Paddling Club

Kayaks, not to be confused with canoes, are popular in Port Ludlow. These light maneuverable craft were first made and used by the Ainu, Aleut and Eskimo hunters of the sub-arctic regions. Native people used the boats to hunt in the inland lakes rivers and coastal waters of the Arctic Ocean, North Atlantic, Bering Sea and North Pacific Regions beginning almost 4,000 years ago.

Today they provide a route to exploring our aquatic environment close up, and to having an enjoyable recreational experience. You can rent a kayak or you can own one. Some enthusiasts, like me, have even built them. In fact, native kayaks were personal craft, each built by the men who owned them. With the help of skilled craftsmen at the Wooden Boat School personally built kayaks can be a work of art.

Kayakers in Port Ludlow have formed an association, the Port Ludlow Paddling Club, devoted to the enjoyment of kayaking. John Reseck started the Club in 1995 with help from his wife, Sharon. In those days, many paddled twice a week out of Port Ludlow. In 2009 Doris Monti volunteered to lead our Club and I joined her as Co-Chair, in 2010.

Around 1997 kayak racks were built on the dock at the Port Ludlow Marina for storage of craft. Soon, there were not enough cradles for all the kayakers that wanted to keep their kayaks on the dock. The result was an active waiting list. The kayak rack is an interesting and colorful addition to the marine landscape of Port Ludlow, even if there is not enough room for everyone to store his/her kayak there.

By 1999, quite a few members were planning and having successful five-day trips. Some of the out-of-area trips in past years included: Loreto, Baja California (seven trips); Lake Powell, UT (kayaks on houseboats; two trips); Broken Islands, BC (1999, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009); Quadra Islands, BC (two trips); Tofino, BC, Salt Spring Island, BC and Belize (two times). Many outings take place in the local area with a traditional 1:00 p.m. paddle from the Port Ludlow Marina most Sundays during the summer.

The schedule for 2011 is a work in progress. Some overnight paddles are being planned in the Hood Canal/Puget Sound area for later in the year. There is a one-night trip

planned to Lake Crescent in Olympic National Park this September.

The Port Ludlow Paddling Club is an informal group of folks who enjoy paddling and are looking for paddling partners and camaraderie. There are no dues or fixed meetings, but they try to have an annual planning meeting over the Winter or early Spring. Most of us have our own kayaks but a good deal of borrowing and swapping goes on as well. As with most groups, people come and go as the years go on.

The Club asks that “members” have initial paddle craft safety training and use personal floatation device (PFD) life vests and appropriate paddle clothing, as well as the minimum vessel safety equipment. Also, they should plan on paddling with a partner or group to ensure safety. There is a leader with each planned paddle. Each year we conduct a “rescue/recovery clinic” to practice needed skills in case of an on-the-water upset or emergency.

The current mailing list for members is around 70 households. Ludlow paddlers often go on outings with neighboring clubs: Olympic Peninsula Paddlers in Port Angeles, Rain Shadow Kayakers in Sequim, Peninsula Wilderness Club of Kitsap Peninsula, and Olympic Kayak Club in Port Gamble. The Port Ludlow paddlers welcome new members.

Scotch Broom—the Beautiful Plague

Some time ago when my spouse and I were checking out this area as our possible retirement destination, we admired those colorful yellow flowering bushes blooming at the same time as the rhododendrons. We soon found they are classified as Class B Noxious Weeds in these

parts. Scotch broom spreads about one mile each year, crowding out native plants and newly planted trees, a bane to reforestation efforts. By displacing native vegetation, it reduces wildlife food and habitat. It’s also a potential fire hazard and can trigger allergic reactions in some people.

Pulling out these invasive noxious weeds is effective, as is cutting and treating with herbicides within 5-20 minutes—but its seeds remain viable in the ground for up to 60 years, making our efforts seem limited. Enter *Bruchidius villosus*, a tiny beetle barely the size of a pinhead, being used in the war against Scotch broom. These bugs attack Scotch broom, without damaging native plants, by feeding on the pollen of those yellow blossoms and sending the plants into shock. Soon their larvae hatch inside the seed pods and devour the seeds, preventing the plant from reproducing.

A typical Scotch broom site requires 100 to 250 adult beetles to begin a colony, with four to five years needed for an increase in population sufficient for plant control. Establishment rate is higher in interior valleys than at cooler sites near the coast and in the lower Cascade Mountains. Hand-pulling, cutting, herbicides and these beetles are important tools in our efforts to control the invasive Scotch broom. Evelyn Fett says that she and her husband Darrell love TJ’s Dutch Smoked Cheese (gouda). Dee McConnell keeps TJ’s Mushroom Turnovers in her freezer for unexpected guests.

Deanna Richards said, “Their selection of inexpensive wines is quite good, e.g., Tres Pinos, Three Pines Covee from San Luis Obispo County, CA and Panilonco, a Merlot Malbec from Chile.” Deanna keeps TJ’s Savory Thin Mini-crackers, Basil Cubes and the Haricot Vert Green Beans (both frozen) as staples in her home.

Barbara Berthiaume especially likes the selection of organic produce. Many residents mentioned the specialty salad greens, including baby arugula and micro-salad greens. Janet Force said that her daughter loves the organic root vegetables. Port Ludlow residents recommended the following additional products:

Bluebills Distribute School Supplies

The challenges facing students, parents and teachers in our community as school starts has never been greater due to drastic education budget cuts. According to World Vision, 13 million families live below the poverty level and the Peninsula certainly reflects this statistic. In the past, teachers have spent anywhere from \$500 to \$1,000 out of their own pockets to provide supplies for students who cannot afford them and many local retired teachers think this figure is too conservative. With staff and salary reductions, preparing for this academic year will be even more daunting.

World Vision distributes school supplies for teachers in schools that meet the requirement of 70 percent of the students being eligible for reduced price or free lunch programs. The Boeing Bluebills have partnered with World Vision in delivering school supplies three times during the school year. They recently loaded three pallets of school supplies from the World Vision warehouse in

Fife, unloaded it to a member's garage, and reloaded the supplies to go to six schools in Kitsap and Clallam Counties before the start of the new school year.

Three pallets equal an inventory of about one ton of supplies and included 10,000 pencils, 8,000 crayon boxes, 1,000 folders, boxes of scotch tape, markers, books, calculators, magnets and numerous other items. It took three trips to Fife to gather all of the supplies and about 70 hours of volunteer time to accomplish the task. Bluebill volunteers drove over 900 miles from Kitsap County to the Pacific Ocean and north coast of Clallam County to deliver these supplies to schools in need.

In talking with a principal of one of the schools, Dick Ostlund, Bluebill co-coordinator for the school supplies program, was very surprised to learn that there were more than 30 homeless students in their program. Other school personnel on the Peninsula have corroborated similar figures. It appears that homeless students are a growing presence in our community.

The need is great, the resources are scarce, and each of us can make a difference by stepping forward and giving a few hours of volunteer time. From the Desk of the Commissioner

Almost anywhere in our County, or on Highway 3 to Bremerton, we notice a vast crop of green and gold foliage. At first glance this plant is attractive, but it is one of our most pervasive noxious weeds. Originally imported to the U.S. as an ornamental and to stabilize soil, it took root and has crowded out native species. Recently I spoke with a British constituent who told me that our beloved Salal has become a weed in Scotland. One country's crop is another country's weed.

By the time this article is published, a number of Port Ludlow residents will have volunteered time on July 26 battling the Scotch Broom. They deserve our thanks, for the weed sinks deep roots and to pull out an established plant requires a special tool and strong muscles.

Recently the County Weed Board identified Wild Chervil (*Anthriscus sylvestris*) as an aggressive roadside weed. The Weed Board and the County Department of Public Works have teamed up to selectively spray outbreaks of

this weed where it has threatened to dominate County roadsides. Several areas west of Eaglemount Road have been targeted for treatment. Adjacent property owners will be notified before any application is made.

The County Noxious Weed Control Board consists of four volunteers: Richard Hild, John Richmond, Patricia Robinson and Jill Silver. Eve Dixon has served as supervising staff for a number of years and has an office at Washington State University (WSU) extension. Belfair State Park and the Discover Pass

It was a sunny day in early July when a granddaughter said, “Let’s pack a picnic and take the kids to Belfair State Park.” Not one to ignore such an invitation, I prepared the peanut butter/jelly sandwiches and helped load up the car with kids, swimsuits, lunches and all the other gear necessary for such an outing.

First, a little about the park: Belfair State Park is a 63-acre, year-round camping park on 3,720 feet of salt-water shoreline on Hood Canal about an hour’s drive from Port Ludlow. Long ago, it was a central meeting place for generations of Native Americans. The Skokomish tribe used the area for gathering shellfish.

There is a clear lovely salmon stream running through the park and that is our favorite area. River rocks have been placed in the stream to make shallow swimming holes and children use their floats to ride the currents. Our group had a marvelous time doing that and collecting bucketsful of crawly things that we returned to the stream before heading home. The sky was blue and cloudless, wet kids were laughing and shouting, and a bald eagle was watching the spectacle. “This is heaven on earth,” I thought as I lolled in the shade and ate my sandwich!

Before entering the State Park, we realized that we needed to purchase a Discover Pass. We stopped at the office and gave the attendant our \$30 and she gave us a hangtag good for one year for one vehicle only to hang from our rearview mirror. We could have bought a day pass at \$10, but we like parks and visit often. After all, Washington has seven million acres of State recreation lands including 100 developed State Parks that include forests, beaches, deserts, lakes, rivers, mountains and alpine meadows. The State’s budget crisis continues to grow. In fact we noticed that last year’s lush grass was brown and dry! \$30 seems like a real bargain to ensure that we are able to continue enjoying all of this!

Eating Around: Have a Cup of Joy

Hansville’s coffee café, Cup of Joy, is a large, square, white building built in the 1930s, which has cheerful, inviting pots of flowers on the steps. The two rooms inside are eclectically decorated with newly upholstered antiques, creating a well-scrubbed charm. This is the dream of Bob and Cathy Sand, and Darryl

and Joy Ulskey, who met 10 years ago at their sons’ Little League games in Edmonds. Darryl and Joy purchased a summer—possibly retirement—place in Hansville’s Skunk Bay, and later bought this building.

Although Kathy says it was hard to turn in her hairdresser scissors for an espresso machine, the couples spent four years putting together a business plan right down to the menu and coffee and opened the doors this February. Although Cathy and Darryl still live in Edmonds, Cathy stays in an apartment above Cup of Joy when working on this side of the bay (or sound?). An early-riser, she opens at 7:00 a.m. in the morning while Joy is the afternoon closer at 3:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday and 7:00 p.m., Friday through Sunday.

With an ancient septic system that puts severe limitations on water usage, the owners wanted to be as “green” as possible and use biodegradable paper products. Wanting to serve fresh, high quality local foods, their breads and baked items come from Liberty Bay Baker and Miracle Morsels. The coffee is from Guatemala Finca Bourbon, a family-owned plantation producing coffee since 1878, roasted and delivered to them by Vashon Coffee. Brewing coffee fresh, slicing their own cheeses, meats, tomatoes and fruits provides fresh products.

There are many distinctive food items on the Cup of Joy menu. Try the Focaccia sandwich, prepared especially for you with tomato, mozzarella, fresh basil and balsamic vinegar and grilled on fresh focaccia bread. A new dinner item is the Bleu Cheeseburger on *ciabatta* bread. Other favorites are Chicken Coconut Curry soup, usually available on Sunday, and the Walking Strawberry Shortcake made with fresh strawberries over shortbread and real whipped cream—not from a can. As the days get warmer, Cathy and Joy are thinking of adding something cold and refreshing like smoothies or Italian sodas and Walking Fresh Peach shortcake.

Currently on Mocha Mondays you can get a 12-ounce hot or iced blend of coffee and chocolate garnished with whipped cream for only \$1. On Tuesdays there is a Breakfast Panini made with ham, bacon, egg, your choice of cheese, served warm from the grill with a cup of coffee for \$4.95.

Cup of Joy has more than food; an adjacent room has unique clothing items, accessories like hats and jewelry and some artwork, all locally created. In back there is a bird sanctuary. Imagine taking your shortcake for a walk in the bird sanctuary. Yum!

Seattle Children's Hospital Guild Walkathon

The year was 1908. The facility was the 12-bed Fresh Air Cottage on Queen Anne Hill, the first building constructed by Children's Orthopedic Hospital. From that humble beginning Seattle Children's has grown to one of the nation's finest and now accommodates 250 beds. The Hospital is building a new facility in Laurelhurst, adjacent to the main campus. The first phase is expected to open in 2013. In addition, there are seven off-site clinics: Bellevue, Everett, Federal Way, Odessa Brown, Olympia, Tri-Cities and Alaska Cardiology.

Children's serves four states: Washington, Alaska, Idaho and Montana. Licensed beds include pediatric intensive care units, cardiac intensive care, neo-natal intensive care, medical and surgical units, Seattle Care Alliance/Oncology, Rehabilitation and Critical Care Unit and psychiatric unit. Hundreds of guilds support the hospital's uncompensated care fund and Research Institute. The latter includes endowed chairs in pediatric infectious disease, urology, immunology, tissue and cell science and integrative brain research.

One mother founded the Pediatric Brain Research Guild. She had this emotional story to tell. "Max [Hanson] was eight when he was diagnosed with brain cancer. The bottom dropped out of our world. We thought he was going to die. Max underwent neurosurgery and a regimen of radiation and chemo. Max is now a freshman in high school and doing well. Because people raise money to improve cancer treatment for children, my son is still alive."

In Jefferson County 634 children were sent to Children's in 2010. The costs to uncompensated care were \$437,855.

The Walkathon fee is \$20 for advance registration, \$25 on the day of the hikes. Both hikes will feature parts of the Around the Bay trail and a visit to Picnic Point. All activity begins at 8:30 in the Bay Club parking lot.

Math Program Seeks Volunteers

Less than half of East Jefferson County's third graders met Washington State math standards in 2010. This matters because students below grade level in math and reading at the end of third grade are at serious risk of becoming high school dropouts. Since 1992 dropouts lost 24 percent in purchasing power. High school graduates lost 10 percent and students with some college lost 7 percent while those with a bachelor's degree or more increased purchasing power by 19 percent according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor.

To improve math outcomes, AAUW Port Townsend and Chimacum Elementary School piloted a successful program using volunteers during the spring of 2011. Students improved, on average, over 20 percentage points.



In October 2011 Chimacum, Port Townsend, Quilcene and Brinnon schools will implement the new program. AAUW Port Townsend supplies organization, training and materials. UWF (University Women's Foundation of Jefferson County), Port Ludlow Yacht Club (PLYC), schools and parents provide funding.

Would you like to help third graders improve their math skills? Volunteer for two hours on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons. Small Group coaches help students master the basics of every day math (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division and simple fractions) through game-like activities. The coaching kit with card games, flash cards and hands-on learning materials is organized for success. Computer Lab coaches help students read instructions, stay focused, use paper and pencil to do math computations and learn to use the ALEKS 'explain' feature when they don't understand how to solve a problem. Volunteers are paired for continuity and scheduling flexibility.

The men were honored with the “Most Inspirational” and “Bull Dog” awards for leadership.

Joint Resident 2010 graduate FF/PM Evan Stanley, was recognized for his leadership abilities. He was invited to serve as Company Officer for this class to assist with instruction. During the 11-week program, recruits learned skills to save lives and properties of those in the communities in which they live.

The Fire Academy is part of a rigid and demanding training program requiring hard work, dedication and a commitment to becoming a career firefighter. The Joint Resident Program has sent nine recruits through the Academy by over the past year. The Joint Resident Program consists of volunteers who are interested in a fire service career. Chief Ed Wilkerson's Safety Message

The months of August and September tend to be a time when we see increased wildfire activity here on the Olympic Peninsula. With more dwellings in woodland settings, more homeowners face the very real danger of wildfire. Wildfires often begin unnoticed. They spread quickly, igniting brush, trees and homes. Reduce your risk by preparing now—before wildfire strikes. Meet with your family to decide what to do and where to go if wildfires threaten your area.

Practice Wildfire Safety by:

- Making sure that fire vehicles can get to your home.
- Reporting hazardous conditions that could cause a wildfire.
- Teaching children about fire safety—keeping matches out of their reach.
- Posting fire emergency telephone numbers.
- Planning several escape routes away from your home—by car and by foot.
- Planning how the neighborhood could work together after a wildfire. Make a list of your neighbors' skills such as medical or technical. Consider how you could help neighbors who have special needs, such as elderly or disabled persons. Make plans to take care of children who may be on their own if parents can't get home.

Before wildfire threatens, take measures to prevent spread of fire. Select materials and plants that can help contain fire rather than fuel it. Remove flammable vegetation including dead branches. Keep shrubs and firewood away from the house. Use fire resistant or non-combustible

materials on the roof and exterior structure of the dwelling. Regularly clean roof and gutters and chimneys. Clean them at least once a year.

When wildfire threatens, listen to your battery-operated radio for reports and evacuation information. Follow the instructions of local officials.

Wildfire and other types of disasters can strike quickly and without warning. You can cope by preparing in advance and working with your family to devise a Family Disaster Plan that includes a Disaster Supplies Kit. If you have questions regarding wildfires, call 437-2236. The Fire Department has free printed materials that will help you.

A recent incident involving a person falling overboard in Port Ludlow Bay has prompted an investigation into what observers should do in such cases. David Aho of the Port Ludlow Coast Guard Auxiliary advises that the best action is first to call 9-1-1; then report the incident to the Marina. Those on board or in nearby craft should alert others to the accident. If it is possible to assist from the water, that should be done—retrieving the individual, providing a flotation device or both.

A person may fall overboard for many reasons: they might have been struck by a part of the vessel, they may lose their footing due to a slippery deck or an unexpected movement of the boat, or any number of other reasons. It is dangerous and life-threatening. Approximately 67 percent of such incidents involve pleasure craft.

Because such accidents are often fatal, it is important to prevent them from happening and to be prepared for them when they do. On large vessels, passengers on deck should never climb or sit on the railings but keep their center of mass well below the top rail. Except in fierce weather, it is difficult to be washed, blown or to trip overboard from this position. Life jackets (always) and safety harnesses (in some cases) are necessary equipment. Boaters should follow published procedures for use.

Apart from staying safe, most yachting schools teach and require students to practice man-overboard drills. This is recommended so that should the worst occur, everybody on board knows what to do. It also provides a good opportunity to practice close-quarters maneuvering. In the cold waters of Puget Sound the possibility of hypothermia is very real and can be made worse by hoisting the individual up vertically thus causing circulation to drain to lower extremities. Rescuers should be cautious not to become casualties themselves by falling or being pulled overboard. If possible, use the natural action of the vessel to lift the casualty on board.

Brazen Bayview Bear Attacks Birdfeeders

Call it the Bayview Village Bear, the Golf Course "Trail" Bear, the Teal Lake or the Timberton Village Bear—one or three different bears have been sighted here and have become more brazen over the past three years.

For Bayview's Joyce Prestesater, an avid bird lover who has lived here for 20 years, her bear problems have escalated in three years to the point that she was greeted by a full-size black bear just below her deck at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, July 1. The first bear visit was three years ago when one morning she discovered the birdfeeder hung high in a tree had vanished. Finding bear claws in the tree trunk, she realized a bear had climbed up and carried the feeder off into the nearby woods.

Undaunted and inventive Joyce changed the feeder location to hang off the end of the deck. Securing it with brackets with the hanger inserted into a half-inch steel pipe, the hanger now was eight feet off the ground. Then one night she heard a noise and knew the feeder was being attacked. The next morning the hanging apparatus was pulled down and was 30 feet down the slope. At that point, she began putting the feeders away every night.

But on Thursday, June 30 she dutifully put out the feeder at 7:00 a.m. and when she looked out her window a couple hours later, a big black bear was at the feeder. He had torn the bottom out, spilled the sunflower seeds on the ground and was feasting. Needless to say, in the interest of safety for everyone, this is the end of Joyce feeding the birds until the bears go into winter hibernation.

PLFR/Quilcene Training Pact Ends

Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue (PLFR) recently announced a temporary dissolution of a joint training agreement between the Port Ludlow and Quilcene Fire Districts following the resignation of Quilcene Fire Chief Robert Low. Port Ludlow Fire Chief Ed Wilkerson cited trainee safety and the prospect of potential liability as the reason for terminating the pact.

Wilkerson and Low created the training program about a year ago. Approximately 15 people are involved in the program that allows firefighters to receive training before enrolling in the fire academy and becoming professional firefighters. The dissolution of the pact does not affect the cooperative aid agreement between Quilcene and Port Ludlow. The training pact may resume when a new Fire Chief is hired in Quilcene.

Port Ludlow Village Council

Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Report

Art Zoloth called the July 7 meeting of the PLVC to order at 3:00 p.m. in the Beach Club. Other Council members present were Dave Armitage, Ned Luce, Larry Nobles, Tony Simpson, Don Thompson, Pat Traci, Elizabeth Von Zonneveld and Zoloth. Absent were Jim Boyer, Laury Hunt, Pete Leenhouts, Shane Seaman and Tom Stone. A quorum was declared; the agenda was adopted as written. The minutes from the previous meeting were approved with amendments.

Highlight: Guest Speakers

Judi Morris, Jefferson County Treasurer, spoke and answered questions. She explained that she is essentially the bank for the County and sub-districts, including the Port, Library, Hospital and Fire Districts. She processes warrants, bills and collects taxes, and manages the debt, liquid funds and investments. She described details of the revenues received from timber harvests, both by Pope Resources and the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Morris deferred to County Commissioner John Austin who confirmed that, if some of the DNR property in question reverts to Pope Resources, the Fire District and the County would lose revenue.

In response to questions Morris confirmed that, according to Assessor Jack Westerman, some parts of Port Ludlow would see substantial reductions in home value that would not be reflected in reduced property taxes.

Melanie McGrory, M.D., lead professional at the new Jefferson Healthcare Port Ludlow Clinic, described her background and goals. McGrory, a Chimacum resident, has been in private practice for 20 years. Originally with the Port Hadlock Clinic, she believes in a comprehensive approach to healthcare. She said she is excited about the opportunity to open a clinic in Port Ludlow, which has long needed one. The clinic will provide both urgent and primary care along with visits from specialists. It will provide blood draws, x-rays and other tests that may be sent to other labs for interpretation. The Clinic will have standard 20-, 40-, and 60-minute appointments and accept all kinds of insurance. She expects to outgrow the current facility in 2 to 3 years.

Dr. McGrory introduced members of her professional staff, all board certified. She announced that the grand opening of the new Clinic at the corner of Oak Bay and Paradise Bay Roads on July 8.

LMC June Board Meeting Highlights

The monthly business meeting of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees was held Thursday, June 23 at the Bay View Room of the Beach Club. The following are highlights of that meeting:

- The LMC has hired Kathy Neill as a part-time bookkeeper. She will be working approximately eight hours per month preparing payroll, paying bills and making bank deposits. General Manager Brian Belmont has been performing all bookkeeping duties so this will leverage his time and provide back-up capability.
- The LMC's five-year copier lease expired in June. The replacement copier now being leased has color copying capability. Black and white copies are still 10 cents per page. Color copies are 50 cents per page and scans to a PDF file are 5 cents per scan.
- The built-in green couch has been removed from the Bay View Room. The cushioning had seriously deteriorated and the decision was made to save money and not replace it. The additional space made available will provide a bit more elbow room for dining and other events.
- The Board formally adopted its 2011-2012 goal to establish a Strategic Long-Range Plan for the management of the LMC assets by March 2012, and present it to the membership at the 2012 Annual Members Meeting.
- A stormwater infiltration/dispersal trench easement across the LMC greenbelt was approved for Grace Christian Church at the corner of Oak Bay Road and Osprey Drive after corrections were made in accordance with comments made by LMC's attorney. Grace Christian Church paid for the attorney's review.
- The Board elected Elizabeth Van Zonneveld as interim Treasurer in the absence of Treasurer Sharron Sherfick.

The next business meetings of the LMC Board of Trustees are scheduled for 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 28 and **Thursday, August 25.**

Manager's Report

It's finally feeling like summer in Port Ludlow. Mother Nature seems to have a way of making up for bad weather. I want to believe that we are going to have a beautiful August and September as a reward for enduring a cold and wet spring.

The recently renovated outdoor pool has been a huge success! We've been getting lots of positive feedback regarding the repairs. If you are a Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) member please come down and try out the outdoor pool—I'm sure you'll be very pleased with the sparkling fresh look.

LMC operates two RV storage lots between Talbot Way and Rainier Lane. Over the years the trees that grow along the perimeter of the storage lots have matured and become problematic. Between the Talbot storage lot and Ames Lane is a strip of wooded Greenbelt property that has a thicket of alder trees near the fence of the storage area. The alders are mature and when they break or blow down, as alders are prone to do, they are within striking distance of the RV fence and the stored equipment inside. The fence has been hit numerous times by falling alders.

I have been working with the LMC Greenbelt Committee (GBC) to get their authorization to have some of these alders cut down. The adjacent property owners will have received a letter in July from the GBC advising them of their opportunity to comment on the proposed project.

Between the Talbot RV storage lot and Ames Lane, 156 trees are marked with red tape and numbers. I would estimate that more than 95 percent of the marked trees are alders with diameters ranging from 4 to 18 inches at breast height; most are 6 inches or less in diameter. Included with the alders are a few cedar and fir trees that are growing close to the RV fence whose limbs are either overhanging or growing through the fence.

The removal of the alders is the first stage of cleaning up around the storage lot perimeter. In other areas problem evergreen trees are within five feet of the fence line so their branches are either growing through the fence or are overhanging the fence. The overhanging limbs drip pitch on the stored equipment. In some cases, limbing of the evergreen trees is all that is needed but in others it will be more cost effective over the long-term to have the tree removed. Prior to starting subsequent stages of the cleanup surrounding property owners will be kept apprised of any requested tree removals.

LMC will work closely with Port Ludlow Drainage District (PLDD) to ensure that our work doesn't create problems for our downhill members with increased water run-off and with members with units stored in the lot to be sure they have access to their equipment.

North Bay Clean Sweep

Summer is finally here! What better time to do your clean sweep route than while walking through your neighborhood on a warm summer evening. The Summer Clean Sweep is scheduled for the week of **Monday, August 8 to Sunday, August 14**. Please try to complete your routes during this week.

Clean Sweep is a dedicated Lot Owners Association (LOA) Committee that never holds meetings, yet gets the

work done. Individuals, family groups and local businesses take responsibility for picking up the roadside litter along a few blocks of the neighborhood. Members are reminded quarterly by e-mail and through the *Voice* that another sweep is due.



Two further items of business were completed: MSP that the Gazebo roof be replaced with composite shingles. Last, MSP to donate \$275 to help support the Port Ludlow Festival By The Bay.

The regular meeting adjourned at 10:48 a.m. to Executive Session to discuss personnel matters. No motions were made.

The Next regular Board meeting will be held on **Friday, August 5**, at 9:30 a.m.

Dock Talk

Sailing Acrobats at Port Ludlow Marina: On **Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 23, 24 and 25**, French sailors Delphine Lechiffart and her husband Franck Rabilier will perform high-wire circus acts from the rigging of their 40-foot sloop *La Loupiote*. Since beginning their cruise/performance in Brittany, France in 2004, they've sailed thousands of miles and performed in hundreds of marinas from the Great Lakes to Martinique, to Panama and Mexico. There will be two 20-minute shows beginning promptly at 5:00 and 7:00 p.m. (See the story "Acrobatics Performed on a Sailboat" in Local News on page 12 for more details.) Both shows are suitable for all ages and are free, but the artist will pass the hat inviting the public to give donations to help them and their two children continue their adventure around the world.

The current plan is to have the show just to the east of A-dock, a perfect view from the Fireside veranda. I recommend making dinner reservations early!

The Purpose of a Dock Cart: This time of year dock carts are in very high demand. As many of you know, it is aggravating to arrive at the Marina with a load of goodies to haul to your vessel and find the dock cart area is empty. The Marina staff will hustle down the docks looking for stranded carts. Many of the carts are being used as storage units for the day, which is not the purpose of the dock cart. A dock cart should be used to haul your belongings to or from your car and to or from your vessel. We ask that you unload the cart and immediately return it to the west side of the Marina office.

USCG Auxiliary Flotilla 41

U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) Auxiliary Flotilla 41 has its roots in Port Ludlow. Founders, past Commanders and most of its officers have been Port Ludlow residents; many are also Port Ludlow Yacht Club (PLYC) members. The Flotilla has now grown to over 60 members including a few from the Flotilla's detachment recently formed in Brinnon. Members are from all walks of life but share a common boating passion. Auxiliary members undergo much the same training as the Coast Guard albeit not so physically rigorous.

The Auxiliary's primary mission is to educate the public about boating safety. To this end members give classes including basic seamanship, use of charts and Global Positioning System (GPS) navigation. The Auxiliary can also inspect recreational vessels at the request of the owners who are provided with a free written report on the safety and legality of their vessel. The Auxiliary has no law enforcement authority; its sole interest is that you and your family are safe on the water. Vessels which pass inspection are issued a USCG AUX sticker and are looked upon favorably by insurance companies. They also are less likely to be boarded by the USCG. The Auxiliary also promotes safety and environmental awareness at local marinas.

These Auxiliary efforts have helped the USCG focus more resources on its new role in illegal drug and immigrant interdiction and anti-terrorism operations. The Auxiliary's role in helping the USCG as additional "eyes and ears on the water" will be covered in future monthly Flotilla news reports featured once again in the *Voice*.

Anyone interested in joining the Auxiliary should come to one of its membership breakfasts held every Tuesday at 9:00 a.m. at the Snug Harbor Café in Port Ludlow. Guests are also welcome at monthly membership meetings, 7:00 p.m., on the second Wednesday of each month at the Port Ludlow Fire Station, or see us at the Festival By The Bay.

New Shine Pit Access Road

Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) is supervising construction of a new access road connecting Shine Pit with State Route 104 at mile-post 8 just east of the highway's intersection with SR 19, Beaver Valley Road. The new road is required for access and egress from the former Shine Pit. No traffic impacts are expected with this stage of work, according to the WSDOT, but delays are expected as the project advances.

The road project adds a westbound left-turn lane, a westbound acceleration lane and an eastbound right-turn lane. The schedule calls for the construction site to be cleared the third week in July, between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Miles Sand and Gravel, which in 2010 bought out the Fred Hill Materials Inc. gravel facility in Shine, needs a new access road onto SR 104 west of its existing access road in part because the quarry operation is moving farther west. A WSDOT official said the agency made a mistake granting the original Shine Pit access on SR 104 some 20 years ago. This project corrects that mistake.


