


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

Popularity of Book Clubs

According to a survey by *The New York Times*, five million Americans gather every few weeks in someone's living room, bar, bookstore, or local library to share and discuss books. From 2004 to 2015, there was a 24 percent rise in book club participation. Book discussion groups have come a long way since Puritan settler Anne Hutchinson's women's Bible study circle founded in 1634. Oprah Winfrey started her book club in 1995 and now has about 2 million members; every time she announces a new pick, the book's sales skyrocket.

Social media has opened doors for book readers to choose, read, and discuss books. There are broadcast clubs such as Oprah's and National Public Radio's Book Club of the Air. Online clubs include Yahoo Groups, Internet Forums, Goodreads, dedicated websites, authored clubs via webinars, and last but not least, community based book clubs. Eighty-nine percent belong to book clubs that meet in person and 17 percent belong to online clubs. The average membership of groups that meet in person is from 8 to 10, and 52 percent of online groups have a membership of 40 or more.

Port Ludlow has a number of reading groups: Martha's Book Club, Ken Thomas' Men's Reading Club, and other smaller groups. A common question is: "What book is your club reading?"

Book club members are attracted to clubs for a number of reasons, including love of reading, enjoyment of a good story, and learning something new. Others enjoy the social aspects of a book club. Group discussions can stimulate new ways of looking at a character, an issue, or a theme. Some clubs are book focused only, some serve wine and cheese with the discussion, and others focus on the book first and then socialize over lunch. Meeting the same people each month provides new reading opportunities and fosters friendships that can last a lifetime. Perhaps the most important aspect of a book club is that it gives members a time out where they can focus on good books with people they enjoy.

Every Student Succeeds Act

Every child deserves a high-quality education, regardless of where they live, how they learn, or how much money their parents make. Making sure the next generation can succeed in the twenty-first century is a national priority and economic imperative. Last year Senator Patty Murray was able to pass bipartisan legislation to replace the country's badly-broken education law known as No Child Left Behind (NCLB). President Obama signed the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) into law last December. It will be implemented this month.

Senator Patty Murray explained, "I had heard from so many parents and teachers across our state who said that No Child Left Behind wasn't working for them or their students. So I took these stories from the Peninsula and around the state to the other Washington, reached across the aisle to break through the gridlock, and passed a bipartisan bill to finally fix this broken law, help end the reliance on over-testing, and put our students first."

This Act will eliminate the need for state waivers exempting states from NCLB requirements. Instead it grants states the flexibility to design their own evidence-based, locally designed solutions that meet unique needs of schools and communities. This flexibility, however, also includes strong federal guardrails to ensure states include student performance, graduation rates for all students, and other important measures of school performance in their accountability systems. The intent is to ensure that high school students are college- and career-ready upon graduation.

ESSA aims to: give states and school districts greater flexibility to improve student achievement rather than forcing all schools into rigid state accountability systems, eliminate one-size-fits-all interventions, and reduce the role of high-stakes testing. It allows states to design accountability systems that include multiple measures of school success instead of just test scores.

ESSA prioritizes high quality early childhood education to help young learners build their skills to start school on a strong footing. The nation's primary, elementary, and secondary education legislation will have dedicated funding to support early education.

ESSA maintains the intent of the nation's K-12 law to meet the diverse needs of all children and young adults through many avenues that are designed to support

students in poverty, the homeless, English-language learners, tribal students, children of military families, and those with significant cognitive disabilities.

At the Empowered Educators Day at the National Education Association Convention, Shelly Krajacic, Executive Board Member, told delegates, "The evils of NCLB are gone and the opportunity of the Every Student Succeeds Act is here. No more test and punish; now it's about putting kids first."

Delegates at the American Federation of Teachers convention overwhelmingly approved a major resolution that is designed to help turn the promise of the ESSA into a constructive reality for schools. For more detailed description of programs included in the new bill, go to plvoice.org.

Why the Community College?

For the past few years, politicians and other leaders have stressed the importance of community colleges. Few people understand what the community college is, where it began, or what its role is in our educational continuum.

Community colleges are referred to as "Democracy's College" or the "People's College" with good reason. These open-access institutions serve a diverse population with diverse needs; nearly half of all undergraduates in the United States attend community colleges. Community colleges do not screen out; they open doors for everyone wishing to pursue higher education. They accept students at any age, any stage in their lives, any educational level, and take them from where they are to where they want to be.

Community colleges have provided 115 years of academic service. In that time, no other segment of public education has been more responsive to its community and workforce. In 2014, 12.3 million students entered community colleges across the US. In that year alone, 795,000 associate degrees and 495,000 certificates were awarded.

In 1901, Joliet Junior College was founded as an extension of a local high school; it remains the oldest existing public two-year college. At the same time, small private and public colleges began offering two-year programs beyond the high school curriculum with the primary focus being liberal arts studies. During the depression, community colleges began job training programs as a path to lowering unemployment. After WWII, with the conversion of military industries to consumer goods, the return of veterans, and the GI Bill, higher

education opportunities were needed. The 1948 Truman Commission Report on Higher Education suggested that a system of publicly supported community-based colleges be created to meet those needs.

In the 1960s, community colleges became a loosely linked national network of 457 public institutions with shared goals of access and service. Currently there are 1,108 community colleges serving their communities. In some states, a State Board of Community and Technical Colleges is the governing body. In Washington and other states, each Community College District may have its own local board.

These institutions thrive because of their flexibility and resiliency to changing times and populations. They provide programs in liberal arts, workforce education, basic skills education, and second language learning. When a community business needs a training program for employees, community colleges create it. They develop partnerships with high schools, four year colleges and universities, businesses, social services, and other groups in the community to provide choices.

Community colleges open doors to higher education for those students who are traditionally underrepresented. An average Washington community college student is 26 years old. Twenty-eight percent are parents, 43 percent work, 42 percent are people of color, 57 percent female, 12 percent students with disabilities, and almost half, in eligible programs, receive financial assistance. Ages range from 16 to 65, and students may enroll in academic/transfer classes, workforce training, basic skills, or pre-college programs. The total headcount for the thirty-four community colleges in Washington is 386,000 both full time and part time.

Classes are small, offered at various times, and taught by qualified instructors, many with advanced degrees in their field, or as in technical and vocational programs, instruction is provided by instructors with experience in the field. In addition to instructional services, community colleges provide a variety of support services which include placement testing and advising, career planning, counseling, tutoring, job placement, and services designed specifically for disabled students. As technology advances, so do opportunities at the community college; these institutions now deliver services at a time, location, and pace of the students choosing.

Community Colleges represent the largest system of higher education in Washington. Tuition is a third that of research universities, half that of four-year state colleges and universities, and students who transfer from two-year

to four-year colleges are as successful as those who began as freshman.

Flexibility and adaptability will always be a challenge; however, with its history of ingenuity and resiliency, the community college will continue to grow as an active participant in the educational life of this country. Why the community college: access, service, cost, and choice.

Northwest School of Wooden Boatbuilding

Let's get this straight—the Northwest School of Wooden Boatbuilding (NWSWB) in Port Hadlock is a different organization from the Northwest Maritime Center in Port Townsend. Both focus on maritime education, but each has a different specialty. They have different leadership, although some NWSWB members have served on the Maritime Center's board in the past.

The mission of the School of Wooden Boatbuilding is “to teach and preserve traditional and contemporary wooden boatbuilding skills, while developing the individual as a craftsman.” It is committed to providing men and women of all ages a quality education in traditional and contemporary wooden boatbuilding, and fine woodworking. It strives to impart sound, practical knowledge in traditional maritime skills, using wooden boats as the training medium. NWSWB imbues students with the pride and satisfaction that comes from skillful work joyfully executed.

Since becoming a 501(c)(3) nonprofit vocational education institution in 1981, over a thousand students have graduated from the school's vocational programs, and thousands more have attended summer and community workshops, studying traditional and contemporary maritime arts. In 1991, NWSWB became nationally accredited by the Accrediting Commission of Career Schools and Colleges. It is licensed under the Private Vocational Schools Act, Chapter 28C.10RCW of Washington State.

Programs, courses, and workshops include traditional subjects such as lofting, oar making, painting and varnishing, boat building, carvel and lapstrake planking, and contemporary wood composite boat construction. Craftsmanship and woodworking standards are the highest within the maritime vocational trades. At the center of its programs is the ability to earn an Associates Degree in one year, culminating each September in presentations at the Port Townsend Wooden Boat Festival.

NWSWB is a true educational resource for our community. Wooden boats are works of art to be enjoyed for generations. Each year students build beautiful wooden boats ranging in size from 10 to 50 feet. Many of the boats are commissioned or are built for sale.

Eating Around: Mossback Restaurant

Mossback Restaurant in Kingston, Washington, tantalizes the taste buds and delivers imaginative cuisine in a quirky and eclectic atmosphere.

Located in a charming 100-year old farmhouse and gardens and nestled in a cliff-top residential neighborhood close to the ferry, Mossback is owned and operated by John Delp and Christy Penney. Starting life as a bakery and coffee house, it has morphed into a full service restaurant. Creating delicious food with an emphasis on local ingredients, it showcases the best that local farmers, cheesemakers, and mixologists have to offer. Many of the local purveyors will be familiar to Port Ludlow residents, Red Dog Farm, Shorts Family Farm, and Spring Rain, to name a few.

Dining takes place inside the main house, in the garden, and in the bar area located in the converted garage. I started with a Souchong Sling cocktail (warship rum, Lapsang Souchong smoked tea liquor, house-made limoncello, bitters, and a splash of soda), unique flavors and delicious.

I shared the Deli Plank and Cheese plank, featuring artisan cheeses from Rogue, Chimacum Valley and Beecher's Creameries, assorted fermented and pickled fruits and vegetables, crabapple chutney, blueberry mostarda, and slices of amazing whole wheat seed boule house-made bread.

I had the Cioppino as my entrée, a bowl of tasty broth made from fresh tomatoes, white wine, garlic, onions and parsley filled with Neah Bay Halibut, Chinook salmon, and Quilcene Bay manila clams, served with slices of focaccia. My dining companion opted for the tacos, fresh corn tortillas filled with house made chorizo fresco, potato, chard, cabbage, and onion topped with crème fraiche, cilantro and pico de gallo de frutas.

The desserts that passed by looked very appealing; unfortunately, we were too full to try any on this visit. A small nice selection of wines by the glass and bottle are offered as well as imaginative craft cocktails, beer, and house-made non-alcoholic beverages.

Mossback Café captures the spirit of the farm to table movement with their creative menu of fresh seasonal produce and ingredients, at very fair prices. The menu changes like the seasons. Starters from \$6 - \$11, Entrees from \$12 - \$21. Cash and major credit cards accepted.

Ken's Gardening Corner

As the cooler weather approaches, it is time to do a little housekeeping and planting in the garden. Many perennials may not be blooming this time of year, but fall is the best time of year to plant them and trees as well. Our periodic rains should get them established naturally, and their roots will have a good start for the growing season next spring.

Plant bulbs when the hot days subside; daffodils, tulips, gladiolus, etc. Don't forget to put a little bone meal at the bottom of the hole with your bulbs. Here is another quick tip for you bulb enthusiasts. If you are in an area where there are bulb eating pests, sink a wire mesh basket into the ground, fill it with soil, and plant the bulbs inside.

Now, on to a little garden housekeeping. Try to prevent pest and disease problems next year by removing plant waste on the ground that can become home to slugs, snails, and disease spores. You can compost dead or dying disease-free annuals, but diseased plant parts go in the garbage. Remember, as well, to move any tender potted plants indoors before the first frost arrives.

As far as the lawn is concerned, you'll want to de-thatch and then add a complete organic fertilizer recommended for fall application. In the veggie garden, things are winding down a bit, but you can still plant Arugula, Bok Choy, Collard Greens, Lettuce, Mache, Mustard Greens, Radishes and Spinach.

And for those of you that don't have gardens going, please remember to support your farmers and farm stands by purchasing local. Eat healthy, and "Happy Gardening!"

Piece of History Added at Marina

In July 2016, the Black family kindly donated a ten-foot high anchor to the Port Ludlow community. The historical anchor comes from one of the notorious hell ships, the *Reaper*, that was used to carry lumber from Port Ludlow to distant ports.

The *Reaper* caught fire and burned out in Ludlow Bay almost 110 years ago to the day – July 21, 1906. The boat had caught fire at the Port Ludlow mill dock; after burning overnight, her lines were cut, and she was taken to the other side of the bay and burned out. At low tide you can see glimpses of the *Reaper's* remains.

In the late 1800s, Port Ludlow was known for its excellent ship building facilities. The Puget Sound Mill Company was in charge of construction of three masters, ten two-masted schooners, and the Kitsap barkentine. The Hall Brothers built approximately 31 vessels in Port Ludlow, many for the Puget Sound Mill Company.

Hell ships like the *Reaper* were known as ships with poor living conditions or had a reputation of treating the crew callously. During this time in Port Ludlow and Port Townsend “shanghaiing” was somewhat routine. When a ship was lacking in crew members, the merchants would send runners to brothels and bars along the waterfront and force them to crew the boat.

Flash forward to the 1960s when two members of the Black family scuba diving in Ludlow Bay discovered

the *Reaper's* anchor and retrieved it. It sat as an amazing historical relic at their family home prior to donating a piece of Port Ludlow history to the community.

The anchor is now displayed at the Port Ludlow Marina for visitors and locals alike to enjoy, as well as learn more about the history of the hell ships and boat-building in Port Ludlow.

Dove House Benefit Golf Tournament

Last year, Dove House Advocacy Services helped more than 468 people transition to a safer life. It is Jefferson County's sole provider of free services to victims of family and sexual violence and crime. Their budget is never enough to meet the needs of all of their clients; they do not turn anyone away. Last year, the Bluebills raised over \$15,000 on their behalf. The money went for items not in their budget such as emergency housing and food, transportation, school supplies, bus passes, and gas cards.

Emergency Packs for Chimacum Primary Students

The Peace Lutheran Fellowship has an ongoing drive to provide 230 Emergency Packs for the Primary School at Chimacum. The purpose of the packs is to insure, in case of a natural disaster or traumatic event, that each child has a three-day supply of food and things needed to survive. Included in the packs are dehydrated food, water, a flashlight, and basic medical supplies. Each pack costs \$22. Donations to support this program can be sent to Peace Lutheran Fellowship, P. O. Become an IRS-Certified TAX-AIDE Volunteer!

If you are good with numbers and with people, consider becoming an IRS-certified TAX-AIDE volunteer. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are needed. The TAX-AIDE program is sponsored by the AARP Foundation and the IRS. You don't need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer, or to receive free tax preparation services from TAX-AIDE.

Training begins in December. All volunteers do an extensive amount of self-study, using training materials and software provided by the IRS. They must attend training classes and pass the IRS Test before providing tax assistance for low and middle income members of our community. New volunteers work with experienced volunteers at several sites in our community, including the Tri-Area Community Center in Chimacum.

If you'd like to become a TAX-AIDE volunteer, but don't want to go through all the tax training and IRS testing, consider signing up as a "Client Facilitator." These individuals act as receptionists at the TAX-AIDE sites.

With our crew of dedicated TAX-AIDE volunteers, you'll work your mind and warm your heart. Contact aarp.org/taxaide to complete an online application. SMART Driver Course Scheduled

The SMART Driver course will again be offered at the Beach Club on **Wednesday, September 28** and **Saturday, October 1**, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. both days. The purpose of the course is to enable drivers to enhance and extend their safe driving experience. The course is strongly recommended for drivers new to Washington's driving regulations and the local driving environment.

This classroom course, formerly known as AARP Driver Safety, and recently redesigned, explores changes in one's physiology as a result of aging and discusses how drivers can compensate for these changes. The course reviews recent changes in traffic laws, the changing driving environment, and the latest in safety equipment in personal vehicles. Motorists 50 and older looking to keep their driving skills sharp and their insurance premiums low are

encouraged to attend. Washington State has ruled that all drivers age 55 and over will be given a discount on their automobile insurance premiums following completion of the course. There are NO exams.

Classes are open to the public. A \$20 fee is charged to cover the cost of materials. AARP members receive a \$5 discount. The course is hosted by the Beach Club which requests a room fee of \$1 per person each day. Please bring exact change.

The course is eight hours; attendance is therefore required both days. To reserve a place in the class or to ask for further information, call Russ Henry at 437-2250.

Small Spills, Big Problems, Sound Solutions

The biggest source of spills in the Sound has not been tankers and freighters, but small recreational and commercial vessels. Small spills, such as oily bilge discharge, account for 75 percent of the oil dumped into local waters over the last ten years. Washington boaters are the first line of defense against this source of pollution.

A simple remedy called the Small Oil Spills Prevention Kit exists. It consists of a small absorbent pillow that is placed alongside bilge pumps to prevent oily discharge from entering the water. In the state of Washington, the kits are funded by the Barrel Tax and made available to boaters, at no cost, through the Small Oil Spills Program.

The program hopes to hand out 1,000 kits. They may be obtained during U.S. Coast Guard boat inspections or at marinas throughout the Puget Sound. 

Timber Herbicide Spraying Explained

Adrian Miller, Manager of Policy and Environment for Olympic Resource Management, spoke at the Bay Club about the planned spraying of 54 acres of logged property near Teal Lake. The treatment, he said, would take place at the end of August. The time is dependent on contractor availability and weather. Replanting of the area would occur in December. Notification of application is available through announcement in the *Jefferson County Leader* and locally from the Port Ludlow Village Council.

Herbicides are only used at the beginning of the forestation cycle to improve the speed of re-forestation, ensure faster tree growth, and control invasive species. Mr. Miller said that only certain pesticides/herbicides are appropriate for use in forestry. The ones used for this application are imazapyr, glyphosate, and sulfometuron. They are not expected to drift beyond the area of intentional treatment.

Pesticide and herbicide use is heavily regulated. The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, Rodenticide Act (FIRA), updated in 2003, must be followed and is enforced by the State Department of Agriculture. It requires that label directions be strictly followed by licensed contractors with permits for aerial application and that records be retained for seven years. Only enough to receive the desired effect should be used.

While spraying is taking place, trail easements in the area will be closed. The area will be posted at significant access points. The company will monitor the effects of the spraying. No acute toxicity to wildlife is expected.

Olympic Resource Management is a subsidiary of Pope and Talbot. It was established in 1985 and structured as a publicly traded Master Limited Partnership. It has three business segments—fee timberland, real estate, and timberland investment. It is the company responsible

Fire Department Services

In October of 2015, Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue (PLFR) celebrated 50 years of service to the community. The District responds to all hazards, including structural and wildland fires, explosions, release of hazardous materials on land and water, natural and man-made disasters, trauma/medical related incidents, transportation related accidents, marine response, and medical, fire, and drowning incidents in the district’s 55 square mile boundaries.

The District also responds to non-emergency calls for other services—securing downed power lines, pumping flooded basements, and fire and life safety inspections. Staff also provide lift assistance to the ill or infirm, respond to calls related to dangerous odors, help install smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, and change batteries for both.

PLFR has formal mutual aid agreements with all Jefferson County fire service agencies, including Naval Magazine Indian Island and neighboring counties, and participates in the Washington State Mobilization Plan.

It is one of the few agencies in the nation trained/authorized to give life-saving “clot-busting” drugs for a specific type of heart attack. The medication is given to individuals who experience a STEMI (ST elevation myocardial infarction), a type of heart attack that is caused when a clot blocks one of the arteries feeding the heart.

The District currently staffs at least one Advanced Life Support (ALS) unit 24 hours a day. ALS units are staffed by firefighter/paramedics who can start intravenous infusions (IVs), administer medications, interpret electrocardiograms (EKGs), defibrillate or cardiovert (change a dangerous heart rhythm), and do external pacing of the heart, endotracheal intubation (breathing tube), and chest decompression, plus many other treatments.

PLFR also staffs at least one Basic Life Support (BLS) unit 24 hours a day. BLS units are dispatched on non-life-threatening calls such as minor auto accidents, injuries, or illnesses. For questions about services, call 437-2236 or email brad.martin@plfr.org.

Some Areas Reopen to Shellfish Harvesting

Port Townsend Bay including Fort Flagler has re-opened for recreational shellfishing of all species. Kilisut Harbor and Mystery Bay are open to all species except butter and varnish clams, which retain biotoxins longer than other species.

Levels of the marine biotoxins that cause Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning have fallen below the closure limit and the Washington Department of Health has changed the health status in those areas.

Although the toxin levels in Mystery Bay have improved, the shellfish season at Mystery Bay State Park is closed by the Department of Fish and Wildlife until October. Check Fish and Wildlife regulations and seasons at wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/shellfish or call the Shellfish Rule Change Hotline 1-866-880-5431.

In its 17th year, PTFF is known as “the best festival for both introverts and extroverts.” Introverts can skip the parties and duck into a dark theatre and lose themselves in a film. Extroverts can buy a pass (Director or Patron level) that gives them concierge service to all films and admittance into parties with the filmmakers, including a private Saturday afternoon cocktail party to meet the Festival’s headliner guests.

Actress Karen Allen, named as one of the most beautiful women in the world in the 1980s, last appeared at the festival in 2013. She returns this year for Q&A after two screenings of her new film, *Year by the Sea*. She will be accompanied by Alexander Janko, who wrote the screenplay and music and directed the movie.

Actor Andrew Perez, a young actor, also will appear with two of his films: *Bastards y Diablos* and *My Scientology Movie*. He both stars in and wrote the screenplay for *Bastards*, filmed in Colombia, South America.

My Scientology Movie is a coup for the Festival, screening here just prior to its release into national distribution. It was praised by a Daily Telegraph reviewer as “all wickedly tendentious mischief...gloriously funny.”

Charlie Soap is director of *The Cherokee Word for Water*, which will screen twice during the Festival with Q&A afterwards. Soap, a full-blood Cherokee who speaks his native language fluently, is the husband of Cherokee chief Wilma Mankiller. When the Festival brought him to five towns on the Olympic and Kitsap Peninsula last January, he filled all theatres to standing room only.

Also appearing are David Tart (animator for *Toy Story*, *A Bug's Life*, *Finding Nemo*, and *Monsters Inc.*); film editor Doug Blush (*20 Feet From Stardom*, *The Music of Strangers: YoYo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble*) and Bill Borden, Emmy award-winning executive producer

of more than 30 films. He was last in Port Townsend 35 years ago as location manager for *An Officer and a Gentleman*, filmed downtown and at Fort Worden.

PLVC Meeting Report

The Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting was called to order by President Mike Nilssen at 3:00 p.m. A quorum of directors was present. The agenda was approved as written. The meeting was recorded for the purposes of accuracy.

Invited Speakers and Community Reports:

Port Ludlow Associates (PLA): Cliff O'Brian, Director of Construction for West Harbor homes, reported that the Ludlow Cove development is progressing on track. Eleven homes have sold in the past year. Three others are contracted and are under construction; one more home is being built on speculation.

Concrete has been poured at Jefferson Health Care clinic building. Builders are working on the parking lot to promote one-way traffic. Angled parking has been planned.

In Olympic Terrace II, construction has started on the model home. Early to mid-fall completion is planned. Marketing information will be available in September. There has been considerable interest and many inquiries on the website. Three homes will be designed by Union Studio and plans from Olympic Terrace I will be offered as options.

O'Brian stated that PLA needs to establish values on lots. The plans will be appraised to make sure they are priced at the right level. Before clients enter a contract to build, they will be able to obtain information on the spec appraisals via the website. Neighbors will be informed of nearby construction as soon as the information becomes available. Residents should notify PLA if construction noise, etc., becomes an issue.

In the comment period, Richard Babian asked about water from the wells, specifically the North Bay wells 14 and 16 as well as wells 2, 3, and 4. Olympic Water and Sewer, Inc. (OWSI) has blended water from well 14 with water from well 16 to bring arsenic to an acceptable level. The north side of Oak Bay Road has an average arsenic level of 4 parts per million (p.p.m.); the south side was 9 p.p.m. as of 2010. The water is tested periodically but the timing was unspecified. The blend between the two wells was not addressed.

Babian expressed dissatisfaction with the discharge of raw sewage into the bay. He requested that a third party independently monitor and review the operation of the facility. The concern is that the utility is not conscientious enough about consumer protection and safety.

Cliff O'Brian offered to take the concerns about arsenic levels back to Larry Smith, OWSI. He said the most recent sewage issue is confusing to OWSI and the state utilities people. Age of the facility does not appear to be a factor. Dave MacDermid requested signs be put up immediately near where the spill occurs as a warning. Mike Nilssen said that the Utilities Committee will work on this issue and asked Mr. Babian to come to the utility committee meeting to share his information with them.

Community Comment: Steve Frenzl spoke about traffic speed safety. Particular concerns are Paradise Bay and Oak Bay Roads. He proposed that the community send letters to the commissioners using the South Bay basic template.

Department of Community Development (DCD): Patty Charnas, new DCD director and formerly from Kitsap County, introduced herself to the community. At the Kitsap County DCD she was in charge of program planning and oversaw completion of the Shoreline master program update overall plan. She formerly (1995) lived in Jefferson County.

Charnas will focus on three areas. First, enlarging the department and investing in the workforce. A priority is to fill management positions that are vacant. Second, she wants to look at current processes and engage in process improvement including the permitting processes. Third, the state-mandated update to the comprehensive plan for Jefferson County for land use, housing, utilities,

transportation, and other areas needs to be completed. The plan is reviewed every 8 years to accommodate amendments to state law and other changing conditions.

Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC): Ron Racki, LMC President, gave the report. He said that a combined North and South Bay BBQ attracted 180 people. It was extremely successful. Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws changes have passed.

South Bay Community Association (SBCA): Gil Skinner, President, said that the repair project for the Bay Club is in process. He thanked the LMC for a wonderful picnic.

SBCA Business and Committee Reports

Minutes: The July 3016 minutes were approved with edits from Tam McDearmid. See website.

Treasurer's Report: Linda Haskin reported that assets for the PLVC on July 31 totaled \$34,215; of that, \$2,472 is reserved for holiday lights. Funds held separately for the Trails Committee are \$9,368. The financial report was accepted by the Directors. A full report is on the website.

Emergency Preparedness: When approved, questions regarding the Emergency Preparedness Handbook and use of materials for this document will be discussed at a future meeting of committee and the board. The handbook will be shared publicly on website. There is a possible sponsor for hard copies of the 40-page document.

Administration: Chair Linda Haskin announced that at the next workshop there will be time for public comment on the Articles and Bylaws.

PLVC participation in the Chamber of Commerce August mixer was discussed. PLVC is not a member of the Chamber.

Election: Three different documents were considered. A resolution was passed by the Board of Directors regarding Articles and Bylaws that will be submitted to the membership for approval. Three different documents were read, reviewed, and discussed. The amended documents were accepted after discussion.

Welcome Committee: The recent newcomer event hosted over 65 attendees. A large number of organizations were represented. The committee was gratified by the success of the event.

Announcements: Meeting dates are provided in the accompanying box. The Village Council encourages all residents to attend the meetings and become involved in the governance of the Village.

SBCA Meeting Highlights

by Craig Henderson, Secretary

President Skinner called the August 5 meeting of the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) to order at 9:31 a.m. Secretary Henderson declared a quorum of Directors. Protocol for the meeting was Robert's Rules of Order for Small Boards. The agenda was approved.

Special Report: Mike Derrenberger related that Port Ludlow Performing Arts (PLPA) will donate \$8,576 to replace the lighting system in the auditorium. The donation will not cover the cost of installation, which requires an additional \$5,272. The new system will reduce current power usage by 80 percent and will extend the life of the light bulbs 10 times. Heat generated from the lighting will be dramatically reduced, a benefit for performers.

The board authorized an expenditure of \$5,272 from the Renovation/Capital Improvement Fund to install the lighting. The contractor will be Capital Communications Incorporated, a well-known and respected firm. The board will recycle the old lighting through E-Bay. The new lighting will be in place for the fall performance.

Board and Committee Reports

Approval of meeting minutes: The special meeting minutes of July 1, 2016 were approved with one correction.

Manager's Report: Manager Mark Torres related that the repair project was now underway and its progress is being reported on the SBCA website. Mark identified two invoices received from the project totaling \$82,386.26.

There are currently 565 dues-paying SBCA members (529 regular members and 36 associate members), not including lots owned by Port Ludlow Associates. Members have chosen several routes for paying the special assessment (about a third paying in full and a third paying the minimum). Only members who have a balance due will receive an invoice.

A template for filing liens for outstanding dues and a collection process is now in place.

The tennis courts will be blown clean by Bay Club maintenance staff on Mondays and Fridays.

An HVAC contractor is working on a bid to better manage the air temperature in the auditorium, and to restore the function or replace the fan in the pool pump room.

Bird Electric has completed the transition of all phone, network, cable, and electrical which will prevent any disruption to service when full demolition on the remaining exterior siding begins.

Mark is awaiting feedback from Cybex for replacement of the center treadmill and possibly a package deal on all treadmills in the gym. The manager's report is available on the SBCA website.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer/Director Dan Quail reported as of July 31, 2016. SBCA had total current assets of \$1,632,379.17 and \$13,398.49 total fixed assets.

In July 2016, \$6,105.00 of Member Assessments were transferred to Reserves. As of July 2016, total operating funds were \$93,332.91. The combination of accounts in Kitsap and Sound Bank were \$727,546.99. Reserve account balances were \$423,955.57. All financial details are available on the SBCA website.

Board Communications: The SBCA Board of Directors received a letter of appeal regarding the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) decision on the Loomis complaint.

Activities and Amenities: Steve Frenzl was approved as the chair of the Activities and Amenities Committee.

ARC: Director Jurca proposed that, effective on the first business day after the ARC renders its final written decision on any appeals from the ARC's modified decision dated July 27, 2016 on the Loomis Complaint ARC docket #15-081, the ARC members shall be

(1) Vickie Derrenberger, as chair, (2) Craig Henderson, as board representative, (3) Dick Meryhew, as board representative, (4) Steve Hammond, and (5) Lloyd Gill, and that Dave Jurca be designated as an alternate board representative to serve if either of the two regular board representatives is unavailable. The motion was unanimously approved.

Director Jurca noted that at its July 15, 2016 meeting the ARC approved a motion to amend the second sentence of Design Standard 5.1.7 (Rev. 4) by replacing the word “plastic” with the phrase “hollow back vinyl.” This was approved by the SBCA board in July. Pursuant to that amendment the ARC approved an application to replace the exterior siding on a home with polymeric composite “Everlast” siding.

Benevolence: Benevolence account to be under the umbrella of Finance Committee.

Communications: Member Linda Wells was added to the Communications Committee.

Facilities: Director Jurca is to be assigned to the Facilities Committee, and Dave Armitage was approved as the Chair of that committee.

Finance: Director Quail was approved as Chair, and Director Jurca was assigned as a board representative to that committee. The name of the Renovation Fund was changed to “Capital Improvement Fund.” The board approved the expenditure of \$8,000 from the Capital Improvement Fund to upgrade the computer network.

A motion was made by Director Quail to spend up to \$3,000 from the Reserve Fund for replacement of the Cybex treadmill exercise machine. The motion passed.

Human Relations (HR): Directors Skinner and Jurca will serve on the HR Committee.

Long Range Planning: The Long Range Planning Committee will become a committee of the Board of Directors (BOD). Directors Quail and Henderson will represent the BOD.

PLVC: President Skinner reported that the Village Council had introduced the new Director of the Department of Community Development. It is working on process improvements. See the full report in the PLVC section in this issue.

Old Business: Attempts to deal with the speed reduction and traffic control on Paradise Bay Road are ongoing.

The SBCA will remit \$42.36, received from LPV3/4, for maintenance and lighting on the eastside monument on South Bay Lane. The SBCA will agree to maintaining the landscape on the eastside monument area at the current condition. If LPV1, 3, and 4 wish to enhance the eastside in the future, they do so only with consent of the General Manager and at their own cost.

SBCA will no longer pay for electricity charges for the lighting for the monuments on the east side of the entrance to South Bay Lane or for the lighting at the entrance to Fairwind Court. The PUD will be advised to shut off electric service for those lights until further notice.

New Business: Regular monthly Board of Directors meetings will be scheduled for 9:30 a.m. on the second Friday of each month instead of the first Friday, unless otherwise specified by the board.



Court Upholds Hood Canal Easement

This July the Washington State Court of Appeals agreed that the easement negotiated between the Navy and the State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was legal. The agreement confers 4,804 acres of canal seafloor to the Navy for \$720,000 for 50 years. The deal was struck in 2014.

Thorndyke Resource, a local company, had hoped to build a conveyer and a pier into Thorndyke Bay for shipping rock. The plan was known as the "pit to pier" project

and was strongly opposed by environmental groups and others. Thorndyke sued to overturn the easement agreement on the basis that the low price of the lease unfairly allowed the Navy to avoid congressional scrutiny. The property had been previously appraised at \$1.68 million.

The newest decision upholds Jefferson County Superior Court's ruling in favor of the power of the DNR to lease the property. The challenge to the lease has also been dismissed in federal court.

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


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
