



What is the *Port Ludlow Voice*?

The *Port Ludlow Voice* was founded in August of 1998 by local resident, Ralph Thomas. The goal was to facilitate communication between residents and cross-communication between the North Bay Beach Club members and Bay Club members living in South Bay. Its mission was, and is, to inform readers of events and activities within and near the Village. A secondary goal is to serve as a promotional vehicle for our community.

Early issues of the *Voice* contained about 16 pages and were produced by three to six volunteers. The staff size has increased, but all staff members are still unpaid volunteers. Ralph Thomas is no longer the editor; he was replaced in 2001 by Barbara Wagner-Jauregg and later by me – first with a co-editor and then by myself. The appearance of the publication has changed dramatically; the mission remains the same.

The *Voice* is a non-profit 501(c)(4) service organization, not a club. It pays no salaries and owns nothing. In the early years, it was completely dependent upon monthly support from the associations, the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) and the developer. Retail and classified advertising occupied a small percentage of space at the back of the magazine.

Today, however, support for the publication comes primarily from advertising, not contributions or support from the developer, now Port Ludlow Associates. Advertising revenue also pays for the supplementary website on which all issues of the *Voice* are archived along with other information including letters, obituaries, last minute announcements, and breaking news.

The volunteers are the backbone of the *Port Ludlow Voice*. They lend their talents and time to producing and delivering the publication. The positions they occupy all have job descriptions and volunteers are chosen on the basis of being willing and able to perform the tasks required. However, on occasion there are volunteers who try out a job and find it is not a "fit." When it happens, the volunteer simply disengages from the publication. The person cannot be fired because he or she was never hired.

Currently the publication lacks a Managing Editor. I am writing this article in part to assure the community that the *Port Ludlow Voice* will survive this situation. The Managing Editor function will rotate between the section editors until someone who fits the position is found.

Olympic Peninsula Boeing Bluebills

According to a Bluebills brochure explaining who we are, Bluebill is the name of a duck chosen by Bill Boeing as the name of the first airplane built by Boeing in 1915. In 1994, a group of Boeing retirees met to form a volunteer group called the Bluebills. It became a Boeing supported group of Boeing retirees, spouses, and other community members. Just as the Bluebill airplane was the first in a long line of military and commercial aircraft that changed the world, the retiree organization, which began operating in 1995 is changing our communities. There are currently three chapters, one covering the Snohomish County area, another in the greater Seattle area, and our chapter covering the Olympic Peninsula.

The purpose of the Olympic Peninsula Bluebills is to provide opportunities for volunteers to use their time, experience, skills, and knowledge to work together to enhance their own lives and improve the quality of life in their community. There are 187 members with an average of 1,300 volunteer hours recorded each month. The Bluebills volunteer in Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap counties and network with a number of non-profit agencies.

There are a wide range of Bluebills' programs that give volunteers options in what and how they want to volunteer. Bluebills build ramps to help the elderly and disabled, install grab bars and railings, and conduct Fall Prevention Workshops. Each month, a group of volunteers pick up products from World Vision in Fife and distribute them to non-profit agencies on the Peninsula. Personal care items and goods are collected to support victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, and money is raised through an annual Dove House Golf Benefit. The Bluebills network with OlyCap to collect items needed to support the homeless.

Every summer, the Bluebills adopt a week to volunteer in the YMCA Summer Meals Program, and work with the Backpack for Kids Nutrition programs in Chimacum, Quilcene, Port Townsend, and Sequim. A new program

was recently added to support education, and the Bluebills adopted the first grade at Chimacum. Volunteers listen to students read in the classroom, and funds were raised to provide 32 Chrome laptops for the first graders. Pallets of World Vision school supplies are delivered each year to Title 1 schools in the three counties, and we are working with the Museum of Flight to bring STEM programs to schools on the Peninsula. The Bluebills donate 80 backpacks with school supplies for grades K – 8 to the Chimacum School District.

Laura Paul is one of the dedicated volunteers and, when asked why she volunteers, she said, "Working in the community with the Bluebills really makes a difference." Jim Mueller says he volunteers because "it feels good to help other people." Dave Parrish states, "It is a treat to be able to help others in need when doing so allows me to spend time and be productive doing things I enjoy. Building, fixing, and solving problems is fun for me, and to have a place that channels my time that way, helping others, is very rewarding." Gail Parrish says, "Bluebills provide the opportunity to help, and it is a win-win for all of us." Lastly, Myron Vogt volunteers because he "feels a strong obligation to help the community."

Why Do We Do It?

That is the question with no answer. The number I sometimes place after my name is neither my college graduation year nor my age (quite yet). October 31, 1993, does signify an important event in my life - my release. After 43 years of office life, balancing the requirements of family, jobs, friends, bosses, community, and society; I was suddenly about to navigate on my own. Retirement: creating events, rather than reacting to them.

Now the most precious element remaining in my personal bank was time. My least expensive, yet most valuable, asset was mine. It struck me that I wanted to use it as wisely as possible. So, I sat down alone and interviewed myself with as much objectivity as possible.

"Now what; I don't know yet. What are you thinking about? More golf; you're not that good; and besides, that's a hobby, not a life. I want to build something like a cabin. Work with my hands for a change, drive nails." "Do it!" So, I did, on Harstine Island. It turned out pretty well, and it "scratched a lot of itches" I didn't know I had. Then,

finally, I watched the desired results emerge and morph into the image in my mind. Two years of time I invested, then - done. It had been an intense learning experience, very rewarding, but very selfish; because it was all about me.

I wasn't really politically aware until I was 30 plus. I had supported some candidates, but had no party affiliation, nor did my parents. Then, in 1963, I was introduced to a candidate who impressed me. I found I could commit myself to volunteering time and, the other useful ingredient of a volunteer, a little money for his election. He won, and after that experience I not only learned something about politics, but, more importantly, a lot more about issues. How is my tax money being spent? Why are so many minorities in prison? Why won't California accept Asian refugees? Why do farmers need subsidies? Not comfortable, but I continued to volunteer for those who I felt were best equipped to resolve some of my new concerns. Some of my candidates were successful, some were not. Over three successive decades those 'issues' never went away, and frequently they grew in size and complexity.

During this time, I began to better understand my mother's frequent absences at our dinner table in the mid "Thirties." She'd leave a note on the oven door, "I'll be home by 8:00; your father's working late tonight; Love, Mom." She had joined some other mothers of my school friends and was helping somebody do something. I didn't know what; I was nine.

In this new century things have greatly improved for some, but have seemingly stalled for others. Waiting for a solution is not an option for many people. Too many folks can't see beyond to "a future." It won't happen anytime soon but, with our help building a bridge, who knows what can happen?

When we think of this "special place" we live in, Port Ludlow, and realize there are more than 50 local volunteer organizations that have made and are making significant volunteer contributions of time (and a little money) to sustain what we hold so dear, I believe there's a personal story behind each volunteer's activity, whether they know it or not. Something compelled them to leave their comfort zone to help somebody, in some way, no matter how small the effort. They feel better for it; that's reward enough.

The need is growing, as are the number of opportunities to volunteer: with kids, students, the homeless, the abused, the disabled, veterans, the infirm, and the elderly. Take your pick; you're in a position to design your own volunteer activity, for your own reasons. You can see that someone needs help that you can provide. It can be for one time, or a lifetime.

My earlier question does not have a right or wrong answer, only a uniquely personal one. I have my two reasons: I like the selfish pleasure of helping someone, anyone; and, Mom would approve. This is why I do it. Why do you?

Backpacks for Kids Weekend Nutrition Program

Ever since moving to Port Ludlow, I have considered myself blessed to live in such a great supportive community and a stunningly beautiful area. It wasn't until I became involved with Backpacks for Kids Weekend Nutrition, a couple of years ago, that I became fully aware of the poverty that exists, literally in my own back yard.

About seven years ago, Peace Lutheran Fellowship identified a need in the community and started the Backpacks for Kids Weekend Nutrition Program. This school year community volunteers packed 70 - 90 bags of food per week, and anticipate that these numbers will be increasing. The bags include non-perishable, nutritionally-sound food and are sent home every Friday with children in the Chimacum School District who rely on the school's free and reduced meal program. School counselors identify the kids who need additional food to get them through the weekend. The Backpacks for Kids Weekend Nutrition Program also supports the Food For All We Act Program at the high school. This year, for the first time, the program is sponsoring a summer food nutrition program in cooperation with the Jefferson County Library in Chimacum and Irondale Community Church.

Backpack food programs have been shown to increase school attendance, decrease behavioral problems, increase self-esteem, and ease student and family anxiety, all resulting in a positive impact on society in general. It costs about \$250 to feed one child per year, and we are striving to have a community sustainable program. As a concerned resident, you may be asking yourself "How can I help?" Here are some ideas:

- Volunteer: Helpers are needed to pack and deliver food on a weekly basis during the school year, shop for food, help with community outreach, keep the books, help with fundraising activities and more.
- Attend our annual fundraiser "Brew Fest by the Bay" Oktoberfest, to be held on **Saturday, October 7**, from noon - 4:00 p.m. at the Bay Club. Come enjoy an afternoon of sampling local brews, brats, great music, raffle, and silent auction. Tickets are on sale now at Brown Paper Tickets and will be available at the Bay and Beach clubs beginning **Friday, September 1**. Visit the Brew Fest by the Bay website, brewfestbythebay.org, for more information.

- Donate silent auction or raffle items for the Brew Fest.
- Make a one time or on-going monetary donation. All contributions are tax deductible and you will be mailed a receipt for your tax records. This program is run entirely by volunteers, so all donations and profits from the Brew Fest go directly to purchase food for the program. This summer we are moving the packing location to 10 West Valley Rd, Chimacum, the former site of the Tri Area Food Bank. So please, come join us when school starts this fall for some laughter and fun as we pack food bags every Thursday at 10:30 a.m.

Jefferson County Sheriff's Foundation - A Community Partnership

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Foundation (JCSF) is patterned after dozens of other volunteer law enforcement foundations in the United States; it is not sponsored, affiliated, or controlled by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. It was organized in 2003 as an independent organization to provide much needed financial support for programs and activities that are beyond the reach of public funding.

Our goal is not to displace funding for basic law enforcement or to reduce, in any way, the responsibility of Jefferson County to commit the necessary funding for law enforcement services for its citizens. As modern law enforcement tasks continue to become more complex, our Sheriff's Office, like agencies across the country, has increasing needs to stay current in training, technology and equipment, and communication and partnership efforts with the community.

JCSF is a not-for-profit Washington State Corporation, organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes within the meaning of section IRS Code 501(c)(3). The foundation is qualified to receive tax deductible bequests, devices, transfers, or gifts under sections 2055, 2106, or 2522 of the Internal Revenue Code. Donations are deductible to the full extent allowed by law.

Who are we really? We are volunteers who have a desire to help provide services that are not presently affordable within the county budget to our communities. The Foundation Board is made up of ten members, all of whom have backgrounds in Law Enforcement, and who volunteer in departmental services and in the business community.

We maintain a close relationship with the Sheriff who, from time to time, identifies items of equipment that would assist or protect the deputies or programs and that he would like to include in service to the community. Our job is to evaluate the request, determine the costs involved, and try to find a way to fund the project.

It is our intent to provide the community with several topics relating to law enforcement that will help provide understanding and assistance to all community members. Eventually, it will include Inventory Sheets for valuable items in your home, Emergency Phone Numbers, Traffic Safety (including vehicles, pedestrians, and bicycles), Crime Prevention tips and techniques, Neighborhood Watch information, Animal Control rules and safety along with Center Valley Animal Rescue information, and Boating safety.

Also, we will be including the history of the JCSF, History of Law Enforcement, History of Western Law Enforcement, and Terrorism. There will even be a section where you as a citizen may make a tax-deductible donation to the JCSF. But in the meantime, donations will be gratefully accepted at the following address: Jefferson County Sheriff's Foundation, P.O. Box 15, Port Hadlock, WA. 98339.

Ken's Gardening Corner

I'll bet most of you backyard farmers are enjoying a bumper crop of vegetables this summer. This, I must say, is my first year trying an experimental farm. It has been a lot of hard work and more than a few pitfalls, but the reward of growing your own food is something special.

I have had a lot of success this year with "Merlot" and romaine lettuce varieties, snap and snow peas, potatoes, onions, spinach, and Swiss chard. Some of the crops not doing so well are celery, carrots, and herbs from seed. The jury is still out on my artichokes, corn, and zucchini.

As far as pest problems, it is the same old story—slugs. Good organic slug control methods include handpicking, habitat modification, traps, copper barriers, and commercial baits based on iron sulfate. Now, on a lighter note, here is a wise tip for you sharing types. When you are handing out your excess lettuce to friends and family members, please make sure you check thoroughly for slugs. And, yes, I did let a few slip by recently. "Escargot, anyone?" At least you know the vegetables are organic.

Help plants beat the heat in the garden by keeping soil consistently moist. A one-two punch of mulch and regular irrigation is the key to get through these last couple of hot months. If rainfall is fairly scarce, which has really been the case lately, water rhododendrons, azaleas, and camellias weekly. These shrubs are currently setting buds for next year's flower show, and drought will diminish bud formation.

You'll also enjoy a healthy berry crop on hollies and fire-thorn when you irrigate shrubs during times of drought. Lack of water causes immature berries to drop. And, after watering lawns and landscape plants, don't water again until the top 1 - 2 inches of soil have dried out. On a final note, try fertilizing with a natural organic fertilizer like fish emulsion every couple of weeks. You'll have great results! Eat Healthy and Happy Gardening.

Port Ludlow Remembers Those Who Defended Our Freedoms

There are many ways to celebrate our nation's heritage. On July 4, we celebrate America's independence with parades, barbecues, and fireworks. On Veterans Day, we honor those who served in the military during all wars in which the U.S. has fought; veteran's organizations hold parades, and the President places a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery. On Memorial Day, we commemorate U.S. men and women who died while in military service by placing flags on graves, and holding Flag Retirement Ceremonies in their honor. These celebrations are all traditions that remind us who we are, and the sacrifices that were made to create the United States of America.

In 2002, a tradition began in Port Ludlow when Captain Jerry L. Conover, USMC (ret.) founded an organization called the Olympic Peninsula Conservation and Heritage Committee. The Committee envisioned a Flag Retirement Ceremony that brings the whole Port Ludlow community together to remember sacrifices that were made for our nation. The ceremony, usually held in Port Ludlow on Memorial Day with a military honor guard and performance by a local singing group, took place on Flag Day, June 14, this year. Members of the community submitted old or damaged American flags dedicated to the memory of a person, place, or event, and each flag was burned separately, in accordance with national standards.

"These dedications serve to memorialize the sacrifices of many Americans whose honor and bravery helped to secure a safer, more free country for many generations. We are thankful to those Americans and their families," read Tom Carter at the opening of the ceremony. This year's dedication, with the burning of the first flag, was for "Jerry Conover – US Marines, Field Artillery Officer, who served in Korea and Vietnam and received three purple hearts" – a fitting tribute to the man who organized the first event in Port Ludlow.

Several dedications told inspiring stories of sacrifices that were made. Lt. Col. Richard C. Ragle, U.S. Army Air Corps, B17-pilot, was awarded the Air Medal for detecting and bombing the Imperial Japanese carrier force during the raid on Dutch Harbor, Alaska, in June 1942. In January 1945, Captain Robert Prince, 6th Army Ranger Battalion, led the raid inside Japanese lines to rescue 551 American POWs who had survived the Bataan Death March. Prince was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. First Lieutenant Jerome Earl Moore, 367th Infantry, died of wounds received during the battle of St. Mihiel in

World War I and is buried in the American Cemetery in Thiaucourt, France. General Simon Bolivar Buckner, Jr., U.S. Army, the highest-ranking U.S. officer killed in World War II, led the invasion of Okinawa in 1945.

PLFR Participates in Wildland Fire Exercise

Saturday, June 17, was a Red Card day for several fire-fighters in Jefferson County who took part in a Wildland Firefighting Exercise. In all, 32 firefighters and five instructors from multiple agencies participated in a day-long training at Port Ludlow Golf Course's Trail Nine. Those agencies included Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue (PLFR), Department of Natural Resources (DNR), U.S. Forest Service, and Olympic National Park.

Skills testing included "wildland urban interface/structure preparedness" using a variety of wildland firefighting equipment, progressive hose lays, fire line construction, entrapment avoidance, escape routes and safety zones identification, fire shelter deployment, and a water supply securement by utilizing portable pumps and a water tank to supply hose operations. A live fire demonstration concluded the exercise.

Ten firefighters earned their Red Cards after this exercise, including two from PLFR. A Red Card is an Incident Qualification Card and is used by state, federal, and other fire agencies who work cooperatively with the National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG). A Red Card is issued to an individual who has demonstrated proficiency in wildland fire incident response including positions in logistics, finance, and planning, as well as, physical fitness requirements. Olympic Peninsula fire districts are surrounded by public lands and our fire personnel often

Port Ludlow Performing Arts Fundraiser Concert

Paolo Alderighi and Stephanie Trick, now husband and wife, were internationally acclaimed jazz pianists prior to their meeting at a Swiss music festival in 2008. The merging of these two great talents has led to an unstoppable team, bringing to the stage outstanding stride, boogie, and blues piano music. Port Ludlow Performing Arts (PLPA) will be honored with their presence on **Friday, August 25**, at 7:30 p.m. at the Bay Club.

Paolo Alderighi, from Milan, Italy, received a diploma at the G. Verdi Conservatory in Milan. After graduating with honors from the Bocconi University, he began devoting himself to jazz music. Winning the prize as “best young musician” at the Breda Jazz Festival in 2004, he was also named “the best jazz pianist rising internationally” by the critic and journalist Franco Fayenz. In addition to receiving many other accolades and awards within the field of jazz piano, he was named “Best New Talent” by the Musica Jazz magazine in 2007.

Stephanie Trick, from St Louis, Missouri, “has come to practically dominate the stride piano field,” notes reviewer Jack Rummel. Harlem stride piano, which developed in the 1920s and ‘30s, is an orchestral style of two-handed

piano playing that not only swings, but also is technically demanding and exciting to watch. A classically trained pianist, Stephanie began playing piano at the age of five and developed an interest in jazz in high school. Stephanie was the 2012 recipient of the prestigious Kobe-Breda Jazz Friendship Award. Her solo “Live” CD was awarded the “New Talent Prize 2011” by the Hot Club of France.

After meeting in 2008, Paolo and Stephanie started a four-hands piano project dedicated to classic jazz, preparing arrangements of songs from the swing era, as well as drawing from the Harlem stride, ragtime, and blues repertoire. They have performed internationally in jazz and music festivals around the world and have recorded four CDs together. In 2014, they played for the Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall at the Edinburgh Jazz & Blues Festival.

You don’t want to miss this incredible evening of ragtime and jazz stride piano duos. This concert is not part of the PLPA 2017 - 2018 series, but is a special fundraiser for the Martha Dawson Education Fund which supports the outreach programs for Chimacum and Quilcene schools, including the “Adventures in Music” program for elementary students, instrument rental scholarships, and the Loren and Mark outreach concert at Chimacum High School.





Port Ludlow Village Council

Village Council (PLVC) Report

by David Mc Dearnid, Secretary

President Dean called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. in the Beach Club. T. Mc Dearnid, Nilssen, Deering, Frenzl (SBCA), and Umbreit were present. A quorum was determined.

Jefferson County, Commissioner Kler: Kler spoke of the need for affordable housing, about a proposed property tax levy to tackle the rising housing and rental costs. A public hearing is scheduled for July 24 at the Court House. It is unclear if it will be on the November 2017 ballot. The Department of Community Development (DCD) will be identifying unnecessary housing regulations. Kler reported on passage of the State budget that includes funds for the Emergency Management Department (EMD). During state emergencies, the EMD coordinates response to ensure help is provided quickly and effectively to those in need.

PLA Developer Report, Diana Smeland: Smeland reported that the new Jefferson Healthcare facility, at Paradise Bay Road and Breaker Lane, will host an open house on **Friday, August 18**, at 3:00 p.m. The existing Jefferson Healthcare facility on Oak Bay Road will provide dermatology services. Smeland reported there are 13 lots available in Ludlow Cove and 33 lots available in the Olympic Terrace II (OT II). Affordable housing issues were raised. There are no plans to develop affordable housing, though some homes in the OT II are priced near \$370,000. Regarding attracting a supermarket, Smeland said studies maintain there isn't a large enough customer base here; the Village Market is planning minor upgrades. Several town center beautification projects are underway, including restriping the market parking lot and trimming trees. Regarding building senior housing here, costs for such a facility are a barrier to moving forward.

Teal Lake Fireworks: Dean reported that, historically, fireworks have been set off over Teal Lake. This July 4, Olympic Resource Management (ORM) and the Fly Fishing Club coordinated with PLVC to tape off Teal Lake parking lot and post signs indicating the illegality of setting off fireworks in Jefferson County. There were no fireworks there this year.

Tala Point Development: Dean reported that ORM applied for a development permit in late 2008 to construct 54 homes on 250 acres. Lots would be 1 to 1.5 acres with 65% of the land left to reserve tracts. The project was put on hold in 2009. ORM has advised the County they would reactivate the application. A public hearing on the development is to be scheduled. Potential concerns include:

Recycling Report: K. Austin Kerr spoke of the importance of recycling in Jefferson County. Recycling reduce costs of using landfills and leaves a smaller human footprint. He distributed Recycling Volunteer buttons to attendees and urged residents to follow recycling guidelines, especially flattening cardboard boxes. The County has contracted with Skookum, who employs veterans and persons with disabilities, to haul recycling.

Community Welcome Event: Dean reported the Welcoming Committee is hosting a "Welcome to Your Neighborhood" event on July 12 at the Bay Club from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Social, sports, and service group representatives will be there.

Emergency Management: Dean introduced Danille Turissini, Port Ludlow Emergency Management Director. A Block Captain Fair will be held at 4:00 p.m. on July 25 at the Bay Club. During an emergency, Block Captains transmit information between residents and the EMD.

Sewer Outfall Lease: Dean reported the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) advised Olympic Water and Sewer Inc. President Gil Skinner called the meeting of the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) to order on Friday, July 14 at 9:30 a.m. All directors were present. President Skinner welcomed attendees and described the meeting protocol. The agenda was approved. The minutes of the June 9 meeting were approved.

President Skinner reminded the audience of the monthly Tuesday night free movies and suggested that the activities committee could use additional volunteers.

Manager's Report:

A flag retirement ceremony was held on Flag Day thanks to the efforts of Gil Skinner, Tom Carter, and staff members Marie and Patrick.

Patrick Steeger gave notice of his resignation as his orders came in earlier than planned. He is off to begin his career in the U.S. Marines.

One of the card tables has been moved from the Card Room to the Great Room and contains a puzzle which all are invited to work on. New games have been acquired for the game room and croquet, badminton, and a bocce ball set are ready for members outdoors use.

Landscape projects are being prioritized. A new heat pump will soon be installed for the pool and the reserve study should be completed next week.

Roof repairs are scheduled for later this month or August. We are still waiting for bids for the entry pillar repair and new check-in software is being reviewed.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer, Dan Quail reported \$555,017 in current assets at the end of June, and \$6,105 of member assessments were transferred to the reserve account. Total operating funds are \$24,317. Total construction related accounts are \$159,440 and total reserves including capital improvement fund is \$135,878.

June operating expenses were \$55,749 and reserve expenses were \$36,756.

ARC Report:

Vicki Derrenberger reported that representatives from all the villages will meet in August. The next ARC meeting is on July 21.

Activities and Amenities:

There will be a sign-up sheet at the annual meeting for people who are interested in either sharing their home and Thanksgiving meal with others in the community or would like to be a guest at someone else's home.

There is an end of Summer Games Day and Barbecue scheduled for Thursday, August 31. Many activities are planned for this event.

Facilities:

The previously approved allocation of \$600 for moving the speakers to the center of the stage in the auditorium was rescinded as new information showed that an improvement in sound quality was unlikely to occur with this move.

Additional contributions will be needed to complete the Bay Club interior design project. Two designs will be available for SBCA members to comment on and the project will not be started until it is funded. No timeline is currently available.

A motion to hire an arborist not to exceed \$2,000 to determine regaining our water view passed. This may be funded as a special project of a landscape budget item.

Finance Committee:

Year end expenses were reviewed.

Since some homeowners have paid off their special assessment, part of those funds can be used to pay down our existing loan.

There will be roof repair and heat pump expenses next month.

JCHS First Friday - The Food Co-op

The Jefferson County Historical Society's First Friday Lecture on **August 4** will be "Sharing Stories - the Food Co-op." A panel of current and long-time Food Co-op members will tell stories of their time at the Co-op. The audience members may then share their stories or ask questions.

The Food Co-op has been in business for almost 50 years. It started in the spring of 1970 in Grant Logg's store, Funk Candle, in the N.D. Hill building space currently occupied by Pacific Traditions Gallery. Logg went to Seattle and bought some rice candies and a few bags of beans and grains which he sat around the shop.

"About two months later, someone at the Health Department came and said, 'Oh, you've got food. You should put those beans up on the shelf anyway.' 'Tough bunch,'" Logg said in a JCHS oral history.

Logg was joined by some friends who thought they should get a bit more organized and form a co-op. They moved uptown to Tyler Street into the space that's now Pane d'Amore, got a big pot belly stove for heat, and incorporated as the Food Co-op in 1972.

By the time Gale Wallis, who will be leading the First Friday discussion, arrived in Port Townsend in December of 1983, the Co-op was over ten years old. It was now in the renovated old bus barn (currently the Land Trust) where it had moved in 1979.

Wallis was a bit different from the young people with counter-culture sympathies who were being drawn to Port Townsend in the 70s and early 80s. "I came from L.A. wearing pantyhose and stiletto heels," said Wallis. Wallis joined the Food Co-op soon after coming to Port Townsend.

"They were hungry for people who could run a cash register, and at the time I was a CPA and could handle a cash register," said Wallis.

The Co-op continued to grow and change until a larger space was necessary. In 2001, the Co-op moved into their current location which had been the old bowling alley. In 2005, they bought the building.

Gail Wallis has witnessed decades of changes and can still be found manning the cash register. "The Co-op truly has shaped my life. I learned so much just sitting there listening to people talk in a way I'd never heard before, and that shaped me," said Wallis. Some things change, but some things stay the same. "Grant Logg comes through my line at the Co-op, and I scan his tofu along with everyone else's," said Wallis.

The First Friday Lecture will be at 7:00 p.m., **August 4**, at the Jefferson Museum of Art and History, 540 Water Street, Port Townsend. A \$5 donation is suggested.




