



## Pope's Management Team, Development Update

### Meeting with New Pope Resources Execs

Recently David Graham, President of the Village Council, met with Allen E. Symington, new Chief Executive Officer and Chairman of Pope Resources and its subsidiary Olympic Resource Management. David L. Nunes, who has been appointed to the position of Chief Operating Officer and President, was also at the meeting. Although the visit was in the form of a get-acquainted session, Graham came prepared with a concise list of questions on issues that concern our community.

From the outset both Symington and Nunes emphasized that although they are primarily timber people and not fully up to speed on issues relating to the Port Ludlow community, they are aware of promises given to the Village. They wanted to assure the community that any commitments made in the past would be honored. Further, they told Graham that Pope Resources has exercised extreme caution in contacting any proposed developer. They are convinced the companies with whom they have been talking would be compatible with the community, respecting the feelings of, and where possible, the desires of its residential owners.

Symington and Nunes also said it is Pope's intention that the results of the Forum process would be implemented when all is said and done. They stressed Pope would not have invested the great amount of money expended to date to bring things to this point in time if that were not the case.

Symington has thirty years' experience in the timber industry and Nunes has fifteen years' experience in forest products. Nunes was promoted from within Pope Resources. They both indicated they have absolute confidence in Greg McCarry and Jon Rose and are certain they will be able to address the concerns presented by Graham.

When questioned further about the new developer, they said the primary organization under consideration is very knowledgeable in resort development and very financially sound. They felt if things do come together, the community would be very pleased when they learned who it is. They explained non-disclosure agreements are in effect so they could not elaborate further. However, they assured Graham that as soon as information could be released, it would be transmitted to the Village Council for dissemination to the community.

### Graham's Perspective

Following his meeting with Symington and Nunes, Graham was asked for his comments on the position of the Village Council. He replied that he felt although the community may not have standing in a legal sense, it does have legitimate concerns that should be addressed by the parties participating in the disclosure process.

During the interview with Symington and Nunes, Graham had pointed out there are long-standing relationships of privilege for residential property owners in effect with Pope that are not protected by any documents or contracts developed between Pope and Jefferson County. He cited as examples various special benefits to the golfing and boating community of Port Ludlow. Graham also stressed that issues of concern, such as the close proximity of the new Resort to both Beach Club and several residential owners' properties, must be addressed in a reasonable perspective.

Also mentioned during the meeting with Symington and Nunes was an issue previously discussed on a number of occasions—namely, the growing need for a large meeting room to solve the increasingly crowded conditions experienced at certain Bay and Beach Club events. Graham stated during the post-meeting interview, that if all or a portion of such a room were designed acoustically to be of theater quality, it would benefit both the Arts Council as well as Resort management in attracting top talent to perform locally.

Graham said the Village Council considers itself a third party of interest and as such represents the needs and concerns of the community. He indicated he respects the need for confidentiality while negotiations are underway and looks forward to meeting with the new developer when possible so he can assure the community their concerns will be addressed.

Graham further stated the Village Council will need to act on the formation of a transition team to study issues of significance that are sure to surface as we move into the next phase of the development of the Master Planned Resort. Issues of open space, traffic flow and the relationship between the new developer and the community would be addressed as well as the implementation of issues presented by the Planning Forum.

Graham said while he is satisfied that Pope Resources management is acting in good faith and that their management has been very open and forthcoming, he feels it is



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imperative that all concerns of the community are addressed. Consequently, as soon as possible and appropriate, on the recommendation of Al Symington, he will ask Jon Rose and Greg McCarry to respond to the questions he originally submitted to Symington and Nunes.

Graham concluded by saying, "We want to assure the results of the Forum process, as a minimum, are honored by any new developer." He noted that Symington had stated during the interview meeting that this is Pope's intention. Graham further concluded, "I believe we have received the required assurances from Al Symington and David Nunes, and are well on our way to achieving a copaceti goal."

## Village Council September Meeting

### Plea for Support

Superintendent of Chimacum Schools, Mary Lynn Der-rington, made an impassioned plea for support of the school levy. She told the Council the local School District is only asking for \$1.71 per thousand while the Washington State average is \$2.52 per thousand. While there were 269 levies on the State ballot in the last election, only four were not approved—and one of those was ours. Because the Chimacum levy failed by only 14 votes, a huge impact is being felt throughout the School District. Ms. Der-rington invited the Council to tour the new Chimacum Creek School. She also told them the new Band Director is looking forward to entertaining in the Village.

### OPG Announcements

Jon Rose of OPG announced that Olympic Resources has a new Chief Executive Officer and a new Chief Operating Officer. Al Symington, formerly of Simpson Logging, is the new CEO. He lives in the Edmonds area and will be commuting for the time being. Rose also said that Dave Nunes had been promoted to the office of COO. David Graham, President of the Village Council, will be meeting with these new officials. (See article on page 1.) Rose also reported that the blasting in Creekside is just about finished with only one more blast anticipated. When asked if an unsatisfactory conclusion to negotiations between the town home owners and OPG would have a significant impact on the build-out of the Resort, he responded that it could have a serious impact and that he could not discuss specific details. He also reported that serious negotiations are ongoing with a potential developer and that the Resort planning is on track.

### 20-Year Planning Committee

Stan Kadesh reported that the Committee expected to present its amended plan to the Council for approval within the next month.

### Major Medical Emergencies

Chief Wayne Kier reported that helicopters had to be dispatched on two occasions this past month. He explained that he made the decision to use helicopters instead of conventional ambulances because of the seriousness of the injury and illness. He reported that both patients are doing well. He also told the Council that the Coast Guard Auxiliary now has a mutual aid agreement in place. He said that he had an occasion to alert them once this past month but fortunately they weren't needed.

### Disaster Response Demonstration Day Planned

Marie Lytal told the Council a large turnout was expected for the Disaster Day event at the Village Center in mid September. She also said there would be a repeat of last year's Microchip Clinic for Pets on the same day with Dr. Tony Rogstadt of the Chimacum Veterinarian Hospital in Hadlock again providing this service.

### Land Use

Tom Hansen, a Bellevue resident and former Bellevue Councilman, who owns five acres adjacent to the Village Church, addressed the Council. He told the Council he would appreciate their help in getting his parcel rezoned so he could pursue the possibility of an assisted living center. He described a long series of communications with Pope Resources during the George Folquet era and with Jefferson County over the status of this property. At question was whether the property was intended to be a residential lot or a commercial lot similar to Bert Loomis' corner property. Mr. Hansen felt it had been intended to be commercial, but in the end the County judged it not to be.

Bert Loomis and David Graham told Mr. Hansen that although they empathized with his predicament, in their opinions applying for a zoning change would wind up virtually fruitless. In addition, Mr. Loomis pointed out that the area of some 35 acres in the triangle between Paradise Bay and Oak Bay Roads has been set aside for commercial use. In his opinion this area appears to be not only compact, contiguous and segregated from residential units, but also completely adequate in size for Port Ludlow's future commercial needs including assisted living.

Sally Smith noted that a central and contained commercial center was the desire of Port Ludlow residents during the Forum Process. She also stated that use of Mr. Hansen's lot had never been brought to the table during the long negotiation process leading to zoning approval. Finally Mr. Graham noted that the sloping topography of Hansen's lot and its location across Oak Bay Road did not appear to provide practical access for senior citizens from a care center desiring to visit commercial buildings located below.

The next meeting of the Village Council is scheduled for **Thursday, October 5th**, at the Beach Club.



We are all concerned about fraud, and appalled when we read about big frauds involving millions of dollars. But what about the little scams occurring unnoticed virtually everyday? Coffee is one of those.

I enjoy coffee, particularly the new latte and espresso drinks that are so popular. When I order a coffee drink I usually order the larger size and expect to be getting more coffee. Would you believe that in some establishments when you pay for a large coffee, all you get is more steamed milk? An example is the QFC Market where you must pay for every extra shot. That's right. You get the same amount of coffee in their large size that you get in the small—unless you pay for the extra shot!

Contrast this with:

### Starbucks Coffee Company

Tall Caffe Latte	=	1	shot of espresso
Grande Caffe Latte	=	2	shots of espresso
Venti Caffe Latte	=	2	shots of espresso

### Tully's

Short (8oz.)	=	1	shot of espresso
Tall (12oz.)	=	1	shot of espresso
Grande (16 oz.)	=	2	shots of espresso
Veinte (20 oz.)	=	3	shots of espresso

### Java Port, Port Hadlock

Large	=	2	shots of espresso
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When I pointed this problem out to the manager of the QFC Market, he said it was a corporate decision and he couldn't do anything about it. So the lesson is this: Ask how many shots of espresso are included in the large drink. If you're told they'll only give you one, say "no thanks!"

## Digital Cable Service Now Available


Millennium Digital Media has its new cable service in place with a few minor exceptions. Some of the digital HBO programs are currently available only in analog mode and the Cable Speed Modem for computer users will not be available until the end of October or early November.

The *Voice* was asked to present the pricing schedule in a readable format. The accompanying chart shows the new pricing. If you are satisfied with the Basic Service you presently have, there is no need to reapply. The new channels will be added to your Basic Service very soon. If you prefer to change to the new digital service you must contact Millennium Digital Media. Basic Service is required in all packages.

The Cable Speed Modem service for computer users will significantly increase your download speed. It comes with up to three e-mail accounts. If you already have cable service and only want to add the Cable Speed Modem, the cost will be \$45 per month for the modem service. With this new system you will no longer need an Internet Service Provider. Those of you who have a dedicated telephone line for your computer will no longer need to

maintain that line as your signal will now be coming in on the same cable as your television programming.

Millennium's new all digital service requires the use of a cable receiver box for each television set you wish to equip with the new programming. One box is included with your service while additional boxes are \$6 per month. Some people have chosen to use their main set to view the new programming and leave basic service on their other sets. In this case you will need only one box, as your other television sets will be able to pick up the basic programming without a receiver.



Millennium currently is offering free installation as a promotion to encourage early signup. Call 1-800-829-CABL to determine if you are still entitled to the free installation and to obtain additional programming information.

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

## Get Fit and Have Fun

Two new exercise classes instructed by North Bay resident Kimberly Dye are being offered at the Beach Club. The first is “Total Fitness” and includes stretch, aerobic, and resistance exercises, which will be held on Tuesdays. The second, “Stretch and Strength” including exercises that promote flexibility, center of body strength, and balance, will be held on Thursdays. The times for both classes are 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. and the cost to Port Ludlow residents is \$70 for ten classes (good for three months); \$10 for a single class. Kimberly brings a world of expertise to these classes she developed. Once a professional ballet dancer with the Philadelphia Ballet, she is now a dance/movement therapist. She incorporates the use of her specially-designed balls and stretch bands that have won major awards in both educational and therapeutic fields for her program. Elasticity is built gradually so muscles can strengthen at a reasonable pace, which prevents initial injury and muscle spasms. Working “the Body Core” not only tones deeper muscle layers but also increases coordination, balance and total body integration. Visual imagery, rhythmic music, and continuous movement give each class its unique appeal.

## Voluntary Simplicity Discussion Group

When do material possessions add meaning to our life and when do they detract? Are there alternatives to the fast pace of our mainstream culture? What are some common misperceptions about a simple life? A discussion group to explore the personal and environmental impacts of simplicity will be formed if there are at least six participants. An introductory meeting to describe the eight-session series and assess interest will be held at the Bay Club on **Wednesday, October 18th** at 9:00 a.m.

Developed by the non-profit Northwest Earth Institute (NWEI), Voluntary Simplicity addresses the distractions of modern society that keep us from caring for our relationships, our environment and ourselves. The course book contains excerpts of essays, articles and books by many well-known writers and scientists. Its combination of literary and fact-oriented readings and discussion questions creates a thought-provoking mix. Questions designed to generate conversation are also provided for each session.

Topics include The Meaning of Simplicity, Living More with Less, Your Money or Your Life, Do You Have the Time?, and How Much is Enough? A class of six to twelve participants will meet for a one to one-and-one-half hour session each week, at a time and location convenient to them. Meetings will include discussions of the week’s ten to fifteen pages of readings. There are no tests or papers, and the only cost for the series is the purchase of the book for \$12.50, which can be shared with other folks if they prefer. As in a book group, there is no instructor; the role of facilitator rotates among the participants.

NWEI was founded in 1993 to provide earth-centered educational opportunities; it is not involved on either side of specific environmental issues. Its discussion courses are designed to be fun and to provide a setting in which participants can examine their ideas, values and habits. Its materials are intended to promote dialogue, not consensus. ## South Bay Board Meeting Update

The last monthly SBCA Board meeting was on Friday, August 25th. In addition there have been several meetings held to discuss the transition from OPG to homeowner control of the Board. The transition issue is extremely important in that it relates to the continuing financial support of the Bay Club by OPG. Issues include carpet replacement, budget shortfalls, reserve fund contributions, etc. The Board has decided to summarize our requests in a letter to OPG and this letter will be finalized at our **Friday, September 22nd** meeting.

Homeowners should be reminded that the master CC&Rs require that homeowners obtain approval for all exterior home modifications as well as landscaping changes. The Architectural Review Committee is in the process of modifying the design standards and identifying what kinds of landscaping improvements must be submitted for approval. On the schedule for discussion at the next meeting is a request to amend the CC&Rs to allow Bayview Village Association to make their own rules regarding landscaping decisions. An initial survey of the Board indicated a negative response to this request.

Financially we are on plan other than the major expenditure for fixing the dry rot on the backside of the Bay Club facility. Although the repairs were made last year, expenses lapsed over to the current fiscal year. The good news is that OPG is providing the money for these repairs. The financial reports are difficult to decipher and a subcommittee has been established to come up with a more user-friendly report. We should congratulate ourselves, as currently there is only one homeowner out of 384 that is delinquent in dues payment.

Bert Goldstein, as the result of his work with the audit committee, has come up with a plan for savings on Bay Club taxes. A letter requesting tax relief for the Bay Club has been sent to the County Assessor.

Jim Callahan has volunteered to look at our insurance program to determine if savings can be made there.

The long-range maintenance schedule developed by Doris Coates, Mike Morgan, Phil Otness, Russ Reed and Larry Smith was reviewed and is an excellent first step toward checking the adequacy of our reserves. This schedule needs to be reviewed at least on an annual basis.

The Board welcomes input to any of your directors: Bob Force, Frosty Foust, Bert Goldstein, Judy McCay, Tom

Murray, Bill Schoenemann and Bob Wilkinson. We also invite your presence at our meetings held on the fourth Friday of every month. The next meeting will be **Friday, October 27th**.

## Bluebills Volunteers Pass 2,112 Hour Mark

Bluebills is a retiree organization dedicated to serving the needs of the community. The Boeing Company supports it but one need not be a Boeing retiree to participate in the Bluebills. The Olympic Peninsula Chapter has exceeded the 2,112-hour mark in volunteering efforts so far this year. At a normal rate of \$35 per hour for the type of jobs we perform, that comes to over \$70,000 (not including materials and supplies).

There are currently 70 active Bluebill volunteers on the Peninsula. Of these, 27 volunteers reside in the Port Ludlow area. There are active (and inactive) volunteers in Jefferson, Clallam and Kitsap Counties. Bluebills participate and respond to the many social services organization requests for assistance. A major focus is on helping the elderly remain in their homes and assisting many charitable organizations such as Woman's Crises Center, Habitat for Humanity and Meals on Wheels. Another focus is on providing for dislocated and poor children. Bluebills also assist in the schools by providing mentoring, conducting an after hours science club and contributing school supplies, materials and books to needy children. These items come from various organizations and are stored in a large warehouse area supplied by Boeing. Books and school supplies have been given to school districts for needy children from Neah Bay and Cape Flattery to Chemicum and Port Townsend.

Bluebills will build wheelchair ramps, help renovate housing for the elderly and poor, and assist social services organizations. They were one of two organizations who recently received a year 2000 Community Action Partnership Award from the Olympic Community Action Agency. The theme is "You make a living by what you earn, but you make a life by what you give." They are always in need of volunteers to assist in single projects or for on-going volunteer opportunities.

The Bluebills are planning an open potluck at the Bay Club on **Wednesday, October 25th** from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Everyone is invited. The featured speaker will tell us about travel opportunities and advice for the senior citizen. We will share our experiences and display materials and photos of our efforts. 



The Board for *Broadway*, our annual song and dance show, is occasionally asked, "What do you do with all that money?" Well, we're proud to tell you what we do with "all that money!"


Our first year, 1994, our profit from ticket sales was just over \$1,000. Since then, our sales have grown to a grand total of \$14,500. Expenses have grown, too—it does take money to put on a good show! However, expenses have been kept to a minimum, totaling \$3,850 for the six years.

It should be noted here that with the exception of a few rentals for specialty acts, (remember Frankenstein's mask?), none of our money has been spent on costumes! Those glamorous, glitzy ones you see on the Rockettes and the cute, bouncy ones on the Steppin' Out gals are created by the dancers themselves at their own expense. This is also true of the ShowTime Chorus and all the specialty performers!

We agreed at the outset that a part of each year's profit after expenses should be used to upgrade the Bay Club auditorium's sound and lighting. Both were, very frankly, pretty bad. We have to date given \$800 toward improved sound equipment and \$2,500 to improve the lighting. This money was augmented by contributions from other theatrical groups, namely the Arts Council and Little Theatre.

Also, each year we have contributed to needs within the greater Port Ludlow community for a total to date of \$2,500. Because its services are so critical to us all, most of that money has been donated to the 911 emergency response team at Fire District #3. It pleased us a few months ago to be able to give \$1,000 to 911 in memory of a very good friend, Moulton Prussing.

As of today, our bank balance is \$4,500, to be used as needed to prepare for our show the first weekend in November. And, there you have it—the "Rest of the Story!"

## Travel Tips

The clouds are different. The air has a crispness we haven't felt for months. Fall is on the way and many Port Ludlow residents will be heading for sunny climates—either in the U.S. or abroad. Before you leave, plan for your return!

If you're traveling internationally, be sure your passport is good for six months beyond your planned holiday. Have you purchased a new camera, computer or other items you'll be taking out of the country? If so, take the receipt with you. You'll then have no trouble with Customs on your return. There is a handy guide published by Customs, *Know Before You Go*, that can save you trouble when you return. The list of items you cannot bring into the U.S. is long and constantly changes, so get the latest copy. You may have seen the Beagle Brigade at airports. These cute dogs are doing a big job in protecting our farms and agriculture by sniffing out forbidden products.

Here is a partial list\* of what is OK to bring back:

- Bamboo (dried poles only, no green at all)
- Beads made of seeds (not jequirity beans)
- Breads, cakes and other bakery goods
- Candies
- Cheeses, fully cured (not cottage cheeses)
- Coconuts (husks or milk must be removed)
- Coffee (roasted beans only)
- Dried foods (including polished rice, beans and tea)
- Fish
- Flower bulbs (no crocosomia, gladiolus and watsonia bulbs from Africa, Argentina, Brazil, France, Italy, Malta, Mauritius, Portugal or Uruguay)
- Flowers (most fresh or dried—but not with roots, except eucalyptus)
- Fruits (canned or dried products only)
- Herbarium plants (no witchweed)
- Herbs (dried for medicinal use)
- Mushrooms
- Nuts (no chestnuts or acorns or nuts without husks)
- Sauces (canned or processed)
- Seaweed
- Seeds (seeds of flowers and vegetables are generally OK. Seeds of woody trees and shrubs require a nursery stock permit)
- Shamrocks (without roots or soil)
- Soup and soup mixes (none containing meat)
- Spices (dried but not curry leaves)

Straw animals, hats, baskets and other souvenirs (no items stuffed with straw)  
Vegetables (canned or processed)

A few minutes of planning will prevent disappointment.  
Have a great trip!

### Myrdelle Teaford's Garden Tips for October

Shop early for the best selection of spring bulbs. Look for those that are plump and firm. Crocus, daffodils, grape hyacinth, scilla and tulips will be on sale this month and can go in the ground immediately. Nurseries still have plants, from 4-inch to 15-gallon cans, often out of bloom, a bit stressed and on sale. Rescue them and plant immediately. Water well after planting. They'll have the fall and early spring months to put down vigorous new roots, and next summer you will have well-established plants.

If you broadcast wildflower seeds over rock gardens, fields and hillsides now, they will bloom earlier next year than if you sowed them in the spring. After scattering seed, scratch into the ground with a rake or cover with a light layer of organic matter and water in well.
