## Are Trails Still #1 in Port Ludlow?

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
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Two beautiful maps of Port Ludlow have been in circulation for several years. One is a large four-color brochure with a blue cover, called *Port Ludlow: Pride of the Peninsula*. The other, a stunning booklet developed by artist and naturalist Larry Eifert, is called *The Nature of Ludlow Bay*. Both maps show a fairly extensive trail system winding through Port Ludlow. Unfortunately, to the disappointment of residents and visitors alike, this system does not exist.

Instead, what we have in Port Ludlow is a hodgepodge of mostly unconnected segments of trails and paths ranging in length from the 4.3 mile-long Timberton Loop to the 600-foot path connecting Wells Ridge Court to Oak Bay Road. There are a number of different surfaces, including asphalt, bark chips, gravel, and dirt.

Our "trail system" crosses many different jurisdictions, including South Bay Homeowner Association (SBCA) easements, SBCA's common grounds, Port Ludlow Associates and Olympic Resource Management properties, and LMC greenbelts. Volunteers usually have either called the Developer for help or carried out maintenance themselves, and the result has generally been hit and miss.

While some sections are kept up pretty well, others receive little or no regular maintenance and are slowly falling into disrepair. If things go on this way with no changes, people who want to walk or jog in Port Ludlow will either find trails that are overgrown, covered with debris, or breaking down. They will continue to have to use the sides of the road in those spots where the trail segments do not connect, or they will find no trails at all to the places they want to go.

Port Ludlow Associates plans to build more trails in the sections of Port Ludlow remaining to be developed, but as we are increasingly aware, our community will eventually be "finished." When that happens, Port Ludlow residents will take full responsibility for our Village infrastructure, including our trail system.

The Gilmore Survey commissioned in 1997 by Pope Resources found that good trails were desired in Port Ludlow by more respondents than any other amenity. Who were these people? They were people who jog to stay in shape. They were grandparents who like to take a walk with their visiting grandchildren. They were people who want to be able to walk to visit their friends in a nearby neighborhood. They were dog owners and nature enthusiasts. They were people who simply love a walk in the fresh air. They were all of us.

So we return full circle to the question at the top of this article: Are trails still #1 in Port Ludlow? If they are, now is the time for us to take some strong action. The PLVC Trails Committee is working to lay out some options for the whole community to consider. If you want to know more, you can attend the next Committee meeting, on **Tuesday, April 9**, 1:00 p.m., at the Bay Club.

If you can't attend, watch for some new ideas to be unveiled soon and an opportunity for everyone's opinion to be heard.

## Traffic Safety Classes Offered

After completing an eight-hour AARP 55 Alive Driver Safety Program, participants are eligible to receive a discount on car insurance in Washington State. The discount is usually 5 to 10 percent for two to three years depending on the insurance company. This class is an excellent reminder of what could happen if one doesn't pay attention to driving, plus it will give you tips on how to successfully handle common driving problems. 55 Alive is classroom learning only. The cost of \$10 per person covers the materials.

## An Alternative to Conventional Ferry Service

Local entrepreneur Len Spinner has come up with a method to provide transportation during the Hood Canal bridge closure in 2006. Spinner, who served in the US Navy during World War II, is acquiring an LST (Landing Ship Tank) from the Bremerton war surplus store. He is confident that he can still pilot the ship. For those of you not familiar with this ship, it has large clamshell doors on the bow that open to allow entrance and exit of tanks at a beach-landing site. They were also used for general cargo, locomotives, railroad cars, and all types of vehicles, prisoners, casualties and numerous other purposes.

Spinner is looking for an appropriate beach site in Port Ludlow and in Seattle. The fare for transporting you and your car to Seattle will be \$345, which includes a box lunch. Transit time is estimated at six hours in good weather, two days in bad. Spinner suggests you bring sleeping gear just in case. All passengers are reminded that they must move to the rear of the vessel when it approaches the beach to insure that the proper angle will be on the bow.

Spinner is meeting with the officials of the Washington State Department of Transportation on **Monday, April 1**,\* to discuss his proposal. Based on some of the alternative plans suggested, he is confident his idea will be welcome. Investors may contact him directly.

## What Will You Do When the Bridge is Out?

The transportation arrangements for residents of the Olympic Peninsula for the period of the Hood Canal Bridge closure in the spring of 2006, read like a trains, planes and busses thriller. But the bottom line is, there most likely will be a passenger-only ferry from South Point to Port Gamble. In case you're not familiar with South Point, it is south of the bridge and accessed off State Route 104 west of Teal Lake Road. As PLVC Vice President Carol Saber said in disbelief, "and what do we do when we get to Port Gamble?"

For those attending the March PLVC meeting, what wasn't said regarding the Bridge closure may be much more important than what was. The questions we should ask ourselves and the community are: How concerned are we? What personal plans are we making? Do we intend to lobby for ourselves? How? Will the Village Council be holding public interest meetings? Will those meetings result in contact with Olympia? Are we contacting our elected representatives? And how practical are we being in working toward no disruption of our lives?

As Joan Bruce, who was here the last time the Bridge went down, so practically put it "you learn to deal with it." She suggested a more resourceful attitude by residents would serve us well. Decide what trips and appointments we can change. Make alternate shopping and entertainment choices. What vacations can we take to keep us away from the challenge, and concentrate on addressing the emergency issues. Perhaps we should be looking to local doctors and hospitals to work with Seattle, Silverdale, and Bremerton providers to set up temporary services here, rather than trying to move everyone needing attention through the drive, park, bus, ferry, bus process. Perhaps we have become too dependent on someone else looking out for us.

## Bluebills “Builders” Expand Northwest Passage

The Olympic Peninsula Bluebills (OPB), a volunteer retiree organization, recently undertook a construction project to expand the Northwest Passage Thrift Store in Chimacum. Northwest Passage is an umbrella organization that raises funds for the Olympic Peninsula Community Action Programs (Olycap). They support and operate centers for preschool to women, families in crisis and elder care assistance.

Last August, Northwest Passage was given the opportunity to open another thrift store in the former Swan Nursery and Grocery Store located near Nesses Corner. Bluebills assisted in preparing the store by building shelves and racks, painting inside areas, and other tasks. The operation has proven to be a success. Clothing, toys and other household gifts are donated and sold to the public with proceeds going to support Olycap programs. If you have donations that are saleable, you can drop off the items at the store which has many hidden treasures (other person’s “surplus”) and is worth browsing.

Northwest Passage was in need of more area, and in December Bluebills agreed to build an additional 500-plus square foot addition to the building. Over a dozen volunteers worked on the project in the three-month period. This was our largest and most ambitious construction project to date. Sometimes our efforts seemed to be a Mack Sennet comedy but our project leader with fortitude and patience guided us good old boys through, and the project was completed.

Bluebills is a Boeing retiree volunteer organization but is open to anyone. ## Monthly Council Meeting

A glorious sunny morning greeted the members of the Village Council, guest speakers and residents. We were fortunate to have Willy O'Neil, Lobbyist to Olympia representing Washington State General Contractors, and Jerry Alb, Washington State Department of Transportation (DOT) Director of Environmental Affairs, who brought us up-to-date on the optimistic outlook for new efficiency in the permitting process necessary for all construction in Washington State. High on their list, and certainly on ours, is the Hood Canal Bridge Project. The good news is the Hood Canal Bridge Project has been designated a *target project*. According to both O'Neil and Alb, that should assure us this project is receiving priority attention, visible to both the Federal and State governments. It is speculated this will speed the remainder of the project and make up for some of the time lost to various delays. The target is 2006. Both addressed some of the state plans for mitigating the inconvenience of the Bridge closure.

Tim Caldwell, a resident of Port Ludlow and General Manager of the Port Townsend Chamber of Commerce, provided a practical handout developed by the Chamber alerting residents of what appears to be Olympia's one-sided view of the closure challenges—getting people off the Olympic Peninsula. Getting tourists and consumable goods to the Peninsula seems of less concern. Mr. Caldwell said the impact of a loss of tourism would affect us all. He also pointed out that Port Townsend is busy advocating its concerns with Olympia.

In summation of the remainder of the meeting: Joan Bruce, Chair of the Fire District Landscaping Committee, addressed the landscape needs for the new Fire Station. Port Ludlow Associates is generously donating staff and equipment to assist. A Volunteer Beautification Day is being planned with lunch provided for workers. A report was submitted regarding PLA's Wedgewood Plat and the Council was urged to accept it. The PLVC will send a letter to the County confirming their acceptance. Dick Ullmann reminded everyone of the work being done by the Natural Resource Committee and urged all to participate in the "Scotch Broom Sweep." Marge Carter addressed the issue of a marked crosswalk from the foot trail across

## County Tax Assessor to Discuss Property Valuations

One of the purposes of the newly-established PLVC Property Tax Committee is to inform and educate property owners within the community regarding property taxes imposed by Jefferson County and other taxing authorities. Since the first installment of our property tax bills are due on **Tuesday, April 30**, the Committee thought it would be timely to invite Jefferson County Assessor Jack Westerman to address the PLVC meeting on **Thursday, April 4**, 9:00 a.m., at the Bay Club.

In accordance with the established Committee format, the nine-man committee must submit advanced written questions to Westerman who will be allowed a maximum of thirty minutes to answer the ten questions. Members of the Council, Tax Committee and the community will then have a maximum of fifteen minutes in total to ask follow-up questions. Mr. Westerman was asked to respond to the following questions at the **April 4** meeting:

1. What is the total assessed property value for Jefferson County in 2002?
2. What is the total assessed property value for Port Ludlow (within the MPR) in 2002?
3. How many separate tax parcels are there within Port Ludlow?
4. How many separate tax parcels does Port Ludlow Associates have within Port Ludlow?
5. What is the current assessed value of the Port Ludlow Associates tax parcels within Port Ludlow?
6. Please provide an example of what a Port Ludlow home assessed at \$300,000 would pay in property taxes in 2002, and show what the property tax would have been for 1995 through 2001.
7. If a Port Ludlow home sold for \$300,000 in 2001, what would the assessed value be in 2002?
8. If a Port Ludlow commercial building sold for \$500,000 in 2001, what would the assessed value be in 2002?
9. If a Port Ludlow developer created a 14-lot subdivision, then constructed and sold homes on 12 of those lots, how would the developer's remaining 2 lots be

assessed?

10. Would you please provide your official definition for: unimproved land, improved land and improvements.

## Port Ludlow Disaster Preparedness Drill

Mark **Saturday, April 13** on your calendar! Port Ludlow is having a Full-Scale Disaster Exercise beginning at 9:00 a.m. You will notice small landscaping flags with plastic Easter eggs throughout the community. These envelopes contain specific disaster descriptions that will paint a picture of the various widespread problems that might occur should we experience a serious earthquake.

Participating in this drill will be the Port Ludlow Emergency Volunteer Disaster Response Teams, the CERT Teams, the local HAM Radio Operators and Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue District #3. Let me introduce you to these organizations.

The Port Ludlow Emergency Volunteer Disaster Response Teams are composed of six Area Coordinators and numerous Captains and Co-Captains who will assess the damage done throughout our community. In each neighborhood, a Captain and their Co-Captains will develop a "snapshot" of their neighborhood's needs. The Captains then transmit this information to a central command point where the various "snapshots" are collated and prioritized producing the "Big Picture" of our Community's needs.

This information is then transmitted by our Local Ham Radio Operators to the appropriate outside agencies as outlined in our State's Disaster Mutual Aid protocols. The organized transmission of this data should assure us of a timely response for Disaster Services. This is more useful than a disorganized, uncoordinated request for help as is typical during a disaster which makes the normal 911 channels overtaxed and less effective.

The Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) are local volunteers trained in Light Rescue Response, Fire-fighting and First Aid/CPR. They should provide our first rapid response to deal with our community's immediate needs prior to the arrival of outside assistance.

Our local Fire Department understands that it will be inundated with calls for service during such an emergency and has provided valuable training and support to our CERT volunteers. During times of disaster, these organizations must work hand in hand in a coordinated fashion to provide the most effective local response, as we are likely to be on our own for a while prior to the arrival of outside help.

We are always looking for additional volunteers. The more volunteers we have should assure a more comprehensive response. We can only depend on a fraction of our volunteers to be “in town” when the need arises, so redundancy is a plus.

Get to know your neighborhood Captains and become part of the team. We hope never to activate our teams, but preparedness is our goal. Feel free to contact me at 437-8059 with any questions.

### Myrdelle Teaford's Garden Tips for April

Now is the time for garden cleanup and fertilizing. Hope you had no damage from the snow earlier in March. I think we can consider April to be spring and safe from freezes.

Plant annual seeds of asters, cosmos, marigolds and zinnias. Take stored fuchsias and geraniums out to sunny spots in the garden. I hope you had a chance to cut them back to encourage new growth. Buy bedding plants while the selection is abundant in nurseries.

To increase your stock of summer flowering perennials, divide them early this month and then replant. Think daylilies, hostas, phlox and summer daisies. Wait until after flowering to divide early flowering perennials. In the meantime you can feed with a high nitrogen fertilizer over the roots after bloom.

Plant bare root from cane berries to ornamental trees.

Election results will be announced and new Board members welcomed. Ballots will be mailed at least two weeks prior to the meetings. Candidate information was printed in the March issue of the *Voice* and will also be sent with the ballots.

## March Meeting of the LMC Board of Trustees

At the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees meeting in March, a forty-one item Spring maintenance and repair list was summarized into the following areas:

- Kehele Park beautification and fencing support for tennis court windscreens
- Landscaping at the Beach Club
- Game room repair and interim change of function to a members' lounge
- Outdoor pool preparation including possible replastering
- New chairs for the Bayview room
- Phone system upgrade when Resort upgrades theirs
- Drinking fountain replacements

The long-debated issue of locks on lockers in the women's dressing room was put to rest by the Operations Committee with the decision to have all locks removed, install a new

bank of lockers and allocate a portion for member rental. Additional repairs and upgrades were mentioned.

Alternatives to burning yard waste were presented. But after a long discussion about whether to ban burning in North Bay, as is now required in South Bay, the Board voted not to do so. The State will have such a restriction in 2006, but at this time North Bay residents must go to Fire District No. 3 to obtain a burning permit and abide by County rules. LMC Regulation I, Article I-10, Outdoor Burning, will be changed to the statement printed on the Jefferson County Fire Protection District No. 3 Residential Burning Permit. Permits for burning will no longer be issued at the Beach Club.

In a separate action, the Board voted not to allow land-clearing fires in any areas within LMC jurisdiction. Contractors may no longer go through Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to obtain \$100 permits to burn on North Bay sites.

Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Chair John Henderson said that there are approximately four new applications for building per month. Approval or disapproval of any request is given in writing. Homes being built in the area by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) are subject to all LMC requirements. When questioned about exceptions to the one-story house ruling, he said his Committee gives careful consideration and sends letters to all neighbors who might be affected to ensure that no problems exist before granting any exceptions. Henderson added that nuisance complaints go to the Operations Committee.

Greenbelt Committee Chair Ross Robson reported that drafts of policy statements on trees and trails are being prepared, as well as the first draft of a five-year plan for the future of greenbelt areas. He reported that a Village Council Committee on trails plans to coordinate the trails system throughout the entire community. With reference to liability, greenbelt trails would be reported to the LMC insurance carrier to assure adequate coverage.

In response to a request from Larry Nobles, Chair of Operations, the Trustees agreed to allocate funds from various sources within the budget (other than from Reserves) to hire Ivo and Lidija Gregov to develop the detailed schematic drawings and specifications necessary for estimation of the Beach Club remodel. Nobles said a

professional estimating firm in Kirkland is being considered. Realistic figures are necessary to plan financing and presentation to the membership for a vote.

In response to a request from the Port Ludlow Volunteer Disaster Services Co-Chair Mark Garcia and the urging of LMC Acting Chair Marie Lytal, the Board voted to give \$500 toward the purchase of radios for co-captains of the Disaster Response Team.

A memorial service for long-time LMC member Art Brunstad will take place at the Bay Club on **Sunday, April 7**, at 2:00 p.m.

The annual ballot presented to the Board contains a request to the membership to apply remaining operating funds at the close of 2002 to the Reserve fund in 2003. Two changes to the governing documents will also go out for vote. One concerns changing both Articles and Bylaws and if passed would give owners of multiple lots additional votes, with a cap of two. The other is a proposed Bylaw change to make the quorum quota to hold a membership meeting the same as required by the State RCW, 34 percent.

The LMC Annual Meeting takes place at the Beach Club on **Saturday, April 20**, at 2:00 p.m.

- Flag pins should be worn on the left side of the body, near the heart.

All Board members were present except Bill Schoenemann and Bob Wilkinson. Barclay Hampton and Tom McCay represented the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). Other homeowners present were Dorothy Miller, Tom and Marge Carter, Maureen Poole, Derek Stone and June Bradshaw.

Treasurer Tony Durham began the meeting with a very positive financial report followed by a membership update stating that we now have 426 dues-paying members and expect to add 29 more by the end of the year.

The ARC report indicated that we are indeed trying to direct consideration of Village matters down to the grass roots level—the individual Villages themselves. The Board President has sent a letter of explanation to all concerned.

“Trees, trees, those wonderful trees”...we all love them or hate them and they will continue to be a bone of contention. One recent incident had neighbors up in arms, but upon review, the individual involved had followed the correct procedures. So, in order to tighten up these procedures, the Board has approved the following course of action:

1. SBCA will provide a list of approved arborists (seven as of this writing) who will be “on call” as needed.
2. The fee for consultation will be paid to the SBCA by the homeowner whose lot is involved.
3. SBCA will in turn pay the arborist.

The Board was generally sympathetic to ARC’s request that there be free communication with the Developer (PLA) regarding development issues which affect South Bay homeowners. Our President attends PLVC meetings, but with 98 percent of all future development occurring in South Bay, direct communication will probably be necessary.

Dorothy Miller, representing the Landscape Advisory Committee, reviewed Spinnaker Way entry concerns which subsequently led to a turnout of about thirty residents on February 26 who did a wonderful job clearing the area. Plans are to follow up with a planting party on March 12. A big thank you to all you volunteers!

The subject of delinquent homeowner dues was brought up and while we have only one, it becomes onerous to the Village concerned. The Board will consult with our attorney on how best to proceed.

The Board agreed to contribute \$200 to the Resort-organized Easter celebration and to buy two additional stools for the Woodwork Room.

Club windows have been recaulked and frames are being replaced as needed. Damaged shingles have been replaced, gutters have been repaired, and the whole building has been generally rainproofed. We are in the process of buying a defibrillator for \$3,000. Just think, soon you can program your heart attack to occur at the Club!

A group is being organized to help plan additional events at the Bay Club. If you have any bright ideas, please contact Maureen Poole at 437-2165. This group is not meant to replace current organizations but rather to augment and increase the overall experience.

## Developer's Questions and Answers

A number of questions have been forwarded to our office. They are printed here with responses.

**Q.** How are sales of your present house/lot inventory going?

**A.** Sales of new homes are continuing; however, compared to last year they are down. The impacts of the economic slowdown in Washington State have certainly taken their toll on Port Ludlow business, both in real estate and the hospitality business. At PLA we are continuously monitoring business and adjusting for changes in forecasted activity. PLA is the same as other businesses that have to adjust business strategies or projects based on economic activity.

**Q.** How is the Resort plan going?

**A.** I met with owners during our February meeting to begin conceptualizing an expanded Resort. Our process is beginning with an evaluation and determination of what is needed. The next step is thinking about locations of various improvements. Part of the planning is delayed by discussions with the owners of the Admiralty condos who participate in the rental pool. As you may have heard, PLA purchased an Admiralty condo and has renovated it in order to demonstrate to other condo owners how PLA would like all condos to look. Admiralty condo owners are being invited to inspect our renovated condo and determine whether they wish to sign up for their own remodel. I expect the process of planning to be completed by summer.

**Q.** Will you be having an open house at the town home project and at the renovated Admiralty condo?

**A.** The new waterfront town homes near the Inn will be completed by May and will feature a furnished model unit. The model will be open each weekend for any residents who want to see it. All residents are certainly welcome to come through the open house. If you wish to see the renovated Admiralty condo, we will open it for tour on **Monday, April 1**, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

**Q.** There are a lot of rumors about a big increase in Golf membership fees, what is happening?

**A.** The story on future membership fees and the Clubhouse are tied together. As you have read, PLA is planning to replace the existing Pro Shop with a new Clubhouse. We have worked on a preliminary design and are meeting with a number of members to determine if the proposed facility meets expectations. The Clubhouse plan and membership benefits are still being worked on and will help determine what the membership fee will be. To help calm down the rumor mill, remember that the Golf Course is a business and the fees will have an economic basis to them and will be priced in our Northwest marketplace. If the pricing is so high that our members quit, then what good is that? PLA's plan is to announce a program by June 2002.

**Q.** What are the Resort's feelings about loss of tourism in 2006 due to the bridge closure? Will you consider shuttle service?

**A.** For those that have not heard, a portion of the Hood Canal Floating Bridge is scheduled for replacement in 2006 resulting in a closure of the Bridge for six to eight weeks. At this time PLA does not have a plan in place. We expect to establish a task force to study the problem and investigate solutions. More to come as progress is made.

## Wedgewood Short Plat

A development plan for three new lots and houses was announced at the March Port Ludlow Village Council meeting. The location of the project is between Bayview Village and the intersection of Ludlow Bay Road and Paradise Bay Road. The lots will feature water views from each of the three lots and will be accessed by private driveways from Ludlow Bay Road. Storm water will be directed to an on-site detention facility to be constructed at the base of a hill.

Since a number of Bayview residents have expressed concern over storm water management for the new short plat, the *Voice* contacted Greg McCarry at PLA. He said, "It is physically impossible for storm water from Wedgewood to get to the Bayview detention pond without a pump system." He said the Bayview Board would have to

give an easement to Wedgewood owners to use the pond even if there was a pump system. Further, he said, "The County has to approve the method of storm water management and there is no plan to use Bayview."

Because the project is bounded by a creek on the East Side, a buffer of trees will be established between Bayview Village and the proposed building sites. A sewer line is already in the road. Contrary to the mistaken belief of some nearby residents, septic systems will not be used according to McCarry.

Jefferson County is processing the Wedgewood project for approval and development is expected to occur in late summer, 2002.

## Development Impact Monitoring

Port Ludlow's 1993 Environmental Impact Study (EIS) set up a condition to evaluate a number of impact issues on an annual basis. The subjects being monitored include development impacts on schools, fire/emergency medical, ground water, Bay waters, sewer connections and traffic. The developer is required to submit a report to Jefferson County each March. Some highlights from this year's report on 2001 activity include:

- 244 lots have been created since 1993 and 143 homes have been constructed during the same period. The construction activity does not include activity by private lot owners.
- 2001 State and local school property tax contributions from new development projects were \$278,178. Since the EIS, the cumulative contribution has been \$1,114,280. In addition to tax contributions, Developer fees paid directly to the School District totals \$106,006.
- 2001 property tax contributions to the Fire District totaled \$68,133. The cumulative total since the EIS is \$225,270.
- Developer fees paid to the Fire District in 2001 totaled \$3,667. The figure was low due to a lull in development activity during the period of the sale of the Port Ludlow assets from Pope Resources to Port Ludlow Associates. Since the EIS, the cumulative total paid to the Fire District is \$47,285.

- All aquifers within the monitoring network showed stable water levels during 2001 that is consistent with previous reporting periods.
- Chloride concentrations have remained stable in all of the monitored wells and are significantly below the State standard for drinking water which is 250 parts per million.
- Monitoring of Bay water samples indicate stable water quality and Class AA water quality standards are being maintained.
- The total number of connections to the wastewater treatment plant at the end of 2001 was 1,178.
- As has been the case in previous years of traffic monitoring, the roads and intersections within Port Ludlow continue to operate at good levels of service.

## Development Confusion?

PLA continues to hear about confusion over the development process in Port Ludlow. I have outlined a number of facts that lead to the process we follow today:

- In 1990, Washington State passed the Growth Management Act (GMA) and gave the Counties three years to bring their Comprehensive Plans into compliance.
- In 1993, Jefferson County's attempt to pass a Comprehensive Plan was appealed and the State invalidated the Plan resulting in a loss of zoning in Port Ludlow.
- In 1996, Pope Resources launched the Port Ludlow Planning Forum to develop a plan jointly between the Developer and the community for the build-out of Port Ludlow.
- Out of the Planning Forum process came a Port Ludlow Zoning Code and the emergence of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC). The PLVC became a liaison group between the Developer and the Community. Pope also agreed to certain Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions on its remaining development properties and agreed to communicate with PLVC on new development plans before submitting projects to the County for approval.
- In August, 2001 Pope sold its Port Ludlow assets to Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). PLA agreed to honor the process of communicating with the PLVC.
- In 2002, PLA outlined a broad development plan for the location of 450 remaining lots to be developed. The plan was discussed at a general PLVC meeting. The protocol for actual development projects follows an agreed upon process between PLA and PLVC.

To follow a typical development proposal, let's use Wedgewood as an example. The project is described on page 22 in this issue.

PLA puts the Wedgewood plan together and forwards the concept to the PLVC's Community Development Committee. The Committee is comprised of 21 members from all areas of Port Ludlow. The purpose of the Committee is to review the project, check compliance with the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions agreed upon in the Planning Forum, and to critique the project. The Commit-

tee then forwards the project to the PLVC for discussion at a general meeting.

A second step for Wedgewood is discussion of the project at the PLVC meeting. The purpose of the general meeting is to describe the project and provide an opportunity for community input. The PLVC may then provide a letter of support if they desire that could be included with the formal application to the County.

The third step is the County's formal development application process. The Wedgewood project is submitted to the County with required forms and development information prescribed in the Zoning Code and Subdivision Ordinance. By definition this is a public process and anyone is allowed to comment during the process. When the County receives our development application, they send a notice to neighboring property owners within 300 feet of a project. The County also reviews an Environmental Checklist which the Developer is required to provide with the application. The County requires that a notice of development be posted on the property and they advertise a 30-day public comment period to allow for citizen input. After the 30-day comment period, the County makes an environmental determination and begins a process leading up to a public hearing with the Hearing Examiner. The Hearing Examiner is responsible for conducting the public hearing, making a determination that the project meets the legal requirements, and then making a decision to approve or reject the project. From beginning to end, the County's formal process is supposed to take 120 days or less.

## Homeowners' Appreciation Dinner

The Resort at Ludlow Bay is planning an evening especially for Port Ludlow homeowners to let them know how much their participation in Resort activities and functions is appreciated. The Homeowners' Appreciation Dinner will be **Tuesday, April 16**, from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m., in the dining room of the Inn and will feature a *Taste of the Mediterranean* menu. \$10 will be collected at the door and hors d'oeuvres will be served.

Resort publicist Capri Brixey says, "The homeowners make Port Ludlow what it is; we owe them no small thanks for making Port Ludlow a place where visitors feel at home and a part of a unique community family."

## Spring Boat Show

A yearly boat show for the individual boat buyer and seller, called the "For Sale by Owner" Boat Show, is set for **Saturday and Sunday, April 13 and 14**, The Resort at Ludlow Bay Marina. ## Protecting your Computer Data

At our recent general meeting, we heard a talk about Internet security from our guests from Ty's Computing in Port Townsend. I thought the talk was well worthwhile and wanted to share some of the information we heard in case you were not able to make the meeting. The basic message is that if you have something on your computer that you would not like to lose, especially if not able to be readily replaced, then you need to do something to secure your computer.

The easy things to do are ones we have talked about all the time and try to impress upon our newer users. You need to be using anti-virus software (keeping the virus definitions up to date) and you need to back up your invaluable data. When you connect your computer to the outside world either through the Internet or by use of e-mail, you potentially open the door anywhere from a small crack to wide open. You become subject to dangerous things (viruses, Trojan horses, theft of your personal information, etc.). To a lesser degree, you become susceptible to questionable or inconvenient things (e-mail Spam, tracking of your browsing or on-line shopping habits, bombardment by ads of all types, etc.).

There are remedies for all of the undesirable security-related things that could happen on your computer. I've already mentioned anti-virus software and backups. You should periodically check for Windows or Office updates from Microsoft (using the Updates option on the Start menu). Microsoft releases security updates as problems are identified and solved. If you have a high-speed connection to the Internet, you definitely want to consider a firewall, either hardware or software. Even with a dial-up connection, you are still susceptible to some of the attacks mentioned above. If you are concerned or actually experience some of these problems, a software firewall may be of good value to you. A hardware firewall may protect you from attacks from the outside, but do nothing from attacks from within (software on your computer which "phones home" with information). I'm not suggesting that you run out and buy lots of new software to combat these problems, but that you educate yourself, think about the

impact and take appropriate action if you feel it is needed. Our friends from Ty's Computing gave us a number of good websites (see below) where you can get more information. The PLCC will be there to help and advise you and we will continue to bring you programs that address these issues.
