Village Council Election Results Summary

Jack Kaelbere, Election Committee Chairman, reported the results of the election at 4 p.m. on Tuesday the 24th of August. Prior to this time all information was maintained as confidential to avoid speculation.

The results of the Port Ludlow Village Council Election:

Elected for the northside: Gene Carmody, David Graham, Frank Siler, Dick Swindler, Dick Ullmann and Della Witt.

Elected for the southside: Bob Force, Carol Saber, Sally Smith and Connie Wilkinson.

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Of the 1412 ballots mailed out, 613 were counted, since a number of ballots were disqualified for voting for more than the number of candidates authorized. Some ballots were marked for only one candidate. Ballots were returned from as far away as Japan and Germany, several were from outside Washington state.

Percentage statistics are: 34% returned from the northside and 62% returned from the south. The overall vote for the Village was 43%. These results are statistically significant considering the usual voter turnout for the Village.

A cocktail party was held on election day to toast the newly elected Council Members and to show appreciation to those who ran but were not chosen.

CLOA's Days Will Soon Be Over



Why All the Fuss about Disaster Planning?

Who wants to think about disasters or plan for emergencies when we're so busy enjoying this beautiful spot we call home?

Because in the event of, say, an earthquake, we could be isolated from the outside world for days and in a sorry state if we don't plan ahead. The Hood Canal Bridge would probably be inaccessible, if open at all, due to roads that were damaged or blocked. Phones and electricity could be out, and the odds are it won't be dry and sunny weather!

There are a great many people right here in our village committed to emergency planning, in conjunction with the Jefferson County Department of Emergency Management, Public Works, Fire District #3, the American Red Cross, the local animal shelter and the region's Amateur Radio Clubs. Did we mention that the Lone Star (Mats Mats) Quarry, Olympic Resource Management, Shold Excavating, Shine Quarry, Cotton Redi Mix and Fred Hill Materials have all offered to help in a disaster with heavy equipment support? Your individual preparation and self-reliance can help these resources be focused where they are most needed, and turn you from a person who needs help into one who provides it.

Whether it's Y2K or a big winter storm, there isn't anything you personally can do to avoid its arrival. But there are many things you can do to prepare for the resulting problems. Consider this: earthquakes occurred in San Francisco and Soviet Armenia within a few months of each other and were of almost equal power. In San

Francisco, 71 people were killed. 25,000 perished in Armenia. The difference was preparation. Take the time—a bit each month—to get prepared in your home. Have those extra supplies on hand. Get to know your volunteer neighborhood captains and co-captains. Plan to attend Port Ludlow's Disaster Awareness Day on **Saturday, September 11th**, and help others by helping yourself.

What is a Disaster?

The dictionary defines a disaster as “a grievous misfortune causing widespread distress and misery.” It also calls it “an unforeseen mischance bringing with it destruction of life or property.” Why then are so many residents giving so much attention in our “Village in the Woods by the Bay” to a comprehensive disaster preparedness plan for our community? What are some of the “unforeseen mischances” that they feel the need to be prepared for? What events could possibly occur in our Port Ludlow that would fit the definition of a disaster?

The most probable disaster events for Port Ludlow, listed in order of probability, are:

- Bad storm. Wind, rain, flooding, snow or a combination of several of these. Most probable effects: loss of transportation, communication, water and power for an undetermined time.
- Earthquake. (There were three in the area the day this article was written.) Most probable effects: loss of transportation from slides and bridge failures; structural damage to homes, making some unsafe to occupy; injuries. Loss of power and water.
- Forest fire in our “Woods.” Most probable effects: Destruction of our shake shingle homes. Many would be homeless. Power and phone lines would be down. Injuries from trying to save homes.
- Tsunami. A major underwater earthquake in the Sound could produce a wave that would hit us in less than five minutes. Most probable effects: The devastation would be extraordinary to a height of approximately 75 feet above sea level.

Other factors besides the disaster itself would influence how we manage our selves and our resources. Consider the time of year, the time of day, the day of the week and where one is. For example, if an event occurs in January there will be cold to combat. If it occurs in August there

will be tourists trapped here with no food, water, shelter or bathrooms. If an earthquake occurs at 3:00 a.m., people will jump out of bed and cut their feet on the broken glass that will be all over the floor from broken windows and dishes. There will be confusion due to poor orientation and an inability to see in the dark without power. If it occurs at 11:00 a.m. more people may be injured because they would be out and vulnerable to falling objects.

If a catastrophe catches us on a weekday, people may find themselves away shopping or at work, and not be able to get back to their homes. If it occurs on a weekend, the number of tourists trapped will be greater. If you are driving, you'll probably be hindered by damaged roads, bridges and ferry landings. Children, pets and the disabled may find themselves alone in a house without power, phone or water.

These problems are real. All the experts say that when they occur (not if but when) your best defense is to be prepared. Learn what help you can expect, when you can expect it and who will most likely provide it. Port Ludlow is developing a community disaster plan, and you can and should take steps to be prepared in your own household and car. Remember—being prepared is like buying an insurance policy: when you need it you can't get it. **You must think ahead.**

Help Self, Help Others With Disaster Supplies Kit

A few Christmases ago in Oregon, a husband and wife gave each other what some friends considered very odd presents: they assembled complete disaster kits for both of their cars. Not flares, jumper cables and window scrapers—they already had that sensible equipment. This couple stocked food, first aid supplies, tools, warm clothing, shelter, sturdy shoes, water purifying agents and other special items. By preparing to be self-reliant, they gave each other the great gift of peace of mind.


Why Plan?

A disaster usually strikes without warning. When it does, emergency services and government agencies may not be able to respond to your needs immediately. Their buildings, equipment, personnel, communications and mobility may be severely hampered by the event. They will be overwhelmed. Utilities may be out for long hours. Experts tell us to plan to be on our own for a minimum of three days.

Contrary to what you may think, the chances of being killed or injured in a disaster are low. More likely you will be unable to live normally in your home. It may be damaged and let in the weather, it may be cold with no heat, you may have no power or water, or it may be too unsafe to occupy. Proper planning and preparation will help you and your family be more comfortable in the event that your home is damaged, or if a disaster strikes while you are driving. By stocking some basic supplies, you can improve your own quality of life. Even relief workers charged with helping others, first attend to their own families. By planning ahead, you become a person able to assist others—instead of one who needs assistance.

Free Information Available

Are you prepared to survive on your own for the first 72 hours following a major disaster such as an earthquake? Information is available in *Family Emergency Preparedness Plan*, a booklet available free from your EP block captain. It includes a list of the six basics you should stock: water, food, first aid, clothing and bedding, tools, emergency supplies and special items, as well as valuable advice on planning for specific disasters and water purification. We urge you to get a copy of the booklet and set a goal of putting a supplies kit together in the next several weeks. We can't stop a disaster from occurring, but we can limit its impact on us and those we love.

Disaster Awareness Day

Disaster Awareness Day will be held on **Saturday, September 11th** from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on the Port Ludlow Village Green, site of the Farmers Market.

Fire District #3 will provide a static display of their trucks and rescue equipment, and live demonstrations on the proper use of fire extinguishers will be held.

Fire Chief Wayne Kier is providing valuable handouts on safety precautions and Julie Garrison, Emergency Director for Jefferson County Emergency Services, will also be participating.

PEP Talk

You take care of your pets' needs daily. Hopefully you are also prepared for their well-being during a disaster and have utilized the guidelines from the August *Voice*.

Very little can be done when that unexpected earthquake or other catastrophe is actually in progress. But here are a couple of tips to keep in mind:

- Bring pets inside immediately, and try to keep them calm. Bringing them inside at the first sign of a problem can keep them from running away. Never leave an animal outside or tied up during a storm.
- If you must evacuate your home, take all your pets with you. Re-read the August column for suggestions on how to proceed if you absolutely must leave your animal friends behind.

Planning Process Moves to County Commissioners

The Jefferson County Planning Commission met on August 18th to discuss the recommended ordinance covering development in Port Ludlow crafted by the mediation attorney and planner Faith Lumsden. Ms. Lumsden got agreement between the participants in the mediation process and she put together an ordinance that satisfied the Planning Commissioners. A number of items of concern were expressed by the Planning Commissioners and these concerns were passed on to the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).

Addressing one of these concerns was LOA Board Member Dave Harris who spoke to the issue of the non-sewer lots on the north side of the Village. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has been drafted by Ms. Lumsden and forwarded to the County Prosecutor and the BOCC for approval. This MOU should protect all lot owners who are not currently connected to the sewer system.

A second issue regarding the possible losses of open space by reconfiguring the residential properties in the Resort area was addressed by Tony Puma. This concern was also passed on to the BOCC. It is understood that the mediation attorney and ORM are in discussions to best resolve this potential conflict.

The process now moves to the BOCC and will be open for public comment. ORM is confident all the issues of concern can be worked out. The Development Agreement between the Developer and the County is also being considered.

Barkley Sound—Paradise Found

Once again the Port Ludlow Paddlers could be seen migrating north with cars full of boats and people strapped to their roofs.

Twenty-eight of our locals became Canadian tourists when they took the ferry to Victoria on their way to catch the coastal freighter "Frances Barkley" in Port Alberni. There was just enough fog to make the three-hour trip on the ship a fairytale-like ride down the Alberni Inlet to the Broken Island Group in Barkley Sound.

Our destination was a new wilderness lodge called Sechart, located on the site of an old whaling station in

the back of the Sound. The lodge was spartan but very comfortable—and the food and staff were outstanding. We had so many places to paddle it was impossible to decide. It seemed every direction had a new island group to explore.

We broke up into three paddling groups and one fishing group. The paddlers explored a different area each day and shared the treasures we saw over dinner and into the evening. The fishermen did well, catching (and releasing) many fish. The salmon kept were up to thirty pounds, and fed the entire group one evening.

Dennis and Kate Madson put the trip together and we have asked them to lock in a week in September 2000. We want to return to where we saw four or five eagles at a time, and to again see the black bear that ate crabs on the beach. A truly great trip.

Our next major trip is to Lake Powell in October, an exciting excursion because of the dozens of narrow channels to explore. It is full at sixteen paddlers. The Port Ludlow Paddlers are over sixty strong now and growing every week. If you would like to grow with us ask a paddler you know (you must know at least one of the sixty!) how to join in.

Visiting National Parks

Thoughtful planning and a few reminders can insure a pleasant and memorable driving holiday:

- Distance is deceiving. If a map identifies a destination as being 60 miles away, that doesn't mean it's an hour's drive.
- Be alert while traveling to and through the park. Watch out for other drivers who are paying more attention to the scenery than the road.
- Call ahead for a bed. Campgrounds and other lodgings fill quickly during peak months.
- Plan for the weather. Snow may be falling in the mountain peaks at the same time the temperature is climbing above 100 degrees in the southern and southwestern parks. Bags should be packed accordingly.
- Be prepared for outdoor activities. Wear sturdy boots or shoes and take along plenty of water, a first aid kit, sunscreen, rain gear and a warm layer of clothing.
- Let someone know where you are going and when you plan to be back.

- Follow the park rules. Stay on marked trails and observe traffic signs.
- Respect, and don't feed, the animals.
- Stop at the visitors center first for information on weather, roads and trails.
- Be doubly safe; don't flash cash. Be cautious of too-friendly strangers.
- No hitchhikers! Many people use the parks for other than relaxation.
- A little planning and caution will assure a great time!

CLOA to Village Council— Smooth Transition Expected

A transition period of less than two months is expected as CLOA (Council of Ludlow Owners Associations) transfers its records and committee information to the newly elected Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC). CLOA, whose 23 voting Association members have met monthly, will assemble as usual on **Tuesday, September 14th** at 9:00 a.m. at the Bay Club. On this occasion, final committee reports will be presented, decisions will be made regarding the dispersal of existing funds and transition expectations will be discussed. The public is, as always, invited.

At press time, it was anticipated that CLOA and the twelve-member PLVC would meet together on **Tuesday, September 21st** at 9:00 a.m. at the Bay Club to jointly discuss the transition. CLOA will provide the Council members with the PLVC Articles and Bylaws, the minutes of the CLOA Self-Governance study group and other appropriate historical information. Also to be conveyed are descriptions of CLOA's standing committees: Natural Resources, Emergency Preparedness, Utilities, Transportation and Long-Term Planning. CLOA is expected to recommend that these committees continue for the foreseeable future, but this will be determined by the new Council.

The Council will also receive a final recommendation from CLOA—that it create several new committees: Finance, Health/Community Services (health care, assisted living), Recreation (golf, Marina, trails, etc.), Community Affairs (e.g. social events, farmers market); Communications and Development Standards. The PLVC must develop its own agenda and processes. Its first task will be to review the Articles and Bylaws and take the appropriate legal steps for incorporation. This is likely to be accomplished by October 1st.

Bowling Group Resumes





Arts Council Announces '99-'00 Season

The Arts Council has arranged a diversified 1999-2000 season designed to reach the broad range of musical tastes found in our growing community. Since 1991, the Arts Council has sought to bring a full program of cultural events to the community so that our residents can enjoy quality events in the Bay Club without lengthy drives and ferry waits.

The new '99-'00 program schedule again includes two tracks, an evening "Mainstage" series featuring four evening performances in concert or cabaret style as well as three more intimate afternoon "Occasional Sunday" performances.

With over 140 rhythm patterns and 420 music styles, a virtuoso organ performance is within reach of every level of player.

He also will play the Technics SX-PR902 Piano which has the touch and feel of an acoustic piano but provides a variety of digitally reproduced piano sounds ranging from a full-sized concert grand for classical performances to a honky-tonk piano for more spirited performances. Falls In Older Adults The Facts ?

Falls are erroneously attributed to old age. ^{one-third one half} Environmental factors cause about 1/3 to 1/2 of all falls in the home. Hazards include slippery rugs or floor surfaces, poor lighting, unsafe stairs and unsturdy shoes.

Health conditions contribute to more than 1/3 of falls among older people. These include dizzy spells, osteoporosis, structural diseases of the feet, stroke, visual impairments and lack of mobility.

Falls create a vicious cycle. Fear of failing is common among older people. This fear may lead to a restrictive lifestyle, reduced mobility and isolation. Reduced mobility may precipitate more falls because of muscle atrophy, joint stiffness and poor physical condition.

After forty years in the timber industry, Gary Tucker was lured out of retirement to take on a new challenge: Port Ludlow. He was charged with the responsibility of growing the company in the face of failing community relations. His first objective was to get control of the problem in Port Ludlow and then set about to “heal the community.” He was staying at the Inn when he received a large packet outlining all of the issues that were of concern to the Village. He decided that to become completely involved, he had to live in Port Ludlow—and now resides in Teal Lake Village.

Tucker surmised that part of the problem in the Village was caused by the hard feelings that were created prior to his arrival. He felt that he could work with the residents in an atmosphere of cooperation if he created a developer/resident team that would work toward a common objective. The Port Ludlow Planning Forum was created to meet this objective. (See related story on page 21 of this issue). Mike Derrig was brought in to work with the community to resolve issues that would affect the build-out of the Village.

Tucker felt that Pope had been too long in bringing Port Ludlow to closure. Development had been underway for thirty-one years. He wanted a “Hallmark Community” to be in place at such time as Pope would leave Port Ludlow. His approach was to use an open forum that would address the wants and needs of the residents and plan a build-out with the help and cooperation of the Villagers.

On a personal note Mr. Tucker is a deeply religious man who makes his religion part of his everyday life.

Local Experts Provide Tours of Japan

In 1995, when Jerry and Carol Saber returned from living in Japan to their Port Ludlow home, they had no idea they would be going back to Japan leading groups of travelers eager to share in their delight of the best of Japan.



Jerry had lived and worked in Tokyo for fourteen years, first at the U.S. Embassy as a U.S. Navy Commander; then, after retirement, as a manager for United States industries building Aegis missile ships on joint Japan/United States projects. During those years, he explored the country, becoming an expert on helping U.S. visitors navigate their way through the complexities of travel in Japan.

Carol had begun going to Japan in 1985 to study Japanese textile dyeing techniques while on leave from her duties as a Texas criminal court judge. She returned to Japan frequently, met Jerry (over a pile of used kimonos at a shrine sale/flea market), married him, resigned from the bench and moved to Tokyo in 1990. Over the years, as a release from pressures of the criminal courts, Carol had pursued her lifelong avocation in the textile arts of dyeing and stitchery. Her clothing patterns, sold throughout the country were loosely based on Japanese styles and, on her return trips to the U.S., she was sought after to give lectures and workshops based on her knowledge of Japanese life, textiles and stitchery. In Japan, her knowledge of the country led her to be asked to conduct travel tours through Japan for Japanese and American diplomats' wives.

Together, from their base in Tokyo, knowing that one day they would leave Japan, the Sabers ranged far and wide throughout the countryside, searching for Japanese textiles, ceramics, baskets, antique furniture and dolls to fill their home with these treasures. Now, back in the United States, Carol gives lectures and workshops on the creation and use of Japanese fabric stitching and dyeing techniques while Jerry provides the much needed logistical, accounting and computer support for this traveling sales and mail order business. It was as a result of one such lecture/workshop venue that Saber Japan Tours was born through the requests of Carol's students.

The fall and spring of the year were determined to be the best time for touring Japan when the weather is mild, humidity is low, rain is less likely and the gardens are at their best: momiji (maple leaves) in the Fall and sakura (cherry blossoms) in the Spring.

The first tour was in the Fall of 1997 with 15 women and one husband. It was so successful that a second tour was organized for the Fall of 1998. Ten women and six men accompanied the Sabers for an even better tour of Japan. Port Ludlow neighbors, John and Beverly Henderson were among this tour group. These travelers were so happy with their Japan experience that they organized a Spring, 1999 "tour reunion" in Seattle where the Sabers were feted and thanked by their Fall, 1998 guests.

A third and fourth trip to Japan have been organized for Fall, 1999 and Spring, 2000. Departure dates for the tours are on or about **Friday, November 19th** and **Saturday, March 18th**, respectively and depart from Seattle to Kyoto via Osaka, Japan.

Each tour is limited to 18 guests plus tour leaders, Carol and Jerry. The tour length is approximately 19 days. These dates are keyed to taking in the best shrine sale/flea market in Japan, held in Kyoto on the 21st of each month.

Accommodations are deluxe with two persons per room. The Sabers believe that Japan is best experienced via the excellent public transportation available. They provide intense cultural exposure to many gardens, shrines, historical sites, museums and shops as well as visits to the home/workshops of "Living National Treasures," experts in their fields of artistic endeavor.

During the days in Kyoto and Tokyo, guests stay in one hotel in each of these cities, taking day trips to more remote areas readily accessed by train or bus. To transition from Kyoto to Tokyo, guests pack an overnight bag for a trip to Hakone National Park for two nights in a magnificent hotel overlooking river ravines and forests while their heavy luggage is being transported to their Tokyo hotel.

A little change of pace this month. One of our readers was kind enough to alert us to a great sandwich shop in Poulsbo. So if you are in the mood for a good sandwich for lunch, you might want to try the New York Deli at 20149 Viking Way, Suite E in Poulsbo. If you are in hurry you can call ahead, 360-697-6355, and your sandwich will be ready for you. A word of caution, the place is packed during lunch hour.

The New York Deli is the offspring of Rich and Janis Rey. Recently retired from the Navy, they wanted a business of their own and purchased the bakery that was formerly at that location. This bakery is one of the reasons for their success. They bake all of the breads used in their fine sandwiches. And another reason their sandwiches are such standouts is because they use Boars Head Meats and Cheeses. These products are the top of the line and it shows in a taste test.

We tried pastrami and Swiss on grilled rye bread and found it to be enough for two people. My lunch partner tried the Philly cheese on an eight-inch roll, and I don't know how he was able to eat the whole thing. This sandwich is made with grilled peppers and onions and white American cheese. There are a large number of toppings available. My partner recommends the sweet red peppers.

The New York Deli has more than twenty-four sandwich varieties available. My favorites are the heated and grilled varieties. You can even order party sandwiches up to five feet in length!

Marina News

Wildlife in Ludlow Bay

Just the other day a guest rented one of the Marina's double kayaks and paddled her way to the Inner Harbor, a destination we frequently suggest to our visitors because of the good opportunity to see animals down by the water. She came back excited to report that she had seen raccoons and a great blue heron by the water's edge and she had seen two seals lounging near the pilings where the log booms used to tie up.

That was an unusual sighting because we rarely see that many seals in the bay. Occasionally a stray harbor seal will swim through the Marina but we have not in recent memory seen more than one. Our guest reported two seals well back into the bay.

Three years ago artist Larry Eifert, a live-aboard resident in the Marina, wrote a guide to the animals, trees and sealife in or near the bay. His guide, *The Nature of Ludlow Bay, A Field Guide to Forest and Bay*, presents small snapshots of most of the natural life of the area. The guide features a simple map of the bay and the surrounding trails, then focuses on the forest shrubs and trees, and the critters large and small that roam the land. It also documents the birds that spend their time in our skies and the sealife that lives on and below our docks.

From the purple martins nesting in the boxes on the dock pilings to the clams that live unseen in the silt below us, Larry's guide is full of facts and pictures of our native wildlife. Sponsored and printed by Pope Resources, the guide is free for the asking at the Marina store. Ludlow residents interested in hiking the trails through the community or walking the shoreline will find the guide interesting and informative.

Larry lives with his wife, Nancy, his dog and two cats on "Rumpuckarori," a 1941 Monk Bridgedeck Cruiser, painting and writing for the National Park Service, the Nature Conservancy and many other institutions and agencies concerned with the environment. His major works are installed at Mount Rainier, Redwood, Yosemite, Brice Canyon, Joshua Tree and many other national parks. Larry's artwork is also for sale in the Marina store.

As to those harbor seals, the guide says that they grow to four to six feet and weigh up to 300 pounds. More impressively they can dive to 300 feet and stay under for up to 28 minutes. Interesting.

For Sale by Owner Boat Show

The second "For Sale by Owner" Boat Show this year visits the Marina on **Saturday and Sunday, September 18th and 19th**. Show hours are 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day. The show is an opportunity for individual boat owners to show and perhaps sell their boats. Past shows have had as many as seven boats sell to proud new owners. The Marina advertises the show in the local media, which has resulted in 200 to 300 visitors to the docks during the two-day event.

In the water, boats from 16 feet to over 60 have been shown. On the shore boaters with trailered boats, dinghies, kayaks and canoes can show off their vessel. The Marina charges a \$15 fee per boat to cover the extra cost of advertising the event. Regular moorage rates apply.

The September show again will feature a Boater's Flea Mart, operated by the Sea Scouts. Local boaters are encouraged to donate old boat gear to the Scouts who will have it for sale at the "For Sale by Owner" show. Resident Dennis Madson, 437-5156, is a contact if you have used gear to donate and need it picked up, or you can bring your gear to the Marina and we will hold it for the sale.

Speeding Boats



Let's address the need for speed felt by a few boaters in the Bay. Every once in a while the Marina gets a call from a local resident

who has spotted someone racing across the Bay. They ask us if we can do something about the speeder. The Bay is posted with a five MPH speed limit which is

painfully slow to some boaters. The sign is on the dolphin, the piling group in the water near the totem pole.

Since the Marina's jurisdiction ends at the edge of the docks, there is little we can do about a speeding boater except tactfully advise him or her of the limit if they enter the Marina. While the waters of the Bay are owned by the Department of Natural Resources, the enforcement of the rules of the road is the responsibility of the Jefferson County Sheriff. If a resident sees a serious violation or problem, a call to the sheriff is the proper action.

Planning Forum Summary

On August 3rd, 469 people attended a community meeting at which Olympic Resource Management summarized the Port Ludlow Planning Forum. The unusually large audience was accommodated through the use of closed circuit television in meeting rooms outside of the Bay Club's main hall.

ORM President and CEO Gary Tucker, wearing a "One Unified Voice" button on his fleece vest, spoke of his commitment to the successful buildout of the community and resort. He noted that the Planning Forum was the result of ORM's need for a long-term business plan, an "exit strategy" for Port Ludlow.

Mike Derrig, Forum Facilitator, reviewed the Forum's origins and thanked all of its participants, especially residents Moulton Prussing and Sally Smith, stating it "takes courage to publicly express one's vision." He said that ORM had offered generous financial support and minimal intrusion to the resident study groups that generated visions of Port Ludlow's future, and that he believes that ORM's commitment to bringing those visions to reality has not changed. Tops among citizen requests are protection of the natural environment, enhancement of social and cultural opportunities and protection from over-development.

Vice President Greg McCarry outlined ORM's goals, prime among them to build a competitive resort, to build to the limits of the Environmental Impact Statement of 1993 and to incorporate as many of the Port Ludlow owners' requests as possible. As written in ORM's summarizing flyer, "Without the ordinance in place, the recommended improvements to Port Ludlow that the citizens worked so hard to create cannot move forward." Among the improvements listed are an expanded golf facility, an indoor tennis and recreation center, assisted living and youth activity facilities and other community services. McCarry concluded that ORM seeks active community support for passage of the zoning ordinance that will allow these goals to become reality.



Septic Lots and Zoning

An evening meeting of the Lot Owners Association is scheduled for **Tuesday, September 15th at 7 p.m.** This meeting will have as its guest speakers Al Scaff of the Jefferson County Planning Department and Stan Kadesh Port Ludlow's Planning Commissioner. The subjects under discussion will be the new zoning regulations and the impact on septic lots. A regular business meeting at 6:30 p.m. will precede the evening meeting.

A number of residents are concerned about the need to have sewer hook-ups in reserve in the event of the failure of a septic system while at the same time there is concern about subsidizing the sewer facility for those who choose to not hook up. One school of thought is that non-sewer lots should be given two years to make a decision on whether or not they want to connect to the sewer system. Persons on septic could be given a longer period of time. Others feel that all lots in Port Ludlow should have the right to hook up at any time in the future. Many believe there should be no septic lots in the Village since we have an adequate sewer system.


Ludlow Maintenance Commission Board Makes Financial Decisions

The Ludlow Maintenance Commission at its regular meeting on the 21st decided to contribute \$2000 to the engineering survey planned to address the storm water problem on the north side. This survey is the first step in what will probably be the formation of a storm water control District. Olympic Resource Management and Jefferson County are also contributing to the cost of the survey.

Additionally the Ludlow Maintenance Commission approved the raising of rates for the Architectural Control Committee to review applications that cover everything from painting to a new roof. Most increases are quite modest but the cost of checking plans for new construction goes up significantly. The new costs will be based on the size of the residence. A schedule of costs is available at the Beach Club.


