## Building The Future, Facing The Present

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Nothing raises the passion of Port Ludlow residents as much as the subject of trees. Talk of preserving trees or cutting trees to create or maintain views and you generate argument. The current reaction to the Paradise Bay Road project is a good example. Criticism was leveled at Port Ludlow Associates (PLA), Kitsap Bank, and Jefferson County Public Works because of removal of trees that, until last month, lined Paradise Bay Road. The trees were on County property, the project was the County's design, and the County is in charge of the operation. Neither the bank nor PLA were involved in the project design or its implementation nor will they profit from the timber sales.

Unfortunately, Port Ludlow residents were left out of the loop until late in the game as well. The design was printed in the March *Voice*, displayed at the Clubs and Village Store, and there were meetings with County representatives. But these took place after the design was finished and the funding was in place. This seems to be part of a general pattern. Port Ludlow residents are seldom allowed input until designs are finished and contracts are being let. If the County more actively solicited public input, they probably would enjoy better relations with the community.

## New Kitsap Bank Ahead of Schedule

There is a lot of activity occurring at the corner of Breaker Lane and Paradise Bay Road. According to Linda Germeau, Kitsap Bank Assistant Vice President and Branch Manager, new construction is ahead of schedule with framing likely to start earlier than planned. The contract specifies a completion date for construction of **Monday, August 14**. The contractor faces substantial penalties for lateness.

The attractive shingled structure will complement the existing buildings in the rest of the Village Center. See the accompanying schematic for an idea of how the final building will look. The plans also include tasteful landscaping, consistent with the rest of the commercial area to replace the former blackberries and trees along the road.

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## From the Editor's Keyboard

You've heard the adage, "Be careful what you wish for!" That seems to be the case since the County Public Works Department began clearing every tree along Paradise Bay Road near the Village Center. While not opposed to progress, I feel residents should have a say in the future direction of our community. While County Administrator John Fischbach and the Department of Community Development have made it a goal to communicate openly with the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) and residents, perhaps the Public Works Department didn't get the message.

We are a Master Planned Resort (MPR), not a city, nor an urban center. Legally we have little say in our future. We want improvements but don't want to sacrifice the qualities of life that brought us here. The Public Works people apparently see our community from a different perspective. When faced with designing road improvements for Port Ludlow, they sought the assistance of urban planners. The resultant design is attractive and reminds one of University Place near Tacoma. Many of us naïvely failed to realize the amount of additional land that would be swallowed up in order to provide for wider lanes, shoulders, bus pullouts, a traffic median, etc. It was only when the heavy equipment arrived and site preparation began that reality set in.

Before the PLVC came into being, its predecessor organization crafted the slogan "A Village in the Woods by the Bay!" Residents and visitors arriving in Port Ludlow are greeted by that slogan. It exemplifies the peace and contentment most of us feel each time we return to this wonderful place from urban areas.

The current road widening is the first phase of a much larger project that should eventually reach the intersection with Teal Lake Road. Although additional funding will be needed for the subsequent phases, the design may be percolating in someone's head. Beautiful buffers of trees that protect Inner Harbor and Hidden Cove homes could be threatened for example. It is imperative that the County understands we know our community best and gives us the opportunity to participate in the formulation improvement plans.

## The Bay Club Expansion: Dilemma or Opportunity?

We have a beautiful Club facility in our community of South Bay, but it is aging and suffering from size limitations. The Bay Club is seventeen years old. Annual usage is over 45,000 sign-ins and growing. Increasing membership and utilization, along with the need to update parts of the building, places the SBCA Board in a dilemma: Do we do something now or do we delay the decision until next year or years after?

Last October, the SBCA Board asked a group of members to investigate and re-examine recommendations given by two prior Expansion Committees. This new Committee was charged with providing recommendations about the need for expansion, if any, and forming an expansion proposal and plans for expansion funding.

By November, the group agreed that the building needed renovation (because of age) and expansion (because of increased use). The next issue was how and where. Should it involve one or both ends—the "pool" and "auditorium"—of the facility? Doing one end at a time implied that another expansion project would be brought to the membership in a couple of years.

The group was faced with the issue of when to expand, now or later. Do we need additional room for activities? Yes. How fast are construction costs rising? The annual increase of 10 percent plus in construction costs seems to indicate that expanding now is better than paying more later.

How would these changes be funded? We considered waiting for the building reserve fund to be sufficient to pay for the expansion, estimated to be at \$1,000,000 at today's costs. We realized quickly that by the time we saved up the funds, the project costs would be out of sight. We considered borrowing the money from a bank. We found out this option required a two-thirds approval vote of the members, and a mortgage on the building along with interest adding 40 percent to the total cost. Our third consideration was an assessment of approximately \$2,000 per household, based on the need for \$1,000,000 divided by 500 households. The fourth option was a "prepayment plan" where members could prepay their dues and receive dues credit for the next ten years.

In February, the SBCA Board asked the Committee to host a series of meetings for SBCA members to share ideas and gather feedback on the timing and funding proposals. Survey cards from those meetings provided some key trends. First, 76 percent of the attendees agreed that remodeling and expansion was needed. Second, while the “prepayment plan” was interesting, the assessment option was more easily understood, acceptable, and cleaner. Third, most respondents conveyed the message: “Let’s do it and enjoy it while we are living here.”

In April, our group conducted a short survey about the importance of the Bay Club with local real estate professionals. Some realtors described our Bay Club as the “flagship” facility of Port Ludlow. They indicate that the Bay Club was an asset to selling homes in South Bay.

This brings us to today. The inputs on Bay Club expansion were presented at the May SBCA Board Meeting. The Board passed motions to support the expansion of the Bay Club and to fund the project with building reserves and a \$2,000 assessment to each home that is a part of the South Bay Community Association. Another motion approved the development of architectural plans for the auditorium end of the building.

The final approval for this project and the funding plan will come from a vote of the homeowners in the SBCA. Approval needs to come from 50 percent plus one vote of the households in the association. The vote will be a part of the Annual Meeting of the SBCA, scheduled for **Tuesday, July 18, 2006**. Information and proxy information will be mailed to SBCA members a month ahead of the Annual Meeting date.

Plans have been developed to provide additional opportunities for the Villages in South Bay to meet and discuss this important subject with the Expansion Committee prior to the Annual Meeting.

The Expansion Committee believes a larger and more useful Bay Club will both enhance our quality of life and appreciate our property values by more than the proposed assessment. This plan creates clear direction for an important South Bay Community facility.

The original road-widening project evolved to include “Context Sensitive Solutions”—a developing statewide trend in roadway design that incorporates features that are sensitive to the surrounding neighborhood’s existing and future character. This will include a planted median to provide traffic calming and speed reduction, new five-foot-wide paved shoulders, bus pullouts, and crosswalks. The project is being funded with a combination of state gas tax money through the Rural Arterial Program and local road funds.

Some residents are concerned that decisions about the true nature of Port Ludlow are made without community input. Others, including Larry Nobles of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC), applaud the design of the project. He calls it innovative and forward-looking. It is hard to argue that the road design is without some good features. When the new Kitsap Bank is finished and appropriately landscaped, negative feelings about losing the tall trees adjacent to that property will likely diminish.

We cannot expect to preserve the past in tact; change is a fact of life. However, we should explore our options for the future. What do we really need and want for Port Ludlow? Answers include more picnic areas, shoreline availability, an expanded trail system, more and/or different retail establishments? What are we willing to do to get these things? The unique beauty of Port Ludlow may be shifting to a suburban mentality that detracts from our descriptive motto: “A Village in the Woods by the Bay.” The only future we will ever have is being created today.

Port Ludlow. They include a drive-up ATM service and two privacy rooms to facilitate client examination of safety box contents. There will be a conference room, a copy work area, and 17 parking spaces for clients' vehicles. The grand opening is expected to be in **September**.

The current structure occupied by Kitsap Bank is leased from a company in Oregon. When the bank relocates into the new building, the leased structure will be removed. The land under the building is owned by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). Diana Smeland, PLA Vice President/Chief Financial Officer and Acting President, says that the company is considering various alternatives for that property and that final plans for the property are not known at this time. The infrastructure under the temporary building will be altered immediately to make the area safe and attractive.

## Village Council General Meeting Report

Attendance was light at the May 4 General Meeting of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC). Those present had the opportunity to hear a candidate for County Commission District 3, Bob Pontius, Republican, who introduced himself and give a brief summary of his background.

- Fire Chief Wilkerson reported on District activities and spoke later about preparations by State and local agencies for pandemic flu. He advised contacting the State Health Department if a dead bird is found
- Diana Smeland of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) said Olympic Terrace II was moving forward and infrastructure work was expected to take about 5 months. She noted the new development would be renamed as requested by Olympic Terrace I owners. PLA has contracted with a land planner to review input and revise the plans for Ludlow Bay Village.
- Elizabeth Van Zonneveld reported the PLVC bank balance was \$21,133.27 for the Council and Trails. Separate checking accounts have been opened for the FunFest and Trails Committees. Finance Chair John Cragoe presented the PLVC FY 2006 Operations Budget, which the Council approved as submitted.
- Community Development Committee (CDC) Chair Jim Brannaman and vice-chair John Golden have met with Jefferson County Department of Community Development (DCD) to review the status of development projects in Port Ludlow. County action on the request to use the Conference Center as a church will be delayed about 60 days. PLA has submitted a request to the County asking for an amendment to the Development Agreement between the Developer and Jefferson County Commissioners. Brannaman seeks volunteers to serve on the CDC.
- Lois Ruggles, Chair of Communications, asked that PLVC Committee Chairs submit meeting schedules to her Committee so it can provide meeting-schedule information to local newspapers and the *Voice*.
- Emergency Preparedness Chair Phil Norwine noted planning is underway to provide CERT (Certified Emergency Response Training) to every current neighborhood captain/co-captain. Both the Beach Club and the Bay Club are implementing agreements with the Red Cross to serve as emergency “places of refuge” in the event of an emergency.
- Trails Committee had 20 volunteers improving the trails leading to the gazebo at the Bay Club says Chair Mike Porter. Benches within the trail system with plaques honoring outstanding members of the Trails Committee, salmon incubator for Ludlow Creek, housing for purple martin colonies, and 50 birdhouses are planned. Signs may be needed to show which trails are “bike friendly.” Also suggested was a memorial park integrated with trails.
- Funfest chair Marilyn Durand reported “Nostalgia” would provide entertainment on Friday evening as a festival kickoff. Additional knowledgeable volunteers are being recruited to assist with set up for the event. The Golf Tournament is uncertain due to the lack of a volunteer organizer.
- In **July** PLVC will sponsor a Short Course in Local Planning to be offered by the Washington State Department of Community, Trade and Economic Development. Master Planned Resorts (MPRs) will be a focus of the session. Jefferson County DCD will handle publicity, and planners and interested parties from other areas, such as Port Hadlock, Brinnon and Discovery Bay, will be invited. Exact time and date to be announced.
- Dwayne Wilcox reported the speed sign in Ludlow Bay has been damaged and needs to be replaced.
- Larry Nobles distributed a document to Council members entitled “Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort Amended and Restated Master Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions,” dated 1 September 2000, wherein the previous developer, Pope Resources, granted to the PLVC certain rights relating to undeveloped parcels. Nobles recommended that the Council review and discuss at the next Workshop.

Regular monthly meetings of the PLVC are held on the first Thursday of each month, and will be held **Thursday, June 1**, at the Bay Club and **Thursday, July 6**, at the Beach Club. Monthly workshop meetings are scheduled on the third Tuesday of each month and will be held **Tuesday, June 20**, at the Bay Club, and **Tuesday, July 18**, at the Beach Club. Both meetings are open to all community residents and begin at 9:00 a.m.

Every regular monthly Council meeting includes agenda time for public input or comment, with each speaker

## From the Jefferson County Administrator's Desk

Greetings to all of you in Port Ludlow. There are several things from my perspective that I'd like to bring to your attention this month.

First and foremost, I'm pleased to introduce you to Barbara Nightingale, our new Associate Planner for the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort (MPR). We're very happy to welcome Barbara to the team. She joins us with extensive experience, both as a planner and environmental consultant, and holds a Masters of Marine Affairs from the University of Washington.

To give all of you an opportunity to meet Barbara, we'll be hosting a "coffee hour" on **Tuesday, June 20**, 11:00 a.m., in the Bay Club. All are welcome to join us for this informal gathering. On another note, we'll be hosting a short course in planning some time in **July**. The date and time are yet to be determined. The course addresses land use issues pertaining to MPRs and is an excellent resource provided by Washington State's Department of Community, Trade and Economic Development (CTED).

Three Master Land Use Applications (MLAs) went before the Board of County Commissioners for legislative action on May 22. (Results from that meeting aren't available at the time of this writing.) They are as follows:

- A Port Ludlow Development Agreement Amendment was proposed by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). PLA has applied for an amendment to the existing Development Agreement that would allow timeshare use in Ludlow Cove. This amendment is proposed so that Trendwest can build a 120-unit timeshare facility on 14.66 acres of property now owned by PLA.
- The Port Ludlow Drainage District (PLDD) has proposed a Development Regulation Amendment to include the Port Ludlow Comprehensive Stormwater Drainage Plan in the Unified Development Code (UDC). The drainage plan describes the basins, topography, soils, hazards, hydrology and other features specific to the

northern portion of the Port Ludlow MPR. This suggested amendment seeks to provide guidance for drainage designs specific to the northern Port Ludlow landscape.

- Property owner Michael Holland proposed an amendment to the existing MPR zoning code, which currently precludes the subdivision of his Ludlow Beach Tract property. This language change would not alter the lot sizes allowed in the Development Agreement, but would allow his property, platted in 1948, to be subdivided consistent with his adjoining neighbors' lots. This amendment may allow others to subdivide as well.

## Safety in the Garden, Part III

Again I want to thank the Master Gardeners Association and particularly Master Gardener Sharon Commander for providing the information for this series of articles on Garden Safety.

The plants we love can often be a hazard: Those beautiful tea roses come with thorns that can tear flesh and cause infection. You may want to reconsider planting that beautiful climbing rose in the front entry where it can reach out and snag guests.

Some plants have poisonous sap and must be handled with gloves, even when just weeding around them. Other plants have poisonous seeds or fruit, and children must be cautioned not to put anything in their mouth without the okay of a knowledgeable adult.

Another hazard is that low hanging limb that can leave you with a nasty lump on your head or that root in the path that is perfect for catching a toe and sending you sprawling. The limb can be removed, or the plantings and paths on the ground can be changed so people will avoid walking or working under the limb. Cover the root with soil or a combination of small rocks with the soil to hold it in place or put an interesting curve in the path to avoid the root.

Another innocent looking hazard is an uncoiled hose. During the summer we water frequently, and sometimes it is just easier to leave that hose across the path, or up the steps to the deck flowers. Not a good idea—if you don't trip over it you can slip on it. Coil that hose after every use.

More obvious hazards are chemicals like pesticides and fertilizers that we put on our garden. When using chemicals always be prepared for spills. Have a handy bag of kitty litter, vermiculite, sand or other dry product that will absorb the spill. Never hose down a spill. This just dilutes it, spreads the chemicals over a larger area, and increases the chances of the chemical getting into our water system. First contain the spill with the dry product, then put everything in a plastic bag, close it and take it to the local Hazardous Waste Facility. Of course, all chemicals should be stored under lock and key.

Take a minute to organize your storage cabinet. Large containers and glass containers should be on the bottom shelf so there is less chance of breakage and spilling. Be sure you are able to read the labels for mixing instructions, and what to do in case it is ingested.

Most important, slow down. Accidents happen when we are in a hurry and don't anticipate the obvious. Enjoy your garden, but stay safe by being aware of the hazards.

## The Biggest Tree in Port Ludlow?

Where is the biggest tree in our wee woody world? Do you care? I don't. Much. But I may have found it.

You see, 3-1/2 years ago I slipped and broke my leg. After the usual cursing, screaming, and bone setting, healing boredom set in. Golf, tennis and dirty dancing were out but careful walking was prescribed. So why not combine a healing hike with some timber research?

On many scenic drives to beautiful downtown Hadlock, I had noticed a very large, handsome tree on the east side of Oak Bay Road between Baldwin and Montgomery Lanes. It's just seven yards north of the right turn sign for Montgomery. It was a good place to start, but with what standards? Height is too tough to measure, so I went with circumference at my chest level of a living, single-trunk tree. It sounds simple, but tree measuring would be easier as a team sport. Solo gimp tapings were not only difficult but probably not nano-accurate. It's because the biggest trees are rooted on steep hillsides or small cliffs and getting a measuring tape in place requires a knack for levitation that, sadly, I lack.

But fearless and bored, I muddled through. The Oak Bay monolith measured 16 feet, 2 inches, a robust start, which I could not match with any other tree in many other neighborhoods. Not the Rainier Loop, the park by the stores, nor the Golf Course.

The Ludlow Falls area was the last place I hadn't looked, so I limped in from the south (the asphalt side) of the trail and ... uh oh ... there was a big tree on the northeast side of the path next to the creek. The largest yet at 16 feet, 8 inches. I taped a few more as I meandered up stream, but they fell short, until I climbed the stairs. Wow! There was a cedar at the top of the stairs that you could eye ball as the winner. I measured 18 feet. 8 inches.

That was 3-1/2 years ago. This month I learned there's now a little informative plaque under the tree that reads in part, "This western red cedar measures six feet in diameter." The late Grant Sharp, a Trail Committee member, had put up an interpretive sign along the trail 2-1/2 years ago. He, too, had acknowledged this cedar's majesty. But the plaque doesn't say it's the biggest tree in Port Ludlow. I'll say it now, and if you want to go searching for a bigger one, well, break a leg.

## Single Emergency Exit is a Concern

As the concerns over disaster preparedness nationwide become major news, residents of Villages adjacent to Teal Lake Road are confronting a local disaster-related issue. Were there to be a fire, which required immediate evacuation, all residents in the area would have to move quickly to the nearest and only exit. As the homes in the second phase of Olympic Terrace are built, some 272 vehicles from Fairwood Village and the several streets and courts in Olympic Terrace would converge on Springwood Lane meeting another 72 exiting from Woodridge at Teal Lake Road (this assumes two vehicles per household). To address the issue, affected homeowner associations met Wednesday, May 17, with Fire Chief Ed Wilkerson.

Suzanne Graber, Olympic Terrace Homeowner Association President, described the problem saying, "In case of a serious emergency, the number of vehicles converging could produce a panic as residents on Mount Constance Way in Olympic Terrace could not exit their driveways; residents on Mount Christie and Mount Lena Courts could not enter Mount Constance Way; residents in the new area under development and without immediate access onto Mount Constance Way could not exit their streets; residents in Fairwood Village would have no alternative egress from Dog Leg Lane to Teal Lake Road except by turning onto Springwood Lane. The number of vehicles from these Villages plus Woodridge and Teal Lake Villages all trying to enter Teal Lake Road across from Springwood Lane would cause a backup that could result in many residents not having safe egress."

An earlier request to County planners to address the situation was denied; and in place the Developer was to place bollards and a chain at the south end of Olympic Terrace for use by emergency vehicles. Finding this lack of assistance unacceptable, homeowners of Fairwood, Woodridge, and Olympic Terrace Villages plus South Bay Community Association (SBCA) president Tom Stone have formulated a process to resolve the problem. In addition to meeting with the Fire Chief, both County and Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) officials will be contacted to assist in resolving the issue.

## Settlement Agreement Announced

A Settlement Agreement has been entered on the 20th day of April 2006 by and among Port Ludlow Associates, LLC (“PLA”), Leslie A. Powers (“Powers”) and Rick Rozzell (“Rozzell”). They are parties to administrative and judicial actions affecting the development of the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort (MPR) and PLA’s interests therein; and the parties without admission as to factual allegation or legal argument asserted in the actions have entered into negotiations to resolve their disputes the effect of which is incorporated herein. The full text of that agreement follows:

NOW THEREFORE in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. PLA will agree to make a capital contribution to South Bay Community Association, in an amount yet to be determined, for each new residential unit or lot whose owners are made new members of South Bay Community Association, as such residential units or lots are sold by PLA to third parties. PLA will consult with South Bay Community Association regarding the amount of the contribution. For purposes hereof, residential unit or lot shall not include timeshare uses. PLA shall discuss this issue with South Bay Community Association in the hope of reaching mutual agreement as to the amount of the capital contribution not later than **September 30, 2006**.
2. If PLA and South Bay Community Association have no agreement regarding the addition of new residential units or lots to South Bay Community Association, then the following provisions shall apply: If the lot or unit is located in a division or plat within the South Bay area that no longer has the right to join South Bay Community Association, PLA will offer South Bay Community Association the right to incorporate such lot, plat, or division into South Bay Community Association when platted and/or converted to non-timeshare residential use. If South Bay Community Association does not accept the plat or division into South Bay Community Association within ninety (90) days of the offer thereof, PLA will have no further obligation to make any capital contribution with respect to any lot or residential unit therein.
3. PLA will join with the PLVC and related associations to encourage Jefferson County to enhance police and fire protection, health and social services, and public transportation within the Port Ludlow MPR and will comply with all concurrency requirements of any applicable law, ordinance, or regulation.
4. Powers and Rozzell agree to not file an appeal of the trial court decision in *Powers v. Jefferson County*, Jefferson County Superior Court Cause No. 05-2-00356-1 (Olympic Terrace II).

5. All parties agree to reengage in mediation after the mediator returns to the state on May 9, 2006, although no party commits to any particular result or any particular process. This paragraph is a statement of good faith intent.

Diana Smeland for PLA and Leslie A. Powers, both individually, and for Rick Rozzell, signed the agreement.

As a result of the Agreement, PLA will resume its development activities in Olympic Terrace II. Establishment of infrastructure along Teal Lake Road has started. Negotiations on other issues, including the Ludlow Bay Village plan and the Ludlow Cove issues, are incomplete. Discussions with the third litigant, Mr. Lewis Hale, are continuing.

In a press release announcing the Settlement Agreement, Randy Verrue of PLA recanted some of the comments made last January in a *Voice* article, saying, “I am hopeful that Mr. Hale and other members of the negotiating team representing the Port Ludlow community will accept my apology for using the term “extortion” as I now understand that there are a number of real issues that need to be resolved that may require the investment of additional funds by PLA.”

## LMC Board of Trustees May Meeting Highlights

The monthly Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees meeting was held on Saturday, May 13 and chaired by newly elected LMC President Terry O'Brien.

President O'Brien reported Trustee Michael Platt's recent move from a condominium to a home created a vacancy on the LMC Board. Trustee John Van Zonneveld nominated Vaughn Bradshaw, a former resident of Denver, CO, to fill the condominium vacancy. Bradshaw's career background includes design of plumbing and fire protection systems.

General Manager Brian Belmont reported the Washington State chapter of the Community Association Institute, a national organization, held a one-day workshop at the Beach Club on May 12. Six regional community associations participated in the leadership-training program.

Brian and LMC member Carl Jespersen have been working together to improve the space layout in the RV lots. Carl has volunteered to work up scaled drawings of the RV lots to better define actual spaces, including width and length. RV renters will be asked to move their RVs, etc., a few at a time, to facilitate measuring and painting space lines on the ground to clearly identify the parameters of each space.

Brian thanked President O'Brien for installing two State statute-required lever door handles on doors leading to the outdoor pool and Trustee Sonny Sanzaro for volunteering to help with some carpentry work on a wood rot problem involving the handrail outside the Bayview room.

**Operations** reported continuing work on several issues related to trees and views and property maintenance. LMC members and their guests are reminded to wear appropriate shoes while using the exercise equipment. Recently, a

member was seen exercising barefooted on a treadmill in the exercise room, despite prominently placed signs stating appropriate shoes must be worn.

Purchase of a table tennis set has been discussed. Comparison-shopping, location for play and storage are all being considered. Sharing the squash court with the squash players is a possibility and feedback from the community would be appreciated to determine if this is a feasible idea.

**Architectural Control (ACC)** approved 18 new requests (four new houses, two garages, one house addition, one shed, four repaints, two revisions to new house construction plans and four tree removals. There are currently 11 pending requests. Houses under construction are being monitored, and reported violations are being addressed.

**Finance** reported audit of the first quarter financials has been completed. The Committee reviewed detailed records of the LMC and is comfortable with all reports submitted by the General Manager. The Committee is reviewing the electrical use at the RV lots and further discussion will be on the Committee's **August** agenda.

**Greenbelts (CBC)** reported replanting in areas where trees have been removed is continuing, specifically on O'Keefe Lane where 30 plants and 77 lower-growing trees have been planted to replace trees that have been removed.

**Covenants & Regulations (CRC)** presented the second reading of the revised Greenbelt Policies and Procedures. Catherine Garrison explained the words "shall" and "may" are preferable in the LMC governing documents rather than the word "will," according to the lecturing attorney at the Community Association Workshop. She will resubmit the second reading at the next LMC meeting. Operations asked CRC to take a look at Regulation 1, Article 1 – No Nuisance, Industrial or Commercial Use. First reading of proposed changes were submitted and legal counsel will be obtained. Catherine recommended LMC implement a policy for retaining copies of minutes of meetings related to

members, the Board, and Committees, as required by State law. Full text of the proposed changes is posted on the Beach Club bulletin board.

**Communications** announced the next issue of the *LOG* would be in **June 2006**. The Committee has discussed print size, layout, and overall appearance. - Resolution for compliance with RCW 24-03-135. See Beach Club bulletin board for complete Resolution text.

Other items of interest:

- Contractor David Riggs has completed work on four of five posts that support the deck of the Bayview Room. The fifth post, next to the pool boiler, will be repaired in the near future. Riggs' repair technique, rather than total replacement, saved LMC significant money.
- The propane boiler for the outdoor pool has been repaired and serviced.
- The outdoor pool is being readied for opening day on May 26.
- The Beach Club is being repainted and completion is expected by the end of May.
- Examination of the Beach Club roof revealed portions of the roof are in bad shape. A plan for replacement will be studied for possibly next year.
- The bathrooms at Kehele Park are being improved.
- The Drainage District Commissioners have authorized up to \$2,000 for engineering work of the drainage system at Kehele Park.

## South Bay Community Association (SBCA) Update

### May Board Report and Commentary:

A moment of silence was held in honor of Bates Thomas, Fairwood Village, who recently passed away.

**Port Ludlow Associates (PLA):** Diana Smeland reported:

- Olympic Terrace II (OT II) foundations will start in **September**
- PLA will have a revised Resort Plan and are taking community input
- PLA is working to change zoning at the log dump to allow timeshares and decrease density from 16 to 9 units per acre. Hearings will be scheduled.
- PLA still has 400 units to build on their maximum development of 2,250. 400 minus 80 for OT II leaves 320, possibly 120 for Trendwest, leaving 200 to spread around in Ironwood, Creekside, Falls Terrace or other
- PLA still wants to add a grocery store, move John L Scott office and redesign the Village Center. Plans should be in place by year end.

### Committee Reports:

**ARC Report:** Linda Colasurdo reported they have resolved some neighbor-to-neighbor issues, worked on seven applications, reviewed four Village permits, are working on view and view maintenance definitions.

**Bay Club Expansion Committee:** After three years of continuous preparation for three Expansion Committees and presentations at three Annual Meetings where high interest and support was expressed, the SBCA Board approved a motion to expand the Clubhouse and finance the expansion through a \$2,000 assessment per home. A 50 percent plus 1 vote of South Bay members is needed for final approval. The Board also approved a motion to

contract for the auditorium/kitchen advance architectural plans. See details of expansion brief at the website at [plvc.org/sbca/expansion.htm](http://plvc.org/sbca/expansion.htm). (See related article on page 2.)

**Tennis Committee:** Clint Webb reported the courts are ready for play. The Tennis Court Lease Agreement between PLA and SBCA has been forwarded to PLA for their review. The courts will be resurfaced in **August**. The Tennis Committee will develop a plan that assigns responsibilities between themselves and the SBCA.

**Trails:** Mike Porter's report described extensive work done on the trails around the Bay Club by community volunteers. He noted that **Saturday, June 3**, is National Trails Day. The PLVC Trails Committee will offer several trail tours that day, and he hopes many residents will come out to view our beautiful Port Ludlow Trails System.

**Nomination Committee:** Bill Browne stated the Committee recommends John Cragoe of Olympic Terrace, Gary Moore of Teal Lake and Christine Whitehurst of Timberton as candidates for the **July** SBCA Board vacancies. Any South Bay resident wishing to run is welcome. All candidates need to submit a written biography to be included in the Annual Meeting packet mailing, which is expected to go out Friday, **June 9**.

**Financial:** Latest financial information is posted on the website [www.plvc.org/sbca.htm](http://www.plvc.org/sbca.htm) and in the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) office. The 2007 Long Range Maintenance Plan was presented but approval was tabled until after the Annual Meeting as the possible expansion could impact some of the areas in question. In order to keep our dues constant for the near future, the Board approved a change in the allocation of a member's contribution to the Maintenance Reserve and the Expansion Fund starting in fiscal year 2007. It requires no change in dues.

**Secretary Correspondence Report:** A letter praised Annette Koch for her Welcome Wagon activity and thanked the SBCA for providing such an excellent service. We agree! Many thanks to Annette for her good work.

#### **Board of Director Reports:**

Tom Stone debriefed the PLVC meeting mentioning the Fire Chief's request to ensure fire safety by cleaning up your property. As part of Olympic Terrace II construction, Teal Lake Road from Paradise Bay to the entrance to Woodridge and Fairwood Villages will be widened within the next five months. The PLVC recording secretary is now a paid position; they are looking for applicants.

Larry Elton stated that the Board met with our attorney to discuss CC&R issues. He also spoke with the County Traffic Engineer regarding reducing the speed limit on Paradise Bay in front of the Club to allow for safer exiting. The road was metered and the findings were that 85 percent of the traffic is going 48 mph; the County Engineer did not think that a change in signage would help to reduce the speed. He did say that if the speed on the area around the Village Center is reduced to 25 mph after the widening is complete that speed would be in effect from the Village stop sign to Timberton Road.

**Membership and Operations Report:** Mike Morgan reported the Bay Club is on summer hours and open on **Sundays**. As requested by the Board, Mike priced an emergency generator. A SBCA Disaster Sub-Committee will determine Bay Club needs for emergency purposes. Work on the Club roads and parking lot should take about three days. The Club will remain open but there may be some inconvenience.

## Developer's Report

**Q 1:** What is the Amendment to the Development Agreement?

**A 1:** The Development Agreement is a contract between Pope Resources and Jefferson County. It was effective May 8, 2000. Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) is the assignee and successor to Pope under the Agreement. The contract is in place for 20 years and so it allowed for modifications to the proposed development during the build-out period for a variety of purposes. These purposes could include incorporation of new information, responding to changing community and market needs, encouraging reasonably priced housing and encouraging modifications that provide comparable benefit or functional equivalent with no significant reduction of public benefits or increased cost to the development.

The application for the Amendment to the Development Agreement was filed with the County on March 3, 2006. The Amendment affects only Tract E of the Plat of Ludlow Cove. Tract E is referred to as the "Log Dump" or Trendwest site. If approved, the Amendment would accomplish a number of things. First, it would make Tract E subject to the Development Agreement instead of prior land use regulations based on vested applications filed by Pope Resources in 1995. Second, it would allow timeshare uses within Tract E, as the Hearing Examiner approved last year (the Appellate Hearing Examiner later said timeshare uses should not be allowed in Tract E and the matter is now on appeal). Third, it would allow the same residential density in Tract E as under the prior land use regulations (16 units per acre) based on vested applications filed by

Pope Resources in 1995 (the Hearing Examiner approved this density), but PLA would agree to a reduced density (9 units per acre).

In October 1999, the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) set the total allowed development with the Port Ludlow MPR to 2,575 Measurement Equivalent Residential Units (MERUs), with a residential unit maximum of 2,250. This Amendment to the Development Agreement does not change the MERU count. Each Timeshare Unit established within Tract E shall be counted as one residential unit for purposes of calculating MERUs within the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort (MPR).

Removing salmon from our fall menus would be the professional equivalent of hara kiri with a 10-inch chef’s knife.

Even though the only salmon I can offer is, in polite company unmentionable: the infamous farm-raised Atlantic salmon. My customers not only want it, they demand it.

Fear not my friends we are in luck! Wild salmon is now officially on the metabolic and chronological menus. Beautiful wild silvers chock full of Omega 3 oils are now being served at both The Fireside and The Harbormaster Restaurants. My staff and I promise to utilize these fish to the best of our ability. We will smoke it, broil it, sauté it and bake it. We will serve it on sandwiches, salads, en Croute and en Papillote. In short we serve it for breakfast lunch and dinner. I love it! And until the end of the season you will see it used prolifically on my menus. Enjoy!

Live, eat, and enjoy the foods that are local, fresh and in season. You will learn to wait with anticipation as the foods you love find their way to you. ## Coast Guard Auxiliary

Below is a reprint of a newspaper article from Oregon. Essentially everything in the article, except for the location, applies directly to our area as well. It illustrates the well-known fact that when a person falls from a boat into the water of Puget Sound, the presence or absence of a life jacket almost always determines the life or death outcome.

### Aloha Man Dies in Boating Accident

Kevin Rowley, 38, of Aloha died October 3, when his 16-foot boat capsized in the shallow waters of Tillamook Bay.

Rowley was apparently helping a fellow angler untangle fishing line from his motor when a swell carried his boat into the surf, capsizing it and tossing Rowley into the water. Coast Guard crew from Tillamook Bay Station recovered the victim in a dangerous rescue in the surf 14 minutes later, but he could not be resuscitated.

"The weather was good, the water wasn't particularly rough—the victim was just too close to shore," said Tillamook Sheriff Sgt. Andy Long. He added that Rowley was apparently not wearing a life jacket.

The life jacket is the last line of defense and is an effective one, according to the Oregon State Marine Board. "We've lost 13 boaters this year and 12 were not wearing life jackets," said Randy Henry of the Marine Board. "We lost two boaters last fall just off the tip of Tillamook's south jetty. They, too, weren't wearing life jackets. It's very likely that all would have survived if they had been wearing them."

Henry suggests that anglers take a hard look at their options and their priorities before boating.

"There are so many types of life jackets now and many are very comfortable," he said. "If you're someone who won't wear a life jacket because they're bulky or restrictive or too warm, purchase an inflatable life jacket and

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wear it whenever you're in a boat. In the ocean, we recommend heavier jackets that keep your head well out of the water and also protect against hypothermia.

"But in most situations where quick rescue is likely, an inflatable life jacket would buy you additional time until help arrives. Trying to tread water or swim in the surf is nearly impossible. In that situation, any type of approved life jacket greatly increases your odds of survival."

It is vital that a Personal Floatation Device (PDF) be worn whenever there is a risk of falling overboard, which is whenever you are outside on a boat on the water. (Vital: adj. 1. of or essential to organic life. 2. essential, indispensable. Oxford Dictionary)

The Auxiliary's Boating Skills and Seamanship (BS&S) course is a comprehensive series of classes designed for both the experienced and novice boater. Course material meets Washington's boater education requirements. The class on **Tuesday, June 6**, 7:00–10:00 p.m., "Your Highway Signs" will cover protection of Aids to Navigation (ATON), buoyage systems, waterway marks, how waterways are marked, light characteristics, chart symbols, light structures, lights on bridges, electronic aids to navigation, a word to the wise, and navigation publications. Materials for the entire series are \$35 plus a fee of \$6 will be collected at each session.

"How to Boating" sessions are stand-alone classes. An auxiliary member with extensive Puget Sound experience, for instance, will teach the class on **Monday, June 19**, 7:00 to 10:00 p.m., entitled "How to Use Dead Reckoning (DR)." It will provide a working knowledge of dead reckoning methods including plotting, labeling, measuring and determining DR positions, speed, time, distance formulas and problem solving, speed estimation, tachometers and speed curves. Fee is \$25.

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
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
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
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
