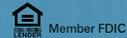

Father's Day, Facts & Frivolity

According to the most recent census, there are over 70 million fathers in the United States, and, on June 16, gatherings across this great nation will honor these special men. Sons and daughters

may treat Dad to dinner at his favorite restaurant or invite him to check out their own culinary skills. There'll be cards, presents. In May, the glory goes to Mother ... in June, the focus is on Father.

Were Mother's Day and Father's Day initiated by Hallmark, as many have jokingly suggested? The iconic card company may have self-servingly promoted the holidays, but Spokane, Washington, claimed the first 'official' Father's Day on June 19, 1910. Sonora Smart Dodd was one of six children raised by a widower father, and she introduced the concept to Spokane officials. Mother's Day had become a commercial holiday two years before, and Dodd wanted to establish an equivalent for male parents in honor of her father. She approached area churches, the YMCA, retail businesses and organizations; her efforts were tireless — and effective. Red roses were given to fathers during a church service; large baskets full of roses were passed around the community; and people were encouraged to pin a bloom on their lapel or blouse. Dodd brought her infant son on a horse-drawn carriage ride through the city, bringing roses and gifts to home-bound fathers. It was a grand day in Spokane.

News of the holiday grew statewide and beyond in subsequent years. In 1916, President Wilson brought Spokane's Father's Day to the nation's attention by paying tribute to Washington State, and in 1924, President Calvin Coolidge encouraged all states to observe a day in honor of fathers. President Lyndon Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers in 1966. Finally, President Richard Nixon made it official in 1972 — Father's Day was to be celebrated the third Sunday in June as a national holiday.

(A side note: On July 5, 1908, a church in West Virginia honored fathers with a service in memory of the 362 men who had died in recent coal mine explosions. The message was tagged *Father's Day*. This particular event was never repeated, although the state did erect a historical marker in 1985 boasting it held the first Father's Day observance.)

A bit more trivia: It's interesting to note that Mother's Day became an instant success and was declared a national holiday in 1914 after only a few years of existence. Father's Day took much longer to gain acceptance. Perhaps men saw flower-giving as unmanly and derided such holidays as a commercial gimmick to sell more products (undoubtedly paid for by father himself).

However, Father's Day grew in popularity during World War II, when advertisers argued that celebrating Dad was a way to honor American troops and support the war effort. By the end of the war, Father's Day had become a national institution, rivaling Mother's Day in popularity. It seemed appropriate when President Nixon gave it official recognition — long in coming, but well-deserved. The result? Economists estimate Americans pay \$1 billion for Father's Day gifts each year. Fathers = 70 million. Gifts = \$1 billion! Not bad for the ol' man!

Ship Jumpers of Jefferson County

The gold fever going on near San Francisco drew thousands of young (and old) adventurers to the Pacific Coast, all looking for their gold at the end of the rainbow. Some folks booked passage on the ships coming around Tierra del Fuego, and some joined up on either the merchant ships or the Navy. Maybe their intentions were to stay in the services of the merchant/military fleet, but with the lure of gold and other treasures, or the terrible treatment of seamen on the ships, many decided to “jump ship.”

William Eldridge and William Bishop, with five other crewmen of the British man-o-war *Monarch*, jumped ship near Victoria in 1853. They hired an Indian to tow them across to Port Townsend, paying him 50 cents. Both Bishop and Eldridge worked on the Littlefield farm near Port Townsend until 1857, when they went to Chimacum and took claims of land along Chimacum Creek, where they paid \$900 for what was the Glendale Farm. Bishop married Snohomish Indian Sally, and three children were born (Thomas, William, and Elizabeth) before William divorced Sally. William, Jr., was elected to the State House of Representatives in 1899 and served in either the House or Senate, for the most part, until his death in 1934. Meanwhile, Bishop and Eldridge established very successful dairy farms in the Chimacum Valley. The Bishop Farm became one of the top breeders for Holstein dairy cattle in Washington. The ruins of one of the barns is at the intersection of Route 19 and Egg and I Road to the west. The Bishop Farm still exists today; the farm is now managed for breeding stock. Eldridge was also successful at farming the Chimacum Valley.

In 1848, a bit closer to home, three young men who had been hired on a merchant ship that sailed up from San Francisco, jumped ship off Port Ludlow. They were John Cooper (from Liebig, Germany), Horace Hawkins (Manhattan, New York), and William Hudson (from England). Cooper and Hawkins had come by way of New York City, while Hudson came from England to Australia to San Francisco. Cooper settled near Tala Point (across from the Puget Mill) and started farming. Hawkins settled in Mats Mats, and Hudson settled in Port Gamble. All three married Snohomish Indian women and established themselves in farming or working in the Port Ludlow or Port Gamble sawmills. The Cooper Farmstead was sold to Pope and Talbot in 1945 by the heirs of Mary and John Cooper, and now nothing remains of the site. As noted in the February issue of the *Voice*, John Cooper’s son-in-law William Watson was killed in an accident in the Port Ludlow sawmill in 1892. Cooper and Hawkins operated the first mail delivery service in Puget Sound, where the mail was picked up in Victoria and delivered to Port Townsend, Seattle, and Fort Steilacoom. Both Hawkins and Cooper are buried in a secluded family cemetery. Hudson, who worked principally in the Port Gamble mill, is buried in the Buena Vista cemetery in Port Gamble. There are still many heirs of the Cooper and Hawkins families who can be found around the area who can provide a wealth of information on the lineage of the families.

Childhood Memory of Port Ludlow

My great grandfather John was born in Baden, Germany, in 1828. He decided to emigrate to America to avoid military conscription, quite common for young men to do in those times before they turned 16; then they would never communicate with their family again. John departed Baden in 1843, and was delayed several years en route before he jumped ship in the vicinity of Port Ludlow in 1848. He was 20 years old.

My great-grandmother Mary, a Tsimshian native, was born in the early 1840s. As a teenager, she journeyed 700 miles by canoe to arrive on the shores of Puget Sound in about 1859. Sometime after Mary’s arrival, John and Mary hooked up. They ultimately had eight children; two children died in infancy. My great-uncle Andy Cooper was the sixth child, born in 1875, and my grandfather Jack was number seven, born in 1877.

Andy and Ette, my great-aunt, bought 90 acres of land on the shores of Hood Canal at a place that today is called Paradise Bay. They raised a family there. Prior to 1950, if you wanted to visit them you would go by boat, or park your car on Shine Road near Teal Lake and hike down through the forest to their house. Andy and Charlie Cooper, brothers, (Charlie being another great-uncle to me), owned a logging company together. It was headquartered on Andy’s ranch.

One of my great memories of Port Ludlow occurred about 1939 or 1940 when family members were going to rendezvous at Andy’s to have a deer hunting expedition. I was about seven or eight and too young to participate in the hunt, but I was allowed to go along and visit my Aunt Ette. The thing I was really looking forward to was being able to stay in the barn and sleep on the hay.

As I recall, that was great fun; but what was even better was going to the cook shack the next morning where the loggers used to eat, and having my Aunt Ette make pancakes for me on the big wood-fired grill, visiting with her, and looking out over the water.

On the Northeast corner of Teal Lake, there was a picture-post-card log cabin located alongside the road. It always reminded me of something out of Walt Disney productions because it was so beautiful. As a child, I always wanted to live there. Unfortunately, the cabin was demolished about 25 years ago. One would park a car there and hike down through the woods to Andy and Ette’s.

In retrospect, everything about that period of time was great. Unfortunately, Uncle Sam requested my service, and it took another 25 years to return to the area. Although I would occasionally return and do a couple of barrel rolls and light the afterburner to let my relatives know I was visiting.

Flag Day

Were you inspired by the beautiful photo of the American flag flying over the cove on the cover of the *May Port Ludlow Voice*? The photo was depicting a Memorial Day scene, but another “memorial” day is coming in June—Flag Day—celebrated on June 14 each year.

Flag Day has a long and storied history. At the beginning of the American Revolution in 1775, a single American flag did not exist. Most fighting regiments flew their own flags in battle. In

June of that year, the Second Continental Congress met to create a unified fighting force, the Continental Army, and subsequently the first American flag. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution that “the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white,” and that “the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation.”

It took almost 100 years after the adoption of the flag for ceremonies honoring the flag to be held. There are reports of celebrations in Connecticut, New York, and Wisconsin, but it was in Pennsylvania that June 14, Flag Day, became a legal holiday.

There is an interesting “education” connection to the observance of Flag Day. In 1885, a 19-year-old teacher, Bernard J. Cigrand, often referred to as “the father of Flag Day,” held an observance of the day for his students and began a life-long quest to have June 14 become a national day of recognition for the flag. At age 50, he saw his dream fulfilled when President Wilson issued a proclamation on May 30, 1916, calling for a nation-wide observance on Flag Day.

Many years later in 1958, a teacher assigned a project to then high school junior Bob Heft to design an American flag. Heft was sure that the current flag with 48 stars was soon to be outdated when Alaska and Hawaii became states. He designed a flag with 50 stars and got a poor grade from his teacher. Undeterred, he lobbied Washington with help from his congressman and in 1960, he was told by President Eisenhower that his design was chosen out of 1,000 submitted designs. On July 4, 1960, he stood next to the president and saw his design become the official flag of the United States of America.

Pat Lohrey is one of the people who doesn’t just show up in town, she bolsters a community. She realized they had some spare time to contribute when she noticed her husband Tom had alphabetized the spices in their new Port Ludlow home. That was in 1996.

Early in her years here, she taught CPR/First Aid for the Jefferson County Red Cross. When Washington State University attempted to connect seniors with educational opportunities, it reached out to the community for volunteers. Twenty-four showed up, and the Learning Exchange was formed. Ultimately, Pat and five others ran the operation for about five years. They found presenters and produced the catalog of classes—initially in long-hand. Eventually it got so big that they ran out of venues.

She used that experience in the formation of the Community Enrichment Alliance, which had a similar goal but added some charity fund-raising as well.

Currently, Pat is the South Bay Coordinator for Emergency Management (CERT) in Port Ludlow. The organization consists of a director, North and South Bay coordinators, communications managers, and a CERT coordinator. Pat has over 69 block captains in South Bay alone and provides the training to both North and South Bay captains. They are our eyes, ears, and educators in their areas. All are connected by FRS radios to a central radio station which is supplemented by our HAM operators.

Pat is a member of the Community Development Committee and the Health and Wellness Committee, which attempt to provide

subjects for the community such as “How to Prepare for Life Alone” offered last month.

For years Pat has been involved with veterans functions, the flag dedication ceremony, and displaying the colors on the appropriate holidays.

Pat’s life pre-Port Ludlow started out in the Northeast. She was born in Boston and raised largely in Philadelphia. She trained as a registered nurse at Pennsylvania Hospital, the nation’s first hospital, founded in 1751 by Benjamin Franklin. She met her late husband in San Francisco. He was in the Navy JAG Corps, and during his career they lived in San Francisco, the Philippines, Virginia, and San Diego.

Pat and Tom always said the best decision they ever made was to move to Port Ludlow, and she still believes that. Only one person she has met was born and raised here. The rest come from other places. They arrive as strangers, toss aside the mantle of their former lives, and become friends. After 23 years, she still remains a happy resident of Bayview Village.

Aphidoidea, Order Hemiptera

Every spring those cottony threads seem to appear out of nowhere. Actually, the aphid eggs have been there all winter long and can survive in temperatures down to -42 C. In North America there are 1,350 aphid species, while worldwide there are 5,000 species.

The aphids form colonies and start sucking sap from the plant’s phloem vessels. When the plant dies and food becomes scarce, some of the aphids grow wings and deposit wingless young on new plants.

Aphids can reproduce without mating. The eggs in the female develop before birth—all daughters, which already have the eggs of the next generation at birth. They mature in seven to ten days and reproduce every 20 to 30 days, with 40 to 60 offspring. In a few weeks there are hundreds of thousands of these 1/8-inch, soft-bodied, usually green or white but also red, brown, or black aphids.

Not only do they suck out the sap, but they also cause the host plant to change the chemistry of the sap to benefit the aphid. At Bielefeld University in Germany, researchers found that an infestation feeding close to new plant buds altered the concentration of organic acids and sugar in the sap, while a different species feeding on mature leaves caused plants to increase the amount of amino acids in the sap.

Aphids also excrete a sugary substance called honeydew that attracts beneficial ants who protect them and even move them to new plants. The honeydew also fosters black fungus and as they move to new plants, the aphids take with them a variety of plant viruses.

To get rid of these pests you can blast them with a hose, wash them with a diluted solution of water and dish soap or insecticide soap, and spray with horticultural oils like Neem. A less direct method is to plant marigolds, calendula, sunflower, daisy,

allyssum, or dill near the plants at risk. These plants attract beneficial insects, like Ladybugs, that will eat the aphids. No matter what method you choose, you will need to repeat the treatment several times during the summer.

The Sky Up There: The Summer Solstice

The summer solstice describes a unique phenomenon that occurs twice yearly on Earth—once in the Northern Hemisphere, once in the Southern Hemisphere—and marks the first day of Summer. In the Northern Hemisphere that date is always within a day or so of June 21. It signals three months of beautiful weather: sunny skies, warm days, gentle breezes, picnics, boating—you name it.

So how does it happen? This is where it gets a little complicated. To begin, the Earth’s orbit around the Sun isn’t circular, it’s elliptical—a circle that’s been squeezed a little bit. That has consequences. Among other things, it means that as Earth orbits the Sun, part of the time it’s a little closer and part of the time it’s a little further away. When it’s closer, the Earth speeds up; when it’s further away, it slows down. That’s why the first day of Summer, and the first day of all seasons for that matter, varies by date.

In addition, the plane of the Earth’s orbit around the Sun is *tilted* to the plane on the Sun’s equator. So, too, are all the orbits of all the planets. This orbital plane is called the ecliptic. It means that for six months each year the Earth is above the solar equator, and for six months, it is below it. As a consequence, during each six-month period one hemisphere of our planet is getting more sunlight—thus, Spring and Summer—while the other is getting less—Fall and Winter. Then it flips.

The summer solstice in our hemisphere occurs on the date when the Sun is highest in the sky, and we experience the most sunlit hours of the year. Beginning the very next day, that number of hours starts to drop as we move toward Fall (the autumnal equinox) and on to Winter (the winter solstice—and the shortest day of the year.) Then, just in time, it starts all over. Winter heading to Spring, Spring to Summer. There. Simple, what?

Choosing to be an Elder Orphan

Three years ago, I wrote an article about “Elder Orphans,” a newly-coined term at the time referring to those of us who have no partners, and either have no children or have children who are grown and living far away. I likened the concept to the television show *The Golden Girls*, which ran in the last half of the 1980s and into the 1990s. It was the story of four women, post-husband and child-rearing, as they shared a house together. In the past couple of years, the Netflix series *Grace and Frankie* tells the same sort of stories from the perspective of twenty-first century women. At the time I wrote that article, there were many communities, both online and in reality, that centered on elders who have chosen to combine their strengths with others and continue their lives living independently, but not alone.

In researching to bring my previous article up-to-date, I have discovered that the concept of Elder Orphan which was one of support and community a few years ago, has become a topic of some very depressing, if not scary, conversation. Instead of discussing the ways in which elders can join forces and embrace a life of Elder Interdependence, what's written now is more about the pitfalls of being isolated, lonely, and a possible victim of abuse. Some have even come across as shaming those who chose to not have children as receiving payback in their elder years for having been so selfish. This is *not* how we support ourselves and each other.

I encourage people to see the goodness and the possibilities of combining resources with others. There are, of course, senior living housing or centers which may be overly-structured or not structured at all. There are over "55/60" apartment complexes that tend to be rather expensive. And, there are other dynamic ways to approach this stage of life—whether in a larger community of tiny houses or apartments, or choosing to share one's home with someone who is in a similar situation.

In a larger housing community of elders, everyone has their own home, but there is a central, community-based effort amongst the

residents to support each other while investing in the community. Neighbors keep an eye on each other, work in community gardens together, and are available to lend support when a community member needs it. In sharing a home together, each person would, possibly by necessity, have to make different lifestyle choices than if they were living alone, but can continue to live in the manner they want to be living by creating a situation that is mutually supportive, a la *The Golden Girls*. This works especially well in areas where the houses, while once filled with spouses and children, are now too large for one person to live in and continue with upkeep. Combining interests and living space can keep elders active and independent, while opening them up to the possibilities of solidifying old friendships, if not beginning new ones.

Why not? I was a dreamer who loved to write. Short stories, poetry, plays ... I had folders full of musings, writings dating from age eight. An only child, I grew up in a tiny town in rural Nebraska (800 residents); my graduating class numbered 27. It was a big step for my parents to send me to the University of Nebraska, 80 miles away, instead of the nearby state college, much closer. But, Lincoln it was, and I obtained a teaching degree in English, journalism, speech and drama.

Did I ultimately teach in Nebraska? I interviewed for positions everywhere EXCEPT Nebraska. I had no clue where I wanted to go, but I knew I was ready for a Grand Adventure. I chose Southern California (my parents were dismayed), signing a contract in January to begin teaching September, 1964. But, in May, I met my husband-to-be, Jim. We dated during the summer, fell in love ... and I left for California the end of August—alone.

Well, gee whiz! I just said 'husband-to-be' so you know it all worked out for us—just a year later. In fact, we're celebrating our 54th anniversary July 31.

My teaching career was split into two parts, SoCal and later Colorado. Children and geography (due to my husband's career) presented detours between. I taught high schoolers; some of my students gained notoriety as the South Park team (achieving a fame—and fortune—which would elude me), while others moved into academia, even professorships. I lay claim to an Emmy-winning musician (he thanks me for his great speaking skills), a Los Angeles stage actor, and even a face that keeps popping up on commercials for television.

I discovered other loves between teaching assignments, such as taking the reins of a Colorado arts council. Surrounded by artists and musicians, I joined the ranks of the local Chorale, performed in and/or directed plays. My life was fun, interesting. My husband was supportive, my kids were ... kids! Maybe a bit offbeat, but then, I never claimed to be 'normal' myself! Later,

I mastered the art of interviewing fascinating people far more notable than me during stints as a newspaper editor, and found my voice on the coveted 'editorial opinion' page.

Life moved forward. Was I really a half-century into my existence? Fully retired from teaching and the newspaper business, I was hired as publicist for a major Denver university, where Pope Paul came to visit and I met the Dalai Lama. My cup runneth over; I felt blessed. Not that everything was always hunky-dory. There were challenges, obstacles. But if the glass is half full instead of half empty, life is good. By this time, my husband had formed a small representative business and we frequently traveled a tri-state territory (CO, NM, WY), giving us the taste of a gypsy lifestyle.

In 2009, Jim turned his beloved company over to the next generation, and we considered our options. Should we board a cruise ship, embarking on a world cruise with all the amenities of a retirement home? Having been boaters enjoying the warm waters off Florida's Gulf Coast, we pondered buying a trawler and spending the next phase of our life cruising the San Juan and Canadian Gulf Islands (we had chartered frequently in the NW). Or, perhaps we could acquire a motor coach and travel this magnificent country. We'd always enjoyed camping — why not try 'glamping'?

The idea became a reality. We bought an iconic Blue Bird motor home, 43' long, with the goal of becoming full-time RVers! After a few months of 'testing' life on the road, we sold our house in Colorado and began to travel in earnest. I dubbed the rig *Bird Trek*.

East, west, north, south. Vast stretches of interstate. Curving side roads with no shoulder. Cliff-hanging highways with steep drop-offs. Montana bridges suspended in space, canyons below. Shadowy drives into dank dense old-growth forests. Crumbling stretches of Highway 101, the ocean directly below us. Hectic Houston, with roadwork cement barricades inches from our chrome trim and semis pushing us ever closer to the concrete stanchions. The I-10 elevated in Louisiana, seeing the bayou for the very first time.

Exploring the ancient ruins of Mesa Verde, the Canyonlands of Utah. Awed by the mighty Mississippi, the proud Missouri, the rivers that criss-cross this incredible country of ours. The study in contrasts between the hill country of Texas and the plains, or South Dakota's Black Hills versus the Badlands. The majesty of Glacier National Park, the unique hot pools and geysers in Yellowstone.

We were entranced by the strange Joshua Tree which bloomed profusely just before dying, and the Saguaro Cactus with its enticing fruit. Desert wildflowers; the momentary beauty of the Arizona cacti—so many varieties and shapes, unique blossoms.

Deer, elk, moose, bear, wildcats, buffalo ... javelina, rattlers, bald eagles, osprey, seagulls ... What an amazing planet! And what fun this Grand Adventure was for two retired wanderers!

Yet ... what about those other plans—the ones to write the Great American Novel (G.A.N.), or an Off-Broadway play? During our nine years as full-time RVers, I created alter-egos named Maggie and Ben Graham (younger than my husband and me by 20 years), and detailed their RV travels to places we'd enjoyed in the BIRD TREK MYSTERY SERIES (four books, light reading, definitely not G.A.N.). The first, *Soul of the Forest*, took the Grahams to the Redwoods National Forest and an off-beat campground nestled deep in the trees. *Spirit of the Joshua* introduced the Joshua Tree National Forest, with its otherworldly rock formations and unusual flora. Moving up the coast of Oregon, *Mists of Deception - Yaquina Head*, examined a murder at a prestigious RV resort perched on a cliff above the ocean. The fourth, *Whispers in the Wind - Willapa Bay*, took us to our beloved Washington, and the Long Beach Peninsula. I always combined mysticism and mystery, and worked to create vivid characters. All are available for electronic readers through Amazon, and I write under the moniker of J. A. Harper.

And now? After passing the 'three-quarters of a century' mark, we decided to hang up the keys and hopefully grow up. Step one was purchasing a home in Port Ludlow, one of our favorite spots to visit by land or by sea. Step two was selling our motor coach and buying a small travel trailer, because there are still places to go, sights to see.

The play ... the Off-Broadway one? I've written a COMEDY CABARET series (six one-hour plays) which I produced at motor coach resorts in Newport (OR) and Aguanga (CA). Reality check: I never said how FAR Off Broadway!

East Jefferson County Memory Café

According to Alzheimer's Association, alz.org, 5.8 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's disease, and 16 million people provide unpaid care for people with memory impairment. They spend 18.5 billion caregiving hours at a value of \$234 billion. Eighty-three percent of help provided to people with dementia come from family members, friends, or other unpaid caregivers. About one in three caregivers are 65 or older, two-thirds are women, and one third are daughters. Most caregivers (66 percent) live with the person with dementia. Of the total lifetime cost of caring for someone with dementia, 70 percent is borne by families, either through out-of-pocket health and long-term care expenses, or from the value of unpaid care.

Alzheimer's takes a devastating toll on caregivers. Compared with caregivers of people without dementia, twice as many caregivers of those with dementia indicate substantial emotional, financial, and physical difficulties. Clearly, there is a high need for caregiver support and information.

A new and innovative type of support has been developed nationwide called Memory Cafés, and its mission statement is to destigmatize dementia. A Memory Café is an inviting place for people with memory loss, and their family and friends, to connect, socialize, and enjoy each other's company.

Jefferson County has the oldest demographic population in the State of Washington, and memory loss is a huge concern to all of us. Locally, we are fortunate to have the East Jefferson County Memory Café. It is a place where people with any stage of dementia or memory loss are all welcome.

The group meets every 4th Thursday from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. at Ferino's Pizzeria in Port Hadlock. Ferino's owner, Adam Burns, and staff always give a warm welcome and are very accommodating and supportive of the group. Other resources in Jefferson County include the Dementia Friends Initiative. It is a part of a global movement working to change the way people think, act, and talk about dementia. In Washington State, this initiative is being led by the Dementia Action Collaborative, a voluntary private-public partnership working to implement the Washington State Plan to address Alzheimer's and other dementias. VegRx Returns to Farmers Market

VegRx, a fruit and vegetable prescription program piloted last year, will again be available to the community thanks to a partnership between Jefferson Healthcare, Jefferson County Farmers Markets, and the Port Townsend Food Coop.

VegRx partners want to connect more lower-income families with fresh, locally grown produce. Coupons for VegRx will be distributed to qualifying families during pediatric clinic visits at Jefferson Healthcare. This season, coupons can be redeemed at the Port Townsend and Chimacum Farmers Market booths starting in June. When the market season closes in December, the Port Townsend Food Coop will step in and offer a voucher, good from January through March 2020, for fresh fruit and vegetables.

The program was piloted in 2018 to increase consumption of fruits and vegetables, support equitable food access, and support our local food economy. Currently, the program specifically targets families with children; the poverty rate for children under 13 is higher in Jefferson County than the Washington state average.

“VegRx recipients who qualify for SNAP and FMNP will also be able to get those federal food assistance dollars matched at the Port Townsend and Chimacum Farmers Markets. We are committed to continuing our work and strengthening our community partnerships so all people in our community, regardless of income, can access nutritious, locally grown food,” said Jefferson County Farmers Market Director Amanda Milholland.

VegRx partners hope to expand the reach of this program in 2019 to serve more families. Dr. Molly Parker is championing the program within the Jefferson Healthcare primary care clinics. “We could have reached additional families last season, and we didn’t, which was disappointing; so now we can spread the word about the program and make sure every available coupon is given to an eligible family. I’d much rather write a prescription for fruits and vegetables to prevent illness than write a prescription for pills after an illness has occurred.”

The Peninsula Support Organization is sponsoring the “Cash for Platinum and Gold” event on **Saturday, June 22**, at the Bay Club in the Craft Room from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Start sorting out all of your old, broken, or unwanted gold, sterling, and platinum items and bring them to the Bay Club on June 22 for cash.

The buyer, Stan Morton, had been in retail and wholesale jewelry business for much of his life and started Cash for Platinum & Gold more than forty years ago to supplement his retirement. His focus is on buying gold, silver, and platinum. All of his business comes from referrals, as satisfied customers have learned he offers as much as 50 percent more than other buyers of precious metals. Stan states that he has the best pricing because he has low overhead and personal relationships with the local west coast refiners to do the smelting and assaying. According to Stan, even jewelers call him to buy their scrap gold and old inventories; he gives them the same pricing he gives to individuals.

Stan lives in Newport Beach, California, and has been an ambassador with the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce for over 15 years. He’s a volunteer in his community and has worked with charities, churches, and synagogues to put on “Cash for Platinum and Gold” fundraising events for their memberships.

The process to sell and buy is simple. Stan weighs each item and then tests to determine the content (for instance, with gold, whether it’s 10k, 14k, 18k, 22k, 24k, or something in between). He pays in cash and provides a receipt for each client’s records. Stan has been coming to Port Ludlow for seven years and has an avid following. He donates 10 percent of his proceeds to the Peninsula Support Organization, which supports STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Science) in local schools and the World Vision Essential Supplies program.

- **Wednesday, June 26**, at 4:30 p.m. in Port Hadlock

The MRCs have lined up a team of expert crabbers to answer all your questions. Experts will demonstrate how to rig your crab pot properly with buoys, lines, and weights. They'll talk about best baits, Washington Department Fish and Wildlife regulations, and favorite local crabbing spots.

This is part of a regional effort to reduce the number of lost crab pots. Each year an estimated 12,000 crab pots are lost in Puget Sound and, thanks to the work of the Northwest Straits Initiative, crabbers are learning how to avoid contributing to the problem. Lost crab pots continue to capture crab with no one to harvest them, resulting in nearly 180,000 Dungeness crabs lost each year.

- Don't broadcast your absence on social media.

- Use an outdoor sensor light and consider timers for turning an indoor light or two, on and off.
- Call the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office at 360-385-3831 and request a vacation check. These checks are free of charge, and a sheriff's office representative will check on your house while you are away to verify that it is secure.



There was no television, computers, cell phone texting, or social networks. Their network was face to face.

They enjoyed or suffered the consequences of their activities depending on the outcome. This prepared them for adulthood and the traumas of real life.

The stories take place in a small farm town in the California's Sacramento Valley. They are told in chronological order starting at age five until age sixteen. Some could have had serious consequences, while others were just funny with no serious outcome. They cover the gamut from experimenting with electricity at age five, encountering a hangman's noose, trying to ride a cow, killing a chicken, and learning to drive a 1929 Model A Ford flatbed truck. Each story has an accompanying sketch artfully created by Claudia Avicola. The book is available on Amazon and at Frances' Contract Post Office in the Village.

Poets in Conversation: Tess Gallagher and Carlos Reyes




Quilting is Her Passion

She started sewing at age 11 and continued into her adult life, progressing to tailoring, sewing wedding gowns, draperies, and anything else that was needed. Upon her discovery of quilting, she found a local quilt guild in Maryland, the Friendship Star Quilters, *Friendshipstar.org*, and the learning began. Also on the program are Edvard Grieg's *Holberg Suite* and the playful *Tico-Tico no Fuba* by Zequinha de Abreu.

A well-rounded musician, Port Townsend's Otto Smith studied piano and voice as a child. He started his migration from folk guitar to English system concertina in 1977 and has been involved with folk and classical concertina since then. He helped create the Puget Sound Concertina Band and has performed Irish, Scandinavian, Klezmer, and American folk music in addition to classical repertoire. Smith has been with the Port Townsend Community Orchestra for over 25 years playing percussion and tympani.

At 90 years old, James Cohn is still actively writing new music and getting new commissions. Smith discovered Cohn's 1966 *Concertina Concerto* a few years ago and has been getting to know it since. address certain passages to get the most out of his instrument and interpretation. The concerto consists of three movements: an Allegretto Capriccio, an Andante Romanza, and a rollicking Rondo labeled Presto con fuoco.

One of Edvard Grieg’s most notable works is the *Holberg Suite*. The work was originally composed for a concert honoring fellow Bergen artist Ludvig Holberg’s 200th anniversary. The work consists of an introduction followed by four movements based on dance tunes from Holberg’s classical era.

Rounding out the concert is an arrangement of Zequinha de Abreu’s fast and happy *Tico-Tico no Fuba* or “Sparrow in the cornmeal.” This is a Brazilian Choro song originally written in 1917, with Portuguese lyrics added in the 1930s. It was a hit by the Andrews Sisters (with English lyrics) in 1944 and Carmen Miranda in 1945. Still a hit, recordings have been made as recently as 2017.

Kitsap Forest Theater

Take a walk back in time at the Kitsap Rhododendron Preserve where the Mountaineers Foundation presents two plays each summer on their 460-acre nature conservancy with over 70 acres of old-growth forest.

Come join the adventure as *Newsies*, based on a 1992 movie and inspired by a true story, is brought to life on a unique outdoor stage. Performances will be on **Saturdays and Sundays, June 1 through June 16** at 2:00 p.m. The musical *Mamma Mia* will be performed in July and August.

The quarter-mile trail to the performance location transports you to a magical place where stories have come to life for the past 88 years. Instead of curtains or lights, there are singing birds and a sun-dappled stage. Giant old-growth firs surround the stage, while cedar bark and living moss cover the “wing walls.” Seating is carved out of the side of a natural amphitheater. The trail opens at 1:00 p.m. It is recommended that you arrive there early, as this is a popular venue. If you are not able to hike the trail to the venue, a minibus escorts people via a short drive.

Before or after the performance, you can hike the trail to “Big Tree.” It is about half a mile long and starts near the historic Kitsap Cabin, ending at one of the 10 largest Douglas fir trees in the world. The hike takes you on a bridge over Wildcat Creek with views of Hidden Valley, blooming trillium, wild rhododendrons, and many other native trees and plants. Wear walking shoes! There is a wonderful playground with a treehouse and other enticements for kids to let off steam after quietly behaving during the performance.

Village Council

Board Meeting Summary

As the first order of business at their May meeting, the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Board of Directors wished Linda Karp the very best in her new home in Sacramento, California. Linda has worked with the Village Council to ensure that the community is up-to-date on all the information necessary to Port Ludlow—oftentimes suggesting topics that needed to be addressed. President Bill Dean stated, “Linda has been such a big part of Port Ludlow, she will truly be missed. We wish her well in her new home.”

The Village Council welcomed two new board members: Mike Towner as a director, and Allan Kiesler as Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) President, replacing Randy Deering who retired in April. Mike moved to Port Ludlow in August 2018 and has been serving on the Emergency Management Committee for several months. Allan is well known in Port Ludlow and has been active with LMC for the past several years, as well as serving on the Village Council Roadway Safety Committee. Additionally, Steve Frenzl was nominated to become Vice President, replacing Steve Hammond who held the position since October 2018.

The Roadway Safety Committee (Steve Frenzl and Allan Kiesler) met with the county Department of Public Works staff and the consultant who has been hired to evaluate the Roadway Safety Committee’s recommendations. The consultant plans a survey of Port Ludlow’s roadways, which will begin in July when the full population of Port Ludlow is in residence.

Danille Turissini gave an update of the activities of the Emergency Management Committee. Most specifically, there has been an enhanced recruitment and training of Block Captains, as well as developing the Neighborhood Operations Center (NOC), which will act as “information central” during an emergency situation. Dani is working with the County Department of Emergency Services to develop the plan for Port Ludlow to maximize the use of CERT trained volunteers and determine a training curriculum for block captains. She also reminded everyone that the Emergency Management Fair will be held on **Saturday, June 22**, at the Beach Club.

Finally, the board provided an update on the Port Ludlow Post Office situation, which by press time may have been resolved. Diana Smeland stated that Frances has notified Port Ludlow Associates of the termination of her lease for the Post Office building. Diana has been in touch with both the Postmaster in Port Hadlock and Post Office management in Seattle, but no decision has been made, as yet, for a replacement tenant to run the facility. The Post Office management in Seattle has indicated their intent to keep the facility operating and does have at least one party interested in becoming the operator.

Both the Village Council and PLA have also been in contact with the officials of the Postal Service in Port Hadlock and Seattle regarding maintaining service in Port Ludlow. Although there is no final arrangement, the Postal Service is in the process of

negotiating a contract to continue operations in Port Ludlow and is working for service to be continued on an uninterrupted basis.

Treasurer Paul Hinton reported that the beginning balance was \$24,545.39 with income of \$310.00. Expenses totaled \$1083.13 leaving an ending Balance on April 30, 2019 of \$23,772.26.

Sitting on the covered portion of my deck in mid-March wearing a winter coat, watching a cold rain fall, and the steam rising from my coffee, I wondered: how did someone from the industrial Midwest end up here?

My father was pushed north by the Great Depression in search of work. Neither he nor my mother ever fully adjusted to leaving the South, so that even as a child, I often thought that I was born and raised in Tennessee in Northern Indiana. My parents and my sister eventually resettled in Middle Tennessee, and though I loved the trips South, and adopted an instantaneous Southern Accent when there, I moved to a faint but different music.

Perhaps it was my father’s tale of the day the Great Roscoe Turner and his pet lion showed up in Savannah, Tennessee, for

an air show, that spawned my interest in flying. I can't say for sure, but I spent seven years as a pilot for the Air Force, and then worked for American Airlines.

When I was hired by American, I thought of the work as temporary until I could fully decide what I wanted to be when I grew up. Thirty-three years later I smiled, realizing that the decision looked pretty permanent.

My work at American involved an association with Boeing during American's purchase, acceptance, and introduction into service of the 777. When I retired from American, I was hired by Boeing, and that introduced me to Seattle, where, when not traveling for work, I would ride the ferry which was and is a great treat (except for the bad coffee). The ferry took me to Port Townsend, and after retiring from Boeing, though I lived in Colorado to watch my grandsons grow into adults, I never lost the lure of the Northwest.

SBCA has a fiscal year that runs from July 1 to June 30—the current fiscal year began July 1, 2018 and will end June 30, 2019. In late February or early March, the association general manager (GM) begins his analysis of the current year's income and expenses, then extrapolates the balance of the year based on that data, as well as historical financial data.

The draft budget is shared with the seven Finance Committee members who are assigned portions of the budget to review and collaborate with the GM to validate each account. After the committee reviews the updated draft budget accounts, the adjusted draft budget is forwarded to the SBCA Board of Directors who then review and make any adjustments.

When the board is satisfied with the draft budget, a motion is made to accept it, and it is included in the packet that goes out to each SBCA member before the annual meeting. Each SBCA member has an opportunity to vote to accept the budget or not. Historically the proposed budget has been accepted by the

She complimented the "flapjack flippers" as well as the kitchen crew that kept a steady flow of batter ready for the grill-meisters and noted that Rick Smith had so much fun serving sausage and bacon that he volunteered to do it again on June 7! Barb concluded, "My deep appreciation to members of the community for attending the breakfast and bringing family and friends. Support for the Chimacum High School Golf Team

The Port Ludlow Golf Club and the Men's Golf Association provide an impressive amount of support each year for the Chimacum High School Golf Team. The golf club has allowed the team to use the Ludlow course as their practice facility during the high school golf season, which runs from early March through the end of May. This has been ongoing since 2010.

Home matches for the team are hosted on the Ludlow course. Members of the Port Ludlow Golf Club staff have worked as coaches for the team in the last few years.

In 2016 the Men's Golf Association in Port Ludlow started soliciting donations from its members when annual dues for the association were collected. These donations helped the Chimacum team members purchase the equipment and clothing needed for their season. Donations for the 2019 season exceeded \$1,000.

Boaters Divert Nearly 11 Million Gallons of Sewage from Washington Waters

With funding from the Clean Vessel Act program, 144 pumpout stations help divert sewage from coastal and inland waters in Washington.

Washington boaters diverted nearly 11 million gallons of sewage from coastal and inland waters by pumping out their boat holding tanks at 144 pumpout stations last year. This free service allows boaters to offload their sewage quickly and safely, helping to preserve Washington water quality. Pumpout Washington is managed by Washington State Parks and Washington Sea Grant, as part of The Washington Clean Vessel Act program. The number of pumpouts in recent years has increased as boater demand has risen, with the most recent site added at the West Beach Resort on Orcas Island last year. More stations are planned, including a solar-powered pumpout boat to be built by the Northwest School of Wooden Boat Building for Port Ludlow Marina.

To aid in the pumpout process, boaters may pick up a free adapter kit designed by Washington Sea Grant at yacht clubs or other organizations that serve recreational boaters. The adapters make it easier for boaters to use pumpout stations without making a mess by creating a secure connection with the pump. Washington Sea Grant is conducting a state-wide inventory of functional pumpouts this summer.
