Village Council Requests PUD Boundary Review

At the scheduled workshop meeting of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) on Thursday, October 18, a presentation was made by Phil Otness, Chairman of the Utilities Committee, and Dwayne Wilcox and Ron Null regarding Public Utility District #1. As a result of this presentation, the Village Council unanimously voted to request that the Board of County Commissioners appoint a Boundary Review Board. They also voted to contact our County Commissioner Glen Huntingford and request that he meet with the Village Council at a special workshop on October 25.

The PLVC action follows a request made on June 5 by the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) via letter to the Jefferson County Commissioners requesting that a Boundary Review Board be established that would relieve the property owners from participating in the Public Utility District (PUD). The letter said in part, "The Trustees found that the PUD does not provide, nor has ever provided, any services to the area served by the LMC." Because of the interest in the PUD and the fact that the Village Council is looking into the matter, the *Voice* felt it would be appropriate to examine the issues presented.

Following is a question and answer (Q. and A.) analysis of the PUD provided by Dwayne Wilcox, a retired attorney from the Dallas area, and Ron Null, also a retired attorney, from the San Diego area. Both of these gentlemen are residents of Port Ludlow. The *Voice* appreciates their contribution.

Questions regarding the PUD as answered by Ronald Null and Dwayne Wilcox.

Q: What is PUD #1 and from what does it derive its revenues?

A: PUD #1 is a Public Utility District, formed in 1940, from authority given by State of Washington statutes. PUD revenues come from property taxes and fees from utility services provided by the PUD.

Q: What law passed by the State of Washington Legislature regulates PUD # 1 of Jefferson County and what does that law allow the PUD to do?

A: The Public Utilities District Act adopted by the State Legislature in 1930 provides the legal basis for PUDs. This act authorizes utility districts to be established to provide water and electrical services. The Law has also been amended to allow a district to acquire and/or operate sewer works. Last year the Law was amended to allow the acquisition or construction of telecommunication facilities.

Q: Why was the PUD Law considered necessary?

A: Many western states were adopting similar laws in the 1930s. Rural communities were developing in these states that were not part of an incorporated city, but were in need of basic services such as water and electricity. Public Utility Districts were a means to allow these rural areas to be combined into a district, with the power to tax, charge service fees and to incur indebtedness (sell bonds) to provide these services.

Q: Is Port Ludlow an area that can benefit from a PUD?

A: It is questionable if there is any benefit to be obtained from a PUD by Port Ludlow and, therefore, whether it should be included in PUD #1. The reason is that Port Ludlow has a private company that provides water and sewer, another utility company supplies us with electricity, and yet other companies provide telephone service and cable television (including new high-speed fiber optic capabilities). Port Ludlow outgrew the need for a rural-oriented PUD many years ago. As noted above, Port Ludlow has more services already provided by other sources than can be offered or provided by the PUD. To continue to be in the PUD would be pulling the area backward, so to speak, in receiving basic services.

Q: What area constitutes District 3, the area in which we live, and what are the District 3 required functions?

A: The "Districts" referred to in connection with PUD #1 are the Commissioner election districts. Three Commissioners control the PUD; each elected from a district within the PUD. Port Ludlow is in Area 3 of PUD #1 and generally includes the Shine and Mats Mats areas. The PUD services only the water, sewer and septic tanks and has approximately 966 paying accounts. Port Ludlow has about 1200 water connections and receives no services from PUD while paying about 11.5% of the total taxes received by the PUD.

Q: Who owns and operates the water and sewer system in Port Ludlow?

A: Port Ludlow is served by a private company, owned and operated by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). This was one of the assets/facilities acquired by them from Olympic Property Group. According to statements made by the president of PLA, this asset was valued at \$2,000,000 plus, at the time of the purchase from Olympic Property Group.

Q: If no water service is provided to Port Ludlow, what services are provided to this area?

A: There are no utility-type services provided to Port Ludlow by the PUD. At a recent Port Ludlow Village Council meeting, the only "service" mentioned by the manager of the PUD was providing back-up to the water service now provided from the Olympic Water and Sewer (OWSI). Obviously this is a potential service with no cost involved to the PUD until and unless they are called upon to actually provide water service here.

Q: If Port Ludlow is not receiving any services from the PUD, where are the taxes paid by Port Ludlow property owners to the PUD being used?

A: Herein lies one of the major concerns. The PUD budget and financial records do not show the use of tax revenues on an area-by-area basis. Therefore, it is impossible to track where and how the tax revenues from Port Ludlow are being used.

Q: Since Port Ludlow is not provided water, sewer or any other service from the PUD, should not the PUD show how and where tax revenue from the area is being used?

A: This is another concern with the PUD financial procedures. State law provides that if property is located in a PUD but does not receive a particular utility service from that PUD, but in fact receives that service from some other entity, the property cannot be taxed by the PUD to fund that same service. More specifically; since Port Ludlow is located within the PUD, but receives no utility services from the PUD, the PUD should not be allowed to tax Port Ludlow property to fund any utility services.

Q: Approximately what are the tax revenues paid by Jefferson County to the PUD (and what portion of such taxes are paid to District 3)?

A: For the 2001 Real and Personal Property tax distribution from Jefferson County, \$371,035 went to PUD #1, of which Port Ludlow residents paid 11.5% or approximately \$42,670. According to the proposed 10-year forecast of PUD #1, the revenues to be paid by Port Ludlow would increase substantially without the necessity of providing any services or showing the use or disposition of such taxes.

Q: What steps may be taken by Port Ludlow residents to correct the practices of the PUD?

A: Since the PUD Commissioners do not appear willing to voluntarily change their practices, any changes will need to be imposed on the PUD. This would typically mean a lawsuit to require the PUD to segregate the tax revenue received from Port Ludlow and show where and how it is used.

Q: Is there any other solution short of a lawsuit?

A: Yes. Washington State Law authorizes a county, through action of the County Commissioners, to establish a Boundary Review Commission in the County. This Commission has the authority, among other things,

to change the boundaries of the PUD if they determine there is good reason to do so. Since the PUD provides no utilities to the Port Ludlow area, we believe this is the best solution. But, first, the County Commissioners must establish the Boundary Review Commission. The LMC has previously attempted such boundary review through the County Commissioners' office, but has not received any co-operation. The Port Ludlow Village Council should undertake such boundary review on behalf of the entire citizenry of Port Ludlow, including Port Ludlow Associates.

Q: If the residents of Port Ludlow are successful in obtaining an adjustment of the taxes what would be the benefit to the area?

A: All property tax bills in Port Ludlow would be reduced by the amount that would otherwise go to the PUD.

Village Council News

The Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) held its annual meeting on Thursday, October 4. A budget was approved for fiscal year (FY) 2002, committee reports were presented, updates were provided by Fire Chief Wayne Kier and County Commissioner Glen Huntingford and election results for the FY2002 PLVC Board of Directors were announced. In addition, representatives of HCV Pacific Partners and Port Ludlow Associates responded to audience questions.

FY2002 Budget

The Council approved an annual budget of \$24,300, based on anticipated income from Friday Market (\$400), sales of the phone directory (\$8,400) and a 2002 Port Ludlow Festival (\$15,500). Planned expenses against this income include Friday Market (\$500), phone directory printing, etc. (\$2,720), Festival costs (\$10,550), plus amounts for emergency preparedness (\$1,669), council elections (\$1,640), trails (\$1,500) and assorted community projects (\$4,571).

Annual Committee Reports

Summary reports were presented for several standing committees. Highlights: The master event calendar is now being assembled for 2002. To have a scheduled event placed on the calendar take the information to the Village Council box at the Bay Club. For questions, or to check on the dates of events already scheduled, please contact Connie Wilkinson at 437-9450. Over 50 people participated in the Timberton Loop Trail Run/Walk during the Festival. The new version of the Timberton Loop map includes distances to the trail markers. The Trails Committee hopes to next collaborate with Port Ludlow Associates to create trail links, particularly between the Resort and the North Bay, and to produce a community trail map.

The number of Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers has increased to 52. A manual for block captains is under development, and the house-numbering project is progressing. The revised Port Ludlow Long-Range Plan was approved by the Council, which will now share the document with the County and community and seek the plan's endorsement by Port Ludlow Associates. The Port Ludlow Festival was a financial and fellowship success, and plans are underway for next year's community celebration. The organizers of Friday Market note that when the market opens in mid-May,

flowers are available but produce is not. Chair Don Cooper is considering beginning and ending the market season later to more closely match produce availability. Let him know what you think at 437-2300. FYI from the Recycling Committee: Wine and beer drinkers willing to "go the extra mile" may take green glass, and other recyclables, to the staffed recycling station in Poulsbo. It is located at Viking Way north of 305 and is open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday.

Sewer Charges Discussed

Phil Otness, Chair of the Utilities Committee, said that the next sewer rate review is delayed by Port Ludlow Water and Sewer's purchase by Port Ludlow Associates from Olympic Resource Management. Greg McCarry stated that rate negotiations with the committee would take place despite the change. McCarry also fielded questions regarding the recent doubling of the sewer hook-up fee to \$8,000. He said the rate connection increase is not linked to ongoing rates, but rather to the \$2.5 million cost of acquiring the utility, \$500,000 in needed infrastructure updates and the \$300,000 to \$400,000 price tag for finishing out the plant's capacity.

Jefferson County

September was a "bittersweet" month according to Fire Chief Wayne Kier. Deeply saddened by the events of September 11, the Department is also deeply grateful for the overwhelming passage of the Emergency Medical Service Levy. Construction of Port Ludlow Station 31 is still on time and on or near budget. The station flagpole was recently renovated by department volunteers and is flying a large new flag. Commissioner Glen Huntingford said that the property taxes will likely increase 2.4 percent or less for the coming fiscal year. Owner Presents New and Old Faces

Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) is the independent company created by HCV Pacific Partners to own its Port Ludlow assets. PLA President Greg McCarry outlined its structure and current tasks. (See related article on page 21.) Larry Smith is responsible for Olympic Water and Sewer; Tom Griffin, for the real estate elements (lot sales, home construction and marketing); and Michael Pad-den, for the hospitality, or Resort, components (Inn, Golf Course, Marina, Conference Center). A weekly report is given to HCV, and the owners come to Port Ludlow every month for a two-day meeting. Top projects: Siting deci-

sions for the last 450 houses to be built, resort planning, and commercial improvements to the Village Center.

McCarry announced that PLA would no longer sell unimproved lots; from now, on PLA will be the builder for any construction on its lots, whether spec, semi-custom or custom homes (including those with buyer-supplied plans). Focus groups will be used to help with product planning. The RV Park is unprofitable and is likely to be developed for residential use. Location of an extended care facility in the commercial center doesn't look promising.

McCarry introduced Resort General Manager Michael Padden. Padden works for Benchmark Hospitality, and sees one of his first projects as integrating the systems, staffs and marketing components of "The Resort at Ludlow Bay." Other priorities are improvements to the golf clubhouse, expansion of the Marina by 100 slips (the goal is availability by summer of 2003) and decisions on other conference components such as rooms and food service. A new contract is being proposed to Admiralty owners; Resort use of the Bay and Beach Clubs will continue for now; and next year's rates for Marina slips will not be decided until a survey of boat owners, competitors and needed upgrades is completed.

Randall Verrue, HCV Pacific Partners President and CEO, reemphasized that his firm was, "Here for the long-term." Asked if HCV has any duty to involve residents in decision making, Verrue answered that, "We view residents as customers," and that any business that doesn't listen or attend to its customers is making a mistake. Olympic Property Group President Jon Rose, who welcomed HCV as neighbors, presented an immense, framed aerial photograph of Ludlow Bay to Verrue and McCarry.

PLVC Board Members Announced

Gratitude was expressed to outgoing board members Dave Graham and Dick Ullman for their dedicated community contributions. Elected to Village Council positions from North Bay are Ollie Gardner, Bob Herbst and Frank Siler. Phil Otness and Connie Wilkinson were reelected from South Bay. All amendments were approved, and therefore both the LMC and SBCA now have voting representatives on the Council—either the organization president or his/her designate.

The next meeting of the Village Council will be held on

Thursday, November 1, 9:00 a.m., at the Beach Club. The Council also meets in a workshop session on the third Thursday of the month, 9:00 a.m., at the Bay Club. Both meetings are open to the public and interested persons are invited to attend.

2. Shipping forms for UPS are also on the table.
3. The first register is for Post Office services; the second register is for UPS. Generally speaking, packages weighing more than seven pounds are less expensive shipped UPS rather than by the Postal Service depending on where they are going.
4. Last, but not least, mail or ship your packages well in advance to avoid the rush and long lines that develop the last three weeks before Christmas.

Is Alka Seltzer Plus In Your Medicine Cabinet?

According to the *Bremerton Sun* on October 11, a Hansville woman has gone public with a complaint about Alka Seltzer Plus with the ingredient PPA. Last December, after taking this product, she experienced a brain hemorrhage, underwent brain surgery, and has only recently been able to return to her job in Kingstons.

The *Sun* article said the woman was alerting people who may not know the Food and Drug Administration ordered the recall of products with PPA (phenylpropanolamine). Despite the recall, the dangers of this ingredient remain largely unknown to the public. A study begun in 1992 at Yale University concluded PPA products increase the likelihood of hemorrhagic strokes in people younger than 50. Many of the 400 products with PPA have now been reformulated without it.

LMC Board of Trustees Meeting

The October 20 meeting of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission Board (LMC) of Trustees was called to order by Chuck Wright, President.

Chief Wayne Kier of Fire District #3 presented the new Residential Burning Permit now in effect for Jefferson County. The LMC Covenants and Regulations Committee have been drafting a new regulation that would allow outdoor burning for only one week in the spring and one week in the late fall. The District #3 Fire Chief would set burning times and the District would issue a burning permit. The new Residential Burning Permit allows for three months of burning in the spring (March, April and May) and three months in the fall (October, November and December) and would not override local homeowner association burning regulations. The Board voted to send our draft back to Committee to study the new permit that will be posted at the Beach Club.

Dick Smith, Manager of the Beach Club, received applause when he advised a new garbage disposal had been installed in the Bayview Room kitchen. A cellular phone will be available for checkout from the Beach Club for use in the Bridge Deck until the problem of the phone connection to the Bridge Deck is resolved. New exercise equipment has been ordered, and a six-camera video monitoring system is being investigated for the Club.

Operations Chairman Larry Nobles reported Bernie Robinson is taking over special events for the LMC. The first event will be a Super Bowl Party. He lamented that she would not be able to do a Christmas or New Year's Eve Party, but was advised by Lenetta Johnson that parties are being planned by Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LOA) for both Christmas and New Year's Eve. Nobles reported the Operations Committee agreed unanimously to make the Beach Club a totally smoke-free facility. In checking into new carpet for the game room, it was

discovered the floor has to be repaired. He also advised plans are being developed to landscape the entrance to the Beach Club.

Dick Regan, Architectural Control Chairman, reported that during his tenure from the previous July, twenty-two new home applications have been received, far exceeding our budgeted ten new homes a year for architectural fees.

D. A. Routt, Covenants and Regulations Chairman, presented proposed changes for Outdoor Burning, Landlord Requirements, Notifications of Adjacent Property Owners and Adjacent Lot Line Setback. With the exception of Outdoor Burning, all were approved and will be posted at the Beach Club.

Stan Kadesh, County Affairs Chairman, urged people attend a County Hearing **Tuesday, November 6**, at 2:00 p.m., County Courthouse, second floor, where Port Ludlow Associate's ((PLA's) plea will be heard to place septic systems on the Walker Way Short Plat near the aquifer which supplies our drinking water previously denied by the County. PLA claims a consulting hydrologist's opinion is that the aquifer is 350 feet below where the well comes up (250 feet from the septic system) and that there is no way our drinking water could be contaminated. Chuck Wright reviewed a letter he sent to the County on June 26, with Board approval, indicating our disapproval of the septic systems. Wright appointed Kadesh to speak for the LMC Board at the hearing.

Marie Lytal, Secretary, presented a "Policy and Procedures for Observation and Comment by LMC Members at LMC Trustees' Meetings, Committee Meetings and Workshops," prepared in committee, to the Board and members in attendance for review. After extensive input from the members, the Board unanimously approved with one revision. The policy will be posted at the Beach Club.

President Chuck Wright appointed Stan Kadesh to chair a planning task force to study future uses of the RV storage facilities.

Bill Wilke, Drainage District Commissioner, advised there would be two seats available on the Port Ludlow Drainage District Commission. He requested that all interested parties should run.

Lot Owners News

The Directors of the North Bay Lot Owners Association (LOA) met on October 8 at the Beach Club. The major topic of discussion concerned the doubling of sewer hook-up fees by Olympic Water and Sewer, Inc. (OWSI). As reported in the October *Voice*, OWSI raised the cost per sewer hook-up from \$4,000 to \$8,000 giving neither a grace period nor prior notice to affected lot owners. Homeowner Robert Duce reported that other community hook-up fees on the Peninsula are appreciably less, most ranging from \$800–\$3,000 and are subject to PUD regulations including prior notification and grace periods. OWSI is a private company now owned by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA).

There are approximately 400 vacant lots in the North Bay neighborhood. Most owners would not pay the hook-up fee at this time and others have already paid. But lot owners with more immediate plans to build are negatively affected by the sudden price doubling and want a grace period during which time they could pay the \$4,000 fee. The LOA Board was unanimous in requesting that PLA and OWSI officers inform all affected lot owners of the potential cost increase and offer a grace period. A letter from the Board will be sent not only to them, but also to the Ludlow Maintenance Commission and Port Ludlow Village Council asking those organizations to support the request. The LOA Board also encouraged individuals to voice opinions directly. The good will created by proper notification and a reasonable grace period could far outweigh the relative loss of revenue.

Two new LOA Directors were unanimously approved to serve on the Board. Jerry Purdy and Lenetta Johnson will replace Chuck Baldwin and former secretary, Marie Lytal. Both new Directors were put to work immediately with Purdy taking over the chairmanship of the Clean Sweep Committee and Johnson helping with the various arts and social events planned by LOA. Dave Harris agreed to serve as secretary.

The Board approved an informational letter that will be given to each new North Bay homeowner with a copy of the Port Ludlow Phone Directory, a gift from LOA. Frances Gronewald, chair of the Welcoming Committee, requested help from the membership in identifying new homeowners who might have been overlooked.

Sally Orsborn reported that another \$1,000 had come in for the piano fund, leaving just under \$2,000 yet to be

raised. Donations may be made at the Beach Club office. Plans are underway for utilization of the new grand piano in recitals and performances. (See separate articles about three November LOA-sponsored events). The LOA will also sponsor a New Year's Eve celebration at the Beach Club with details to be announced later.

Ralph Thomas and the staff of the *Voice* were commended for the effective and efficient coverage of the community news. It was reported that help is needed in the areas of writing and distribution. Volunteers were encouraged to contact Ralph Thomas.

Stan Kadesh suggested that a presentation about wildlife in Port Ludlow be given at a future LOA meeting, specifically covering regulations and recommendations about control of the deer, raccoons, fox, coyote and cougars that have been seen in this area. Dave Harris agreed to find an appropriate speaker on the subject.

Scheduled LOA Board meetings will take place on the first Monday of the month, the next one on **Monday, November 5**, 9:30 a.m. at the Beach Club. See the *Voice* and watch the bulletin board at the Beach Club for future meetings, programs and events.

South Bay Board Meeting Update

The monthly Board of Directors' meeting was held on September 28 with nine guests and homeowners present. There were no new significant budget deviations other than our efforts to reduce power consumption, which seem to be succeeding, as we are \$1,000 under budget. Club membership increased by 5 to a new total of 417, including associate members. We are ahead of the number of members in our budget projections. The long-term maintenance committee made some recommendations on how to classify capital equipment versus expense items and these recommendations were accepted.

A presentation was made for the replacement of the pool disinfectant system with a new system that breaks down common salt to generate chlorine, saving approximately \$1,000 a year in chemical costs. The long-term maintenance plan schedule called for the old system to be replaced this year. A motion was made and accepted to purchase a system from TMI Corporation at a maximum expenditure of \$4,500.

There was a renewed discussion of having another internal audit with an "ad hoc" committee. It was decided that next calendar year's budget would include funds for a professional audit.

Richard Kastel, President of the Inner Harbor Homeowners' Association, addressed the appearance of the entry at Paradise Bay Road and Spinnaker Place. Inner Harbor has been maintaining this area for ten years but cannot absorb any capital costs for improvements. The SBCA Board has consistently resisted assuming responsibility for individual homeowner association entryways and monuments. However, all of us would like to see some improvements made in the entry way appearance. Bill Schoenemann was assigned to write a letter to the Garden Club to request their assistance in planning and performing some cleanup of the area.

The ARC has had two meetings with homeowner association representatives and is making progress in formulating changes, which would allow greater latitude for associations to make more decisions related to architectural and landscaping changes. More meetings are scheduled.

Repair of drywall and paint around the pool windows was quoted at \$3,207. It was decided that Mike Morgan should obtain another quote as well as buying a humidity gauge.

The implementation of a facility usage fee for some of the profit-making organizations that utilize the Bay Club at no cost was discussed. Representatives of the Arts Council felt they could not afford a fee at this time, since their annual budget assumes classical concerts will operate at a loss while others make a profit leaving minimal excess at the year's end. Representatives of the Broadway Show and Little Theater will be invited to attend the October meeting to present their viewpoint. On a similar vein, the Free Spirits are buying a disposal for the kitchen. Thank you, Free Spirits.

A handling fee for processing ferry tickets was discussed, but was not approved.

The refurbished treadmill has been received and installed with a new mat underneath it. Wiring to separate circuits for these machines will be done in October. It was decided not to obtain maintenance contracts as it was felt they were not justifiable.

Mike Morgan's crew has been busy this month and will continue next month doing our annual fall cleanup including repainting walls and cleaning carpets.

We want to welcome our newest employee, Linda Colasurdo to the Bay Club. Linda will be taking over from Debbie Ueda who has moved to Florida.

We urge you to contact Board Members, as well as present your views at our monthly meetings, held on the fourth Friday of each month with the next meeting scheduled for **Friday, November 30** at the Bay Club.

Unlimited Colors and Variety in Guitar Trio's Performance

The Canadian Guitar Trio "...A dazzling display of guitar technique," according to the Peace Arch News. And founder Harold Micay says, "There are a lot of guitarists out there, but a trio is quite different. It's more fun playing with other guitarists. There's no limit to the colors and



variety. We make it interesting for ourselves so no one player has all the tunes." See for yourself on **Saturday, November 3**, at 8:00 p.m., when this talented trio appears in the second concert of the Arts Council's *Performing Arts in Port Ludlow* series held at the Bay Club.

The Canadian Guitar Trio was founded in 1996 by Micay who is joined by guitarists Hanh Nguyen and Zach Westfall. Each member brings his or her own individual strengths and talents. While there are about 20 years between forty-something Micay and the youngest member, twenty-something Westfall, Micay believes that's an asset. "Every generation (of musician) gets a little stronger," he says. "We older ones have to try harder. It keeps me fresh."

Micay has performed throughout Europe, Israel and the United States, and has appeared as a soloist with orchestras in Canada. He was a winner at the Canadian National Guitar Competition and has appeared at the Victoria International Music Festival and the Toronto International Guitar Festival. He studied at the University of Southern California with Pepe Romero and Andres Segovia.

Nguyen is a soft-spoken Vietnamese woman in her thirties. She began studying the guitar on her own at age 9 in Saigon. In her country, she says, the guitar is considered a male instrument, mostly because it's hard to play. In her experience, women guitar players are in the minority. Upon arrival in Canada in 1982, Nguyen continued her studies at Western Washington University and Vancouver Community College. She has performed on national radio and television in Canada and the United States and is on faculty at the Vancouver Academy of Music.

At the age of 5, Westfall started his musical studies on the piano. He first took up the guitar as a member of a "thrash metal band" which led him to discover the classical guitar stylings of Christopher Parkening and John Williams. At 15, he made his debut as a classical guitarist and continued his studies at the University of British Columbia. Westfall says he adds a "youthful exuberance" to the sound of the trio. He is sought after as a performer and teacher in the Vancouver area.

For the Canadian Guitar Trio's Saturday evening pro-

gram, they may sound like a great pop band playing Mason Williams' *Classical Gas*, or a small classical orchestra with Vivaldi's *Four Seasons* and Bach's *D Minor Double Concerto*. They'll also delve into the rich South American cultures with deFalla's *Ritual Fire Dance*, Sephardic music of the Jewish exiles from Spain, and works by Brazilian-Canadian composer Celso Machado whose music, according to Micay, "is just perfect for us. He's a fantastic percussionist who uses his face, hands, everything to make sounds."

Doors to the Bay Club will open at 7:00 p.m. for seat selection and beverages in the Great Room wine bar. Curtain is at 8:00 p.m.

Myrdelle Teaford's Garden Tips for November

If you haven't planted spring flowering bulbs yet, there is still time to get them into the ground. In addition to the obvious choices of crocus, daffodils and tulips, consider planting ornamental allium, anemones, freesias and scilla.

Sow seeds of hardy annuals like candytuft, clarkia, larkspur and linaria, as well as wildflower mixes. Seeds sown in the fall will germinate and flower earlier than the same seeds sown in spring.

When choosing plants for your outdoor retreat, include those that provide winter interest. Coral bark maple and ornamental grasses can provide striking silhouettes. Sarcococca and heather produce winter flowers. The foliage of nandina and euonymus turn brilliant shades of red, orange or purple in the winter weather.

The Anatomy of Port Ludlow Associates

At the October 4 Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting, Greg McCarry reported on the organization of Port Ludlow Associates LLC (PLA). Greg, the president of PLA, explained that PLA has three distinct businesses including utility services, real estate and hospitality.

Utilities: PLA owns Olympic Water and Sewer Co., Inc. The company provides water and sewer services to Port Ludlow residents. The operation is managed by Larry Smith and has 6 additional employees.

Real Estate: The real estate department does land planning, land development, entitlements, homebuilding and real estate sales. PLA has adopted a policy of building on all lots the company owns including speculative, semi-custom and custom homebuilding. The custom homebuilding is a new business for PLA. PLA also owns the franchise for the John L. Scott Real Estate office on Teal Lake Road. The sales office will be relocated to the Village Center in the near future. The real estate department is currently located next to the Village Center at 70 Breaker Lane. There are 37 employees in the department. In addition, there are 12 support employees in the accounting and human resource support groups.

Hospitality: The hospitality business is known as The Resort at Ludlow Bay. The Resort includes all rooms (the Inn and the Admiralty rental pool), the Marina and the golf operation. Michael Padden, an employee of Benchmark Hospitality, Inc., has been hired by PLA as General Manager and will be responsible for managing the combined operation. The entire hospitality business has 160 PLA employees and adjusts for seasonal fluctuations.

Port Ludlow Associates is owned by HCV Pacific Partners, a San Francisco-based integrated real estate company. PLA executives meet with the owners on a monthly basis to report on planning and operations.

After developing 19 lots recently at Timberton Village, PLA will focus on the development of 431 additional lots as permitted in the Port Ludlow zoning code. PLA is busy identifying where these lots will be located. They are generally in the South Bay area of Port Ludlow. As details evolve, each project will be discussed at upcoming

Village Council meetings. This step is to ensure that the Village Council and residents of Port Ludlow are able to discuss plans before they are submitted to Jefferson County for development approval.

Golf Course Planning

PLA has retained an architect to design a new pro shop for the Port Ludlow Golf Course. In preparation for the design work, a number of member group discussions will occur to determine member needs. The objective is to complete design in 2002 and open the new facility by late spring 2003.

Home Design Volunteers Needed

PLA is considering the development of a clustered village near Ludlow Creek. The homes in the new village could be between 1,000 and 2,000 square feet of living area with all yard work maintained by a Homeowner Association. If you have any desire to move into a smaller home, please contact Shari Hagey at PLA. Shari will then organize a focus group meeting. A focus group is an interactive session with an architect where you have a chance to review proposed floor plans and contribute your own ideas about home design development. By attending the meeting there is no obligation on your part. Your ideas will be used to help develop a project plan. Shari Hagey is located at the development office on Breaker Lane and can be reached at 437-8334.

Resort Site Planning Underway

Port Ludlow Associates has retained a land-planning consultant to develop a plan for the expansion of The Resort at Ludlow Bay. Basic elements of the plan will be proposed in the Resort zone on both sides of the Beach Club. PLA hopes to have conceptual plans developed in the next few months that will include additional amenities for the Resort. These plans will also be merged with the plans to expand the Port Ludlow Marina. Permits are being processed for 100 additional slips. Assuming the Marina permits are processed in a timely manner, the additional slips will be constructed in 2003. There is currently a waiting list for boaters seeking moorage at the Marina.

New Real Estate Sales Manager

Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) has entered an agreement with John L. Scott, Inc., to purchase a franchise for the Real Estate Sales Office. In addition to the franchise agreement, a sales manager has been selected and hired to oversee the operation. Dennis Sutter of Bainbridge Island has assumed the role effective October 1. Dennis has over 20 years' experience in the real estate business. He will also reorganize the existing sales office to expand the business to a full-service office. The company will handle resale listings as well as new home sales. One of Dennis' first objectives is to identify a new office location so the business can be expanded.

Sewer Plant Expansion Underway

The sewer treatment plant owned by Olympic Water and Sewer Co. is constructed to 50 percent of its permitted capacity. Plans are underway to build additional improvements to handle the full allowable capacity. These improvements will be required to accommodate the full build-out of Port Ludlow to 2,250 homes and condominiums. The capacity is also planned to allow for the connection of any lot owner inside the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort boundary. This includes lots that are currently permitted for septic tanks. The plant improvements are expected to be complete by spring 2002.

Marina Scoping Meeting

Jefferson County Planner Josh Peters held a Marina scoping meeting for the Marina expansion project on Friday, October 12 at the Bay Club. Attendance was fairly good, approximately 20 residents attended. Representatives from Reid Middleton, an engineering firm from Everett, explained the proposed changes and answered questions from the audience.

Copies of the proposed plan are posted at the Bay Club and the Beach Club, or you may stop by the Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) Development Office located at 70 Breaker Lane, if you like.

The latest report from the State Department of Health as of October 18 shows that the shellfish collected in our area on October 17 have a high level of biotoxins (304 micrograms) and are unsafe to eat. Shellfish Harvesting Volunteers

Volunteers are needed to collect mussels and send them to the Washington State Department of Health every other week for the purpose of testing for Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning (PSP) and other biotoxins. These biotoxins make shellfish harmful for human consumption and can even cause death. It is important. Doris Monti and I found it to be a very rewarding experience and it is not difficult.

The State provides a cage of mussels that hang off one of the docks at the Marina and also provides all the necessary materials for shipping. We collected from our kayaks as opposed to the cage, but you may do it whichever way you choose.

Early Port Ludlow Photos

There have been questions about the many historical pictures that appeared in the October *Voice* as part of the article on early Port Ludlow. All photos were courtesy of the Port Gamble Historic Museum (PGM) and the Jefferson County Historical Society (JCHS). Written permission must be obtained from either the Museum or the Historical Society in order to reproduce them.

A.J. Pope, also known as Andrew Jackson Pope, was born in 1820 and died in 1878. The picture in the *Voice* was taken in 1867. W.C. Talbot, also known as William Chaloner Talbot, was born in 1816 and died in 1881. The *Voice* picture was taken in 1876. Cyrus Walker was born in 1827 and died in 1913. The PGM owns all three of those pictures.

The Arthur Phinney House was built as early as 1856 and torn down in 1910. The Port Ludlow Schoolhouse picture was taken in 1914. It was located where the Conference Center now sits. It is unknown when the picture of the Charles McCormick office was taken; but the firm was located in Port Ludlow between 1925 and 1938. All of these pictures are also property of the PGM.

It is not known when the photos of the Port Ludlow Post Office or Admiralty Hall and Port Ludlow Ferry Dock were taken. Both are the property of the JCHS.

PLCC Update

Internet security, justifiably, continues to be on the forefront of many articles appearing in almost every publication you pick up. Much like the recent terrorist attacks on our country, we will continually be under attack on the Internet front from many directions, whether from criminals or sick-minded people. There is evidence that suggests terrorists may or could be involved and, at the least, may be taking advantage of the Internet to help plan their nefarious undertakings. We should all recognize this is ongoing and that we may never be 100 percent safe at any given time. All we can do is to keep abreast of what is going on and try to take advantage of all the tools that have been and will be provided to general users.

In earlier articles, I recommended the use of a hardware firewall, particularly for those who have an "always on" Internet connection such as CableSpeed. I recognize that these devices do not guarantee 100 percent safety. They are very cost effective and will eliminate most of the attacks on your computer from the outside. You still need up-to-date anti-virus software, and perhaps other software, to stem the tide of "attacks from within." Whoa! Attacks from within, what's that all about?

The hardware firewall blocks all incoming requests that you do not initiate. Some that you do initiate are getting your e-mail, downloading files, accepting "cookies" when you visit various web sites, etc. Each of these "approved" incoming files could contain viruses or worms. There are "call home" types of worms that will, without your knowledge, request downloads of other software damaging to your machine. That's the worst case. Possibly equally devastating are those that steal personal information, track your usage on the Internet, etc. There are remedies for these too, but you have to be aware of them.

It's all getting very complicated. Some folks double-lock their doors; others leave them open. I cannot tell you which to do. I can only make you aware of the hazards and some of the remedies available. If you load each and every remedy on your computer, you'll spend all your time responding to prompts/alarms about each and every

possible undesirable operation that your computer is about to execute. This seems to me to be equivalent to gridlock or to paranoia; after all, I bought the computer to do useful things for me and not to run my life! Each of us has to find the balance of risk vs. gain. It looks like we all are going to have to hone our skills of risk management, whether it concerns use of our computers, our approach to travel, visits to public places, etc.




