



From the Editor's Keyboard

What is going on in our country with respect to the epidemic of shootings that have occurred in the last few years? It is not just the murder of a single person out of ire or hope for gain but the wholesale slaughter of individuals not known to the shooter. The murders at the Sikh temple in Wisconsin, the

Batman shootings and the carnage in Tucson are only the most recent of a string of atrocities involving people with guns. How do we stop it?

Increasing restrictions on who has access to guns would be desirable. The United States is admittedly lax when it comes to gun control. A recent news report says it all: A musician in Washington, D.C. ordered a flat screen TV through *Amazon.com* and received a Sig Sauer military semiautomatic assault rifle intended for a dealer in Duncansville, Pennsylvania. Fortunately, the receiver, who was neither a nut nor a criminal, called authorities.

The Brady bill, enacted in 1981, and subsequent campaigns focused on gun control as a primary goal. However, legislative attempts have consistently run afoul of the National Rifle Association (NRA) which trots out Second Amendment rights to bear arms (even though it is not clear whether the constitution is talking about a militia or individuals). The gun rights organization has huge political clout but not much common sense.

Nevertheless, the arguments are complex. If you search "gun control," you will find a plethora of research correlating rates of gun ownership to gun-related homicide and suicide. There are both positive and negative relationships. Despite arguments to the contrary however, there seems to be no reason for an individual to possess assault weapons or to be able to buy firearms and ammunition on the internet. Eliminating that convenience would be a good idea.

Stricter gun control would help, but would it be enough? The people who commit the mass shootings of innocent individuals are not in their right minds. We need to provide better funding for identification and treatment of troubled individuals in contained environments where the individual is not a danger to themselves or others.

Hunt Local Wild Mushrooms Safely

Wild mushrooms are coming. Soon they will be everywhere, in your yard, sprouting from your driveway, on trees and along trails. The Olympic Peninsula, with its maritime climate, varied topography and abundant plant life, is one of the world's greatest habitats for wild mushrooms. With lots of trees, there are lots of mushrooms in the Pacific Northwest, more than 5,000 species.

Most mushrooms have a mutually beneficial relationship with trees; the mushroom mycelia and the tree roots are intertwined. These are known as mycorrhizal mushrooms. Other mushrooms are strictly decomposers of organic material. The mycorrhizal mushrooms receive sugars (food) from the trees, and the trees receive nutrients, water and sometimes other benefits (e.g., protection from pathogens). Some scientists believe that without this mycorrhizal relationship, there would be little plant or animal life and thus no need for decomposers.

Port Ludlow is home to many edible, poisonous and other mushrooms (inedible, edibility unknown, or too tiny to bother with for food). Among the edibles found close by are golden chanterelles, the prince, parasols and puffballs. Some poisonous mushrooms are the flat-topped agaric and Smith's amanita. About one out of every 200 calls to poison control centers involve mushrooms. Most poisonings just make people sick, but about one person a year dies of mushroom poisoning in the United States.

How can you learn whether you have found an edible mushroom? You could take college mycology courses or study lots of books on your own. (The best book for this area is the *Mushrooms of the Pacific Northwest* by Steve Trudell and Joe Ammirati, Timber Press, list \$27.95.) Alternatively, you could find someone who knows mushrooms or join a mushroom club.

For most people, joining a mushroom club is the way to go. As of May 2012, thirty-two people who list Port Ludlow as their home belong to the local mushroom club, the Olympic Peninsula Mycological Society (OPMS). Members live from Joyce to Brinnon, with most coming from Sequim, Port Angeles and Port Townsend. OPMS is the second largest mushroom club in Washington, with the Seattle-based Puget Sound Mycological Society at the top. The Kitsap Peninsula Mycological Society, South Sound Mushroom Club and the Snohomish County Mycological Society are nearby clubs.

Mushroom clubs have experienced members (survivors) who pass their knowledge on to new members through meetings, identification classes, hunts and overnight forays. Most also display mushrooms to educate the public at annual mushroom shows. OPMS has an annual spring foray to Eastern Washington to hunt for black morels and other edible mushrooms. Dues are reasonable, \$15 per year for a family and \$10 for an individual. Check the website, www.olyushrooms.org, for information.

Hunting wild mushrooms in and around Port Ludlow is fun and good exercise. It is like an Easter egg hunt for adults. You learn more about the Olympic Peninsula and socialize with people of like interests. Learn about wild mushrooms by attending the next meeting of OPMS at the Tri-Area Community Center in Chimacum on **Wednesday, September 12** at 7:00 p.m. And visit the OPMS Wild Mushroom Show in Sequim on **Sunday, October 21**.

September in the Garden

In the Maritime Northwest we try to hold onto summer for as long as we can and there is no better way to do that than to create a bright and colorful fall perennial garden.

Fall favorites are Aster, Gaura, Chrysanthemum, Russian Sage, Black-Eyed Susan, 'Autumn-Joy' Sedum, Goldenrod, Abelia, Miscanthus and Ox-Eye Daisy. These perennials like part to full sun and dryer soil.

More shade than sun and damp soil? Enjoy beautiful color with plants such as False Chamomile, Turtlehead, Joe-Pye Weed, Gentian, Toad Lily and Windflower.

In the vegetable garden, tomatoes, corn, zucchini, artichokes and cucumbers are finishing. Soon the squash and pumpkins will be ready. Check for late blight and cut off affected plant leaves. (Throw diseased leaves into the trash and clean your clippers before trimming other plants.) It is not too late to do your fall planting of cabbage, kohlrabi and Swiss chard.

Now is a good time to renovate or start a lawn. For established lawns, aerate, dethatch, reseed and apply lime to improve the quality of your grass. For new lawns, good drainage, topsoil, lawn seed and nutrients are essential. Slope your lawn area three inches per 100 square feet, loosen soil and remove rocks to a depth of 6 inches and add in fermented organic material. Fertilize with a 5-10-5 mix when grass is several inches high. Lawn seed of half perennial ryegrass and half fine fescue typically does well, but check with your local County Extension office for more information. Once seeded, water gently and frequently; once established, deep water less often. Mow only after grass is over 2 inches and the soil is firm.

Sharing the Trail with Mountain Goats

Sometimes while hiking in the Olympic National Park and Olympic National Forest, you may unexpectedly find yourself sharing the trail with *Oreamnos americanus*, also known as the Rocky Mountain goat.

The mountain goat is more closely related to the antelope than to true goats. Its skull is lighter and the horns are smoother, shorter, pointier and more slender than a true goat's horns. These mammals are especially adapted to life on steep, craggy cliffs with very powerful forelimbs for braking and climbing. Their textured foot pads help cushion their feet and give them traction when jumping from rock to rock, while their hooves act as pincers to take hold of irregularly-shaped rocks.

The mountain goat population in the forest and park has been increasing and is expected to double by 2027 according to a recent census. In most areas of their habitat, mountain goats are reclusive and avoid humans. However, many areas the goats inhabit are also popular recreation destinations, which allow them to become habituated to humans. Habituation can lead to aggressive behavior through attempts to assert dominance and hold ground rather than move away when humans are near.

The Mountain Goat Action Plan, revised in June of 2011, establishes protocol for the park's response to goat incidents. The park works to prevent hazardous interaction between goats and humans through a variety of tactics including increased public awareness, marking animals to identify and track particular goats involved in incidents, aversive conditioning, area closures and animal destruction. Public outreach materials and signs provide advisories about general goat behavior and warnings about habituated goats in certain areas. When necessary, areas are closed due to aggressive goats. As of this writing, an emergency closure warning implemented on July 4 for Mount Ellinor at Trail #812 in the Olympic National Forest is still in effect.

Mountain goat management is a high priority, according to Barb Maynes, Public Affairs spokesperson for Olympic National Park. The mountain goat is a non-native species and the park is currently seeking federal funding for an environmental assessment. A significant impact, such as public controversy, would trigger preparing an environmental impact statement, which goes into a more thorough degree of review. Are Trusts from Other States Valid?

Estate planners frequently are asked about Trusts drafted out-of-state. The quick answer is "Yes, your Trust is absolutely still valid." The longer answer is a little more complicated because while your Trust is still a valid and active Trust, it may or may not be doing everything that you intended for it to do.

What will remain the same is this: your Trust will continue to own your estate (meaning your properties and accounts will still be held in the name of your Trust, thereby keeping your Trust "funded"), your estate will not go through probate if you have "fully funded" your Trust, and your beneficiaries will inherit as you have set out in your Trust document. These facets of your Trust will remain the same regardless of where you created your Trust and where your Trust is being administered.

Some other considerations may or may not affect your estate. Each state administers Medicare and Medicaid according to its own statutes and regulations. You should talk to an estate planning attorney to see if your Trust has provisions that may differ from Washington law.

Also, depending on the size of your estate, there may be different tax considerations for Washington State and the state in which you had your Trust drafted. Washington

State currently has a \$2,000,000 estate tax bar. If your estate is above or near this mark, you should consult an estate planning attorney and see if there is any estate tax planning available to you.

It is good to be aware that Washington State differs in how Trusts are administered from other states. Washington State has the Trust and Estate Dispute Resolution Act (TEDRA) which allows problems that arise with a Trust to be addressed through informal court procedures. If your Trust document requires that your Trust be administered in the state where you used to live, you may not be able to take advantage of the TEDRA provisions. This will have a big effect on how your future Trustees are able to administer the estate.

More important than which state you live in, is how recently you have had your estate plan reviewed. It is recommended that you have your estate plan reviewed every ten years or anytime there is a major life change.

Clamming is Closed

In late July the Washington State Department of Health issued a closure notice for all species of shellfish on almost all beaches in Jefferson County due to the dangers of marine biotoxins. Marine algae blooms (often called “red tides” though they can present as green or brown) naturally produce these biotoxins which filter feeding clams, oysters, scallops and mussels collect and concentrate. When humans consume such shellfish the toxins cause Paralytic, Diarrhetic or Amnesic Shellfish Poisoning (PSP, DSP and ASP, respectively). These algae blooms can happen any time of year and neither cooking nor freezing impacts the toxins which shellfish can store for up to two years.

PSP has been around for ages. In 1793 Captain George Vancouver noted local tribes considered it taboo to eat shellfish when the seawater became bioluminescent with algae blooms. After several of his crewmembers became ill and one died after cooking up a breakfast of mussels he named the place Poison Cove. DSP, however, was only identified in 1976 and ASP was not found until 1987.

PSP’s principal toxin is saxitoxin which blocks the movement of sodium through nerves, thereby deactivating them. The result is paralysis with only the heart (which runs on a separate system) and brain remaining functional. Suffocation and death result. ASP’s toxin is domoic acid which causes permanent short-term memory loss, brain damage and death in severe cases. There is no known antidote for either.

Symptoms of PSP, DSP and ASP are similar and appear from ten minutes to 24 hours after ingestion. They begin with abdominal cramps, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and tingling or burning lips. Children and immune-compromised individuals are most at risk. Humans aren’t the only mammals to suffer from these toxins. The deaths of sea otters and humpback whales in Alaska, sea lions in Monterey, California and monk seals in the Mediterranean have been linked to ingestion of tainted fish and shellfish.

The old tale that tainted shellfish can be identified by nibbling a small amount of meat or rubbing the raw shellfish on one’s lips to check for numbness is false. Accurate testing for toxins is difficult and requires a laboratory, several mice and five to six hours of work. How Much does it Cost?

Are you among the many shoppers who have been surprised by the price of your bottle of Johnny Walker or Kirkland Signature liquor at the cash register? Unlike the old state stores, which included taxes in the posted price, many private retailers have relied on the customer to figure it out after the passage of Initiative 1183. Many customers come up lacking and object to having to try.

Confusion is understandable because there are a series of taxes that must be added to the base price of spirits. (Spirits are any beverage that is distilled and wines exceeding 24 percent alcohol by volume.) Taxes include 20.5 percent spirits sales tax plus a liter tax that varies depending on the size of the bottle. There is also a Business and Occupations Tax that must be absorbed. Shoppers with rusty math skills need a calculator to work out the price.

Customers are also unhappy that savings from the switch to private retailers is not what was expected. The reason is that Washington’s liquor taxes are among the highest in the nation. Compare the Washington liquor tax (\$26.45 a gallon) to that of California (\$3.30 a gallon) to understand the difference in prices. Visitors to California are likely to continue to load up before embarking on their return trips. Retailers in less heavily taxed Oregon are benefitting as well.

After finding that some customers have trouble doing the calculations, some stores are adding final, after tax prices to the tags. Costco plans to add the after tax price to its tags sometime in the late summer. Some Costco stores already do so. Safeway may begin adding after tax prices. Fred Meyer and QFC don’t intend to make similar changes now.

Changing prices for name-brand products are a factor in the decision to calculate the after tax price for the customer. Changes require the retailer to re-tag the products which can be burdensome and expensive.

Carpe Diem Opens Season

Champagne, appetizers and greetings from friends await those arriving at the Bay Club on **Saturday, September 22**, at 6:30 p.m. for a one-hour social preceding the Arts Council's launch of its 21st concert season. Featuring

an in-demand and unique chamber ensemble, Carpe Diem Quartet has earned widespread critical and audience acclaim for its electrifying performances. This past season they performed over 60 concerts in 30 states across the U.S.

Carpe Diem takes the stage at 7:30 p.m. and will open with Beethoven's *String Quartet, Op.18, No.1, in F major*; followed by composer and member Korine Fujiwara's *Fiddle Suite "Montana."* Following intermission they will conclude with Dvorák's *String Quartet, Op.96, in F major, "American."* The group's innovative programming reflects its passion for folk and contemporary music alongside the traditional string quartet repertoire.

Chimacum Creek Restoration

Chimacum Creek has been restored as a healthy thriving habitat for salmon and other wildlife thanks to the long-term efforts of many dedicated individuals and groups.

When a culvert washed out thirty years ago, the creek was ruined as a spawning ground for summer chum. The plight of the endangered chum inspired the Jefferson Land Trust (JLT), Hood Canal Coordinating Council (HCCC), North Olympic Salmon Coalition (NOSC) and over a dozen other non-profit and governmental agencies to unite as the Chumsortium in 2001 with the goal of securing and protecting land the creek runs through and restoring the habitat of the creek and its estuary. Since then, over 160 acres of the Chimacum Creek corridor have been put under some form of protected status. "In 1983 no chum returned to the creek to spawn," said Jac Entringer, Volunteer and Outreach Coordinator for NOSC. "But in 2010, over 1,200 chum that had been hatched in the creek returned to spawn."

This spring, JLT added another piece with the purchase of a 5-acre parcel close to the creek's mouth. "This is a key piece both for the chum and the community," said Sarah Spaeth, JLT Executive Director. The piece was purchased with grants through the Salmon Recovery Funding Board and Jefferson County Conservation Futures Fund.

The parcel is well situated for use as an educational setting, says NOSC's Entringer. JLT is planning to hold its annual picnic there on **Saturday, September 15**.

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) owns and protects much of the creek corridor and estuary. They have removed mills and other structures at the estuary, and Jefferson County, other organizations and volunteers are working to bring it back to its natural state.

NOSC plans a Riparian Land Owner Workshop later this summer, Entringer says. "There are some funds and volunteers available to help landowners keep the creek healthy and protect this vital part of our environment." Johnson Explains County Position on Rock Shipment

In a recent PLVC meeting David Wayne Johnson took issue with claims that Iron Mountain Quarry might be able to ship rock from docks at Mats Mats. He said that the County Staff, the consultant and legal counsel had been working to clarify the language that was questioned.

They have discussed omitting the word "export" from mitigation measure #30, but decided that "export" should remain to keep the final Mitigated Determination of Nonsignificance (MDNS) "clean" and unaltered. However, Johnson is inserting additional language to clarify the meaning of that word, as well as adding an additional condition to address this issue.

Johnson said that the statement would read: "This proposal is for truck transportation of materials only. The operator may provide material to local markets serving local demand; however, no export material is to be transported for transshipment via the Mats Mats facility." The word "export" in this sense as a transitive verb means to carry away: remove or send to some other place (Merriam Webster 2012 on-line version) or in the context of importing or exporting fill material to and from a site and does not strictly mean to transport abroad to another country.

A new condition was added: "No material from the New Shine Quarry shall be transported to the Mats Mats Quarry facility for shipment from that facility by water." County consultant Reid Shockey explained the use of the word "export" in an accompanying letter. Additional comments are included in the PLVC report on page 23.

It is yet to be determined whether these proposed additions or others will be included in the final permit. Comments or suggested language to add to the permit conditions were accepted, if submitted prior to August 22.

Work on the Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue (PLFR) budget is ongoing. I continue to monitor the numbers very closely and the staff is being diligent in cutting costs. We are already gearing up for our 2013 budget cycle with ongoing dialog between my office, the Board of Fire Commissioners and the firefighters union. A proposal, brought by the union to the Board of Fire Commissioners for budget relief, has been substantially embraced by all parties. We are working hard as a unified force to overcome budgetary hurdles.

Despite budgetary problems, our service levels remain high. Remember that we are happy to assist anyone in the Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue jurisdiction with smoke detector checks and battery replacements. However, we often must service requests that are close to one another and your request may be delayed. If you have asked us to service your alarm and we have not arrived by the end of business that day, please call the station and inquire as to the status of your request. Emergency responses, multiple requests, training or other situations may have caused a longer response. Please be patient.

For those that are not aware of how to request a smoke detector check/battery replacement, just call the main fire station at 360-437-2236 and provide your name, address, a good phone number (cell phone if that is the best way to contact you) and what you are requesting. Anyone that answers will be more than happy to assist you.

Finally, I would like to invite you all to visit the fire station, located at 7650 Oak Bay Rd. In the lobby, we offer a variety of pamphlets and information that will provide invaluable information about healthcare and fire protection. Local Paramedic Completes Rigorous Training Program

Eighteen paramedics from around the Puget Sound were honored as the 38th graduating class from the UW/Harborview Medical Center Paramedic Training Program. In order to complete this rigorous training program, students receive more than 2,500 hours of intense training, spending twice as much time in the field and experiencing over 700 patient contacts (three times the national average). Among the graduates was Peter Wickstrom of Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue.

The Paramedic Training Program has certified more than 500 paramedics since its inception. The survival rate in Seattle for witnessed, shockable cardiac arrest is the highest in the United States at 50 percent, due in part to the life-saving, intense training program funded by the Medic One Foundation

Of the 18 students honored in August, there are paramedics from the Bellevue Fire Department, Everett Fire Department, King County Emergency Medical Services, Port Ludlow Fire Department, San Juan Island Emergency Medical Services, and the Seattle Fire Department.

Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Report

President Tony Durham called the Thursday, August 2 meeting of the PLVC to order at 3:00 pm., in the Bay Club. Other Council members present were Laury Hunt, Ned Luce, Larry Nobles, Lois Ruggles, Vicki Tallerico, Don Thompson and Elizabeth Van Zonneveld. Absent were Don Clark and Pat Traci. A quorum was declared. The meeting was recorded. Twenty five residents attended the meeting and President Durham welcomed them.

Guest Speaker: President Durham introduced guest speaker, David W. Johnson, the County's Lead Planner and Liaison for the Port Ludlow Master Planned Resort. David stated that he intends to be better in the customer service for Port Ludlow, and will attend the PLVC General Meetings more frequently. David reported that the IMQ is currently drafting a new permit, however there are some obstacles that slowed down the process; one being the wetland issue plan and the word "export" which has been a topic of discussion in the past with the PLVC. See the additional article in the local news section of the *Voice* for a more complete description.

There was also a review of the letter dated August 2, 2012 to David from Reid H. Shockey, AICP stating that the word "export" is a term commonly applied to excavation, land development, grading or other similar activity, and refers to the removal of material from a site. It does not refer to transshipment of material via ships leaving the region. Mr. Shockey will make sure that this intent is made clear in any condition attached to the Stormwater Permit when and if it is issued.

David ended his presentation with a question and answer period that covered many concerns of the Port Ludlow community, and he will send all future information to the concerned residents through the PLVC.

Council Actions and Committee Reports

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to accept the minutes for the PLVC General Meeting for July 5.

Treasurer's Report: Don Thompson gave the recent Treasurer's Report. IMQ Legal Fund contained \$5,145. The General Operating account held \$18,388. Certificate of Deposit stood at \$10,937. General Operating funds

All text scans and images have been converted to readable text using Optical Character Recognition (OCR).

The text in documents is fully searchable by using "Archive-only Google" method as well as by fast built-in indexes. The documents represent an estimated 10 percent of available PL material that should be archived. Free multi-site software includes Drupal content management. Use plarchive.org.



Depending on how you filter the calendar, you can see when and where upcoming Board and Committee meetings are scheduled, or if you filter the calendar by "Social", then you will see the scheduled activities such as Bridge, Poker and Potlucks. If you filter by the "Other" category, private functions such as weddings will be shown on the calendar. If they so choose, members can even subscribe to a feature that will work with Apple iCal, Outlook 2007 Internet Calendar, Google Calendar and other iCalendar compatible calendars to receive automatic calendar updates from the LMC site.

Following the publishing of the next LMC Navigator newsletter, the LMC website will be partitioned into two sections – Public and Members Only. In the Navigator scheduled to be published near the first of September, with login information for the Members Only section of the site. Activation of the partition occurs **October 1**. Information in the Members Only section includes LMC financial statements.

Because getting input from the membership is so important, the new site has email links to our committee chairs, LMC General Manager and Front Desk. Members can access forms and policies used by the LMC committees on the new website. Forms such as member change of address are also posted on the site. In addition, a feature that we will look to add in the future is the ability to post and respond to member surveys on the website.

I'm so pleased with our new site. It is my hope that our members will take a few minutes and explore it. As always, I would appreciate your feedback both positive and constructive. 





Pope to Pay \$12.5 Million for Port Gamble Clean Up

Pope Resources is finalizing a remediation agreement for their Port Gamble planned development. The scope has increased to include larger dredge areas, more capping of underwater sediment areas, and demolition of both pilings and an old mill site wharf, according to the release. The total remediation will likely total \$14.3 million, much larger than previous projected figures. The state is also requiring the company to pay “natural resource damages,” an element of environmental law that provides for mitigation for injuries to the environment.

The release also states the department will use \$9 million “for acquisition of environmentally sensitive properties, rehabilitation of geoduck beds, pollution source control, habitat preservation, and clean-up sustainability.”

Pope Resources released a financial statement on August 8, reporting a net loss of \$9.3 million this year. Part of the loss was attributed to an environmental charge of \$12.5 million.

Rogue Movers Slapped on the Wrist

Unlicensed moving companies that hold goods hostage unless customers pay extra will get their come-uppance this October. A new law will give the Transportation Department's Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) the power to collect fines up to \$10,000 a day and force companies to return goods to customers. New companies will have to pass tests on consumer protection and estimating.

Last year the FMCSA received 2,851 consumer complaints about moving companies. Together with Mayflower and United Van Lines, the agency runs Move Rescue, which helps victims reclaim possessions.




