

As inclement winter weather recedes and sunny days become more frequent, thoughts turn to possibilities. At this happy time, we are particularly pleased to announce that secret negotiations between the LMC and the SBCA took place this last month. The result was the beginning of a plan to extend joint membership

to residents, putting an end to the despised non-member fee, simplifying the rental policies and moving us toward one Port Ludlow. According to Manager Brian Belmont, details are yet to be finalized. This editor commends the groups on their fine work.

With booming condominium pre-sales, Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) plans for the Marina development have taken a quantum leap forward. Construction will begin in spring. The development includes a new and expanded Marina Store, an informal restaurant (replacing the Harbormaster), a boardwalk and a new Yacht Club facility. Construction of office space and remodel of the existing Conference Center will commence later in the year.

In a surprise announcement, the Village Market will undergo remodel and expansion to provide space for fresh produce and bulk food. The emphasis in the market will be on local, organic food products. The Garden Club will participate in the beautification of the center by replanting the flower beds and attending to hanging baskets. Planned additional retail includes a pharmacy and a sportswear/gift shop. Negotiations are taking place regarding a time share near the present Kitsap Bank. An adjacent park area will encircle the current native plant garden to encourage visitor strolls to Ludlow Falls and provide play/picnic space.

The Festival by the Bay has signed Taylor Swift as their lead act this July. Dinner cruises on the Bay are planned; sign up early as they are expected to be popular. Artech of Seattle will complete the conservation and preservation of the Totem Pole in time for a dedication during Port Ludlow's Festival 2013. The Inn At Port Ludlow has already begun planning the menu which will include planked salmon and compote of wild berries, lovingly gathered by PLA staff. Representatives of the Suquamish tribe will attend, paddling in by canoe for the ceremony.

The happy news is that, whatever the rest of the world is doing, the state of the Village is healthy and the prospects are glowing. Now I should shout "April Fool" but some of this might come to be. I hope so.

Skagit Valley Has 30th Tulip Festival

You know it is spring when the tulips bloom, and Mt. Vernon is the place to celebrate blooming tulips for the whole month of April. In addition to 350 acres of blooms, there are many events, mostly on the weekends. The largest crowds are then, too.

The tour of the fields is designed for driving, but bicycling is another way to get around. Call Tulip Country Bike Tours, 13391 Avon Allen Rd., Mt. Vernon,

360-424-7461. The tour route is clearly marked and there are maps. Parking is free at RoozenGaarde and Tulip Town, but for a fee, private citizens may open their pastures for parking. The roads are rural and narrow so shoulder parking is discouraged and can even get you a ticket.

Of course, I must stop at Christianson's Nursery at 15806 Best Rd., and at Skagit Valley Gardens at 18923 Peter Johnson Rd., both in Mt. Vernon. A couple other activities that sounded interesting to me were the Shutter Photo Tour between **April 1-28**, 206-504-2128, and the weekend helicopter tours, 360-377-4115.

In addition to looking at tulips, you will probably want to bring them home. To get the blooms from field to home in good condition, use a cooler with ice or a cold pack, but don't let them get wet. They like to be cold but not wet. Of course, the bulbs are still in the ground so you can't take them home, but you can buy them and they will be sent to you in the fall, just in time for planting.

Where to Start in the April Garden

I always approach the garden in early April with a mixture of excitement and foreboding. The first chore that deserves my attention is trimming the old desiccated flower heads from my budding hydrangeas. If I cut them off too low on the stems, I will ruin this year's glorious color. Of course, there is appropriate fertilizing to be done, and it shouldn't be hard to arrange this task right before it rains. There is Aluminum Sulfate to make those hydrangeas more blue and lime for the heathers.

The acid-loving plants, like most perennials, can use a very small dose of rhododendron food. I need to remember not to be too heavy handed though, since most of our local soil is already acidic. Slug bait or some natural strategy to combat slugs is important just now. They love those new shoots of delphinium and dahlia.

Weeding is at the top of my to-do list. If I don't jump on it right now, Shot Weed (*Hairy Bittercress*) will go to seed and fire their progeny all over the garden. The Horse Tail Ferns will also be raising their green plumes very soon. I have found that constant mowing of these voracious prehistoric plants works best for me. My husband often uses a "flame thrower" on them.

It seems I have concentrated on the hard work and negativity here. In reality, I so look forward to being outside

and seeing the lovely lime green shoots. I really enjoy the smell of freshly turned earth and the aroma from a layer of newly spread compost. I look forward to the first yellow and purple crocus and multi-colored primroses. I take pleasure in caring for the roses with some pruning to open out the stems to air circulation, and the application of systemic rose care and alfalfa pellets to insure beautiful blooms later in the season. If there are any "bare root" shrubs I want to start, I need to get them planted now.

As in all seasons in the garden, there is a mixture of labor and reward. The enjoyable anticipation of the outstanding rewards to come is worth the effort.

The Power of Superfoods

Envision foods potent enough to reduce your risk of heart disease and cancer while helping all the systems of your body function at better capacities. Goji berries are one of the most nutrient-dense foods on earth, containing 18 kinds of amino acids and up to 21 trace minerals. They can be found growing on vines in desert regions from America to Asia. Loaded with antioxidants and phytochemicals, they are believed to be one of the richest sources of Vitamin C on the planet. Goji berries are known to curb appetite, fight inflammation and improve sleep. They are prized for their anti-aging, mood-boosting and immunity-building effects on the body.

Indigenous to the Himalayas, moringa (*oleifera*) has made its name as the miracle tree. Its leaves yield more than 90 nutrients and 46 antioxidants. Beneficial to heart health and diabetic patients, it lowers cholesterol and reduces blood glucose levels. Moringa supports liver and digestive health by detoxifying the body and regulating metabolism. Improvements in skin, eyesight and mental clarity are also common.

Grown high in the mountains of Peru, maca is a root plant noted for its energy and stamina-increasing properties. Aiding the nervous and digestion system, it is composed of 55 different phytochemicals and 20 different fatty acids. Maca regulates hormones, reduces stress and has an anti-depressant effect. This amazing plant also enhances one's memory and learning ability.

We all have to eat, so let's feed our bodies the best foods possible. Add some dried goji berries to your cereals, trail mixes and muffins. Moringa and maca powders can be mixed into smoothies for an extra boost or taken in capsule form. Moringa tea is also available and very popular. All can be found in local health stores or online.

Growing Potted Herbs

Fresh herbs are deliciously aromatic and desirable for brightening the flavor of simple everyday dishes or your gourmet creations, not to mention herbal teas and aroma therapy. Although most herbs prefer warm areas, they will thrive in our temperate marine climate following some simple tips for success.

Pots: Well-draining porous pots made of terra cotta are preferred. Choose the appropriate size for specific herbs. Parsley, for example, has long roots requiring a deeper pot.

Growing media: Use good quality potting soils that drain well. Another option is making your own using equal parts potting soil, peat moss and perlite or vermiculite, plus a bit of sand and bone meal.

Feeding: While most herbs don't require fertilizing, you may add a natural organic fertilizer to the potting mix prior to planting. Over fertilizing might produce large plants with reduced flavor and aroma.

Watering: Do not over-water. Poke your finger in the pot; if it feels moist it's perfect. Water only when the first two inches are totally dry. Most, though not all, prefer dry conditions. Check frequently and you will soon learn their individual requirements.

Sunlight: Herbs need a minimum of six hours of sunlight. The advantage of container gardening is that you can move pots to a sunnier location when needed. Many, such as basil, do well indoors on a south facing window sill. Outdoors, place your pots against a south facing wall so the plants can benefit from reflected warmth. While small, cover them at night with a gallon size plastic milk jug with the bottom cut off. When larger, try rigging up plastic sheeting to protect them from cold nights. Remember to remove the covers in the morning.

When shopping for herbs, stop by the Gardens at Four Corners Nursery; their experts will answer any questions you may have. If looking for local organic herbs and seeds, you will find them at the Chimacum Corner Farmstand. They also sell a helpful book, *Vegetable to Vegetable*, written specifically for our weather patterns by the couple operating Midori Farm in Port Townsend.

Local Heroes: JHC Doctors

Three Jefferson Healthcare physicians will travel to the Caribbean nations of Dominican Republic and St. Lucia to assist in the medical treatment and care of their native residents. Dr. Christopher Giedt is a Hospitalist working at the Jefferson Healthcare Hospital ACU/ICU area and his wife, Dr. Gemma O'Keeffe, is an Internist who works at the Jefferson Healthcare Internal Medicine Clinic in Port Townsend. Dr. Claus Janssen specializes in Family Medicine and works at the Jefferson Healthcare Family Medicine Clinic in Port Townsend.

In April, Drs. Giedt and O'Keeffe treated patients in the Dominican Republic at two separate medical clinics. One is an established medical and dental clinic that sees 120 Dominican and Haitian patients every Saturday. The other is a community called Barrio Blanco that houses many of the Haitian and Dominican "help" for the local tourist community. The area is an impoverished marshland with recurrent floods whose residents suffer from GI, skin and other infections.

A Eugene, Oregon American has organized a pool of other ex-pats to donate their time and money to rebuild the community, including over 20 new elevated homes and a water distribution system so that frequent flooding will no longer spread disease. A new school has been built and construction has begun on a separate medical clinic. The doctors see up to 60 patients each afternoon, in a school building. In addition to providing medical care, both Drs. Giedt and O'Keeffe may assist in the construction of a clinic.

Dr. Claus Janssen will be in Vieux Fort, St. Lucia as part of Hewanorra Health Volunteers. He will spend two weeks in St. Lucia in late March and early April providing medical care to the residents of St. Lucia. Hewanorra Health Volunteers is a nonprofit organization that mobilizes professional and financial resources to support the delivery of health care at St. Jude Hospital in Vieux Fort. St. Jude Hospital is the primary healthcare provider for families who live in the southern part of St. Lucia.

Built by the U.S. government for use during World War II, the facility became an 88-bed hospital with inpatient and outpatient services, specialty care, maternity ward,

emergency department and surgical services. Many services are provided by international volunteers who work alongside permanent staff. Volunteers come from all walks of life. All share a common desire to use their time and talents in service to others.

St. Lucia is a British Commonwealth island in the Caribbean, off the coast of Central America. The Dominican Republic is a Spanish-speaking country on the island of Hispaniola shared with Haiti. These two areas are well-known island destinations for tourists, but little is known about the need that exists for medical services and facilities for their poverty-stricken residents.

Suquamish Museum Showcases Native Heritage

Sometime when you are “out and about,” cross over to the Kitsap Peninsula and visit the Suquamish Museum. The thoroughly modern museum is located just a short distance from the Clearwater Casino on the Suquamish reservation. It is an impressive example of a modern museum with an impressive collection, thoughtfully displayed.


We were fortunate to arrive on the special day when the museum was dedicating its 40 foot long wall-mounted timeline of tribal history. Tribal Chairman Leonard Forsman and Archaeologist Dennis Lewarch spoke to the large crowd gathered in a meeting room. They explained the Treaty of Point Elliot, ratified in 1859, which established the reservation, preserved fishing rights, shellfish gathering and hunting, and provided benefits for Suquamish children. We learned about life from the time of Chief Seattle to the modern day. Exhibits reference Chief Seattle’s famous speech in 1854 during the treaty negotiations. We also learned that a branch of the Suquamish inhabited Port Ludlow.

The museum contains a multimedia production showing festivities and, less pleasantly, the period when children were forcibly taken from their parents to boarding schools. A special centerpiece is a three-hundred year-old canoe lifted by bearers who represent the Suquamish from ancient times to the present.

Also worth visiting is the gravesite of Chief Seattle and Old Man House Park. The view from the waterfront is spectacular. If you are hungry, the Clearwater Casino

Resort has a buffet, café and steakhouse. There is also Bella Luna Pizzeria in Suquamish. The House of the Awakened Culture, a community center, is an example of the change that comes from casino revenue. By the way, Suquamish means “place of the clear water;” hence the casino name.

Chief Seattle famously said that “my people are ebbing away like a fast receding tide which will never flow again.” He would be pleased to be wrong. For more information, go to www.suquamish.nsn.us or www.visitkitsap.com.

“Phantom” Returns for Season Finale

Franc D'Ambrosio carried the mantle of the “World’s Longest Running Phantom” for over a decade. Now, after a three-and-a-half year wait, the tenor returns at the invitation of the Arts Council for the finale of its 21st Performing Arts in Port Ludlow series. He will perform his “Franc D'Ambrosio’s Hollywood, Songs from the Silver Screen” to piano accompaniment on **Saturday, April 20**, 7:30 p.m. at the Bay Club. The concert is funded in part by a grant from Waste Connections, Inc./Murreys Disposal.

Currently touring extensively throughout the United States, Europe and South America with his critically

acclaimed one-man show, D'Ambrosio's performance includes his signature numbers, the “Phantom” medley and Love Theme from “The Godfather.” With a resumé that includes an Academy Award nominated film, Emmy Award nominated television show, and a four-time nominated Broadway show, D'Ambrosio also has had two Grammy considerations and a nomination for a National Theatre Award.

While D'Ambrosio was singing in the chorus of his first Broadway show, he was cast by Francis Ford Coppola as the perfect Anthony Corleone, the opera-singing son of Al Pacino in Coppola's film, “Godfather III.” He had the honor of singing the Academy Award winning theme song, “Speak Softly Love” (Brucia la Terra) in the film and on the original motion picture soundtrack.

Following his impressive run as “The Phantom of The Opera,” D'Ambrosio caught the eye of Barry Manilow, who selected him to create and star as the male lead in the pre-Broadway tour of “Copacabana.” The show enjoyed a successful year-long tour and earned D'Ambrosio his National Theatre Award nomination for Best Male Performer in a musical.

Series subscribers are invited to take advantage of a 15-minute window to select their reserved seats beginning at 6:15 p.m. before doors open to other attendees at 6:30 p.m. Enjoy a pre-concert beverage at the wine bar and an exhibit of colorful floor clothes and pencil drawings by Jeanne Joseph of the Port Ludlow Artists' League. The daughter and granddaughter of artists, Joseph majored in visual communication and ran a successful design business prior to retiring to Port Ludlow.

A Night at the Opera is the theme of the Port Townsend Community Orchestra's spring concert on **Saturday, April 27** at 7:30 p.m. The program will highlight three opera divas, all who have years of stage experience singing in Europe and America. Soprano Nancy Beier sang her entire career in German opera houses. Soprano Susan Roe, who sang with the orchestra in 2012, made her operatic debut singing *La Boheme* in the Cairo Opera House in Egypt, and Sharon Annette Lancaster, mezzo-soprano, has sung in the Seattle area for many years and has also sung in Germany.

Maestro Dewey Ehling has conducted many grand operas as well as dozens of musicals and has selected a blend of arias and music from opera and ballet. Ehling says that opera is stimulating because it is so complex—encompassing all the elements of theater including lighting, costuming, make-up, dance and acting. All are secondary to the art of singing.

The audience will hear arias from *Carmen*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Tosca*, *Lakmé* and *Der Rosenkavalier*, as well as ballet music from Faust and a lovely mazurka from Delibes' ballet *Coppelia*.

Also on the program will be the fourth movement of Borodin's *Symphony No. 2 in B minor*, which will complete the symphony's season. Next October the orchestra will play the entire symphony.

All concerts at Chimacum High School Auditorium are free to the public, and donations are welcome. Conductor Ehling gives a 20-minute program preview at 6:45 p.m.

Coming Unbound



Judge Approves Iron Mountain Quarry/Jefferson County Deal

On March 1, Judge Steve Dixon approved an agreement between Jefferson County and Iron Mountain Quarry (IMQ) regarding a county stormwater permit and ordered dismissal of a Land Use Petition Act (LUPA) case. The county’s decision to issue a Mitigated Determination of Nonsignificance (MDN) had been a subject of dispute since it was issued on September 28, 2012. IMQ had argued that some of the conditions the county had imposed on its operation were not within the county’s authority. IMQ filed a LUPA appeal in October 2012. A damages lawsuit by IMQ remains active against the county.

The decree means the mining company has met the stormwater permit requirements for the construction of New Shine Quarry. Other permits are still needed. They include a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit from Washington State Department of Ecology, an Air Operating Permit from Olympic Region Clean Air Agency, a building permit from the Jefferson County Building Department, water and septic approval from Jefferson County Public Health and permits from the Department of Natural Resources.

Activities begin with retired U.S. Coast Guard Captain Peter Joseph taking participants on a tabletop cruise to the Straits that portrays hazards, equipment breakdowns, and other mishaps that are common in the Pacific Northwest. Next, attendees will learn proper use of life jackets and survival gear from Coast Guard Auxiliary members David Aho and Kevin Ryan. They will discuss how your clothing selection while aboard can impact your chances of survival should you end up in the water. The demonstration takes place at the indoor pool of the Beach Club. Lunch follows the demonstration.

Afternoon activities start with a variety of breakout sessions held at multiple locations in the Beach Club and nearby at the Port Ludlow Marina docks. Topics include *Tides, Currents and Trip Planning*, and *Docking*, presented by the Northwest Maritime Center Waterfront Programs Manager, Carolyn "Ace" Spragg. Other classes include:

- Knot Tying – Practical and Decorative, Bill Dengler, member of the International Guild of Knot Tyers.
- Digital Selective Calling and Automatic Identification System, Piotr Okonski, Coast Guard Auxiliary, Flotilla 41, Staff Officer for Communications
- Reading a Nautical Chart, Joe Langjahr, a retired Captain of the U. S. Coast Guard Reserve and current member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

On A dock, next door at the Port Ludlow Marina, Terry Allen, owner of Aurora Yacht Services of Port Ludlow, will demonstrate the proper way to perform a pre-departure engine room check.

The keynote speaker will be Jay Albrecht, Lead Forecaster and Marine Program Manager for the National Weather Service, who will present *Heavy Weather Avoidance in the Pacific Northwest Marine Waters*. This presentation will highlight how storm systems evolve, how big waves develop, and where the most dangerous parts of storms are typically located.

Metropolitan Park Districts

According to Wikipedia, a park district is a form of a local special-purpose district for providing public parks and recreation in or near its geographical boundaries. Some also own or maintain related facilities such as monuments, sports arenas, music venues or museums. Usually a Park District does not have exclusive rights to establish parks. Other entities may establish parks. State and national parks are controlled by the entity that created them, not by any park district.

Port Townsend is investigating the establishment of a metropolitan park district (MPD) in its general area. The idea was generated by the Exploratory Regional Parks and Recreation Committee out of concern for maintenance of the county parks which are unfunded due to recent economic conditions. Those include H.J. Caroll Park, the Port Townsend Recreation Center, Memorial Field and others. If a park district were established, the County could levy property taxes on behalf of the district and charge entry fees to support the park. Jurisdictions already having MPDs are excluded from participation.

Some citizens in Port Ludlow have expressed concern because Port Ludlow might be asked to help pay for the parks. They complain that they would be mostly in Port Townsend, thus inconvenient, and would replicate services already available in Port Ludlow, therefore providing little benefit to its residents. Nevertheless, they might be subject to a tax designated for park support.

The County is not very far down the road in this process. At this point no one knows whether the issue will be on the ballot. A steering committee, containing 12 people and chaired by Mike McFadden and Kathleen Kler, has been formed. Kler formerly served on a Parks Advisory Board in Quilcene. The committee will make a recommendation to the councilors who are primarily responsible for funding.

Presently, there are only two park districts in Jefferson County. The Coyle park district funds Coyle’s community center. Brinnon also has formed a park district mainly to keep out a county MPD. On the positive side, the MPD is an altruistic attempt to help children who are primary users of parks.

Message from Chief Brad Martin

Sequestration took place on March 1 and with it came mandatory across-the-board budget cuts. The full effect, on the Federal level, will take time to be realized. The full impact is not completely understood. Each organization of the government will have to sort through the requirements, and develop their plans for implementation.

Unfortunately, some cuts to federal programs will have an impact on the fire service in general. The fire department relies on grants to assist us with expensive budget items such as staffing, equipment purchasing/replacement, and prevention programs. Two predominant grant programs, the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) and the Assistance to Firefighter Grant (AFG), are affected. These two grants, funded for 2013 for \$208 million dollars, were cut by \$117 million dollars. That makes obtaining funds through the grants nearly impossible.

In addition to the cuts to the grant programs, Medicare reimbursement will be cut by 2 percent. For PLFR that will only be approximately \$4,000/year. That is based on

the number of calls and call types that Medicare patients require. Each fire district will have differing rates dependent upon their location and population.

With the cuts and furloughs and layoffs of base workers, it is predicted that business patronage and sales tax revenues will be dramatically decreased. Fortunately, and unlike Bremerton and other municipalities, Ludlow is not dependent upon sales tax revenues. Nevertheless, our proactive Board of Commissioners and department personnel have considered the impact of reduced funds and are working to ensure service levels and staffing survive the crisis.

Kurt came in 17 out of 1473 climbers and bettered his previous time by 13 seconds at 13:17 minutes. Rachel came in 60 out of 134 female climbers at 25:05 minutes.

The “Scott Climb” benefits the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society whose mission is to cure leukemia, lymphoma, Hodgkin’s disease and myeloma. It is a climb up 69 flights (1311 steps and 788 feet of vertical elevation) outfitted in 60 pounds of firefighting equipment in the Columbia Center Building in Seattle.



Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Meeting Report

by Beverly Browne, Managing Editor/PLVC Reporter

Vice President Tony Durham presided over the meeting of the Village Council at 3:00 p.m. on March 7 at the Beach Club. Also present were Laury Hunt, Tamra McDermid, Larry Nobles, Sue Oemichen, Lois Ruggles and Terry Umbreit. Absent were Dave Armitage, Linda Haskins, Elizabeth Van Zonnefeld, Jerry Purdy and Vicki Tallerico. A quorum was declared. The meeting was recorded.

Review of prior meeting minutes resulted in delaying their approval. Larry Nobles complained that they were misleading with regard to the number of pilings being replaced. Tamra McDermid concurred and noted that it was not clear if they referred to the pilings themselves or just bird houses. Clarification will be sought.

Council Actions and Reports

Treasurer's Report: Tony Durham presented the Treasurer's Report in the absence of Linda Haskins. He said that it had been a slow month with no income received. Expenditures included a \$200 contribution to the *Voice* and \$1,000 to the Trails Committee. The PLVC has \$3,646 in the IMQ Reserve Fund, \$18,443 in the General operating account, \$10,941 in Certificates for Deposit and \$29,383 in General Operating Funds. It holds \$13,024 for the trails committee. Larry Nobles moved that the Treasurer's Report be accepted. It was seconded and approved.

Invited Speakers: Durham announced that the Council is developing a list of meeting speakers and asked for suggestions. Some suggestions were: John Fabian of the Hood Canal Coalition, Jefferson County Sheriff Tony Hernandez, speakers from Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue, someone from the Chimacum School District and Port Ludlow Associates. Tony Simpson suggested that the Development Agreement, water quality and water rights would be appropriate topics to showcase.

The topic of the Port Townsend Metropolitan Park District was also proposed. The Park District is likely to have tax implications for Port Ludlow residents. Oemichen moved that County Commissioner John Austin be asked to explain the ramifications of the park district and how it affects Jefferson County. The proposal was seconded by Tamra MacDermid and approved by the Council.

Election Planning: Candidates for board positions are being sought. Board members whose terms are expiring are Larry Nobles, Lois Ruggles, Vicki Tallerico and Terry Umbreit. Persons who would like to run for office should contact one of the Directors.

Farmer's Market: Reporting for Vicki Tallerico, Umbreit said that the posters are being finalized. Tallerico has developed a large vendor list. Tamra MacDermid displayed alternate poster designs. The market will start on the last day in May and run to October. The location will change to the bluff near the Harbor Master. Hours have been adapted.

It was proposed that the PLVC sponsor a tent at the market. Umbreit said that is in the plans. A major market promotion is planned for April.

Report from the Developer

Diana Smeland, President of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA), said that the corporation sent a letter last fall requesting a 5-year extension to 2025. They also requested a 3-year extension to the development plats. Olympic Terrace II and Ludlow Cove are set to expire in 2015. PLA is behind on their development schedule and is not sure when that will change. PLA does have enough water rights to do the build-out.

The Councilors questioned whether it would be helpful to send a letter to support the application for the development extension. A motion to send a letter passed with 6 of 7 councilors approving. Private citizens may also write letters.

PLA is entering into a final settlement agreement with Pope Resources regarding soil contamination in a well site. The settlement refers to a cost-sharing agreement between Pope and PLA to clean up gasoline leakage where the well was being dug.

Smeland also confirmed a rumor that PLA is exploring the sale of Olympic Water and Sewer (OWSI). She emphasized that no decision has been made at this time. If the sale is desirable from a business standpoint, PLA will start the process by listing with a commercial broker. The broker will look for potential buyers in the market.

Utilities Committee Response: Phil Otness, PLVC Utilities Committee, said that the committee has been exploring options for ownership of the utility for some time. The options were: to petition or request Jefferson County PUD to buy the system, form a local water and sewer district by vote of the people under RCW 57, and ownership by another company. The complete report is in the PLVC Archives and is dated November 30, 2004. Otness said that the committee is unanimous in wanting to prevent another private company to acquire OWSI. A further discussion of this issue is planned for future meetings.

It is believed that the Jefferson County Utility would have the financial and human resources to assume ownership of the Utility. It already runs 13 water districts in the county and recently took over the Kala Point water system.

Other Business

Assuming responsibility for the *portludlowtoday* has been discussed with current managers, David Pike and Dean Mosier. No agreement was reached but Pike will meet with Tamra MacDermid.

President's Message

This past month has seen numerous new developments that will impact our community. Several Port Ludlow residents attended a joint meeting of the Port Townsend City Council and the Board of County Commissioners for Jefferson County, on a proposed Metropolitan Park District (MPD) on February 11.

The MPD is an attempt by the two governments to solve a funding problem that was created by an Eyman initiative that limited the growth of government to no more than one percent a year. This growth rate is less than the rate of inflation; thus the government loses buying power. In attempting to provide the same levels of service, the county is considering shifting discretionary

spending on parks into a special purpose taxing district. By establishing a separate taxing authority, the county can continue to provide service.

The net impact on rate-payers is that taxes will rise more than one percent and customers will deal with a fractured government with multiple layers. In addition, Port Ludlow will help fund Port Townsend recreation facilities, but will receive little in return.

The ultimate solution is to overturn the Eyman initiative or amend it to at least cover the rate of inflation. If Port Ludlow is included in the MPD, you will be able to vote on the formation of the district. For additional information, see the article on page 13.

A second rising issue deals with the extension of the development agreement between Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) and Jefferson County. PLA has been hurt by the downturn in the housing markets. The current agreement will end in 2020. PLA does not feel they can complete the build out in that time frame and is asking for an additional five years. The extension is reasonable, but at the same time it raises some questions. In establishing the initial agreement, the developer promised to provide certain services and amenities. Will that happen?

PLA has announced that it may sell the water and sewer company, Olympic Water and Sewer, Inc. (OWSI), to raise money to complete the development. You should care who owns the water company.

OWSI has not established reserve funds to replace aging facilities. A new owner will not have that luxury. The Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC)'s Utility Committee has reviewed this issue several times. See the report of the PLVC meeting for a list of possible buyers. Each has its pluses and minuses, but all will likely increase rates to establish a reserve fund for future repairs. A private company will add a profit on top.

These issues will require your attention. The PLVC needs to hear your voices.



LMC February Board Meeting Highlights

The monthly business meeting of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees was held February 21 at the Beach Club. The following are highlights of that meeting:

The compressor in the heat pump that serves the Bay View Room in the Beach Club is failing seven years before its scheduled replacement. It is not cost-effective to just replace the compressor. We have received a bid to replace the system at a cost of \$11,253. Two more bids are expected before a decision is made. In the meantime, the Bay View Room is being heated by back-up electric-resistance heat which is less energy efficient than the heat pump.

LMC maintenance staff replaced a failed spa motor and pump which cost \$500. A circuit board and fan motor were recently replaced in one of the Beach Club's treadmills for approximately \$600.

Peace Lutheran Fellowship is considering renting the Bay View Room for their services every Sunday at 9:00 a.m. to noon beginning around **May 1**. They are also looking at 17 other venues. Revenue data indicates very little use of the Bay View Room at that time of the week. Another church group (St. Patrick's by the Bay Anglican Church) currently meets on Sundays in the Bridge Deck.

The North Bay Lot Owners Association (NBLOA) has awarded five \$100 grants to help North Bay homeowners pay the 2013 LMC special assessment. The board and General Manager commended the NBLOA, especially Jamie Bima, for helping our neighbors who are struggling.

Viktor Gecas was approved as a new member of the Greenbelt Committee.

Bids are being sought to replace door hardware in the Bay View Room and the Bridge Deck to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. The hardware

You and Your Greenbelt

Did you know there are approximately 54 acres of reserve properties within North Bay designated as greenbelts in accordance with the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Governing Documents? The greenbelts belong to and are for the benefit and enjoyment of all LMC members. The native trees, undergrowth, and other plants that inhabit these greenbelt areas greatly enhance the beauty and value of our community, mitigate water runoff problems, provide visual screens and buffer zones, lessen traffic noise and air pollution and provide habitat for birds and other wildlife. As with all forests, the trees in our greenbelts grow, become diseased, die and fall (sometimes causing hazards to individuals, homes, roads and trails), and infringe upon water and mountain views.

The Greenbelt Committee (GBC) manages the LMC undeveloped greenbelts for the benefit of all members. The GBC's tasks include planning and initiating projects to maintain and improve the greenbelt areas to ensure that dead, damaged and diseased trees do not become a hazard, and to consider lot owner requests to mitigate view infringements resulting from the growth of trees within the greenbelt areas. Dealing with potentially hazardous trees is the first priority of the GBC.

To ensure that the greenbelt areas are properly managed and maintained, the LMC Governing Documents require

that work on, use of, or modification to the greenbelt areas must be approved, in advance, and monitored by the GBC.

Should you have greenbelt trees adjacent to your property that you believe may pose a potential hazard, please complete a GBC Request form (available from the Beach Club office) setting forth your concerns and turn it in to that office. Someone from the GBC will respond to your request at the earliest possible time. Trees that pose an imminent threat to human safety or property will be removed at GBC expense.

Request for view maintenance or restoration should also be submitted to the GBC on the request form available at the Beach Club. If the request is approved by the GBC, any costs and expenses associated with such activities shall be the responsibility of the requesting party.

If you are interested in maintaining a portion of the greenbelt area, you will need to submit a written maintenance plan to the GBC for consideration and approval. The form for requesting a maintenance agreement is also available at the Beach Club.

The GBC meets the **second Tuesday** of every month at 2:00 p.m. at the Beach Club. If you have any questions regarding your greenbelt areas, please come to a GBC meeting or contact Jack Riggen (437-0370) or Ron Garton (437-2022), co-chairs of the GBC.

SBCA Meeting Highlights

The South Bay Community Association Board (SBCA) met on March 1, at 9:30 a.m. Six Board Members were present; twenty-one members signed in. The highlights of the meeting appear below. The official meeting minutes and financial reports are posted on the SBCA website, plsbca.org.

Correspondence: The Board discussed the use of chlorine vs. bromine as a pool sanitizer in response to a letter from a member. Bromine is a more effective sanitizer in higher temperatures (spa) and both pool and spa users may develop allergies to either chlorine or bromine.

Financial Report: Kay Cathcart reported that the Columbia Bank CD has been renewed, but the interest rate is greatly reduced. There are a number of members with a balance due; 65 have an overdue balance of more than two quarters. Second notices will be sent to members with a balance on their account. Pros and cons of recording liens were discussed.

Committee Reports

Operations Report: Brian Belmont, interim General Manager, said he was impressed with the hardworking, loyal Bay Club staff. Belmont announced that the Board is seeking another part-time employee as a front desk "fill in" position. The position will cover requested time off and sick calls.

Architectural Review Committee: The ARC filed an Olympic Terrace painting project (approved by Village ARC). A view maintenance application in Timberton Village was approved; two complaints in LPV-1 were deferred as complainants were not in attendance. Three view applications from Woodridge Village are under study. The ARC will review legal opinions and determine whether there are additional questions before moving forward.

Facilities Committee: Diane Ridgley said the Landscape subcommittee is working on issues with drainage in the soggy back lawn. The landscaping contract is being developed and will go out for bids when completed. Moss in the parking lot and on walkways is being addressed in an environmentally safe way. Sidewalks will be repaired. The pool, scheduled for re-plastering in 2015, is blistering due to the acid wash. The plastering will be rescheduled to occur in 2014.

The tennis courts are scheduled for repair and repainting this year; the committee is currently compiling a contract to obtain bids to repaint the Bay Club trim.

The review of Bay Club storage has resulted in new shelves in the storage room and clearing and organization of the electrical room. The shed is being cleaned, organized, and inventoried; the off-site storage unit will be emptied. Board Member Ed Knodle will coordinate record retention. The sound system in the Great Room has been serviced. The Board approved the purchase of eight new cordless microphones and a laptop computer with recording capability for \$800 plus tax.

Finance Committee: The committee recommended the creation of a policy for facility fee guidelines for charities and qualifying nonprofits, the establishment of a level of funding for SBCA Reserves at 70 percent, and a target goal to achieve funding in the next five years. Identification of components that need maintenance, repair, or replacement during the upcoming budget and review of the healthcare benefits by the Human Relations Committee were recommended.

Human Relations: The committee will discuss employment options for the General Manager position, review job descriptions, update the employee handbook, review the employee benefit package, and review employee files for required documentation.

Finance: The conversion to an in-house bookkeeping system has progressed with the help of Jarilyn Rust.

Member information has been imported into Quick Books. Employee and payroll tax data has been entered; the goal is to issue the next payroll from the in-house system. The Chart of Accounts is currently being formulated.

New Business

General Manager Position: The interview process was outlined. Thirty resumés have been received for the General Manager position. The Board of Directors will select interviewees. Three teams of interviewers will conduct independent interviews; leaders received interview packets. Teams will meet and devise 5 or 6 questions for candidates. All candidates will receive the same questions and be rated on a scale. Teams will have 30 minutes with each candidate.

Extended Hours Task Force: Jarilyn Rust requested rescheduling the key card presentation for the April Board meeting. Initial estimates were that the system would cost \$15,000. The task force needs additional time to examine other aspects of the system.

Other Business and Announcements

The Finance Committee and the Facilities Committee were tasked to provide a report at the April Board meeting on how to achieve a level of 70 percent funding of the SBCA reserves.

A draft protocol for recording SBCA Board meetings was distributed and will be discussed at the April Board meeting.

The Instructor Led Classes - Facility Fee Guideline was approved.

Ed Knodle will chair the Nominations Task Force to find nominees to fill vacant positions on the Board of Directors.

The SBCA Board of Directors and SBCA ARC will conduct a workshop to discuss legal opinions on March 18 at 1:00 p.m. at the Bay Club.

Richard and Phyllis Gandy were approved as Associate Members. The Board recessed to Executive Session to discuss personnel issues. The regular meeting reconvened and candidates were approved for interview for the General Manager position.

The next regular SBCA Meeting will be **Friday, April 5** at 9:30 a.m.







Harrison Offers Innovative Cardiovascular Procedure

Ventricular tachycardia is an irregular cardiac arrhythmia that is fatal when untreated. Randall (Randy) Peterson knows this first hand. The daily effort of regulating his heartbeat was becoming an overwhelming and life-threatening task.

“My ICD [internal cardiac defibrillator] had gotten to the point where it was firing daily, even multiple times a day,” Peterson recalled. “I just couldn’t enjoy life the way I’d envisioned it.” The retired Coast Guard man had begun to believe his sailing days were over.

To help Peterson and dozens like him, the cardiovascular team at Harrison Medical Center, led by electrophysiologist Nathan Segerson, MD, of Kitsap Cardiology Consultants, performed a successful mapping and ablation of an unstable ventricular tachycardia patient using the Impella® left ventricular assist catheter. Harrison was the first hospital in the Northwest (including Washington, Oregon, Western Montana, Western Idaho, and Alaska) to employ this type of dramatic, life-saving procedure using the Impella® device.

Collaborating with Dr. Segerson were members of Harrison’s cardiothoracic surgery team, including cardiac anesthesiologist Chai Kanithanon, MD; cardiothoracic surgeons Chris King, MD and William Reed, MD; and cardiologist Satyavardhan Pulukurthy, MD. Randy Peterson was Harrison’s first patient to undergo this procedure, which enables patients to receive this state-of-the-art care close to home.

“The rhythm abnormality this patient was suffering from was immediately life-threatening every time it occurred. Without the defibrillator shocking him back to life, he was near death multiple times per day,” said Dr. Segerson. Receiving ICD shocks so frequently is simply not a life worth living, and medication options had failed.

The Impella®, a highly advanced heart catheter that pumps blood out of the heart and to the body, was the solution. It is inserted into the left ventricle (the heart chamber that pumps oxygenated blood to the body) to ensure proper blood flow while the physician creates a map of the electrical activity. The device ensures sustained cardiac output during that time.

This procedure would not have been possible without this supportive technology. “Prior to the availability of this technology, we might have considered heart transplant. However, that approach is simply not practical for older patients or for patients with multiple health problems,” said Dr. Segerson.

Jefferson Land Trust's Natural History Course

Jefferson Land Trust (JLT) will repeat a 7-week Natural History Course completed by participants, including this writer, last year. Designed by naturalists for the residents of the area, the course allows participants to spend focused time learning about our non-human community by observing in the field and gaining awareness of place. The course structure and content provide a comprehensive overview of the natural history of the area.

The Orientation Session is on **Saturday, April 27**, 9:00 a.m. until noon, at the Cotton Building, Port Townsend. Orientation is an opportunity to review the course outline, locations and logistics, and learn about the instructors and participants. Course journals will be issued and journaling assignments discussed.

The field trips are on **Saturdays** beginning **May 4**, beginning at Port Townsend's Marine Science Center with a lesson on plankton and food webs in the Salish Sea. Participants will board a comfortable boat to tour portions of the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the Salish Sea. The following Saturdays are spent exploring rain shadow forests and prairies, shorelines, temperate rainforests, aquatic and riparian environments and sub-alpine and alpine zones. For a course syllabus, contact Eric Kingfisher, JLT Stewardship Director at steward@saveland.org or 379-9501. A sliding scale fee of \$160-\$250 is requested.

JLT has protected and stewarded 10,919 acres of land, of which they own 179 acres, and protected 24 miles of creeks and rivers. JLT is located at 1033 Lawrence Street, Port Townsend.

The group that completed the course last year encompassed a wide range of ages and abilities. Enthusiasm was so high after course completion that some graduates formed a JLT Natural History Society. From that has evolved an online newsletter, a book club, monthly walks, hikes and lectures. Several participants have become stewards of JLT nature preserves, and we all graduated with a new appreciation of our natural environment. The Quilcene Historical Museum is in the final year of a 2 year option to purchase the adjoining 14 room 1891 Victorian Worthington home and 10 acres with out-buildings, pond, 660 feet of river front, orchard and timberland. Phase 2, 3, and 4 are to renovate/repair, preserve and furnish the home. The Museum is at 78 percent of its funding purchasing goal. One outdoor stage has been built on the property in order to hold fundraisers to help generate funds.

Eileen Worthington said: "In working with the Museum board to place the property in their care, I know this unique piece of history can be used as a learning environment; not only for our children, but for the community in general. It is my belief that the Museum will be a good steward of the land and use the facilities and grounds to enhance many new opportunities for our town."



The *Port Ludlow Voice* is a 501(c)(4) tax-exempt organization, whose entire staff is volunteer and unpaid. All writing and editing is done in the homes of staff members on their personal computers, while a volunteer staff member does all the formatting, which is provided to the printer on disc.

The *Voice* is delivered at no cost to readers to all U.S. Post Office carrier route customers in the Master Planned Resort (MPR). Members of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) and South Bay Community Association (SBCA) who live outside the delivery routes, as well as Snowbirds, may subscribe for \$8 a year. Subscriptions to all other interested parties are available at \$17 a year. Average monthly expenses for printing and postage are \$5300 plus miscellaneous items of \$60, for a monthly average of \$5360.




