### Arts Council's 10th Annual Music on the Green

The same holds true for "Mardi Gras in July"—Port Ludlow's 10th annual Music on the Green (MOG), which promises to be a memorable celebration as well! Be sure your plans include being a part of the big event **Sunday afternoon, July 22**, on the Bay Club lawn.

Doors open at noon with emcee Don Clark leading a traditional Mardi Gras parade that gets under way about 12:15 p.m. with both you and the musicians joining in the fun! Feel free to be outrageous; dress in traditional Mardi Gras colors of purple, green and gold; and if you wish, wear a mask—feathered, or the faces of comedy, drama etc. Consider decorating an umbrella for the parade and/or to protect against the afternoon sun. You might win a prize; you'll certainly catch lots of bead "throws," a Mardi Gras tradition since at least the late 19th century.

## From One Editor's Keyboard

The Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Communication Committee recently released the results of the "Issues and Ideas" survey taken by individuals identified as Key Communicators. In response to a question to identify the most important issues facing Port Ludlow residents in the next five years, almost 75 percent of the participants indicated that "Integration and coordination of North and South Bay activities" was the most important. The second issue of concern was "Responsibilities for utilities after [Port Ludlow Associates] PLA leaves" with 69 percent.

What does "Integration and coordination" mean? Obviously it means a lot of different things to many people. To some it means letting everyone in the community use amenities that are owned by an organization to which they have not paid dues, and this is not desired by many of the long-term residents. To others it means setting aside the obvious differences between the two sides of the Bay and working together to build a better Port Ludlow.

I was reminded of the latter when I was enjoying the Port Ludlow Artists' League exhibit on "Diversity in Presentation of the Same Theme" displayed at American Marine Bank. The piece by Mary Lynn Laker included a quote that read, "Everything happens for a reason it's just a matter of moving your point of view around until you see it." Perhaps this is what we all need to do...move our current approach to the idea of "Integration and coordination" and look for a different viewpoint.

A true community spirit exists here. I saw it at Friday Market on June 1 when mechanical and ferry problems delayed the arrival of Pescador Farms until almost closing and the market attendees pitched in to help them unload and setup. The sense of helping one another was evident when a man "hid" his fish selection in the ice at Ike's stand until he could come back with the money to pick it up and other purchasers "protected" it for him. The sense of community pride is quietly displayed by many neighbors on both sides of the Bay who pick up the roadside trash without recognition as their way of helping everyone enjoy our beautiful area.

Funfest is a wonderful example of an event where the entire community can work together and create a true one Port Ludlow event. Let's help with that one and look for the next thing we can work on together.

Infused with the spirit and enthusiasm of the hottest jazz bands of the '20s and '30s, New Orleans North is a traditional jazz band that features a front line that includes a clarinet harmonizing above the melody—in this case, Lloyd Arntzen on reed, vocals and spoken word—while the melody is carried usually by a trumpet, cornet or flugelhorn, played by Alan Matheson. The rhythm section features Grant Simpson leading the band and providing chord structure on both stride and swing piano while drummer Graeme Peters keeps the beat steady. This foursome teams up to explore New Orleans jazz and blues that rose from the establishments of the infamous back rooms of New Orleans.

**Zydeco:** A form of American-roots vocal music of the black and multi-racial French-speaking Creoles that evolved during the late 1800s, zydeco is a must for “Mardi Gras in July.” This music was originally created for house dances so the blacks and free people of color of south Louisiana could gather for socializing. As the Creoles further established their communities, the music integrated waltzes, shuffles, two-steps, blues, rock and roll, and most dance music forms of the era.

The opening set, from 12:30 to 1:15 p.m., will feature the Puget Sound area’s File’ Gumbo Zydeco Band performing spicy Cajun, zydeco, Tex-Mex, New Orleans rhythm and blues, Dixieland and a whole lot more! The featured house band at the New Orleans Restaurant in Seattle’s Historic Pioneer Square district for fifteen years, this group will return again from 2:45 to 3:45 p.m. Orville Johnson is lead guitar man/vocalist, Marc Bristol is group songwriter and guitarist/washboard player, Doug Bright is singer/ accordionist, Rob Moitoza plays bass, while Bob Merrihew is on drums. Although none of these guys are from down on the bayou, travelers from Louisiana who hear them always say, “You sound just like home to us!”

Between sets you can enjoy southwestern barbecue cooked up by Dos Okies—two guys from Oklahoma who will be dishing up pulled pork and chicken sandwiches, ribs, slaw, beans, watermelon, soft drinks and tea. Arts Council volunteers will be dispensing wine and beer throughout the afternoon.

All seating for this concert is on the Bay Club lawn. Summer is officially here in **July** and it can get very sunny during part of the afternoon, so hats and sunscreen are a

must. Bring your own blanket or low-backed chair that sits flat on the ground. People with higher-backed chairs will be asked to move behind those in low-backed ones. Parking is always an issue at Music on the Green. A shuttle bus will provide transportation from off-site parking locations. Better yet, get together with your neighbors and carpool!

Advance ticket price for the full afternoon is \$15 and increases to \$18 on performance day. Children twelve and under will be admitted free of charge as long as they are accompanied by an adult. Tickets are available now at the Bay Club, and will be sold at most Friday Markets in **July**.

Dave Weakley, director of Port Ludlow's mixed choral group, presented \$500 to Bram, Tuesday, June 5, at the Chimacum High School (CHS)

Senior Recognition Night.

Southern Oregon University (SOU) in Ashland, Oregon has accepted Bram for the term beginning in September 2007. SOU is a four-year public university specializing in liberal arts, sciences and select graduate and professional programs. The *New York Times* recently named SOU one of 20 "hidden gems" of higher education.

Bram has been in the Chimacum Schools Band Program since fifth grade and has been associated with the Port Townsend Community Orchestra and the Stardust Big Band out of Sequim. He auditioned and was selected to serve as trumpet section leader in the CHS Band for the last two years. During his junior year, his peers elected him band president. In addition, he has been taking private percussion lessons from Karl Bach, conductor of the Port Townsend Summer Band. In addition to earning a 3.676 GPA, he has worked as a dishwasher at the Ajax Café and presently is employed as a janitor at the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) Bay Club.

Scholarship funds were raised at the "Puttin' on a Show" musical programs presented by PLS this past April. In addition to performances throughout the community, they already are planning another concert for the fall of 2008.

## Biking for Cancer Survivors

Lance Armstrong was diagnosed with testicular cancer in 1996. By the time the condition was diagnosed the cancer had moved to his lungs and brain. Through various treatments he recovered and three years later was winning his first of seven victories at the Tour de France. After retiring in 2005, he devoted all of his effort to a charity named after him, the Lance Armstrong Foundation. The foundation aims to unite people in the fight against cancer by offering information and providing services to help cancer survivors live life on their own terms.

As part of its effort to make cancer a national priority, the Foundation sponsors four bicycle events in the USA every year. Participants solicit contributions and give those contributions to the Foundation for furthering its goals. One of those events will be held in Portland on **Sunday, September 30**. Port Ludlow's Mike Porter participated in the 2005 race and will participate again this year. His goal is to provide support and hope for local residents suffering with various forms of this dread disease. ## Teal Lake Road to be Widened

Jefferson County Public Works Department (PWD) plans to widen a portion of Teal Lake Road from the intersection with Paradise Bay Road past Highland Drive to Crestview Drive, in **September**. The work will take approximately two weeks to complete, according to County Engineer Jim Pearson. The road will remain open with "flaggers" on site during construction. Although the County will attempt to minimize inconvenience to the public, there may be brief delays.

The project is intended to mitigate the traffic impact from the development of the Olympic II Long Plat, commonly known as Olympic Terrace II. Based on an assessment of a transportation engineer and the PWD's analysis, Jefferson County determined that wider road shoulders were needed to accommodate traffic from the plat. The project will result in the road being safer and more bicycle and pedestrian friendly.

Construction will be in conformance with plans approved by the PWD and Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) standards. The cost of the project is estimated to be \$106,000 based on the bid of the contractor, Seton Construction. A licensed civil engineer reviewed the bid, who agreed that it was in the typical range for such a project. The cost will be paid entirely by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). In order to ensure completion, PLA has posted a bond of 200 percent of the estimated cost, a typical arrangement that conforms to the County's Unified Development Code (UDC).

## Port Ludlow Health Facilities Investigated

In March, after Vic Dirksen, CEO of Jefferson Healthcare (JHC), indicated that Jefferson Healthcare would be willing to consider establishing a health facility of some type in Port Ludlow, a small group from the Village Council met with several local retired MDs for discussions. The general consensus was that such a facility would be very beneficial to our community and that we should continue to explore this possibility with Jefferson Healthcare.

Accordingly, a larger group met with Dirksen; Paula Dowdle, JHC Chief Operating Officer, and members of the JHC Board, Kathy Hill and Chuck Russell, on April 12. At the meeting JHC agreed to investigate the project in greater detail and to convene a small meeting to work on details.

JHC held a subsequent meeting at the hospital in Port Townsend on May 7. Alan Panasuk of the Village Council, Ron Deisher (a resident with a background in healthcare), Diana Smeland and Larry Smith of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) represented Port Ludlow. Ed Wilkerson, Fire Chief, attended briefly, but was called away on an emergency.

JHC is considering the possibility of a facility similar to the one they now operate in Quilcene. The Clinic would be supervised by an MD, and staffed by a registered Physician's Assistant. It would be primarily a walk-in Urgent Care Clinic, but might also take some appointment-based primary healthcare patients. JHC would initially commit to operation of the Clinic for a year, with continuation dependent on the experience of the first year.

Two major problems are now being addressed:

1. Where is there space for such a facility in Port Ludlow?
2. Is the initial capital cost to establish a clinic affordable for JHC?

Another major question is: Will our community wholeheartedly support such a facility if we can get it up and running?

Tony Durham, Tom McCay, Larry Nobles and Alan Panasuk have represented the Village Council in these discussions. We wish to thank the many other Port Ludlow residents who have helped out with time and advice. These

include Jerry Brady, chiropractor and current President of the Chamber of Commerce; Michael Cahn, Bill Collins, Bruce Hudson, Connie MacDonald, Francis Marik, Kevin Ryan and Bill Shamhart (all retired doctors); Ron Deisher and Tracy Gordy (healthcare administrators); and Ed Wilkerson, Fire Chief.

The clinic proposal is under active discussion between Jefferson Healthcare, Port Ludlow Associates and the Village Council.

## How Safe is Your Home?

A recent *New Yorker* article on geriatrics reports a case history of an 85-year old patient. The woman had lower back pain, arthritis, two knee replacements and high blood pressure. She had also had surgery for colon cancer and an undiagnosed nodule in her lung. Doctors were treating her symptoms. However, from the viewpoint of the geriatric specialist, the single most serious threat she faced was not the nodule or the back pain or any of the other problems. The greatest immediate risk to this woman's health was falling!

About 350,000 Americans fall and break a hip each year. Of these, 40 percent end up in a nursing home and 20 percent are never able to walk again. According to medical sources, the three primary risk factors for falling are poor balance, taking four or more prescription medications and muscle weakness.

Installing grab bars, railings, ramps and steps are the Boeing Bluebill's bread and butter. Take a look at your home and that of your friends. ## Pardon Our Chips

Each year the Jefferson County Public Works Road Maintenance Department resurfaces roadways throughout the County. This summer during the months **July through September** a number of roads in Port Ludlow will be resurfaced. Drivers may experience temporary delays during the process. Drivers should reduce their vehicle speed when they encounter the “Fresh Oil” or “Loose Gravel” signs to reduce the amount of oil or rock that can be kicked up. Roads may be reduced to one lane during the resurfacing project, but it is doubtful any road will be closed completely.

Roads in Port Ludlow will be chipsealed, which means an application of asphalt followed with an aggregate rock or chips cover. Chipsealing is done in several stages. The first step, known as pre-leveling, is to clean and patch the road surface and to correct any surface deficiencies. Hot liquid asphalt is then applied to one lane, covered with rock, rolled to set the rock (chipsealing) and once the road surface has cured, the excess rocks are swept clear.

Depending on the weather and scheduling, the following roads are planned to be chipsealed:

Ames Lane, Barque Lane, Clipper Lane, Condon Lane, Cutter Lane, Deer Hollow Road, Dunbar Court, Dunsmuir Road, Evans Lane, Fernridge Drive, Grove Court, Ketch Lane, Libby Court, Mainsail Lane, Montgomery Lane, Paradise Bay Road, Raeburn Court, Sayward Lane, Sloop Lane, South Bay Way, Topsail Lane, Tyee Lane and Yawl Lane.

## AARP Driver Safety Classes

## Economic Development in Jefferson County

Ian McFall, Executive Director of the Economic Development Council (EDC) discussed the activities and goals of the EDC at the June 7 Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting. According to McFall, the EDC's approach to economic development is greatly affected by the area's demographics. Pertinent demographic factors include the following:

- Retirees compose 46 percent of Jefferson County's population.
- The average income is 30 percent below the State average.
- Rural schools have declining enrollment.
- The average home price is unaffordable for the average wage earner.
- Younger workers are emigrating out of the area.

In view of these limitations, McFall sees the role of the EDC as one of creating desirable economic growth, providing a one-stop resource to support the region's businesses, and providing a voice for local industry in determining State and local regulation. A major goal of the EDC, according to McFall, is to help existing industries determine and overcome obstacles to their growth. He favors creating a five-year plan for future business development.

A part of the plan would be to obtain State and Federal funding for regional programs that provide an infrastructure for key regional industries. There are five target industries in Jefferson County. They are technology, marine trades, aquaculture and agriculture, tourism and hospitality, and light manufacturing. The major obstacles to growth were perceived to be lack of markets, an adequately trained workforce, facilities, infrastructure, regulations and capital. As an example of an infrastructure factor hindering development McFall cited the lack of high-speed internet throughout the region.

Unlike previous EDC Boards, the current Board is composed of key industry representatives rather than elected or appointed individuals. Funding is done through membership and service fees. The projects are regional in scope with clear benefits for Jefferson County. The focus

of the Commission is on projects, entrepreneurial skills and results. So far EDC membership has increased by 80 percent and the Commission has been self-sustaining for the last six months. There is a rate schedule for membership. The EDC has become a business rather than a governmental agency according to McFall.

McFall encouraged the audience by stating that much is happening in the newly structured EDC that should benefit Jefferson County. Persons wanting additional information should contact the organization by phone at 385-6767 or by e-mail at [director@edcjc.com](mailto:director@edcjc.com).

## From the Jefferson County Administrator's Desk

Happy Fourth of July to each of you! As usual, we have a lot going on at the County and I want to keep you up-to-date on as much as possible.

The County has hired Peter Buck as a mediator for the Port Ludlow Resort Build-out project. He will be working with the County, Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) and the four appellants over the next few months. I thought you might like to know a little bit about him.

Peter Buck is a partner with Buck & Gordon out of Seattle, specializing in land use, environmental, real estate and civil litigation. He has represented a broad range of clients from "concerned citizens," to individual property owners, to large international development corporations, as well as local governments on a case-by-case basis.

Buck is consistently ranked as one of the top "Super Lawyers" in the State in *Washington Law & Politics*, as "Best Lawyer" in *Best Lawyers of America*, and as one of Washington's top three zoning and land use attorneys in *Chambers USA*.

The deadline for receiving Statements of Qualifications for the Appellate Hearing Examiner was in mid-June. An interview committee has been formed and we'll be selecting at least two candidates to interview. We hope to have the new Appellate Hearing Examiner selected by the end of **July**.

In late June, David Wayne Johnson, Port Ludlow Associate Planner in the County's Department of Community Development (DCD), gave a presentation to the Ludlow Maintenance Committee (LMC) regarding tree removal in critical areas. Since there have been some concerns about what, where and how trees can be cut, trimmed or removed for view maintenance, this was an opportunity for everyone to better understand the County's policies. Activities in critical or environmentally sensitive areas, such as landslides, hazards areas, wetlands, and even certain shorelines, require adherence to regulations.

As you may have read in the newspapers, we have settled on keeping the Gateway Visitor Center where it currently exists at the intersection of State highways 104 and 19. The Jefferson County Historical Society (JCHS) will continue its management role and we plan to upgrade it over the next year, including adding restrooms. More news will be forthcoming as we move forward.

In early June, DCD held a pre-application conference with PLA for a 45-lot subdivision to occupy the old "Trendwest" site called Ludlow Cove Division 2. Both the County and PLA agree that this subdivision would be a good opportunity to employ Low Impact Development techniques to treat storm water runoff before it enters Ludlow Bay since it would be on the shoreline. I will give you more information on this as it progresses.

## Eating Around

### Breakfast at Niblick's

One of the best-kept culinary secrets on the Peninsula is breakfast at Niblick's at the Port Ludlow Golf Course. Kathy Arthur and her able crew are always ready with bright smiles, quick, courteous service and good old-fashioned home cookin'.

One of the more popular items on the menu is "Pro's Pick." This is a breakfast burrito large enough to share. Imagine eggs, cheese and bacon, sausage or ham wrapped in a flour tortilla. For those looking for more traditional fare, "Tide" is a light breakfast (two eggs, hash browns, and toast) and "Timber" is a full breakfast (two eggs, hash browns, and toast with bacon or patty sausage). Rounding out the breakfast menu is "Trail." This is a breakfast sandwich with eggs and bacon, sausage or ham served on your favorite toasted bread. Although French toast does not appear on the menu, if you ask nicely, the ladies will serve you either two or three pieces covered with powdered sugar.

## Popular 10-Week Stock Grows Abundantly

*Matthiola* or Stock are from the Mediterranean, but have been popular in the U.S. for hundreds of years. They are in the 'Brassicaceae' or mustard family, which is responsible for their pungent spicy smell. My favorite Stock is *Matthiola incana* sometimes called 10-Week

Stock because they are long blooming. In our area they are biannual, but in colder areas they cannot take the winters. In any case you will want to collect the large, round flat seeds for replanting. In early spring or late fall, when the weather is cool, you will be rewarded with spirals of blooms in pink, rose, lavender, red, and some combinations. The leaves are oblong, about 4 inches in length. They quit blooming when the temperature goes above 65 degrees.

Seeds or plants can be planted in the early spring or late fall when the weather is cool. Plant them in full sun, with rich well drained soil. The soil needs to be kept evenly moist but never soggy or the roots will rot. In windy areas the plants will also need staking. If you are buying plants, select those with abundant leaves but no flowers. The flowers don't transplant well and will probably drop off or not attain their full height. Position the plants 7 to 12 inches apart. They look best in large groups of 12 or more. However, my grandmother always lined hers against the house where they were tall and stately, with smaller plants towards the front of the bed. You will want to plant plenty because they make a dramatic cut flower. For continued blooming, deadhead the flowers and fertilize the plants every 4 to 6 weeks.

Not all *Matthiola incana* are tall; they range in size from 1 to 3 feet and some branching types are 10 to 16 inches wide. However, Column and Double Giant Flowering are unbranched towering at 24 to 36 inches tall. They are a dramatic statement in any garden.

## Vegetation Removal Requests Explained

*The following is based on information submitted at the Voice's request by David Wayne Johnson, Jefferson County Department of Community Development (DCD) Lead Planner for Port Ludlow, and on the ordinances Johnson stated he would use in discussing the Critical Area Ordinance in a meeting scheduled to be held on June 27.*

Jefferson County regulates the removal of vegetation in Critical or Environmentally Sensitive Areas (including landslide hazards, wetlands, streams and shores) through the Unified Development Code (UDC), JCC Title 18, of 2001. In the past, requests to remove or trim trees within critical areas and associated buffers under the threshold for a Stormwater or Department of Natural Resources (DNR) permit were processed for free on a case-by-case basis. The stormwater threshold included land-disturbing activities over 7,000 square feet or creation of more than 2,000 feet of impervious surface. Critical area and buffer alterations required submittal of a drainage and erosion control plan and compliance with protection standards. The threshold for a DNR permit for timber is any harvest of merchantable timber over 5,000 board feet. The following exemptions applied:

**Geologically Hazardous Areas**, JCC 18.15.275(6)(d). Buffers could receive minor pruning of vegetation to enhance views.

**Fish and Wildlife Habitat Areas (Streams, Eagle Habitat)**, JCC 18.15.315(5)(c). Buffers could receive minor pruning of vegetation to enhance views or provide access as long as the function and character of the buffer is not diminished.

**Wetlands**, JCC 18.15.330(5)(c). Buffers could be altered where the vegetation had been disturbed, invaded by highly undesirable species (e.g., noxious weeds), or where it would substantially benefit from diversity of introduced species. Replanting with native vegetation is required where buffers are disturbed. Minor pruning of vegetation to enhance views and removal of undesirable species (e.g., alders) could be permitted by the administrator on a case-by-case basis.

**Shorelands**, JCC 18.25.410(3)(e). Residential developers and individual builders must indicate how they plan to preserve shore vegetation and control erosion during construction.

Conditions have changed. Recently, the UDC Administrator, Stacie Hoskins, implemented a more restrictive policy addressing exempt activities including "minor pruning to enhance views" within critical areas and their buffers. Effective January 1, 2007 tree removal requests require consistency review with a Type I review process. The minimum application fee is \$153 will be billed prior to decision issuance. The case type would be ZON (zoning). This will allow the County to track cases more efficiently, provide case information on the website for interested parties, and provide better direction for appeals. The County is attempting to be consistent with the existing Jefferson County Code (JCC 18.40.140), provide a consistent review process and preserve the right for the applicant to appeal denied requests.

If a proposed removal is within a mapped critical area, a report from a qualified preparer under Article VI-J Special Reports is required to determine where the critical area is, what level it is and what effect the proposed activity will have. Waivers of the special report requirement may be granted when the applicant demonstrates the area will not be affected in a manner contrary to code goals and that minimum protections standards are satisfied (JCC 18.15.355).

Before application for tree removal, the requester should check the County Geographic Information System (GIS) maps for critical areas and determine if they exceed the threshold for a Stormwater or DNR permit. Maps can be checked on-line or by the Planner of the Day at 379-4450. Persons violating the conditions of the law may be subject to fines, special studies and costs of restoration.

## Water, Water Everywhere...

*Part two in a three-part series on water issues facing Port Ludlow.*

In Seattle, the “M’s” are the talk of the town. In Port Ludlow it’s the “m’s” that are making news: manganese and magnesium in our water are causing concerns. Manganese, as noted in last month’s article, can leave an oily, black film in appliances; it’s harmless, but unsightly. Magnesium can encourage the formation of a thick, black sludge or cause a rotten-egg odor to emanate from faucets. While some homes have these magnesium problems, most do not. The implication is that the issue lies not in our water system, but in something specific to the homes involved, most probably their water heaters.

Water heater manufacturers sometimes use sacrificial magnesium rods to control corrosion; the rods waste away saving more essential parts from harm. The resulting dissolved magnesium can either react with naturally occurring sulfur in the water to form hydrogen sulfide gas (H<sub>2</sub>S) with its distinctive rotten-egg odor, or, in association with the temperatures found in most water heaters, it can create a festive environment for harmless, but frustrating, sulfur bacteria.

Sulfur bacteria are naturally occurring in the environment and can be found in the hot and/or cold side of a house’s water system. They come in two forms, sulfur oxidizing bacteria (SOB) and sulfur reducing bacteria (SRB). Both take in sulfur as food and flourish in magnesium-rich water. SOB produces black sediment that can clog plumbing fixtures; it’s aggravating, but it won’t harm your health. SRB—the more common of the two—produces H<sub>2</sub>S, which can be detected by smell in quantities as low as 2 parts per billion. Though H<sub>2</sub>S can be toxic at high levels, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) does not consider its presence in drinking water to be a health risk.

So, what’s a homeowner to do with these unwelcome odors and/or sludge? In newer homes, there might be an association between odors and some plastic plumbing that is now the standard for new construction. In this case, your homebuilder may be able to help, though not always.

In older homes, sulfur bacteria might need to be controlled. But, be sure to check with a professional plumber before attempting any corrective action on your own! Several ideas that might help are listed below, but each comes with a caveat:

- Install a filtration system that employs chlorine to kill bacteria (chlorine has its own aesthetic issues).
- Buy a new water heater without a magnesium anode (expensive).
- Remove the magnesium rod from your existing water heater (probably voids your warranty).
- Routinely kill bacteria with high temperature and chlorine (water at 140 degrees can scald in less than a few seconds).

In the end, both “m’s” are essential to human health. Additionally, the U.S. National Academy of Sciences has estimated that a nation-wide initiative to add calcium and magnesium to soft water might reduce the annual cardiovascular death rate by 150,000 in the United States. Proving once again, you might not like it, but it’s good for you.

## Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Report

Approximately 25 attended the monthly General Meeting held on Thursday, June 7.

### Guest Speaker

Ian McFall, Executive Director, Economic Development Council (EDC) described the reorganization and goals of the Council. (See related article on page 11.)

### Reports from Agencies and Organizations

John Fischbach, Jefferson County Administrator, announced that Peter Buck has been chosen as the mediator for the Port Ludlow Resort Build-out project in the Mediation/Hearing Examiner case on appeal and that the ground rules have been established for the mediation process.

The applications for a new Appellate Hearing Examiner would close June 17. The Closed Record Appeal Hearing will be conducted simultaneously with mediation in **August**. If the mediation is in progress, and an appeal is not needed, then the County will refund the monies.

The Board of County Commissioners has approved Olympic Terrace II and the final plat recorded as of May 7.

The Paradise Bay Road lights by the Village Center will be installed in **July**.

When asked by a Council member about the status of the Visitor Center, Mr. Fischbach reported that the Center would remain where it is, and after some permitting issues are resolved, they intend to landscape, pave, install restrooms, add new signage and perhaps a picnic area. All this should take place within the next year.

Diana Smeland, Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) President, reported that the County Hearing Examiner approved the proposed Ludlow Bay Village development on February 8, 2007. PLA is entering into mediation with the appellants and hopes to resolve outstanding issues. If that is not successful, PLA hopes to have the Appellant Hearing sometime in **July or August**.

The Olympic Terrace II final plat approval was received May 7 and the plat recorded on May 10. They have re-

leased pricing for the model as well as lot premiums. (For standard specs, see her report on page 30.) The anticipated opening of the two-story, 3,157 square foot Olympus model is in late **July** or early **August**. Two additional single-story models, a 2,465 square foot Anderson and a 2,703 square foot Claywood should be completed during the fall.

Arlene Obtinario, Administrative Chief of Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue (PLFR), speaking on behalf of Chief Ed Wilkerson, reported that the Board of Fire Commissioners has approved a new Fire Fighter Trainee program that opens three full-time fire fighter/emergency medical technician trainee positions to members of our Volunteer Resident Fire Fighter program. These three new trainee positions allow for full staffing 24 hours per day at the Port Ludlow and the Shine/South Point stations. PLF&R expects to start this new program mid-**July**.

PLF&R, partnering with Melanie D. Lewis and Maureen Larsen of Coldwell Banker Realty, will sponsor the first annual Health and Safety Fair at an open house at the Port Ludlow/Oak Bay fire station on **Friday, August 31**, 1:00–4:00 p.m. (See related article on page 7.)

### Treasurer's Report

Gene Carmody thanked John Cragoe for his able assistance. The storage unit is now rented on an annual basis to save PLVC rent. To date, the rental fee for spaces at the Friday Market has garnered \$780, and, with the large number of vendors, more income is expected in June. The phone directory sales have earned \$1,490 to date and are continuing briskly. The Funfest projection figures look good.

**Friday Market:** The number of vendors has increased. Residents are encouraged to visit the market and sample the old and new offerings.

**Funfest:** Lia Robinson outlined the work the Committee has accomplished and discussed budget items and insurance concerns. Much has been accomplished and the Committee is on schedule to deliver a fine event. The event is being promoted through new media to build added awareness among those visiting the Olympic Peninsula.

**Trails:** Larry Scott thanked PLA for supporting the make-over of the entrance to the Interpretative Trail and the donation of two weed wrenches for Scotch broom. He also thanked the Fire Chief and his crew for help completing the Beaver Dam Trail. He mentioned future plans and priorities for evaluating Lower Rainier Trail drainage issues and assessing the cost of repairs to existing asphalt trails. Brian Belmont will be assisting him. Jack Riggen and Larry Scott will co-chair the LMC Greenbelt Committee. Larry Nobles thanked Larry Scott and all the volunteers for the continuing improvement of the Port Ludlow Trails. Trail maps are available at the Beach and Bay Clubs.

**Recycling:** Steve Failla described the two additional bins for green glass and #2 plastics. The additional bins should help reduce overloading and let Skookum reduce the number of pick-ups. Please call Skookum if a specific bin is close to full. Phone numbers are on the bins.

Electronic recycling, a joint effort of the Boeing Bluebills and Skookum, will take place **Thursday, September 20**, 8:00 a.m. to noon.

**Utilities:** Walt Cairns reported his Committee had a short meeting with four people from Puget Sound Energy to discuss encouraging residents to report "danger trees" to the PSE. Completion of the Four Corners substation is on schedule according to PSE. PSE also intends to upgrade the quality of power on Oak Bay Road. This Committee will meet again in **September**.

**Health Facilities Group:** Larry Nobles reported on discussions with Jefferson Healthcare regarding a Port Ludlow medical office similar to the one opened in Quilcene. (See related article on page 8.)

## PLVC Utilities Committee Report

On June 5 the Utilities Committee of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) met with representatives of Puget Sound Energy (PSE) and a local government energy coordinator in an effort to get answers to questions about power issues in Port Ludlow. They discussed electrical distribution to and outages within Port Ludlow.

North Bay is at the end of a supply line from the north and South Bay is at the end of an entirely different line from the south. Each has a different "phase" so they cannot cross supply since they are "out-of-phase." This is why, during an outage, North Bay may be "on" while South Bay is "off" and vice-versa.

Within Port Ludlow most of our electrical lines are underground, but the lines that ultimately supply our community pass through adjacent communities with above-ground lines on poles. Overhead lines are more vulnerable

to breakage, but easier and quicker to repair. Overhead breakage is primarily due to trees and parts thereof falling on the lines, especially in conjunction with wind and/or rain.

PSE depends heavily on citizens to report potential problems which may lead to outages, such as trees leaning on wires, etc., and has made a phone number available for that purpose—888-225-5773. PSE encourages residents to report potential problems and promises to inspect within three days of the call. Actual outages, of course, are addressed immediately. So, be alert to actual or potential problems with overhead transmission lines on either side of our community, particularly on Oak Bay Road and Beaver Valley Road. Let our preventive slogan become, “report a problem—prevent an outage!”

## LMC Board Activities

**LMC Board Orientation and Goal-Setting Workshop**  
The Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees gathered at the Beach Club on Saturday, May 5, for an all-day orientation and goal-setting workshop. The Trustees collaboratively worked on identifying the following goals for the coming year:

1. All Standing Committees will develop, for Board approval, written policies and procedures. Where appropriate, the policies and procedures will include enforcement procedures in compliance with the Association's governing documents.
2. Identify membership issues versus special interest issues. That is, develop a means for assessing whether or not issues identified by Committees truly reflect the wishes and interests of the broader community.
3. Improve and expand two-way communications between the Board and the membership regarding corporation affairs and concerns.
4. Identify possible Board credibility issues.
5. Develop a long-term solution to the *Voice* funding.

## Beach Club Manager's Report

The Trustees have been provided financial statements through April 30 and had no questions regarding the report. Year-to-date we have collected nearly 99 percent of the invoiced 2007 annual assessments.

Washington State Ferries has implemented electronic ticket sales on all major ferry runs. As of May 19, we are no longer selling ferry tickets at the Beach Club. That was the expiration date for the three tickets, with a face value of \$15.60 that were left in our inventory.

Our insurance company, Community Association Underwriters, sent a risk management specialist to Port Ludlow to provide an assessment of Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) improvements. The specialist inspected the Beach Club and Bridge Deck facilities as well as Kehele Park. Although at this writing we haven't yet received a written report, the only verbal suggestion made was that we should post evacuation routes in each of the Beach Club rooms.

The removal of the English ivy that was growing alongside the outdoor swimming pool has been completed. At last month's meeting we asked for authorization to hire Joe Thompson to remove the ivy. It was explained that this would be a time and materials contract but it was estimated that the cost for the removal would be approximately \$1,300. LMC had budgeted \$2,000 for the entire project. Since the large amount of dirt found under the ivy would prevent us from planting the lawn area as planned, I instructed Joe Thompson to remove the extra soil so that we could complete the job and his final bill was \$1,895.25. Additionally, we purchased approximately \$50 in grass seed. The total cost for the project was below the budgeted amount of \$2,000. Article III Section 8 (L) of the LMC Bylaws states:

*The Board of Trustees may appoint a General Manager who may exercise the authority of the Board of Trustees between formal meetings of the board, provided that all such authority so exercised shall be reported to the next meeting of the Board and submitted for approval by the board. Failing such approval, such action of the General Manager shall not be effective after the meeting of the Board of Trustees at which considered except to the extent that formal continuing undertakings may have been made on behalf of the corporation.*

As part of our preventative maintenance program, the LMC recently has had the three propane pool/spa boilers (\$510) and three Beach Club heat pumps (\$356) serviced.

The opening of the outdoor pool went smoothly and we have received numerous thank you messages from the membership for opening the pool two weeks early.

## SBCA Update

Eleven residents attended the June meeting of the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) Board of Directors. Primary discussion focused on the Annual Meeting to be held Tuesday, July 17. Members will be asked to vote for four new Board members and whether to approve annexation of up to 202 new homes to be located in up to five new South Bay villages being planned by Port Ludlow Associates (PLA). A “yes” vote activates the Capital Contribution Agreement. The Board recommends approval of annexation primarily because:

- SBCA will receive \$2,000 per home in the already-annexed Olympic Terrace II as each home is sold.
- SBCA could, over time, receive up to around \$550,000 in capital contributions and dues from new members if the Developer opts to annex each new village.
- Annexation helps to ensure jurisdiction over new homeowners who then would be bound by our Master CC&Rs and Design Guidelines.

A copy of the Capital Contribution Agreement and some pros and cons are posted on the [plsbca.org](http://plsbca.org) website and on the Bay Club bulletin board.

Also discussed was the survey recently taken by the PLVC Communications Committee. The top priority of those responding is to bring more harmony to Port Ludlow and its residents living in the North and South Bays. The Board was asked to support and encourage opportunities to carry out this priority.

### Committee Reports

**Architectural Review Committee (ARC):** Linda Colasurdo reported that Aven Andersen has been appointed Chair. Jerry Perlot, outgoing Chair, will be recognized for his outstanding service. Of six permits requested, three were approved and the other three required a Committee visit. Village ARCs approved 10 applications. The

Committee is working on the final draft of the “limited common area application forms.” Jefferson County will hold a meeting on Wednesday, June 27 at 3:00 p.m. in the Bayview Room at the Beach Club regarding new County tree-cutting ordinances.

**Finance and Long-Range Planning Committee:** Chris Whitehurst, reporting for John Cragoe, stated the committee discussed:

- (1) different types of utilization reports
- (2) if the reports would be useful for planning
- (3) which users the reports might benefit

Work has started on the first item on the renovation priority list—the upgrade of exercise equipment and the cosmetic appearance of the exercise room. Equipment has been ordered and lighting issues investigated. The next item on the priority list is the acoustics in the Great Room, the Auditorium and the meeting rooms. The Board approved \$1,000 to hire an acoustical engineer for an opinion on those changes that would benefit the Club.

**Policy and Procedures Committee:** Tom Stone presented, in Ed Knodle’s absence, provisions of the May revision of the SBCA Policy and Procedure Manual Outline not previously reviewed by the Board. The Board voted to approve those provisions with one item to be sent back to Committee for review by counsel. Once completed and approved, the Manual will be available for members to access on line or at the front desk. Each staff member will have a copy.

**Tennis Committee:** Connie Wilkinson reported lots of play at the courts and that **Saturday** lessons are successful. To avoid traffic hazards, she suggested overflow parking should be at the Golf Course parking lot and not on Highland Drive.

**Financial Report:** Chris Whitehurst presented the financial highlights through April. Current Assets are \$382,086.84; Total Assets are \$532,392.71. To-date, Fiscal Year 2007 is well ahead of budget with total revenues of \$383,587.43, total operating expenses of \$304,531.81 and a net operating surplus of \$79,055.62. The Maintenance Reserve is \$112,467.32, and the Renovation Fund balance is \$127,761.12. At the **July** Board meeting, a decision will be made as to allocation of surplus funds.

**Membership and Operations Report:** Mike Morgan reported there were four re-sales. Membership total is 535 of which 29 are Associate members. The exercise room has a new elliptical machine. A ceramic pot with plants has been donated. (See related story on this page).

**Old Business:** The Annual Meeting mail-out packet was discussed. It was suggested that the proxy be printed on different colored paper to avoid accidental discard of the ballot. The packet also will include the proposed budget for fiscal year 2008 to be ratified at the meeting, biographies of the Board candidates, and why the Board recommends approval of annexation of additional villages into the SBCA.

**New Business:** Bill Browne, a South Bay representative to PLVC, asked that the current SBCA Board support and recommend to the incoming board that SBCA is interested in creating a more harmonious environment throughout Port Ludlow. The PLVC would act as a facilitator to improve relations between North Bay and South Bay. The current Board agreed with the concept and the issue will be placed on the agenda for the **July** SBCA Board meeting.

Next monthly Board meeting is **Friday, July 6**, at 9:00 a.m. The Annual Meeting is **Tuesday, July 17**, at 2:00 p.m. Both meetings will be held at the Bay Club. 🌱

## Developer's Report

### Ludlow Bay Village:

The County Hearing Examiner approved the proposed Ludlow Bay Village development on February 8. We are entering into mediation with the appellants and hope to resolve outstanding issues. If that is not successful, we hope to have the Appellant Hearing sometime in **July** or **August**.

### Olympic Terrace:

We received final approval on May 7 and recorded the plat on May 10. We have released pricing for the models and standard specifications, as well as for lot premiums. The homes will start at a range of \$525,000 to \$650,000 or a little over \$200 per square foot. Our standard specifications will be granite countertops, tile, custom cherry cabinetry, hardwood floors, 10-foot ceilings, and 8-foot doors. The first model, the Anderson, is 2,465 square feet and is a single story. The second model, the Claywood, is 2,703 square foot and is also a single story. The third model, the Olympus, is 3,157 square feet and is two stories. We anticipate opening the Olympus model in late **July** or early **August**. The Anderson and Claywood models should open about 30 days later. Our designer is Connie Lamont from Poulsbo. She has worked with residents here in Port Ludlow, so her name may be familiar.


